### Wright Named Director Of NETPA

Robert W. Wright, publisher of the Deport, Bogata and Talco newspapers, was named a director of the North and East Texas Press Association at the annual meeting in Sherman last weekend. The Association celebrated its 50th Anniversary with this meeting, during which James T. Bass, publisher of the Mount Vernon Optic-Herald, served as president. Bass will serve as chairman of the board of directors of the association as immediate past president.

Awarded the Sam C. Holloway award as the outstanding newspaperman of the year was Charles Hawkes of the Arlington Citizens-Journal. The award is made possible each year by a bond donated by Holloway's widow, Lucille, of Deport, who was unable to attend the convention this year due to her health. Holloway was the first to receive the Outstanding Newspaperman's Award in 1918, and the award was named after him two years later.

The North and East Texas Press Association encompasses the entire eastern half of Texas. The Mount Vernon Optic-Herald has been a member of the North and East Texas Press Association for 23 years, since 1953, the year following its purchase by Mr. and Mrs. James T. Bass. In 1973 the Deport, Bogata and Talco newspapers, which had belonged to Sam C. Holloway until his death in 1960, were purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Bass and their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Wright. George Grant and his son-in-law, Jerry Burns, had owned and operated the Holloway newspapers from 1960 until 1973. Grant had worked as a printer and linotype operator for Holloway almost all his life.

Holloway bought the Deport Times from Claud Council in September, 1912. He established the Talco Times in 1936, after the discovery oil there, and purchased the Bogata News in

1937. He and his wife, Lucille, were often visitors in the Bass home in Mount Vernon.

James T. Bass entered the newspaper business while in high school in his home town of Jefferson, Texas, at the Jimplecote, then worked for the Longview News-Journal for 18 years in the job shop. Mrs. Bass worked for four years on the advertising staff at the News-Journal, then both worked for a short time for the Gladewater Mirror before the purchase of the Optic-Herald.

### Committee Elected On Line Branch

Landowners in the Line Branch watershed recently elected a committee to guide development of a plan. The plan will serve as basis for RC&D cost-share funds. Committee members are Jack Franklin, Gordon Strain, Raymond Knight and Thomas DeBerry. This committee will work with other landowners and Soil Conservation Service personnel to develop and implement the plan of action.

Line Branch is a critical area treatment project measure in the Northeast Texas Resource Conservation and Development. Charles VanDeaver, District Conservator told the landowners that Line Branch is rated second in Red

River County and is in the top ten in the five county RC&D project area. The project measure is to control erosion and reduce silt.

Ten possible sites for drop structures were discussed at the meeting. Also, the possibility of shaping 270 acres of critical area. Waterway shaping and the smoothing and sprigging of old terrace systems that are contributing to the erosion problem was also discussed.

Everyone is concerned about the erosion of our agricultural lands that must support future generations. The control of soil erosion and silting of our streams benefit everyone. Since the community will benefit from this project

measure, the cost-share rate will be 80-20. The RC&D project funds will pay 80 percent of the cost of installation while the landowner will be responsible for 20 percent.

Each landowner will have maintenance responsibilities of practices installed on their land. The Soil Conservation Service will check the practices for a five year period after installation.

Bill Brooks, RC&D Project Co-ordinator SCS, made the point that the project measure is in its planning period. Now is the time to recognize the work needed. Each landowner should make the final decision on the work to be done on his place.

The landowners were told by Charles VanDeaver and Bill Brooks, that a person must have control of the land on which he wants work done. It was pointed out that a conservation district agreement sheet could serve as a land control document.

RC&D can not work directly with landowners. It must work through some unit of government. The Line Branch project measure is sponsored by the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District. RC&D will work through this unit of government.

