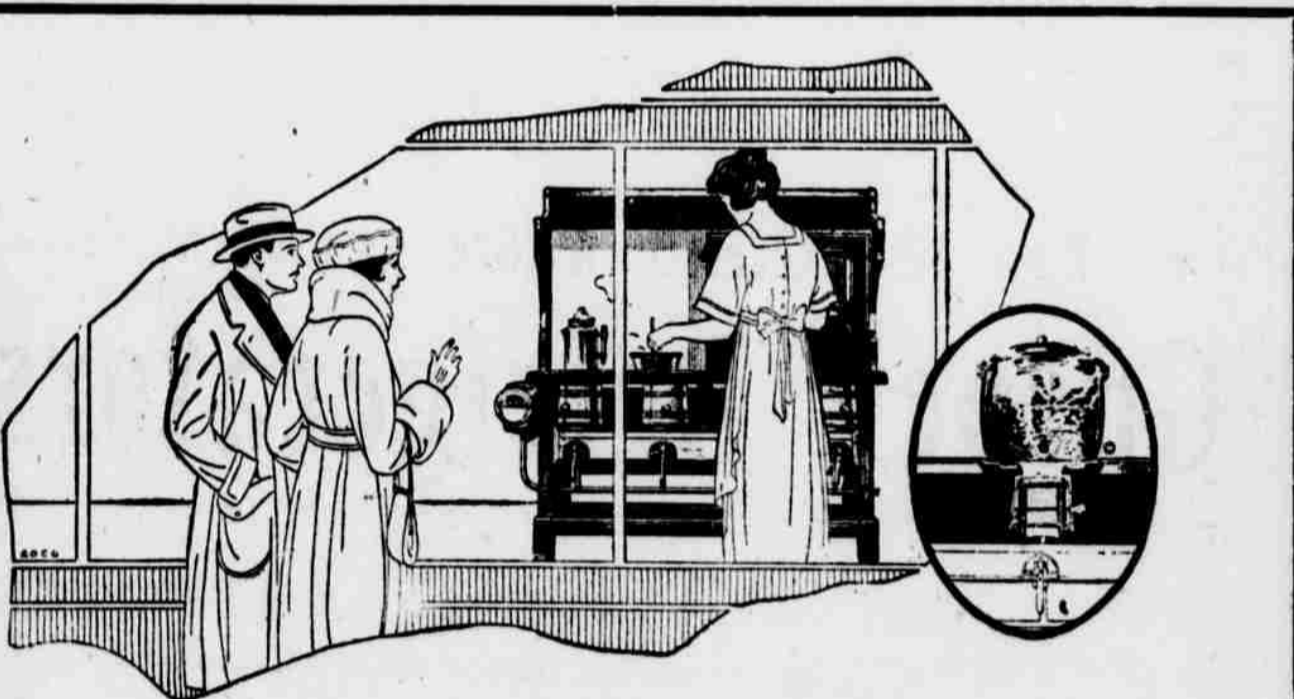

**STAMFORD LETS CONTRACT \$80,000.00 SCHOOL BUILDING**

The Stamford School Board has let the contract for Stamford's new High School building, the contract price for the building, wiring, plumbing and heating coming within the bond issue of \$80,000.00.

J. C. Joplin Construction Company of Wichita Falls got the contract. The school will be erected on one corner of the old Stamford college property. It will be three stories high. The contract calls for the completion of the building in time for the next scholastic year, which begins in September.

The completion of this building will give Stamford four commodious school buildings and ample accommodations for the present scholastic population. It is being built on the unit plan so that with the growth of Stamford other units may be added.

**PIG CLUB INTEREST RAPIDLY GROWING**

Interest in the Pig Clubs which are being organized over the County is rapidly growing according to J. W. Foster, principal of the Midway school, who has been leading the organization work in the county.

Clubs have already been organized at Rule, Rochester, Post, Sayles, New Mid, Center Point, Tonk Creek and Midway, while clubs are in progress of organization also at Welnett, O'Brien. The Midway club reports more than 75 per cent of their stock subject to registration.

A meeting is being planned for all the clubs in the county at an early date for the purpose of perfecting a county organization and electing officers. This will probably be followed this fall with a pig club show.

The communities that have not taken up the work are urged to do so at once and help to make Haskell County the better hog producing county in West Texas.

### SWEET POTATO DISEASES AND CURATIVE STEPS

There are some disease of sweet potatoes which are doing considerable damage to the potatoes in the field and while in the storage houses. The worst of these is the black rot which is being scattered over the State by infected slips and unless potatoes are carefully selected and crated, it will become worse from year to year. Black rot is usually carried from the seed lot to the field by infected slips. From the field it is brought to the storage houses, where it may spread and from there it is taken back to the seed bed unless the potatoes are selected and treated.

