Rebels Score Late Against Mustangs

The Rivercrest Rebels discovered too late in the ballgame Friday night the right combination to move the football against the Hughes Springs Mustangs, and took the plunge 27 to 8.

The Mustangs exhibited a strong ability to move the ball on the ground, collecting 304 yards of Rebel turf for the stable. A struggling Rebel offensive squad could seek out only 84 yards against the Mustangs.

The Rebel score came in the last half of the fourth quarter in a desperation attempt to get on the scoreboard. Quarterback Kip Stansell, who had handed the ball to running backs Billy and Milton Scales without success, gave to sophomore Jimmy Via for a 14 yard gainer to the Hughes Springs 47.

Four plays later Stansell looked downfield for a pass receiver, then scampered down to the left sideline for 35 yards. Fifteen of these yards were

erased by a penalty against the Rebels, and the ejection of Ricky Franks from the ballgame. Barry Hanna was thrown out of the game earlier, and a Hughes Springs player ejected later as tempers flared in the penalty riddled game.

A welcome combination, the Stansell to Chris Potter pass that worked for the Rebels last year, put the Rebels on the Hughes Springs seven yard line as the pair made a 28 yard completion. Via carried in for

the score from the four yard line with 16 seconds left on the clock. Stansell found Potter in the end zone again for the two points after.

It was a long ballgame for the Rebels and a large home crowd of Rebel fans who came out for the first game of the season. Hughes Springs scored their first touchdown early in the first quarter, and the Rebels ran only seven plays from scrimmage in the first period. The sole first down of the first half came to the Rebels on a penalty for roughing the kicker, Joe Rhoades.

Hughes Spring scored late in the first quarter, once in the second and third quarters, in addition to the early score.

Play was interrupted by official penalty 26 times, with 12 penalties assessed against the Rebels for 86 yards and 14 against the Mustangs for 190 yards. Rebel penalties were for offsides and illegal motion, plus two personal fouls and one for roughing the passer. Mustangs were penalized repeatedly for holding.

Joe Rhoades did the punting duties for the Rebels, averaging 32 yards a punt. The Mustangs returned only two punts for a total of 13 yards.

The Rebels will play this Friday night at Cooper at 8:00 p.m.



Blossom Threatened With Lawsuit

The Blossom City Council voted Tuesday night to leave action to Jack Brooks and his attorney in the matter of a letter of disclaimer which Brooks has sent the City of Blossom claiming \$30,000 in losses to Brooks because of the raising of a road in Blossom which causes his property to flood.

Books said he and his attorney had set 5:00 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 8, as the deadline for action by the city before a suit would be filed. No action has been taken nor has there been a suit filed at this time. Blossom city attorney Eric Clifford said the action at this time stands only as a claim against the city which the city has refused to pay.

Brooks is asking \$10,000 in damage for each acre of property he owns inside the City of Blossom. He bought the property in 1969.

In other business the council gave approval for the Senior Citizens to use the Community Center three days a week for a hot lunch program, and authorized Community Public Service to install three street lights on North Street near the new City Park.

An emergency ordinance was approved providing that stop signs be erected on Division Street where it crosses Center to solve a traffic problem by the new Post Office.

The council authorized city clerk Ms. Mildred Justus to

check on a surplus ambulance for use by the city water department.

An ordinance providing for federally subsidized flood insurance was passed by the council and signed by Mayor Charles Fendley.

The council approved an easement to Lamar County Water Supply to lay a water line and install ground storage facilities in the City of Blossom.

