## Airport Resurfacing May Begin Next Week

The resurfacing of the Red River County Airport at Clarksville may begin next week in spite of the fact that the bids opened Monday morning by the Red River County Commissioner's Court were too high and were all rejected by the Court.

Red River County Judge Murray Giles said that the bids for the paving ranged from \$67,000 to \$87,000, and all three bids received were rejected.

A visitor to the Commissioner's Court meeting, Sammy Gist, who operates a paving company in Clarksville, offered

to spread the asphalt for \$3.00 a ton if the county would provide for transportation from the railroad head to the airport, a proposal which Giles said the Commissioner's Court approved. Giles said Wednesday morning that an order for material had been placed with

Uva Ide Mining Co. and that the first carload of a 2,100 ton order was expected in Clarksville

November 23. The spreading of 2,100 tons of material at \$3.00 a ton would amount to \$6,300.

Giles said that if the weather remains good that the surface should be laid within seven

days of the start of the resurfacing.

A price tag on the work to be done now, the resurfacing of the runway and the turnarounds, would cost \$42,000, Giles said, and indicated that the lights, beacon and road would be added later.

Part of the total project would be paid for with a grant of \$40,000 from the Texas Aeronautics Commission. Red River County Commissioners Monday issued time warrants in the amount of \$10,000, which were financed by the Red River National Bank. Giles said the bank would contribute \$500 for 10 years to the Chamber of Commerce to pay for half the county warrants, and finance all the warrants at an interest rate of three percent. The county would only have to pay back \$5,000.

Red River County Commissioner Earl Humphrey said that each precinct would have to pay \$132 a year for the next ten years on the project.

Bill Jennings of Clarksville will supervise the work, Giles said.

## Engineers Meet With School Board

A representative of Pritchard & Abbott, valuation engineers for oil and utility properties in the school district, met with the Talco-Bogata School Board Nov. 1 to discuss a new contract for their services. The Board made a proposal to the firm as to a contract fee with a definite agreement to be reached by the time of the next meeting.

Various procedures for schools meeting the requirement of unemployment compensation for all school

employees were discussed. Action on selecting one of the procedures was delayed until further study.

The Board briefly discussed revised values on all school buildings for fire insurance purposes. The superintendent is to meet with the schools insurance servicing agent and arrive at a reasonable value for each building that may be acceptable to the Board and insurance companies.

In other action, a bid submitted by Bell Air Conditioning for air conditioning the Talco School Cafeteria was accepted, approval was given to the Bogata and Talco PTO's to install glass backboards in the respective gyms if they so desire, approved as well as approval to install insulation in one of the school owned houses. In matters related to personnel, the resignation of Kathryn Ribble as a teacher at Rivercrest was accepted and Martha Bone was employed in this position.

In final action, the various financial reports were approved and the Board meeting time was changed to 7:00 p.m. for future meetings.

Basketball season opens tonight for Rivercrest High School with the junior varsity boys and girls playing in the North Hopkins tournament Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The varsity boys and girls will open at Celeste at 6:00 p.m. Friday. The first varsity home game will be at 5:30 p.m. Saturday against Leonard.

Tuesday, the varsity boys and girls and the junior varsity boys will play Honey Grove at Rivercrest with the game beginning at 5:00 p.m.

Season tickets are on sale at the school or at home games. The tickets are good for all home games and the River-

crest tournament. Season tickets for students are \$8, for adults, \$12, and families, \$30.

## Fire Fighting Training Course To Be Offered

Lewis Williams, instructor with the Fire Protection Training Division of Texas A&M University's Extension Service, will teach a 15 hour course in basic firefighting training in Bogata beginning Tuesday, Nov. 29.

The Bogata Volunteer Fire Department now has 15 men on the rolls, Williams said, and 22 are needed to bring the department to full strength.

The training school will be held Nov. 29, Dec. 6, Dec. 13, Jan. 3, and Jan. 10, at night.

The course is designed for municipal fire departments on chemistry of fire, hand extinguishers, hose loads, hose

lays, booster and pumper operation, ladder practices, breathing apparatus, size-up, use of tools and equipment, and related instruction.

There is no charge for the course.

The insurance key rate for the City of Bogata is now 17, two points lower than last year.

## Rebels Clobber Rains 48 To 8

The Rivercrest Rebels scored at will Friday night against the Rains Wildcat in a tough game which was won 48-8 by the Rebels.

