Rebels Blank Prairiland

A fired up Rebel team discovered Friday night what Rebel fans suspected all along: The Rebels can play football when they want too, and they wanted to play bad enough

Friday night to defeat the Prairiland Patriots 8-0 before a large homecoming crowd.

For the first time this season the Rebels were hitting hard and having a good time doing it,

and they solved some problems during the week of practice that had put the Rebels on the wrong end of the scoreboard in previous weeks.

The largely defensive game

against rival Prairiland was a credit to both teams for sportsmanship exhibited, and Rebels and Patriots joined for the prayer circle following the game.

The contest was scoreless until the beginning of the fourth quarter, but the Patriots had penetrated the Rebel defenses once, marching to the Rebel four line. The Rebel scoring drive began on the Patriot 46 yard line, with halfback Milton Scales picking up 18 yards on one play through the center of the line.

It was the last ditch effort of quarterback Kip Stansell pitching out to Scales as he went down that turned on the crowd, and Scales scampered across the goal line. A Stansell pass to Chris Potter was good for two points after.

Turnovers during the first quarter consisted of long punts by Patriot quarterback Troy Dunn, who averaged 37 yards a punt, to a fumble lost by Scales. The ball went from the Rebels to the Patriots once on downs. A fumble by Kip Stansell was recovered by center Keith House, who was also credited with five tackles during the game.

Other leading defensive players against the Patriots were Jimmy Via with four tackles, Eddie Belcher with six, Joe Lynn Rhodes with eight, Edward Deaton with four, Terry Williams with six and Nicky Brown with six.

The Rebels moved the football well against the Patriots, totaling 286 yards rushing during the game as compared to 89 for the Patriots.

A drive just before the half was thwarted by the Patriot defense, and included a 22 yard pass from Stansell to Billy Scales. Big brother Milton Scales led the Rebels in offensive yardage with 23 carries for 140 yards. Quarterback Stansell added 52 yards to the Rebel game.

The Patriot drive that might have resulted in a tied score was early in the third quarter, when quarterback Troy Dunn gained 19 yards around right end. Eddie Belcher sacked Dunn for an eight yard loss on the next snap. A fumble by Patriot David Haley as he went over the center of the line was recovered by Rebel Jimmy Via, and the Rebels worked from the five yard line to the 39 before punting the ball away.

The Rebels travel almost to Dallas for their game this Friday night against Quinlin, located on the west end of Lake Tawakoni, and fans are urged to follow the team. Kickoff will be at 7:45 p.m.

Community Education Classes Offered

Bogata residents are cordially invited to participate in Clarksville Public School's Community Education Fall '77 Program. Community Education is a return to the "little red school house" concept when the schools were used by all citizens of the community for educational, vocational, and recreational purposes.

Toile Painting and Wood-carving classes will begin on October 17 with registration on Monday, October 10, from 6:00-

8:00 p.m. at the Area Vocational School on North Donoho Street. All other classes will register Tuesday, October 18, at the same times and place. Registration may also be completed during the day at the Chamber of Commerce building.

Thursday night classes, beginning October 20, include Beginning Bridge, Powderpuff Mechanics, Square Dancing, and Women's Physical Fitness. Monday, October 24, classes are Danceercise and Cake Decorating. October 25 classes, Tuesday, include Men's Basketball, Belly Dancing, First Aid, Furniture Refinishing, Macramé, and Public Speaking.

Most classes last 6 or 8 weeks and meet 2 or 3 hours one night per week. Tuition for most classes is \$10.00 with some classes having an additional

materials fee. Belly Dancing tuition is \$30.00. Square Dancing lessons, lasting 20 weeks, will cost \$25.00 per person. And dance-ercise will cost \$32.00.

Vocational courses offered through the Area Vocational School include Typing, Bookkeeping, and the Adult Basic Education Course.

Typing and Bookkeeping, beginning and advanced classes, will be taught two nights weekly for 12 weeks. Registration will be October 10 at the Area Vocational School from 6:00-8:00 p.m. Cost of both courses will be \$20.00.

Adult Basic Education is an informal class that prepares one to pass the GED High School Equivalency Examination. It is designed for those 16 years of age or older who are not enrolled in school. The course is continuous which allows individuals to enter or leave at any time. All materials are furnished and there is no registration charge.

New Council Offices will be installed during the Awards Program on October 17.