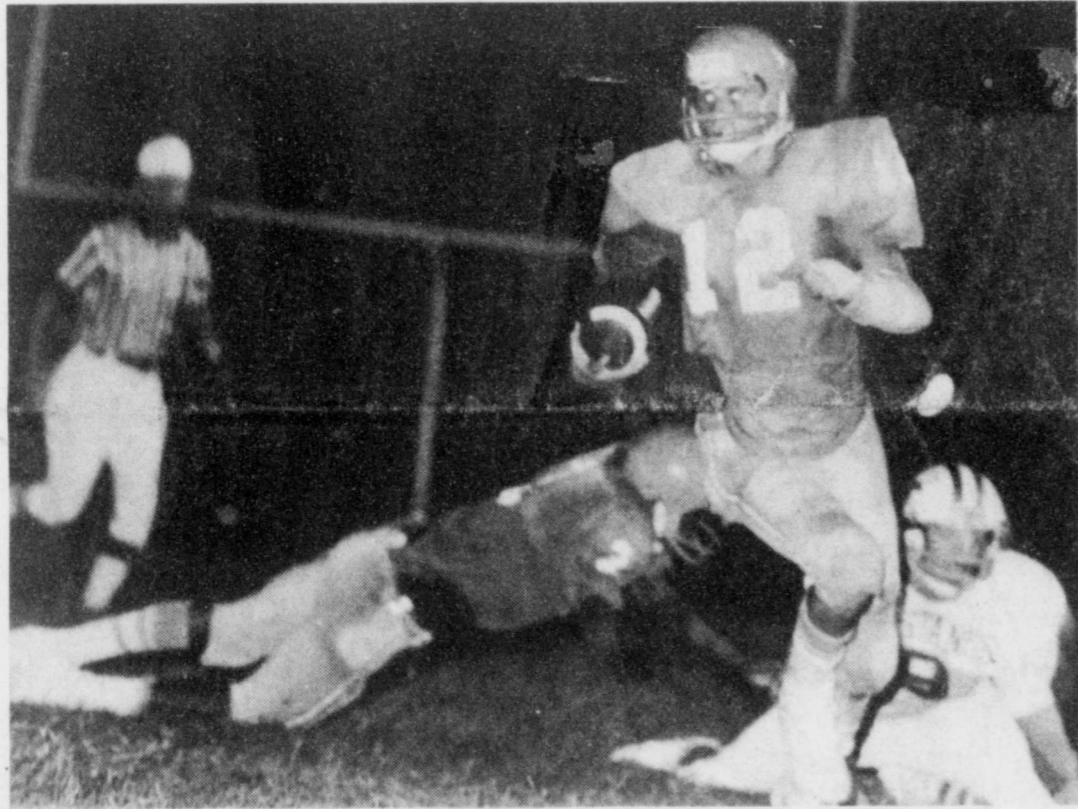
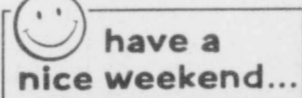
The council voted to send Danny Mieur to a training school conducted by the Texas Department of Health Resources in Tyler Sept. 13-15. The training would be applied to credit for Mieur's certification as a waste water and

water treatment plant operator.

The council voted to raise Mieur's salary from \$600 a month to \$650 a month.

The council agreed to check into a 100' line to tie Marvin Galey into the city sewer system.

Joe Singleton, Ronald Roddy, Tom Garrett and Mrs. Chuck James appeared before the council to ask for better sewer service. City engineer Jerry Lands was assigned the task of determining the best method of solving their problem.

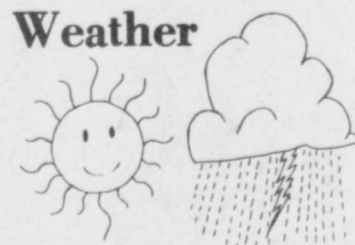

Vehicle Registrations Increased

AUSTIN—Texas motor vehicle registrations increased more than half a million in the 1976 registration year over the preceding year according to a preliminary count by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Robert W. Townsley, director of the DHT Motor Vehicle Division, said the 1976 preliminary total of 10,220,919 is expected to increase when the final results are tabulated. The 1975 registration year total was 9,687,081. Registration years end each April 1.

Harris County (Houston) again led the 254 Texas counties with 1,670,596 motor vehicles registered. That county's previous year total was 1,555,960.

Dallas County reported 1,188,190 registrations, an increase of 45,327 motor vehicles. Tarrant County (Fort Worth) had 660,890 registrations in 1976, an increase of 34,688.