The Rebel defense, led by Terry Williams, sacked and

pressed the Rains offense into mistake after mistake. Williams blitzed without being touched, as the Rebel defense closed off the ground game for the Wildcats and they were

forced to pass 29 times. Only five passes were completed.

The Rebels made almost half of their total points during the first quarter, scoring on their first possession after Rains gave the ball away on a fumble.

Senior Rebel Milton Scales scored from the Rains 26 yard line, but the Kip Stansell to Chris Potter pass attempt for extra points was no good.

Rains put together a drive and made three first downs in the first quarter against the Rebels, but pressure on the backfield by Williams and Nicky Brown forced the Wildcats to punt from their 47 yard line.

When the Rebels were unable to get a first down in three plays against Rains, Stansell faked a punt and passed to Milton Scales, who ran 80 yards for the second Rebel score. The try for points after was not good.

Rains fumbled to the Rebels on their first play from scrimmage, giving the Rebels possession on the Rains 24 yard line. Stansell had the scoring honors this time from the 14 yard line. Jimmy Via made the extra points across the middle of the line.

The Rebels were forced to punt twice during the second

quarter, but the defense kept Rains out of Rebel end zone with pressure and alertness.

Via intercepted a Wildcat pass on the Rains 35 yard line and returned it to the 42. Then Stansell hit Potter at the three yard line to set up the next Rebel score.

Via scored from the one, and the try for extra points was not good.

In a desperate attempt to score before the half, the Wildcats surprised the Rebels by lining up near the sideline, with the center lateraling the ball to the quarterback. The play was good for 21 yards and a first down for the Wildcats, but the whistle blew the ball dead on the Rebel 33 yard line.

It was late in the third quarter before Rains scored, following the interception of a Stansell pass. The Wildcats took possession on the Rebel 13 yard line and scored from the three. The pass for the points after was complete in the end zone.

Williams foiled the Rains attempt for an onside kick by covering the ball at the Rivercrest 40 yard line. Milton Scales broke loose around the right end for a 56 yard run and another Rebel score.

The fourth quarter turned

into a brawl as two Rivercrest players and two Rains players were thrown out of the game for fighting. More plays were run from scrimmage during the fourth quarter of this game than in any quarter played by the Rebels during the past four years.

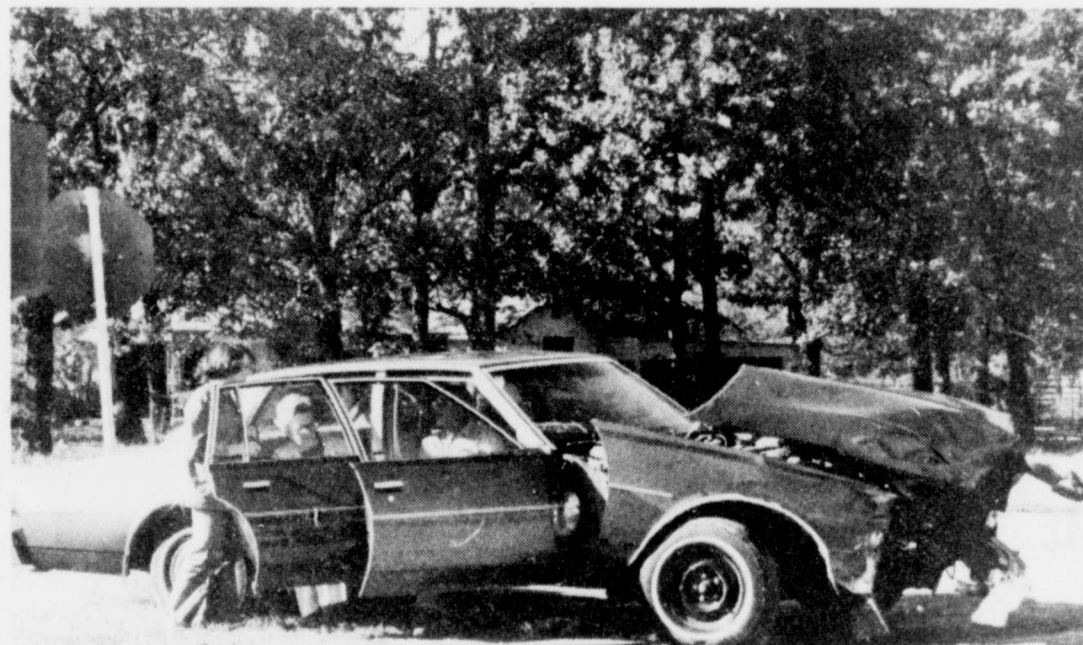
In addition to the fights and the number of plays from scrimmage, the fourth quarter was notable for a 42 yard touchdown run by quarterback Kip Stansell, and the first touchdown of the season for Rebel tackle Edward Deaton.