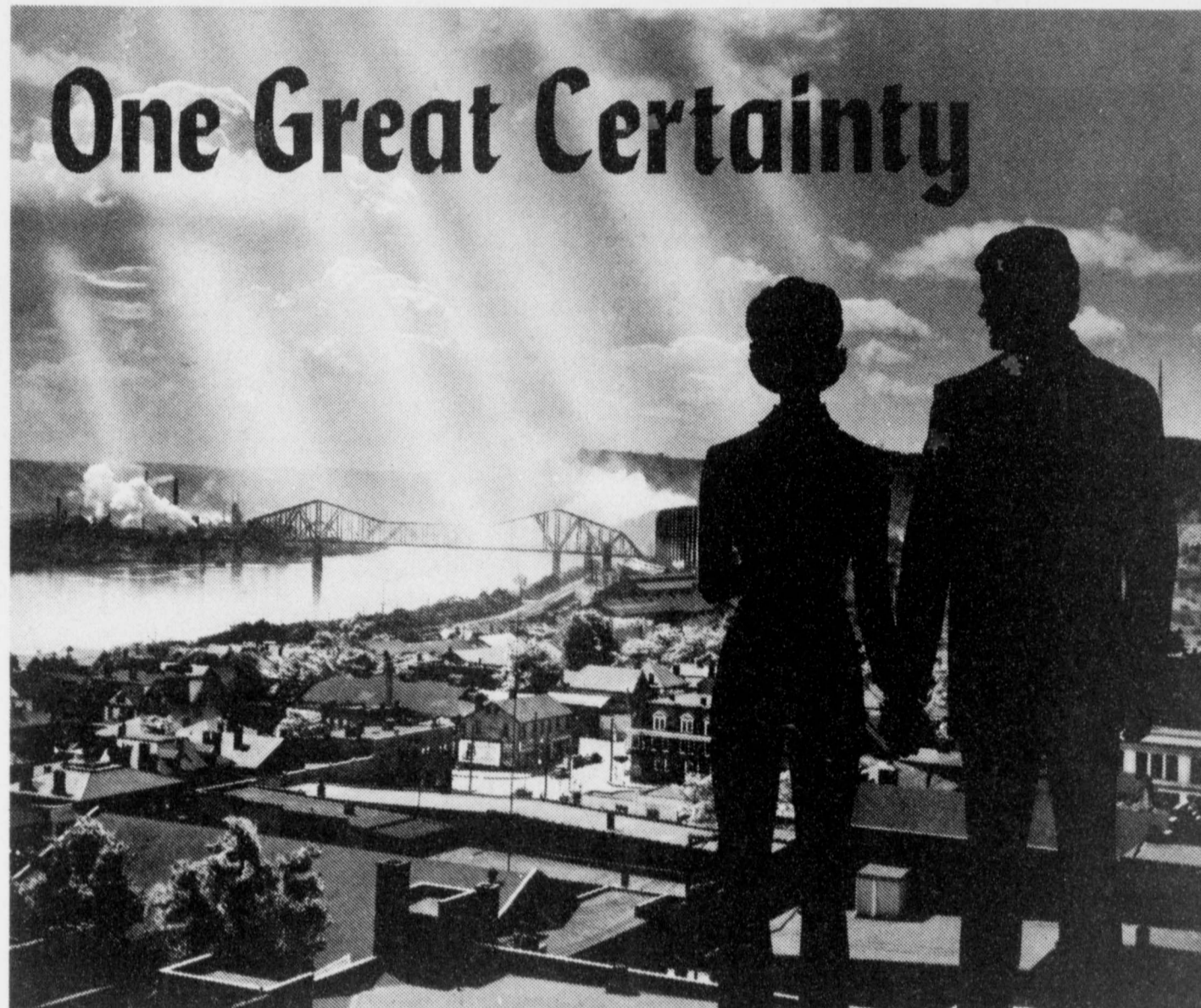

Per Capita Income

Up In Texas

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday that figures compiled by the US Commerce Department show that per capita personal income in Texas has shot upwards 52 percent in the past five years.

The increase was the largest recorded among the large industrial states and the third largest in the nation, Bullock. Per capita personal income in the U.S. as a whole grew by 42 percent during the period.

The income statistics, compiled by the U.S. Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis, are analyzed in the September issue of the Comptroller's monthly financial report, "Fiscal Notes."

Only two states, Alaska and Wyoming, registered larger percentage increases in per capita personal income between 1972 and 1976. Alaska registered a 96 percent increase and Wyoming recorded a 57 percent increase.