Loving County in West Texas reported the fewest motor vehicle registrations: 230—an increase of 26 over 1975 registrations.

Beginning with the next registration year, motorists will pay registrations fees on a staggered year-round schedule based on present license plate numbers. In addition to a series of DHT releases giving details

of the new procedures, information concerning the 1977 and later registration methods are in the hands of county tax assessor-collectors.

Hub Whiteman Dies

Herbert L. (Hub) Whiteman of Rt. 1, Clarksville, the 1933 All-American Cowboy, died Thursday in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Dallas. He was 67.

Mr. Whiteman began his rodeo career in 1929, when he joined the 101 Ranch Show. It was the next year that he won his first contest, taking first place in amateur bronc riding at Cheyenne, Wyo.

During his 30-year rodeo career, he received numerous awards and honors and in 1941 was wrestling champion by the Rodeo Association of America.

Among his honors also was a special Hub Whiteman Night at this year's Bogata rodeo.

Mr. Whiteman was born Jan. 1, 1910, at Clarksville, son of

Mr. and Mrs. Squire L. Whiteman. He married Marie Benningfield Aug 29, 1936, at Des Moines, Iowa. Whiteman was a veteran of World War II, serving in both the Army infantry and military police.

Following his discharge from the Armed Forces, he returned to full-time rodeo performing, gradually retiring into judging. He judged rodeos in Madison Square Garden, New York, Cheyenne, Wyo., Boston, Mass., Fort Worth, and many others.

Whiteman served at one time as an officer of the Cowboy Turtle Association. At the time of his death, he was serving on the Board of Directors of the Cowboy Hall of Fame Rodeo Historical Society.