Deaton scored when he beat a Wildcat halfback to a lateral on the Rains 13 yard line and lumbered in for the score. The pass for extra points from Stansell to Potter was good.

Rebels who looked good on defense against Rains were Keith House and Eddie Belcher, as well as Deaton and Bradley Smith.

Milton Scales gained 147 yards rushing and 80 yards on a pass from Stansell against the Wildcats, for a big chunk of the Rebel total offense of 359 yards.

The win against Rains completes the season for the Rebels with a record of 5-2, tying Winnsboro for second place. Rivercrest beat Winnsboro 30-23.

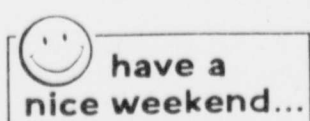
## Newspapers

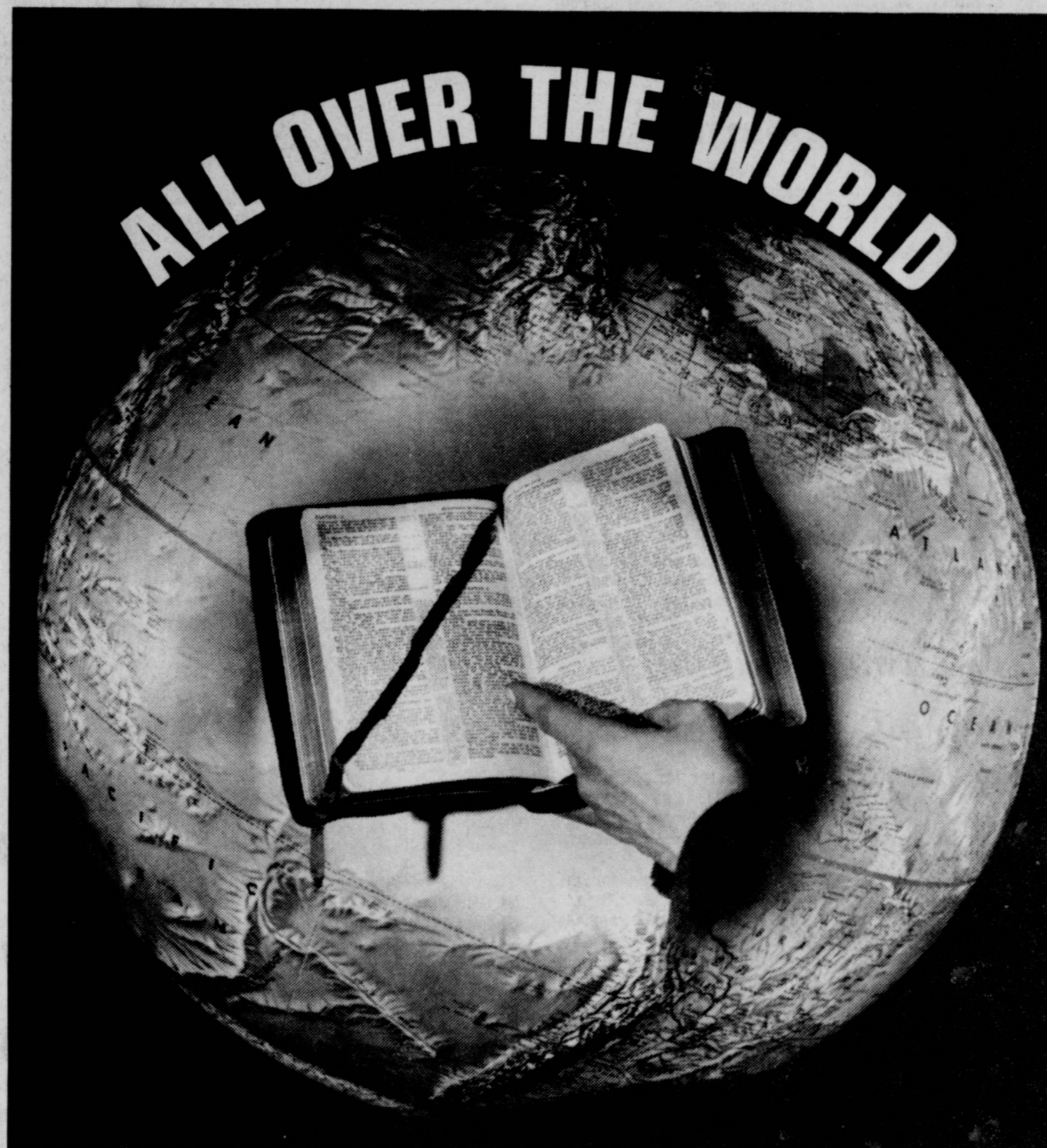

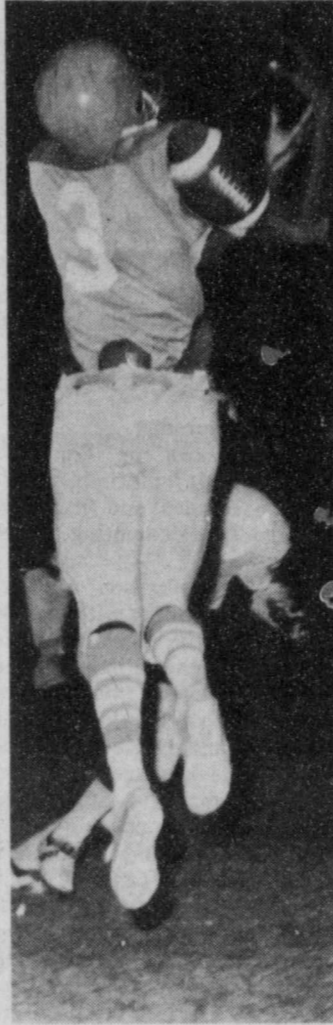
SCOREBOARD—With 3:30 to go in the last quarter, the score was already at its maximum, 48-8 in favor of the Rebels against Rains.

