## Rebelettes Assured District 20A Basketball Title

The Rivercrest Rebelettes are well on their way to winning the title to District 20AA in the girls division, with only a game with Maud scheduled for Friday night at Rivercrest between them and first place.

### Crude Oil Production Increased

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said the value of crude oil produced in Texas increased last year to an average of \$8.93 per barrel, a 7.2 percent increase over the previous year.

Bullock said a study of oil production, prices and tax revenue was featured in the January issue of "Fiscal Notes", a monthly financial report published by the Comptroller's Office.

The Comptroller reported that production of crude oil during fiscal 1978 totaled 1,059.8 million barrels, compared to 1,112.2 million barrels in 1977.

This represents a decline of 4.7 percent, the largest decrease in the last five years.

An examination of quarterly price increases show that the price per barrel for crude oil jumped from \$3.48 during the second quarter of fiscal 1973 to \$6.77 for the same period of the following year.

Average Texas crude oil prices per barrel have steadily increased over the past five years to the current record levels.

Even though production of crude oil in Texas is on the decline, oil production tax revenues are expected to grow at a slightly faster rate during the next three fiscal years.

Based on the Comptroller's December 1978 revenue estimate, receipts from oil production taxes will increase by 3.7, 4.0 and 3.1 percent respectively during fiscal years 1979, 1980 and 1981.

after both districts complete their regularly scheduled games. The Rebelettes will play the winner of district 19AA, which is being led easily at this time by Spring Hill, located close to Longview.

In preparation for the playoff games, the Rebelettes have two practice games with Pittsburg, with the first at Rivercrest on February 12 and the second at Pittsburg on February 15. Game time will be at 6:30 p.m. both nights.

Rebelette Coach Frank Stubblefield said last week that he plans to get a practice game for the week prior to Bi-District.

## J.B. Holley New Red River Justice

The Red River County Commissioners Court convened in a special session at the Courthouse at 10 a.m. on Thursday morning to name a new Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1, for the unexpired term of Wm. M. McDonough, who submitted his resignation on Jan. 19, effective Feb. 1.

J.B. (Ballard) Holley, who has been associated with Holley Bros. garage of Clarksville, was unanimously chosen. He was nominated by Precinct 1 Commissioner Earl Hum-

phrey, seconded by County Judge Connie Sullivan, and received affirmative votes by these two and Precinct 2 Commissioner R.L. (Lunsford) Edwards, the three members of the Court present for the meeting.

Commissioner Runyan was ill with the flu and Commissioner Floyd was out of the county on business.

Holley was immediately sworn in by Judge Sullivan and assumed his duties.

Holley is a native of Red River County, having been born in Clarksville, son of

Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Holley. He was married to Margaret Cross, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.A. Cross, on Sept. 27, 1940, in Clarksville.

The couple have one son, Britt, 18, who is employed by T.P.&L. and also attends Tyler Junior College.

Judge Holley was a member of the U.S. Army Coast Artillery from Nov. 9, 1942, to Nov. 11, 1945. He was in the invasion of France with the 1st Infantry Division, 5th Field Artillery, and participated in seven major campaigns, being discharged with the rank of Corporal.

He has always been interested in all sports, and has been active in the American Legion for some 30 years, serving in various capacities, locally, including that of Post Commander, Adjutant, and Chaplain.

Judge Holley is also the first member of this Post to be elected as a District Legion official, having been previously chosen as Chaplain and is presently serving as District Vice-Commander.

He has been very active in the United Methodist Church in several positions.

December sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Red River County were reported earlier this week by County Bond Chairman Ben E. Black. Sales for the twelfth-month period totaled \$150,145 for 94 percent of the 1978 sales goal of \$160,000.

## Repairs Slated For US Highway 271

Anyone who has recently driven over U.S. Highway 271 between Bogata and the Sulphur River is aware there is a problem with the surfacing that was placed late this past summer. This can be seen by the bare spots and the loose gravel present on some sections. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is also acutely aware of this problem and regrets the inconvenience it is causing.