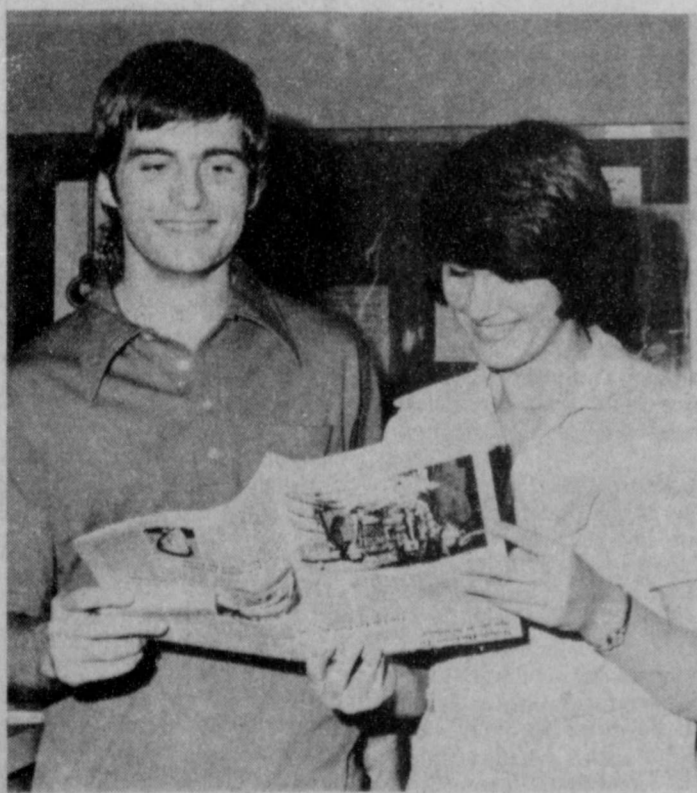

## The Speaker Reports

AUSTIN--Hopefully our state agencies, commissions, governing boards and institutions got the message last week at the Governor's Budget Conference.

The message was that state appropriations and expenditures are growing at alarming rates and must be halted. The lid must go on.

Texans are telling state government in no uncertain terms, "We're tired of excessive government."

I joined with the governor and Lt. governor in explaining to the heads of all our departments that we would not stand by and see our taxpayers gouged for additional taxes to support bigger government.

I take to heart the late President Kennedy's words: "We must remember that the people come first, not the government."

Government was created for the benefit of the citizenry. It does not serve the people well by becoming a burden to them.

Right now in Texas one of every six workers is employed by local, state or federal government. That will one day be one in every four workers unless we bow our backs and resolve that we are not going to

become a state overflowing with bureaucrats.

I can think of only one thing better than no growth in government and that would be cutting down what we presently have.

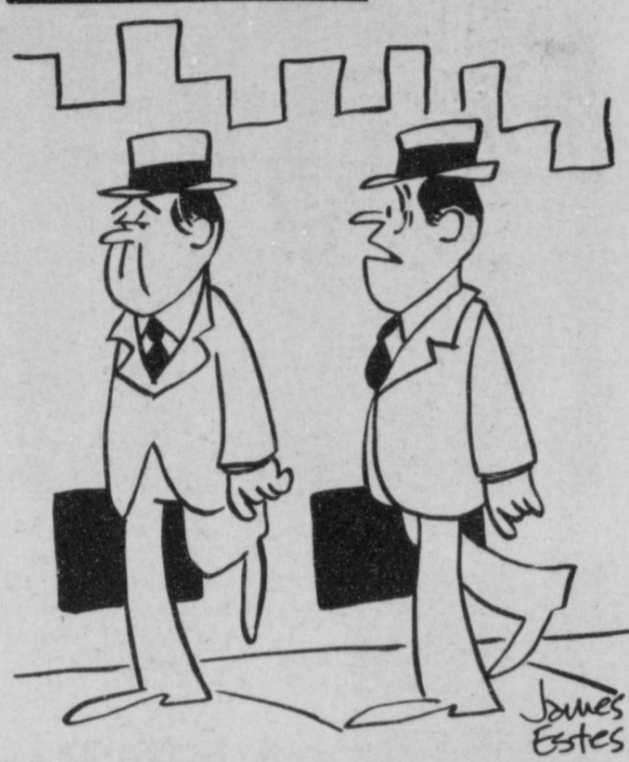
Government will remain an important factor in our lives, and we don't want to destroy the initiative of programs that plainly benefit the great majority of our taxpayers, but the fat has got to go.

I am hopeful that zero-based budgeting will make it easier for us to more easily identify the least critical areas of government services.

We are having agencies first submit their budgets at 90 per cent of present funding. If additional funds are needed the agencies must submit proposed budgets for every additional 10 per cent increase.

This concrete step in budgeting is in the right direction. There are innumerable suggestions as to where cuts can be made. In the coming months the budget process will focus on all of these areas and the results can be a break for our overburdened taxpayers.

