The primary reasons for not reporting were fear of retribution. did

Of the respondents who indicated that their own child had been abused, 47 percent reported physical abuse, 13 percent reported sexual abuse, 67 percent reported emotional abuse, 23 percent reported neglect. 
Kathy Barton has been named new field advisor and camp director for the Red River Valley Girl Scouts.



February activities will include the Valentine Banquet and a bowling trip to Paris.







THE AGE Discrimination prohibits forced retirement for most persons before age 70, effective on January 1, at age 65.

The Department of Labor said recently that persons still employed who reach 65 before next Jan. 1 but who are not scheduled to retire until after that date will be protected against forced retirement before 70. * * *