In dollar figures, the per capita personal income in Texas grew from \$4,102 in 1972 to \$6,243 in 1976. Illinois, with per capita personal income of \$7,432 in 1976, was at the top of the list nationally.

Despite Texas' big increase, the state still ranks below the other major states in personal income. The state now ranks 26th in the nation, moving up from 32nd place in 1972.

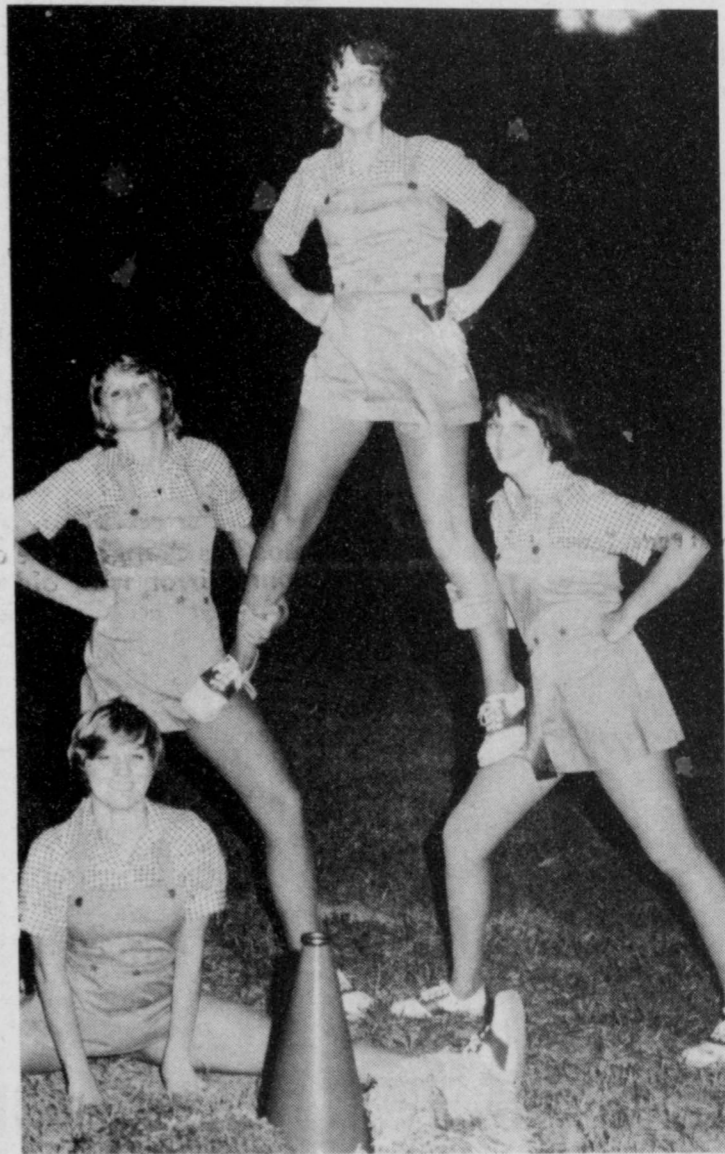

Pesticides Classified As Restricted

Methyl Parathion and Ethyl Parathion are two agricultural pesticides that have been classified as "restricted use" by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). These chemicals along with 21 other chemicals will require private applicator certification in order to be purchased after October 21.

The list of restricted-use pesticides will likely increase as EPA completes the review of all chemicals. Therefore, it is safe to assume that other chemicals will be added to the list prior to growing season next spring.

The EPA lists the following active ingredients which have been designated "restricted use" in the various commercial brand name products: Methyl bromide, paraquat, picloram (Tordon), demeton (Systox), methyl parathion, ethyl parathion, strychnine, and sodium cyanide. Acrolein, acrylonitrile, aldicarb, allyl alcohol, aluminum phosphide, azinphos-ethyl, calcium cyanide, endrin, fluoroacetamide-1081, hydrocyanic acid, methomyl, mevinphos, sodium fluoroacetate, sulfotepp and TEPP.

Individuals who purchase and normally use those chemicals should definitely qualify as a private pesticide applicator.

Turkey Shoots To Begin Soon

The Bogata Volunteer Fire Department annual Turkey Shoots will begin Sunday, Oct. 23, 1977 at 1:00 p.m. on Highway 909 east of Bogata. Shoots will be held for eight consecutive Sundays.

Winners receive their choice of a turkey or ham. Entry fee is \$1.50.