## TEXAS 1876

March 18-25, 1876

**SAN ANTONIO**—The Committee on War Expenditures of the House of Representatives has summoned several Texas men to Washington to testify before the committee. Among those summoned is James Trainer of San Antonio.

**HOUSTON**—Efforts are being made by the directors to make the Seventh State Fair, to be held here the first week in May, a more extensive and attractive exposition of the kind than any which has yet taken place in Texas.

**RAINS COUNTY**—All the prisoners in the Rains County Jail escaped last week.

**GALVESTON**—The number of cases docketed during the past week in the Recorder's Court were twenty-seven. Of these, thirteen were fined, the fines amounting to \$90, independent of the costs; seven were discharged, and nine continued to next week.

**WACO**—Last night and this morning the weather was the coldest we have had this winter—a regular old freezer. It is feared all the early fruit was killed.

**HOUSTON COUNTY**—There was no service of any kind in any of the churches at Crockett Sunday, in consequence of the smallpox scare. The bridge across Hurricane bayou is completed; it is a very substantial structure.

**COMAL COUNTY**—The penetration of Western Texas by railroad will, it is hoped, bring this fine region more prominently before the world and promote the growth of population. New Braunfels, the county seat, is filled with houses white as snow.

**PARKER COUNTY**—Many a buffalo has bit the dust on the frontier within the last few months, judging from the number of hides brought to Weatherford.

**SAN ANTONIO**—Information from the lower Rio Grande says the Revolutionists are encamped near Matamoros, the heroic city, but neither Federal nor Revolutionists are very active. They act cautiously.

**GONZALES COUNTY**—Gypsum is found here, as well as coal.

**COOKE COUNTY**—Dr. Toles of Dexter has been sentenced to one month in the penitentiary for bigamy. Under the laws of the Republic of Texas, bigamy was a capital crime; but no one was ever hung for it.

## Texas Taxes

Austin—We have all heard jokes about traveling salesmen.

I am sure that many of these sales people fail to appreciate the humor of such jokes. I can sympathize with them, because most of them are, I am sure, honest, upstanding, reputable, taxpaying business people.

But there are also some traveling sales people, especially in the rural areas of our State, who attempt to make the State of Texas and its taxpayers the butt of a joke.

I am talking about the shysters. Not only may they be selling worthless products, unlike the reputable route sales person, but they may also be operating in violation of State tax laws.

Anyone who operates a regular retail business must obtain a Sales Tax Permit from the Comptroller's Office. This applies to traveling sales people as well as those with fixed places of business.

If they do not have a Sales Tax Permit, they are committing a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$500 a day. They are not only violating the law, however, but also engaging in unfair competition with other business people and cheating the taxpayers.

Sales tax permit holders must collect taxes on all purchases not exempt by law and forward those taxes to the State. If they fail to do so, they are again violating State law and are subject to punishment.

Possession of a permit indicates the probability that the permit holder is forwarding to the State the taxes you pay. And that makes it easier for the Comptroller to collect the taxes all of us must pay.

It is for the protection of taxpayers that they request from such sales people proof that they are legally engaged in retail sales.

Citizens making purchases from traveling sales persons should request to see their Sales Tax Permits. We can and do keep track of those retailers who have permits.

Legitimate route sales persons who are abiding by State tax laws should not mind presenting their permits for inspection upon request.

The assistance of consumers assists us in fairly enforcing the sales tax law and insuring that your tax dollars are spent on programs and services that benefit all the people of Texas.

## The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Alaska! The dream of getting rich on the Alaskan pipeline, where wages for "go-fers" are rumored to hit \$1,000 a week, has recently caused many Texans to pay several hundred dollars for "advance fee resume services" in hopes of getting jobs in the Far North.

Unfortunately, as attorneys in our Consumer Protection Division can attest, the only assistance most persons receive from such services is help in parting them from their cash.

Because of this, we were able to get a permanent court injunction against one such "resume service" which was misrepresenting its ability to put customers in touch with employers hiring for pipeline jobs. We were also able to get restitution for many persons who had used the service under the impression that pipeline jobs were plentiful and that the resume service had special influence with employers.

We discovered that the company's efforts amounted to taking \$400 and some background data from a person, preparing and duplicating several hundred resumes, and providing them along with a set of gummed addressed labels of potential employers. The customer was responsible for stuffing, stamping, and mailing them to the addressees.