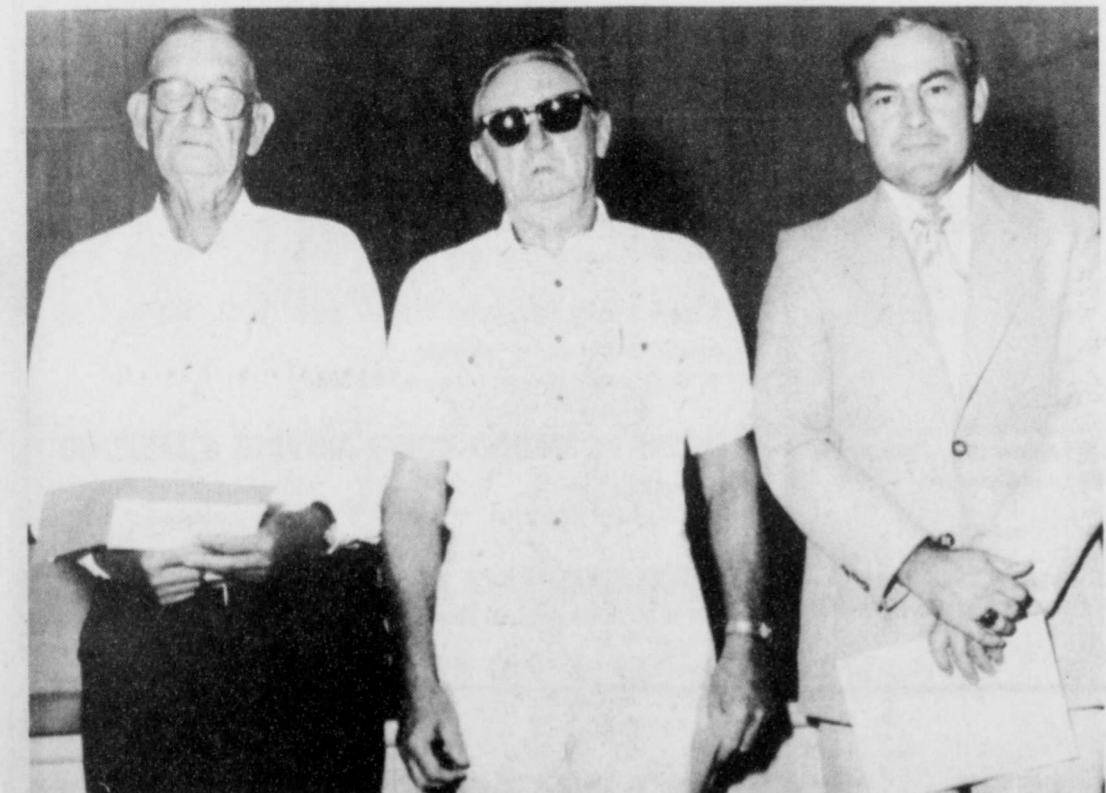

Teachers Attend Outdoor Workshop

Students in local school may find reading, writing and arithmetic being taught with an outdoor flavor this year. Eight teachers from Clarksville and Detroit recently completed a two day workshop on the use of outdoor learning areas. The workshop was sponsored by the Northeast Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts and Region VIII Education Service Center.

Soil Conservation Service personnel assisted in conducting the workshop which was held at SWEPCO'S Wilkes Lodge near Avinger.

Teachers in the Clarksville school system that completed the training included, Lucille Braddock, Eddie Hausler, Suzanne Lowe, Rita McCain, Watha Stroud, Jane Tufts and Mary Ann Williams. Venita Joe Oldfield from the Detroit school system also completed the workshop.

The Red River County Soil And Water Conservation District sponsored the eight teachers to the workshop. The district paid for their meals while attending. The Workshop is one of the educational activities of the district.

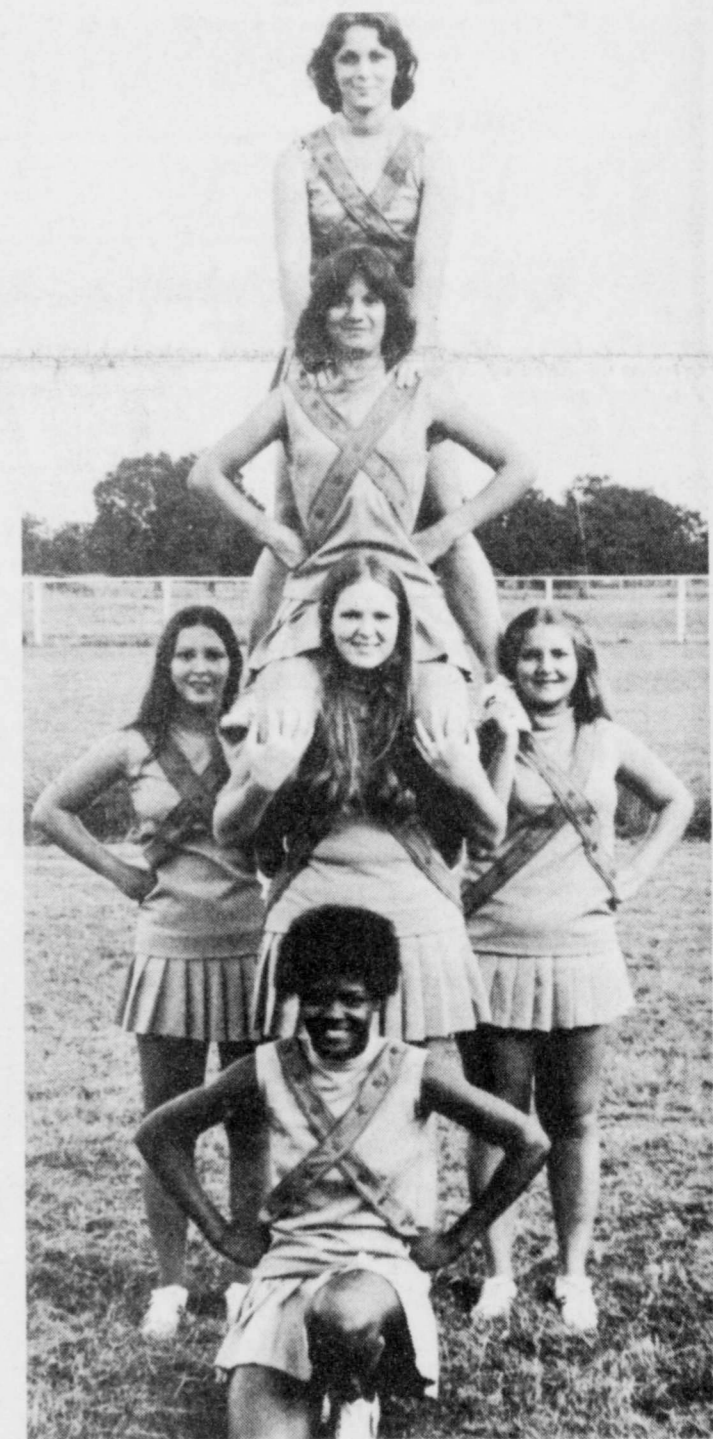
This year's workshop marks the fifth consecutive year teachers and administrators have gathered together at the Avinger location to participate in such training.

