# Bogata Rodeo Begins This Thursday

east Texas is held in Bogata, Texas, and this year is expected to attract most of the top 15 cowboys and cowgirls in the International Rodeo Association. This year the rodeo is scheduled for June 24, 25, and 26, and will be kicked off with a parade downtown at 4:30

Downtown merchants are planning Bogata's third annual Rodeo Sidewalk Sale Thursday to tie in with the occasion, and the Bogata Area Chamber of Commerce has planned three days of Frontier Days activities to tie in with the big rodeo.

The Bogata Rodeo will feature the nation's top bullfighting clown, Billy Scoggins of Paris, Texas, who is not only noted for his bull fighting ability, but further entertains crowds by "Dancing" with the bulls.

This year the Bogata Rodeo has attracted George (Nocana) Taylor and his wife, Kathi, who do trick roping and comedy acts. Kathi Taylor does a special act with trained dogs.

A live country band will play at each performance, and there will be many other special attractions that will require attendance at the rodeo to see.

Perhaps the reason that the Bogata Rodeo is so large is that one of the nation's largest rodeo producers, Wing Ranch Rodeo, is located just east of Bogata, and is owned and operated by Jerald Smith. Smith will furnish part of his large string of stock for the Bogata Rodeo to add to the excitement of the event. Smith was named Producer of the Year in the IRA

Events will be bareback riding, calf roping, saddlebronc riding, steer wrestling, barrel racing, bull riding, and a calf scramble



"A bank, television or radio station, or any business requiring specialized equipment may buy that equipment from out-of-state without paying the Texas sales tax," he said. "In all those cases, however, they owe the Texas use tax on the total cost of the purchase.

In fact, said Bullock, the use tax is due on any goods bought from out-of-state and then put to business or personal use, without being resold.

The Comptroller said his office is conducting a public information campaign in an effort to clear up misunderstanding about the use tax.

Also Tuesday, Bullock mailed checks totaling \$48.9 million to 846 cities and towns as the June rebate of the onecent city sales tax they collect.

City rebates for 1976 are running 12.5 percent ahead of 1975, he said. Rebates through June of 1975 totaled \$129.2 million, he noted, while they total \$145.4 million through June of this year



R. S. Thornburrow, District Engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, has announced that construction will begin on F.M. Highway 1699 in Red River County. This project will begin at the North end of the present F.M. Highway 1699 and extend West 5.184 miles to F.M. Highway 1158 in the English, White Rock area. Construction will begin June 15, 1976 and will be completed May 15, 1977, depending on weather conditions.

Traffic will be routed through the construction area and barricades and warning signals will be placed at certain points. Flagmen shall be used to direct traffic as necessary.

"The construction will consist of grading, structures, base and surfacing" said J. B. Hutchison Jr., senior resident engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Clarksville, who will be in charge of the project.


#### **Local Option** Petition **Not Correct**

#### Blackland Farm Research Seminar Planned At A&M

operators throughout North Central Texas have been invited to a review of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research and a program featuring top Southwest scientists on July 8 at the Texas A&M University Research & Extension Center.





#### **Utility Commission** Adopts Regulations

mission of Texas, in three days of public hearings, adopted rules governing rates and services of utilities under its jurisdiction. The adoption of the rules marked the end of a thirty-day waiting period during which time public comment was actively solicited. Representatives of various utility companies, plus such groups as the League of Women Voters, the Texas Municipal League, and the Texas Consumer Association were present and participated in the meeting

The rules, which apply to all telephone companies in the state and all rural electric, water and sewerage utilities, concerned three main areas: rate setting, service standards, and reporting requirements.

In setting rates, utilities will be allowed to charge advertising, contribution and donation expenditures in the rate base as long as those expenditures do not exceed threetenths of one percent of the gross receipts of the utility for services rendered to the public. The commission encouraged fully-recoverable expenditures

The Public Utility Com- of such funds used for promoting conservation of energy or measures which can allow a consumer to effect a savings in his total bill. Other recoverable expenditures which were encouraged were those which seek to improve utility peak load usage and support of utility trade associations which directly contribute toward the professional standing of their memberships.

Contributions to charitable causes and such organizations as Chambers of Commerce will be allowed as a cost of service so long as the total sum of all such expenditures does not exceed the three-tenths of one percent formula.

The utilities were excluded from charging customers for funds spent for political or lobbying activities, membership in social, recreational, or religious organizations or clubs, or promotion of increased energy consumption. Utilities, if they choose however, may spend investor dollars for these purposes.

The reporting section of the rules, while lessening the burden on utilities to supply data to the PUC on a monthly basis, requires that the companies supply the commission with information on quarterly and annual bases regarding their fuel costs and other expenses, such as advertising, contributions, employee expense accounts, and political lobbying expenditures.





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

#### **Profits Made Through** Pasture Management

By Glen Sutton Managing pasture grasses can increase farm and ranch profit. Good grass reduces the need for commercial feed. Grass also saves money by controlling erosion. Less money spent on feed and controlling erosion means more profit to the farm.

Nature gives us grass. About 50 percent of the annual growth is available for production of livestock and livestock products. Dallisgrass and Common bermudagrass need at least a four-inch height left and fescue and coastal bermudagrass need at least a sixinch height. The four-inch and six-inch stubble belongs to the land and plant for soil and grass insurance. This insurance provides erosion control, soil fertility maintenance, water conservation and stabilized soil temperatures. It also provides for plant growth and reproduction. Use beyond this point means a loss in plant vigor and future pasture production. Further use means bare ground ranching. Forage production is cut thus causing an increase in cost for feed. Grass recovery is very slow and seeding needed to reestablish the grass. Bare ground is an open invitation to erosion. Gullies will further

reduce the production of the land. The soil washed into streams will clog the stream and increase flood danger. Silt will also destroy fishing and water supplies in the streams and lakes