What the company failed to tell customers, however, was that they had had no contact whatever with the companies on the labels and that many of the names and addresses were merely copied from oil and gas directories and journals.

The service also misrepresented to consumers that all of the employers listed on the labels were actively searching

for pipeline workers, when in reality they had no idea if jobs were available at any of the employers listed.

In our investigations into the services offered by this advance fee resume service, we discovered that the availability of jobs on the Alaskan pipeline was so limited as to be almost nonexistent for most persons.

We talked with the Alaskan assistant deputy of labor, whose description of the job situation in that state was so revealing that we asked him to come to Texas to provide information in our case.

According to this expert, the resume writing services who advertise pipeline jobs are useless in helping persons to get those jobs. That's because most pipeline work requires highly skilled, technical, or experienced labor, and hiring for such jobs is done through unions.

In addition, he pointed out that there are large numbers of unemployed workers already in Alaska, waiting for any job openings that might become available.

So if you're interested in using an advance fee resume service to get a job in Alaska or elsewhere, be sure to inquire first into the service's success rate in getting jobs for its customers. Ask for names of persons who have obtained jobs by using the service, then check for information. Check, too, with some of the employers whose names have been provided. Find out from their personnel director if employees are ever hired in this way. And if you have a consumer complaint about deceptive trade practices in this field, or others, get in touch with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division or your county or district attorney.

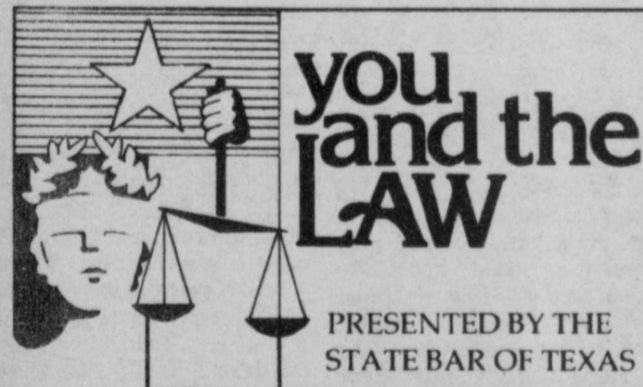
After both the applicant and the staff have spoken,

other persons attending the hearing have an opportunity to make statements. They may ask questions of the applicant or may tell the hearing commission anything they believe to have a bearing on the proposal.

One of the key functions of the hearing examiner is to ask questions of the applicant, staff and any witnesses present to bring enough evidence to light to allow an educated decision to be made on the case. He then writes his report which is presented to the Board, usually within 60 days after the hearing.

Today, under provisions of the new Administrative Procedures Act, agencies are required to conduct hearings much more like court trials than was formerly the case. A person not trained in the law may not know how to present his side of the story or how to prevent the opposing side from using statements which could not normally be used in court.

So, if you have something to say (pro or con) at a TWQB public hearing, please attend the hearing in question and speak up.



## You and the LAW

PRESENTED BY THE STATE BAR OF TEXAS

**Q: We are planning to sell our home. If we find a buyer who wants to "assume" our mortgage, instead of arranging for a new mortgage, could our mortgage company come back to us for payment of the mortgage if the buyer cannot make the monthly payments?**

**A: Yes.** Any time you sell your home by having someone assume the balance of your mortgage, the mortgage company retains the right to look to you for the monthly payments if the buyer fails to meet them. To protect yourself in a sale of this type, the contract between you and the buyer should be written to include provisions allowing you to have title to the home returned to you in the event the buyer defaults; then, you would resume responsibility for paying off the mortgage.

**Q: How can I copyright watercolors I have painted?**

**A: Artists** cannot always prevent unauthorized reproduction and distribution of their work. Their rights are controlled by common law copyright and Federal copyright laws. Before art works are publicly displayed, the artist has absolute control. Once art works are publicly displayed, the artist must comply with federal copyright

laws which require that a statutory copyright notice be affixed to the art work, and a copyright form be filed with the United States Copyright Office. The result of failure to comply is that the artist loses all control over reproduction and sale of his work.

**Q: I inherited several hundred shares of stock from my father. Is my husband's permission required for selling this stock issued in my name?**

**A: No.** Texas law no longer gives the husband full control and management of a married couple's community estate. A wife now has full control and management of her separate property and all community property acquired solely with the wife's earnings.