For these reasons all growers of slips whether for home use or for commercial purposes, are urged to use the following method in order to grow good healthy slips.

Before bedding, be sure to carefully select the seed potatoes and discard all that show any black spots or other signs of diseases. Then dip all of the seed potatoes for ten minutes in a solution containing one ounce of bichloride of mercury (corrosive sublimate) to eight gallons of water. This solution will kill the disease germs on the surface of the potatoes, but cannot reach those which have already gone

through the skin and hence it is very important to select the potatoes carefully before being dipped.

The dipping can be easily done in a shallow vat or in barrels or half barrels. Wooden vessels should be used as the bichloride of mercury is corrosive to metal. This solution is poisonous and should not be left where livestock or children can have access to it.

A handy way to do this dipping is to place the potatoes in bushel baskets and then immerse them in the solution for ten minutes. They are then ready to be placed directly in the seed bed, after the solution has drained off. While they are being bedded another lot can be dipped. This method is very simple and extremely important to keep down serious diseases.—By E. A. Miller, Sweet Potato Specialist, A & M Extension Service.

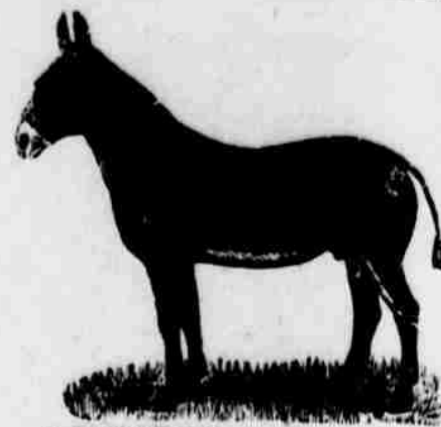

### HASKELL IN DEAD EARNEST ON PLAINS ROAD

Haskell is in dead earnest to help build the proposed Fort Worth-Plains railroad. That spirit is dominant not only among the business men but even in the ranks of the laborer. No wonder that the writer in his present journey over the proposed route of the Fort Worth-Plains railroad found Haskell ready to shoulder its part of the burden, whatever that load might be.

E. Patterson, vice-president of the Haskell National Bank, is one of the real fighters for the West. Patterson said that Haskell is particularly anxious for the road to be built and that when the time came for action Haskell would not be found lacking. The writer believes that the business men and cattle and land owners of the territory about Haskell would readily purchase \$200,000 worth of stock in the railroad if it should decide to build across Haskell county and make Haskell city a station. Merchants and land owners with whom I conversed reiterated faith that Haskell would come in "big" on the project. Haskell is at present an important station on the Wichita Valley railroad running from Wichita Falls to Abilene.

**Prosperous During Depression**  
 Even during this season of the year, when freight business is at its lowest ebb, Haskell is giving this railroad in \$15,000 a month, which does not include freight which goes out collect or is received prepaid. Ticket sales run from \$1,000 to \$2,000 a month. In 1919, the writer was informed, Haskell station cash receipts were in excess of \$100,000. It must be remembered that there are several other stations in the county that did considerable railroad business. The fact of the matter is that Haskell county is among the more prosperous and wealthiest in West Texas. Its cotton production, local people say, is equal to that of any other West Texas county.

In 1921 express receipts were over \$22,000. During the winter over 300,000 pounds of poultry were shipped. The value of the latter was about \$80,000.

The value of property in Haskell county in 1920 was \$23,537,100, as against \$1,765,490 in 1900. This increase was phenomenal. It was largely due to the ingress of a railroad. The county has by no means been fully developed. The potential tonnage could be increased a hundred fold.

**Crop Production**  
 Figures on crop production in 1920 for Haskell county are:  
 Oats, 460,000 bushels.  
 Wheat, 825,000 bushels.  
 Maize, 1,050,000 bushels.  
 Sorghum hay, 3,000 tons.  
 Cotton, 40,000 bales.

It might be remarked that if the price of cotton had not been under the cost of production in 1920, when the 40,000 bale production is shown, the figures might have been increased by 20,000 to 30,000 bales, for, it is conservatively estimated, that much went to waste in the fields.

The potential tonnage of Haskell is large. Much of the richest sections of the county have not been developed. There are thousands of acres which have never been plowed. Under these circumstances Haskell feels pleased to announce to the world, through the columns of the Record, that it is ready to go to bat with any other railroad fan to make a "homer" for Haskell. The proposed railroad on its way to Fort Worth would bisect Throckmorton county, now without a single mile of railroad. Throckmorton county has about 900 square miles, or 576,000 acres, most of which is arable. Of that acreage only about 57,000 is now actually under cultivation, the remainder being in fenced ranches.—Hamilton Wright in Fort Worth Record
