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

Preston Smith's inauguration was marked by country music and retiring Governor Dolph Briscoe insisted on non-alcoholic beverages at both of his inaugurations.

Austin's historic Driskill Hotel saw the inaugural Ball of the popular Governor Lawrence Sullivan Ross in 1887. High society was in attendance but the new Governor's father kept them aware of their frontier roots.

Shapely Prince Ross, a

tall, rough Indian fighter with a love for hard living and drink, was a Texas legend in his own right. In the mid-1880's he was known as the ablest Indian fighter in the State. Mildred Hamby of Nashville, Tennessee, may be better known for her voice than her face-at least to the hundreds of visually impaired Tennesseans who listen to her Talking Library Program on a Nashville radio station.

Mrs. Hamby has been a program hostess since the Talking Library originated three years ago.

"I was delighted to be able to help the visually impaired," Mrs. Hamby told a writer from The National Council on the Aging (NCOA). "My own eyesight has been impaired for the last 15 years and I know how it affects a person's

Mrs. Hamby's radio show consists primarily of interviews with guests on a variety of topics of interest to her impaired listeners. These, she is quick to point out, are "not so different than the interests of a person with normal eyesight."

A special feature of the program is Mrs. Hamby's sharing of her favorite re-

cipes with her audience. When she is not on the air, she polls her listeners as to what they'd like to hear on the program.

"It's their show, after all," she said. "I'm just the hostess.

Born in Nashville, Mrs. Hamby spent a large part of her life in Michigan, where her husband operated a trucking business. When he was killed in an automobile accident, she moved back to Nashville and immediately became involved in volunteer work.

Her current job as program hostess is due to the efforts of the Senior Community Service Project, a program funded by the U.S. Department of Labor and administered by NCOA for economically disadvantaged workers 55 and over.

Mrs. Loretta Connors, coordinator for the project, said, "Mildred Hamby is an outstanding lady. Despite her own impairment, she is determined to help as many disadvantaged people as she can. To me, she's an inspiration and an example of what people with handicaps can achieve.'

Along with her radio program, Mrs. Hamby serves on several boards in an advisory capacity, including the Department of Human Service.

Does Mrs. Hamby foresee the day she'll retire?

"Not right now I can't," she said. "I think people who want to work should be allowed to as long as they have the ability. And right now I don't feel as if my ability has diminished."

Neither does anyone else, particularly the visually impaired people in Tennessee to whom Mildred Hamby brings a glimpse of the rest of the world.

IN SANTA ROSA, California, a Senior Skills Center has been launched which uses older persons to provide second career training, counseling and job placement services to other unemployed or underemployed persons 55 years of age and

Individuals can obtain

free training in office skills, home maintenance, basic auto maintenance, small appliance and electronics repair and offset printing. Other classes are offered in home health care, horticulture, arts and crafts and English. Funding for the center is provided by the state.

IN RUSSIA, most statesubsidized pensions require reaching a certain age-60 for men and 55 for women and a certain number of years of service. Certain professions, such as teaching and medicine, have their own pension plans.



Nearly twothirds of these injuries involved the eye, according to Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates.

battery-related eye injuries are operators of cars with older batteries, because gases ignite when conductors between cells become cracked.

Chemical reaction inside a battery produces an explosive mixture of hydrogen and oxygen. Usually, this gas mixture escapes a little at a time through vent holes. Sometimes, however, the mixture collects in and around the battery and can be ignited by a small spark or flame.

To attach jumper cables--1. With red-clamp jumper cable, connect the positive terminals of the two batteries, dead battery first, booster battery second. Clamps should be tight, so they will not spark. Each one should be wiggled a little bit to get a good hold.

2. With the black-clamp jumper cable, connect the negative terminal of the booster battery. Then, make the final connection to a bare If the victim is wearing metal part of the disabled car's engine or on the engine block itself on the side away from the battery, and not to the battery terminal. Since the terminal is grounded to the engine block, this procedure is the same as connecting the cable to the terminal. This final connection is the one that sparks, so it needs to be far away from the bettery.

3. Be careful not to allow clamps to touch each other during the procedure.

4. Keep cables away from fans and belts.

5. Start the booster bat-2. Turn off ignition, lights tery, then try and start the disabled car. If it will not start the first time, start the booster car again and let it run a few minutes before 3. Extinguish all cigarettes trying a second time.

7. Finally, replace all battery caps.


