

making nouncement, Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that Vaughan helped Brazoria County farmers learn more about beef cattle management and rice farming by providing in-depth educational programs.

"Income from the sale of farm products in Brazoria County increased 50 percent from 1971 to 1974, largely due to Vaughan's efforts," Pfannstiel

Partly because of Vaughan's endeavors in 4-H work, the youth program in Brazoria County has expanded to 29 4-H clubs with a total membership of

Pfannstiel said Vaughan was instrumental in getting a man who specialized in marine resources added to the Brazoria County Extension staff. Vaughan recognized the specialized for need educational assistance in making the best use of local marine resources.

Vaughan began his Extension career in Washington County as an assistant county Extension agent; then went to Waller County for three years prior to transferring to Brazoria County 20 years ago.

## **SBA To Increase Bank Participation**

The Small Business Administration is planning to increase by 25 percent the participating with the agency and to generate a minimum of an additional half-billion dollars a year to small

Fred S. Neumann, Director of SBA's five-state Southwest said today that 'planned drastic reduction" in red tape and paperwork would substantially speed up loan procedures and "that will attract more banks in the SBA's programs."

Neumann detailed other facets of the plan which he said would be tested in selected banks throughout the nation.

The new plan provides guarantees to banks within two working days in cases where the bank will take a minimum of 20 percent of the loan and certify as to its creditworthiness in contrast to the current guaranty program in which banks take a minimum of 10 percent. The plan supplements rather than supplants current guaranty programs, he

Neumann said the new plan also would permit banks to apply a fluctuating interest rate on a quarterly basis to their SBA guaranty loans.

"Institutions with large amounts of so-called insensitive interest-rate loans on their books during the 1973-75 period when their market cost of money was much higher are reluctant to handle any volume of long term loans on a fixed basis," he said. "The new plan should provide an attractive incentive for banks to increase their business with SBA."

A new national secondary market program for the sale of guaranteed portions of SBAguaranteed loans designed to tap new private sources of funds in the national money markets also is being planned, he said.

Under this plan, also to be tested with selected banks, participating lenders sell the guaranteed protions of their SBA loans in the investor market place and the proceeds can then be reinvested in the

small business community. "We believe the potential for additional money for small business through this plan is unlimited and certainly will help generate the kind of dollar volume which is necessary for a positive impact on the financial needs of the small

business community," he said. To meet the problem of the lack of access to an adequate supply of venture and equity capital, the SBA has formed a special task force of small businessmen, investment bankers and venture capitalists to analyze the subject and make recommendations to the SBA for innovative action Native rock was used for accent and for the doorway. 