**Q: I have a question as to whether my lawyer did something unethical in representing me in an estate matter. Should I hire another lawyer to investigate?**

**A: You** should bring your complaint before one of the district grievance committees of the State Bar of Texas. If you do not know the name of the chairman of the grievance committee in your area, write to the State Bar in Austin. It will not be necessary for you to have a lawyer to represent you before the grievance committee.

## Short Course Slated In April At Rivercrest

A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held April 12-15 under the sponsorship of the Rivercrest High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Taimadge Morgan, Superintendent, and Pete Taylor, Craig Ingram and Bud Thacker, teachers of vocational agriculture.

Phillip Nix, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Nix holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M University, and has also done work in Agronomy at Texas A&M. He has had 19 years of field experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

"Many pasture short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Nix and all have met with outstanding success," according to Ira Black, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Sulphur Springs, Texas.

Arrangements for adult education short courses in pasture and in other fields are made through Black's office.

The short course at Rivercrest is scheduled to begin Monday, April 12 at 7:00 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held April 13-15. During the dates the short course is in progress, Nix will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Taylor, Ingram and Thacker.

Persons interested in attending the short course may pre-register by contacting Superintendent Morgan, or the teachers of vocational agriculture. They can also register at the start of the short course.

An entry fee of \$5 will be charged. Pasture Short Course certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions. Visitors are welcome at all times.

Nix states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to

cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is to help farmers and ranchers make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who

"This cooperative program," stated Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of Beef Production, Farm Electric Wiring and Safety, Farm Electric Motors, Farm Arc Welding, Swine Production, Tractor Maintenance, Oxy-Acetylene Welding, and Pasture.

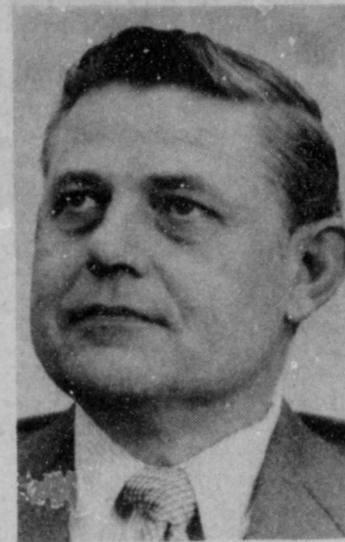
The outcome of this race, which Hudson views favorably from his standpoint, will be determined by the people on the basis of two factors, which he says are in his favor:

