A price tag on the work to be done now, the resurfacing of the runway and the turnarounds, would cost \$42,000, Giles said, and indicated that the lights, beacon and road would be added later.

Part of the total project would be paid for with a grant of \$40,000 from the Texas Aeronautics Commission. Red River County Commissioners Monday issued time warrants in the amount of \$10,000, which were financed by the Red River National Bank. Giles said the bank would contribute \$500 for 10 years to the Chamber of Commerce to pay for half the county warrants, and finance all the warrants at an interest rate of three percent. The county would only have to pay back \$5,000.

Red River County Comissioner Earl Humphrey said that each precinct would have to pay \$132 a year for the next ten years on the project.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at Red River County Hospital.

In the second accident, Dunahm said, Morris was driving south on Highway 37 when his car also left the roadway, sideswiped a tree, spun through the air about 20 yards, then struck a tree headon about five feet from the ground.

Morris was also pronounced dead on arrival at Red River Hospital, and Hines died at 1:45 a.m. while enroute to Parkland Hospital in Dallas.

There were no other passengers in either vehicle, officers reported.

The accidents were investigated by officers Dunham and Jerry Conway.


## Wolfe Returns **To Deputy Post**