Following a welcome by Larry McCasland, President of the NETSWCD association, the teachers exchanged ideas and viewed slide programs on outdoor classroom development, use of nature trails, and sources of materials and manpower in development of learning areas. The second days activities included group planning of outdoor classrooms taking into consideration resources that might be available on school property. "Outdoor learning areas do not take the place of classroom teaching but rather is an extension of such instruction," according to Charles VanDeaver with the SCS. "The possibilities involving the use of such areas or limited only by the imagination of the students and teachers," he added. VanDeaver said that the SCS would be glad to assist teachers interested in developing outdoor classrooms.

Conservation of our soil and water resources cannot be accomplished entirely by

farmers and ranchers. There must be public awareness of its importance. This awareness can be developed by teaching conservation in school. Outdoor learning areas help make this teaching more meaningful.

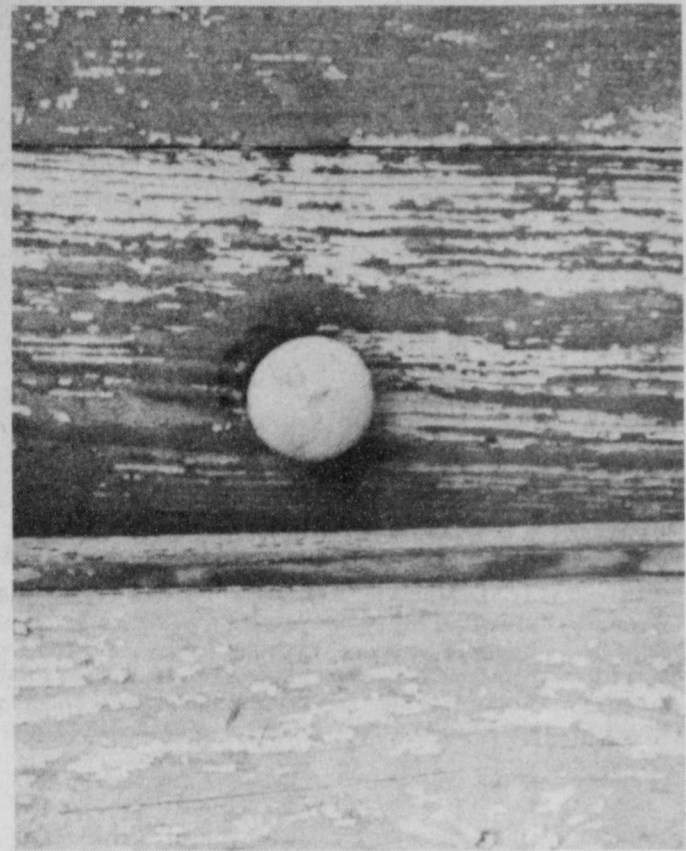

Bullock Set Back By Supreme Court Decision

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that the Texas Supreme Court's denial of his request for access to the status of tax cases previously sent to the Attorney General for suit is a setback for tax administration for the Comptroller's Office.