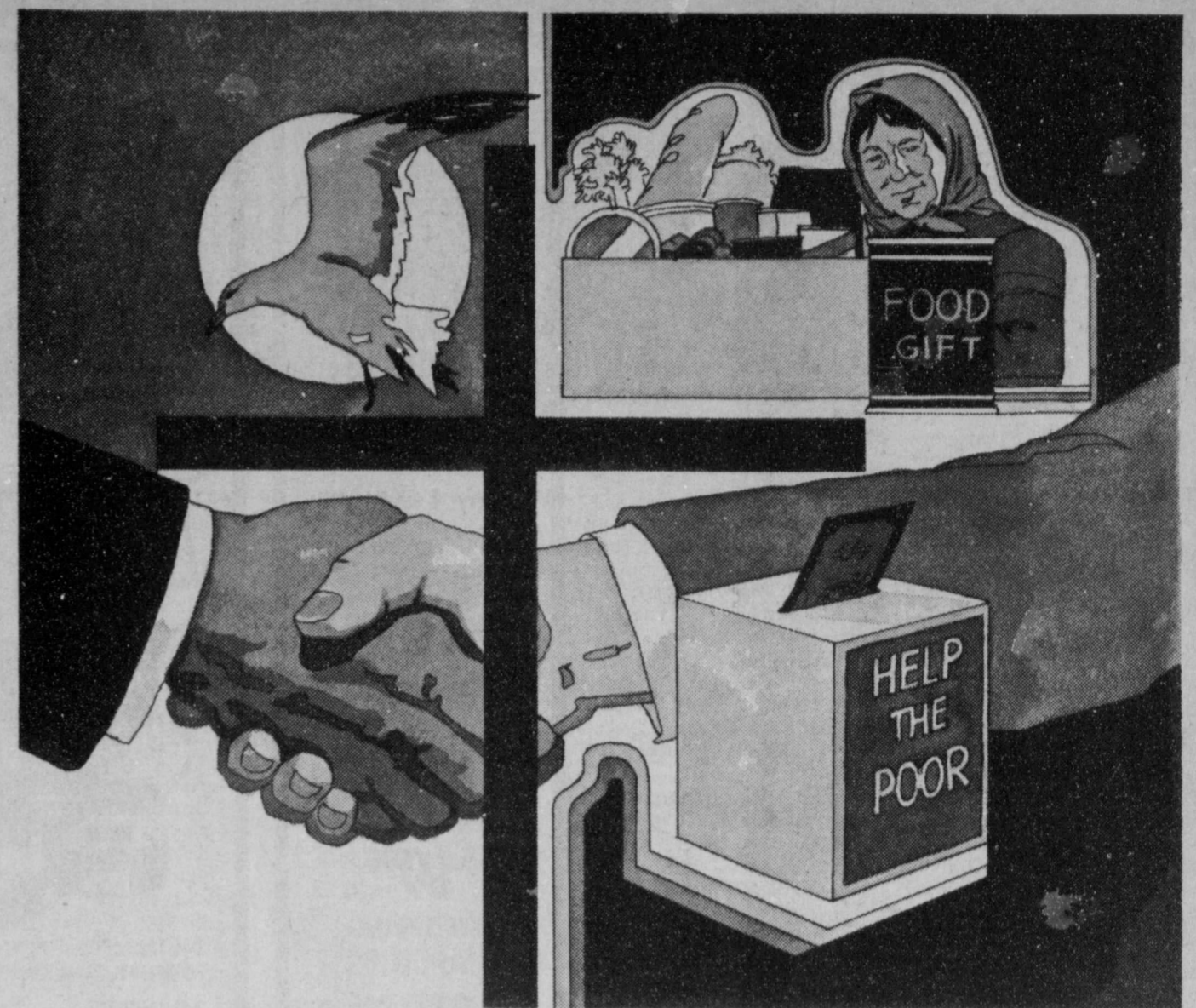

### Governor Approves Funds For Law Enforcement Grant

AUSTIN—Governor Dolph Briscoe announced his approval today of three grants totaling \$90,402 for improvements in law enforcement and criminal justice in the area served by the Ark-Tex Council of Governments.

The largest grant of \$44,152 to the Ark-Tex Regional Law Enforcement Communication Project is to complete the Ark-Tex Regional Law Enforcement Radio Project. Engineering changes were needed to be made. Purchase of equipment with financial assistance from CJD will be provided.

A grant of \$32,000 to the Ark-Tex Regional Crime Prevention Project will be used to stabilize or reduce the incidence of residential and commercial burglaries and theft. This project will continue to strengthen the participating agencies abilities to carry out citizen education and involvement.

A grant of \$14,250 is awarded to "The Red River, Titus and Camp Counties and City of Mount Pleasant Detention Facility", to review plans and requirements for minimum Jail Standards of Texas.

The local grants were among 70, for a total of \$4.5 million, which Governor Briscoe approved today for criminal justice improvements throughout the state.

The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office which administers the state's grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

Pat McDonald, Clarksville veterinarian, will conduct a continuing education class on Beef Cattle Production, beginning Tuesday night, April 6, at 7:00 p.m. at the Vocational Building in Clarksville. This class will meet each week for one and one-half hours until May 25.