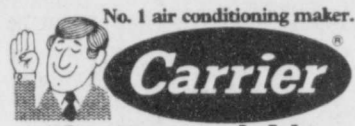

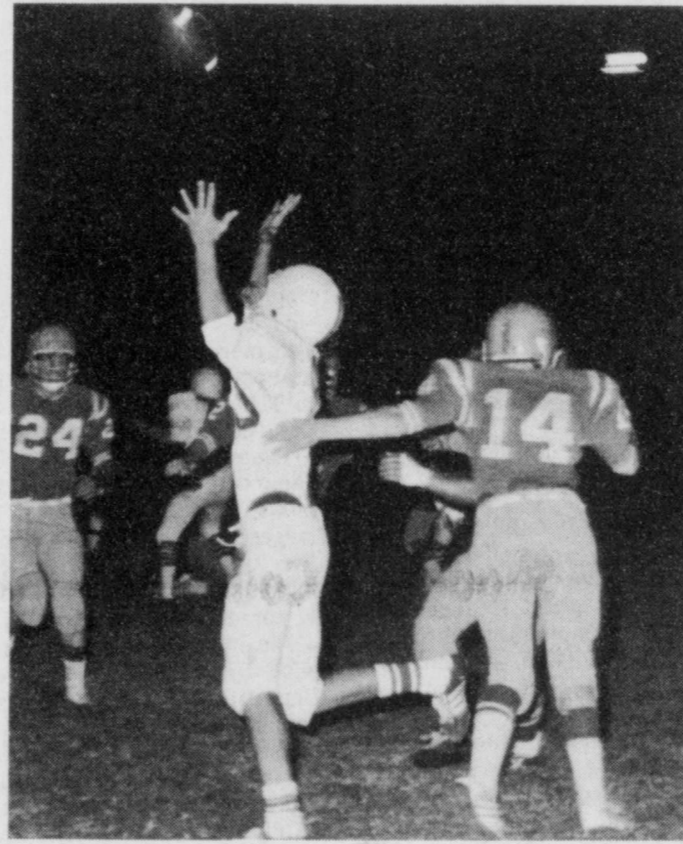

A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote. SECTION 3: That the entire Town of Blossom Prairie, Texas, shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the Commission Center, in said Town is hereby designated as the polling place. On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. SECTION 4: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election: L. C. Colham, Presiding Judge Mrs. Barbara Pitts, Alternate Presiding Judge The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than three (3) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks. Absentee voting shall be conducted at the Town Secretary's office in the Town Hall, in accordance with provisions of V.A.T.S. Election Code, Chapter 5. SECTION 5: That all resident qualified electors of the Town shall be permitted to vote at said election. This election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code except as modified by Chapter 1 of Title 22, V.A.T.C.S., and as may be required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish. SECTION 6: That a substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election. pumps and sprays. Sanitary sewage from the plant is routed to the Detroit sewage system. James Shown, an attorney for the Water Commission, will conduct the hearing. The Texas Water Commission is the judicial arm of the Texas Department of Water Resources which, on Sept. 1, combined the Texas Water Quality Board, Water Development Board and Water Rights Commission.

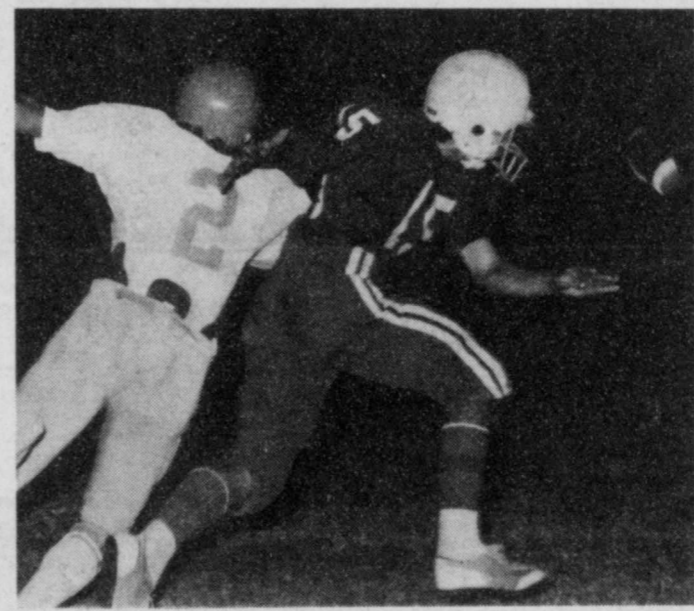