Bullock explained that he sought information on the status of the 5,600 delinquent sales tax cases totaling more than \$13.5 million as part of his overall effort—which began when he took office January 1, 1975—to clean up the backlog of sales tax delinquencies that he inherited.

He said the 5,600 cases are "just those of \$500 or more and have an average delinquency of \$2,410. If you think that's peanuts, consider that it represents the sales tax due on gross sales of \$48,200 made to consumers of this state."

Shortly after taking office, Bullock said, "I was shocked to learn that 70,000 sales tax delinquents owed the State a total of \$60 million. We did everything we could to collect that money, including conducting more than 500 seizures."

He explained that those delinquent accounts that could not be collected in the field were forwarded to the Attorney General for suit.

"During all of this time," he said, "we assumed that the Attorney General was actively pursuing those cases we sent him as well as the cases forwarded to him prior to my taking office. Records in our office and in courts here in Travis County show that this is not true."

Bullock said he learned that it has taken the Attorney General's Office an average of 529 days—more than 17 months—to win judgments on sales tax cases, 99 percent of which are default judgments that can be won within 30 days of filing suit. Bullock added that he has sent Hill's office 256 cases for suit from July 15 to August 19, yet suit has been filed for only 29. "Delays such as this reduce our chances of ever making collection," he said.

"Perhaps the greatest disappointment of all will be for

my auditors and field employees, who have worked these cases so diligently, only to see their work product gather dust on a shelf in another agency," Bullock said.

"When a judgment finally is obtained, if it ever is, the case is so old that it is extremely difficult for these same field personnel to locate the taxpayer and collect," he explained.

Bullock said his office "will continue to make every effort to collect every tax dollar rightfully due the state even though it will probably take more manpower and more

hours to do so in light of the court's ruling."

He said his staff will begin work immediately to see if there is not some other way to get information it needs.