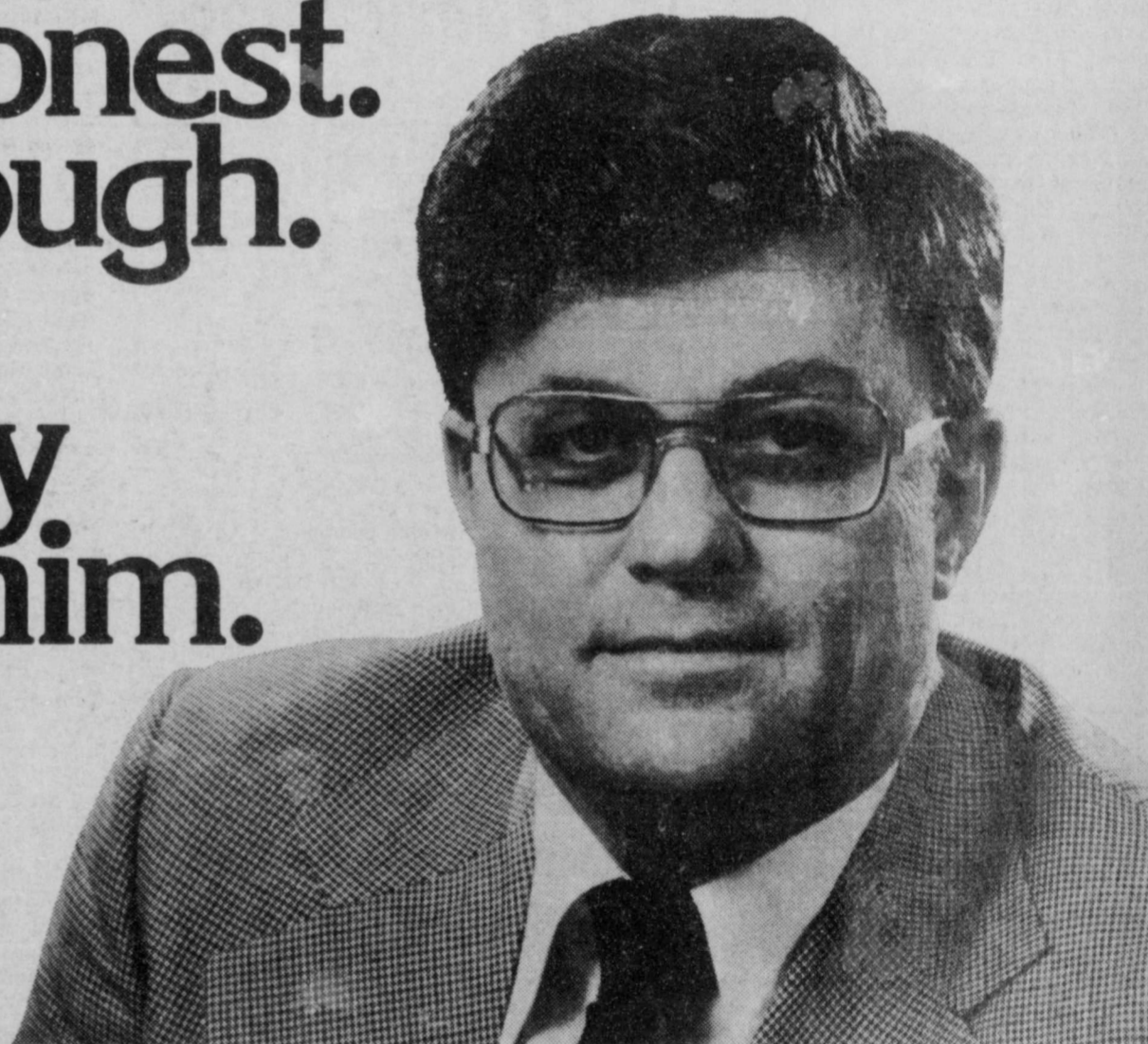

## Deer Stocking Completed For Brownsboro Area

TYLER—Stocking of whitetail deer in the Brownsboro Restoration Area was completed on March 2, according to Jimmy R. May wildlife extension biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

According to May, 71 does and 29 bucks have been released in the 11,000 acre area located in the Brownsboro-Chandler vicinity.

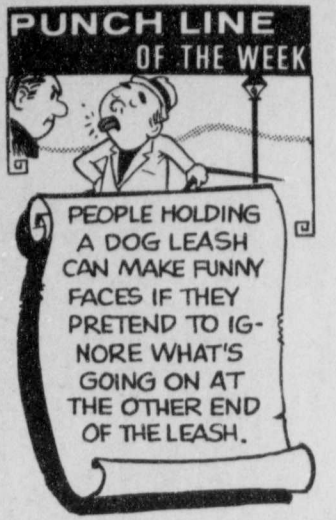
The Game Management Division of the P&WD began working on this re-stocking program last spring when interested landowners contacted the department. The area was recommended and approved as a release site for deer after May found the habitat adequate to carry more brood stock.

Landowners signed a deer restoration license agreement supporting a closed season for five breeding seasons following

date of the last stocking. The deer released in the Brownsboro Restoration Area were obtained from ranches in the Victoria area. They were netted and then transported by truck to the release site.