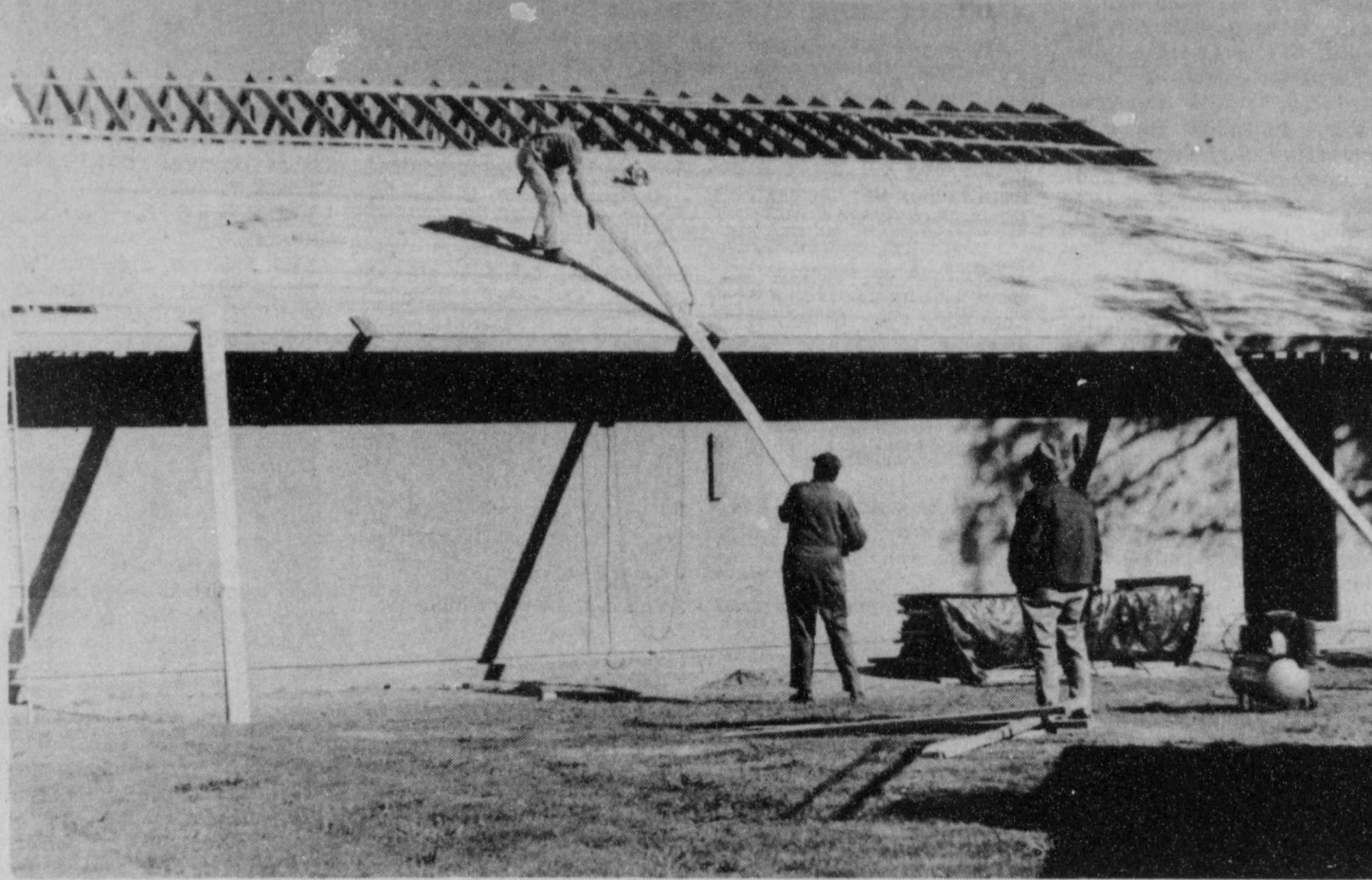

### SWCD To Help Stock Ponds

"The Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District is now prepared to help landowners buy fish for stocking their ponds and lakes," Jack Franklin, district secretary, said today.

"We have worked out an arrangement with a reliable fish farmer who agreed to deliver fish to Clarksville," Franklin continued. "We will accept prepaid orders at our office in the basement of the postoffice in Clarksville. When enough orders have accumulated so the fish farmer can deliver fish free of charge, the district and farmer will agree upon a delivery date and location. Landowners will be notified where and when to pick up their fish."

Orders are now being taken for channel catfish and fathead minnows a source of food for the catfish. Catfish will sell for .15 to .30 apiece, depending upon the size. Minnows are available for \$5.00 per pound. If this service gains acceptance, other fish species may be available in the future.