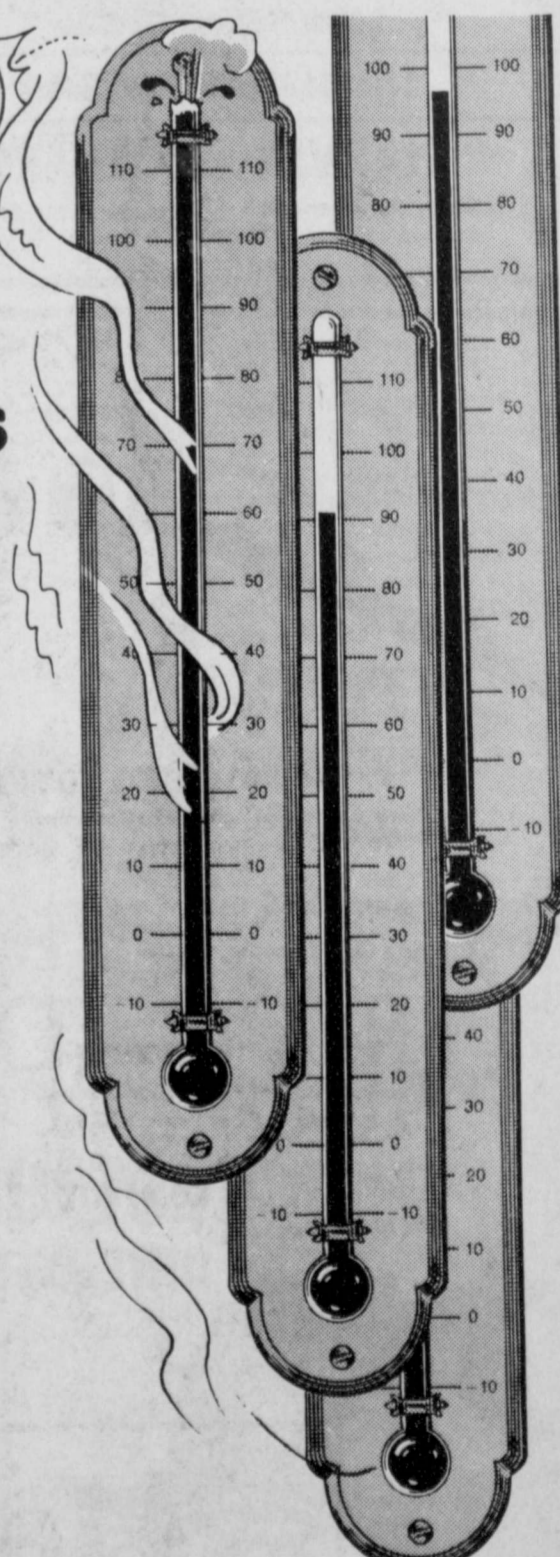

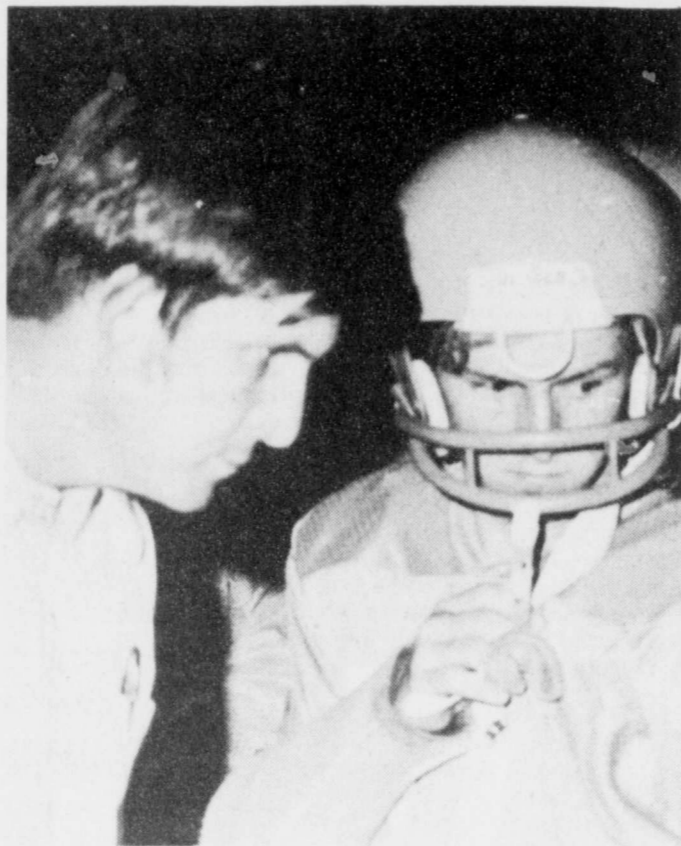