P&WD officials stress that the area is closed to hunting for five years to allow the herd to replenish the deer population. 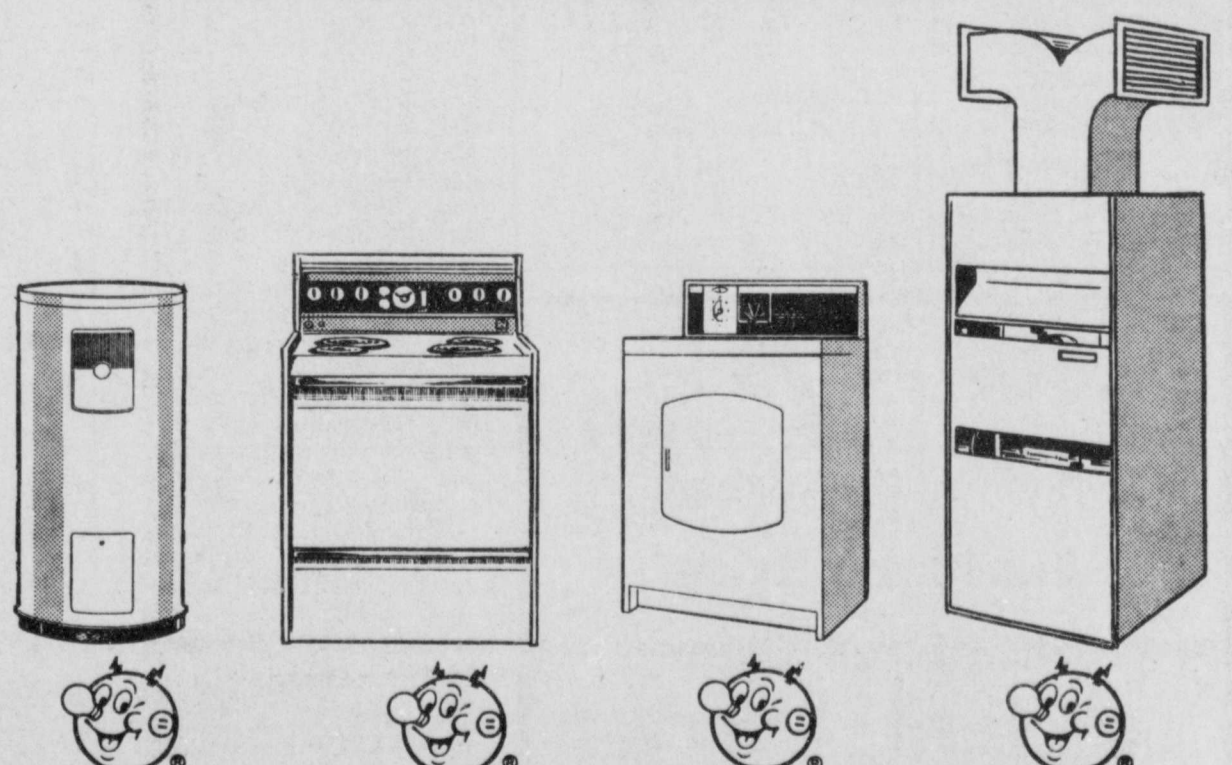

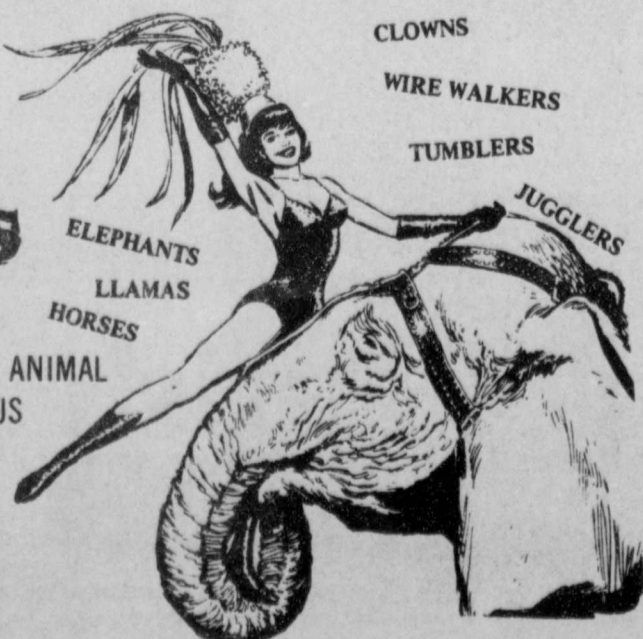