In the past, fish were free for the asking from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The former has stopped stocking private waters altogether and the latter recently announced plans to begin charging for fish stocked in private ponds and lakes.

"We feel this program can be a valuable community service by saving landowners time, gasoline, and telephone calls. The fish farmer will benefit in several ways, including handling several large orders instead of many small ones," Franklin pointed out.

Charles VanDeaver, District Conservationist for the soil Conservation Service here said personnel in his office are available to help landowners determine how many of each fish species to stock.

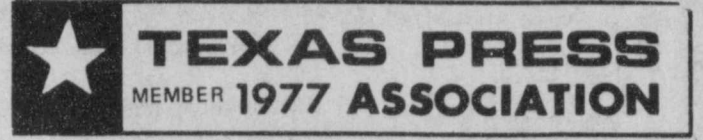

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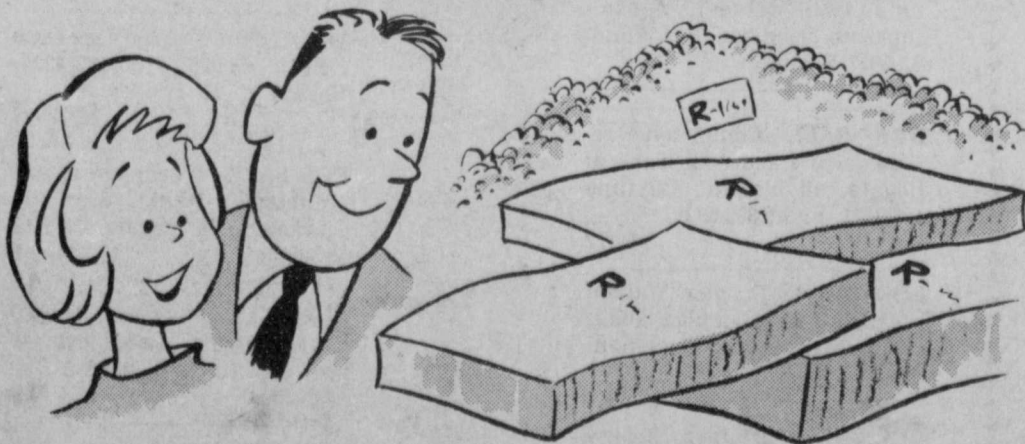