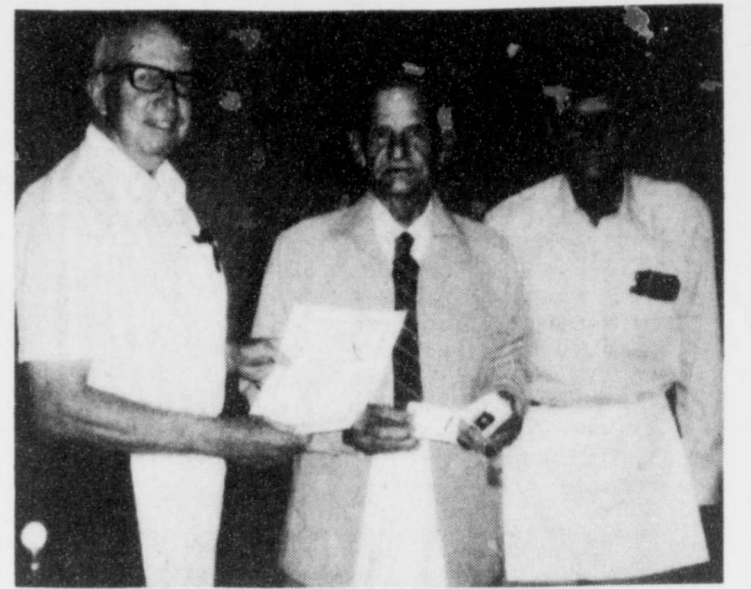

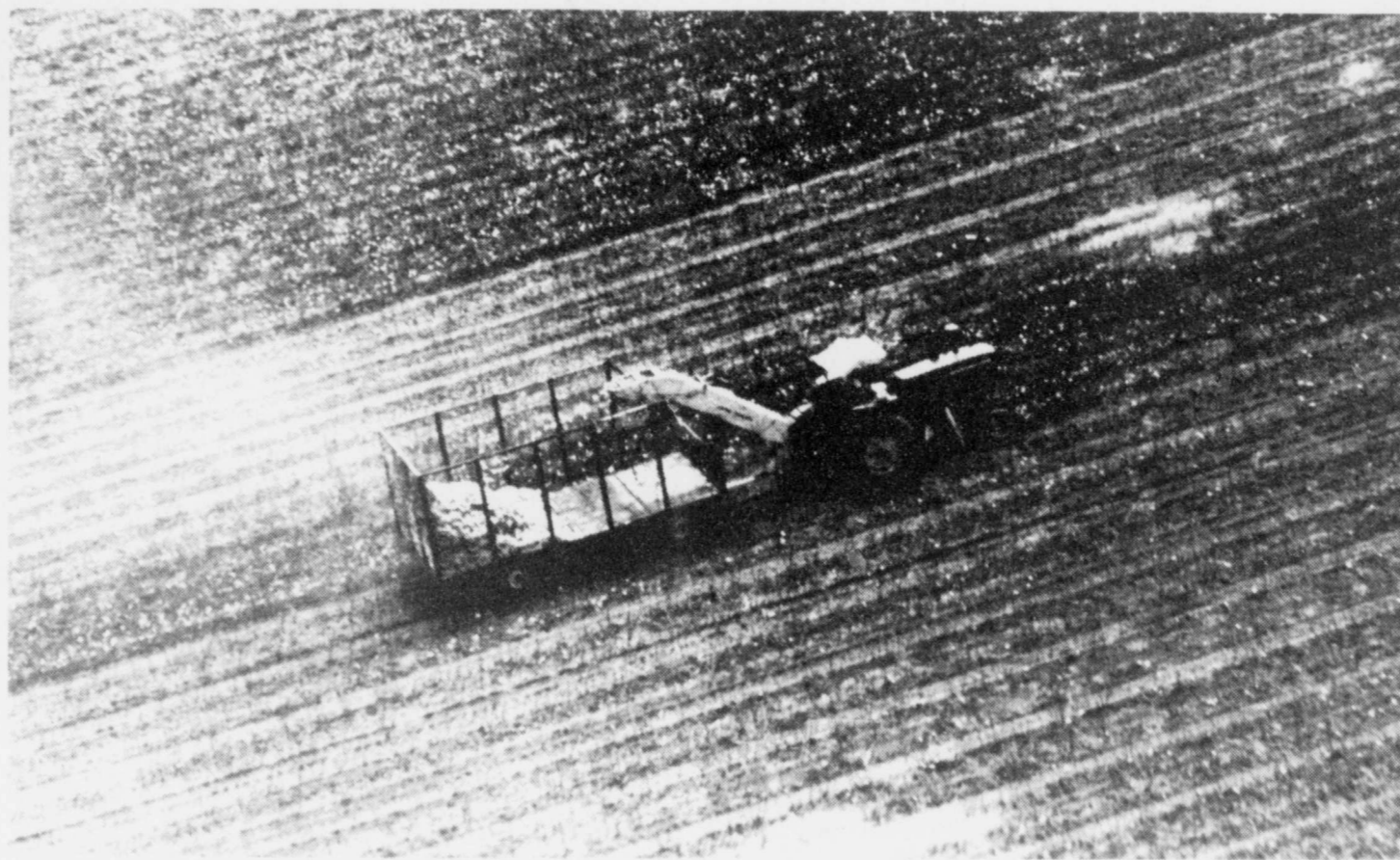
