Bill Buckman Designated Outstanding Conservationist

By Charles VanDeaver Bill Buckman of Bogata has been designated Outstanding Wildlife Conservationist of the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. The district's board of directors chose Buckman because of his outstanding contribution to wildlife native to this area. Buckman owns 310 acres of

Bogata. The ranch contains 60 acres of improved pastureland and 250 acres of native pasture wildlife land. Soils consist of tight sandy loam upland and clayey bottomland. The clayey bottomland is frequently flooded by Mustang Creek. Buckman purchased 160

acres in 1972 and immediately

land about four miles south of contacted the local Soil Conservation Service office for technical help. He signed a cooperative agreement with the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District April 21, 1972. With SCS assistance, Buckman developed a pasture and wildlife conservation plan. In 1974 he purchased an adjoining

tract containing 150 acres. His plan was revised to include the additional land.

The native pastureland is covered with hardwoods, native grasses and forbs that are being protected and improved for wildlife habati. Deer and squirrel populations are increasing.

The cooperator's first project was to develop an improved pasture on the 60 acres of open land. The acreage was seeded to common bermudagrass and clovers. The pasture is fertilized and stocked light so cattle seldom go into the woods and compete with deer for native browse.

During October, 1974, Buckman constructed a small lake in the native pastureland. The lake impounds about four surface acres of water. A six inch trickle tube was placed under the dam with an eight inch riser and valve behind the dam. This design was used so excess water would be taken from the bottom of the lake. Fertile water near the surface is left in the lake to increase fish production. The lake is stocked with channel catfish and improved hybrid bream. The lake furnishes needed water for deer and squirrel during dry seasons. Several specie of ducks, including wood ducks and mallards are seen on the lake.

Several small areas in the woods are seeded to rye and oats to furnish deer food during January and February. This is recognized as the most critical season for deer food in this Greenbrier and area. American beauty berry are protected for native browse. These plants and acorns furnish food during summer and until mid-winter. Seeded

buds start growth in March and April. Small feeders were built in the woods to feed deer and See BUCKMAN Page 5







In 1925, The Star-Telegram bought William Randolph Hearst's Fort Worth Record and introduced the economy of publishing two newspapers in the same plant. Coincidental with the word "press", the first merchant to open his door in Fort Worth was Press Farmer, whose store was doing business in a tent at the Trinity River crossing in early 1849. The business section grew rapidly around the military fort, named for General Williams Jenkins Worth by the fort commander. Major Ripley A. Arnold.





Course At PJC

A course on Terrariums and Foliage House Plants will be taught at Paris Junior College beginning Thursday, February 12, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. in Room 104 of the Grimes Natural Sciences Center. 

Also, not later than this day. the presidential candidate can, by written notice, refuse to be represented by a nominee. They are than dropped and replaced by the Delegate Selection Committee chairperson.

April 1, 1976 Thirty days before election. A nominee for delegate cannot withdraw after this date. If a nominee dies, his or her name will remain on the ballot, the votes are counted and, if they win, the Delegate Selection Committee chairperson names a replacement.

April 10 - April 11, 1976 Up until April 10, 21 days before election, a presidential candidate can withdraw. If the candidate withdraws, all of the candidate's nominees are not printed on the ballot. If a presidential candidate dies or withdraws before April 11, 20 days before election, the nominees for delegate will not appear on the ballot. If a candidate dies after April 11, these delegate nominees will remain on the ballot and will be uncommitted or become pledged to another presidential candidate.

May 1, 1976 Democratic Primary Election--This is it-- election day. Remember, you cannot vote for a slate by pulling one lever. You must vote for each individual delegate. People could vote for 1 Bentsen, 1 Wallace and 1 Uncommitted Nominee. Those delegate nominees in the number allotted to the Senate District who get the most votes are the winners. It can be a majority or a mere plurality.

Precinct, senatorial or county convention will be held as usual. There will be two state conventions as usual during a presidential year. The first one will be June 18 to 19 where the 32 at large delegates and all 70 alternates to the national convention will be elected. The second convention will be held between September 7 and September 21 (date to be set by the S.D.E.C. later). At this convention, we will elect state party officers as well as a State Committeeman and State Committeewoman from each Senate District.







Continued From Page 1 squirrels. Shelled corn is fed during winter and block salt is kept in the feeder year round. Native mask consist mainly of acorns and hickory nuts. Buckman is improving native mask by grafting pecans on young hickory trees. He does the grafting work and has about 25 living grafts. He plans to underplant pine seedlings on several 2-3 acre motts to furnish more dense cover for deer. He will also plant honeysuckle this year for deer browse. The pine will later furnish food for squirrel after they start producing cones.

A small stream meanders through the improved pasture. Native brush and weeds are maintained along the stream to furnish a travel lane for deer and nesting area for quail. Buckman constructed a fishing pier on the lake before it filled with water. With help of several friends, he built a cabin near the lake during the summer of 1975. An access road to the lake area was also built. The road curves through the woods so wildlife may not see or be seen at great distances.

Buckman is truly a wildlife conservationist and urges others to protect and improve wildlife habatit in this area. He is concerned about some landowners clearing timber without plans to provide for native wildlife. Buckman's example will undoubtedly motivate other landowners to carry out a better wildlife management program.