According to R.S. Thornburrow, District Engineer in Paris, there are so many variables involved in the placement of asphalt surface treatments that it is difficult to know what caused so much of the gravel to fail to properly stick to the asphalt. "The types and rates of application of asphalt and coverstone were practically the same as used in seal coats for other highways that are not giving us any

trouble", Thornburrow said. This seal coat was placed near the end of our asphalt placement season; the fact that this section did not get the benefit of additional compaction from traffic under the hotter weather conditions could be our problem, or part of it", he said. The Department hopes to determine the causes and take the necessary steps to prevent a similar situation from occurring on future projects of this type. Several methods of correcting the present situation are being explored, but corrective measures for a permanent solution will probably not be possible until warmer weather arrives. In the meantime, loose gravel will be swept from the highway on a regular basis, the weather permitting, in an attempt to reduce the number of windshields and headlights damaged as much as currently possible and to lessen the inconvenience to traffic using this highway. The Department urges drivers to drive with caution and at reduced speeds. Thornburrow said, "if all drivers would slow down to about 35 m.p.h. when meeting and avoid passing when traveling this highway, windshield and headlight breakage could be practically eliminated". He said

that the Department will certainly appreciate the cooperation of the traveling public until the situation can be corrected.

## PJC Students Initiated Into Phi Theta Kappa

Sixty-one Paris Junior College students were initiated into the Beta Zeta Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, scholastic honor society for

junior college students, in ceremonies Sunday, Feb. 4, at Calvary Methodist Church in Paris. Phi Theta Kappa is the only national scholastic honor society for junior colleges which is recognized by the American Association of Community-Junior Colleges, explained Betty Clement, sponsor of the PJC Chapter.

To be eligible for membership, a student must have completed one long-term semester at PJC, must have a cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 or better, and must be within the upper scholastic 10 percent of the regularly enrolled student body.

One three-year term will be filled from Bogata, one three-year term will be filled from Talco, and one one-year term will be filled at large from either Bogata or Talco according to the number of votes received.

All requests by candidates to have their names placed on the ballot for the election shall be in writing, signed by the candidate, and filed at the superintendent's office at Rivercrest by 4:30 p.m. March 7, 1979.

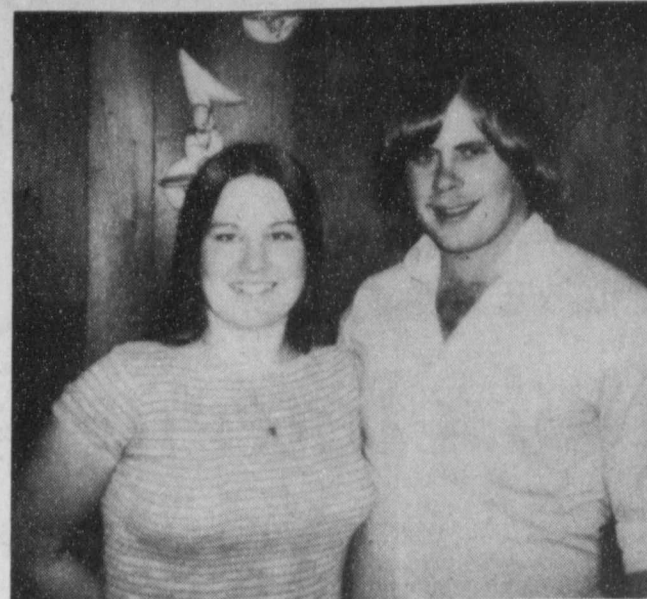

Practice wise clothing care methods to conserve energy and possibly cut utility costs. The greatest savings can occur with reduced water temperatures for laundering. Heating water accounts for three percent of all U.S. energy used.

Reduce energy consumption in doing home laundry by 50 percent using warm water for washing and cold water for rinsing rather than using hot water temperature.

When using cold water, wash temperatures dissolve powdered detergents before use or use a liquid detergent or one formulated for cold water washes. Also, more detergent may be needed for effective cleaning.

Hot water temperatures may also result in harmful effects on garments, particularly unnecessary fading and shrinking.

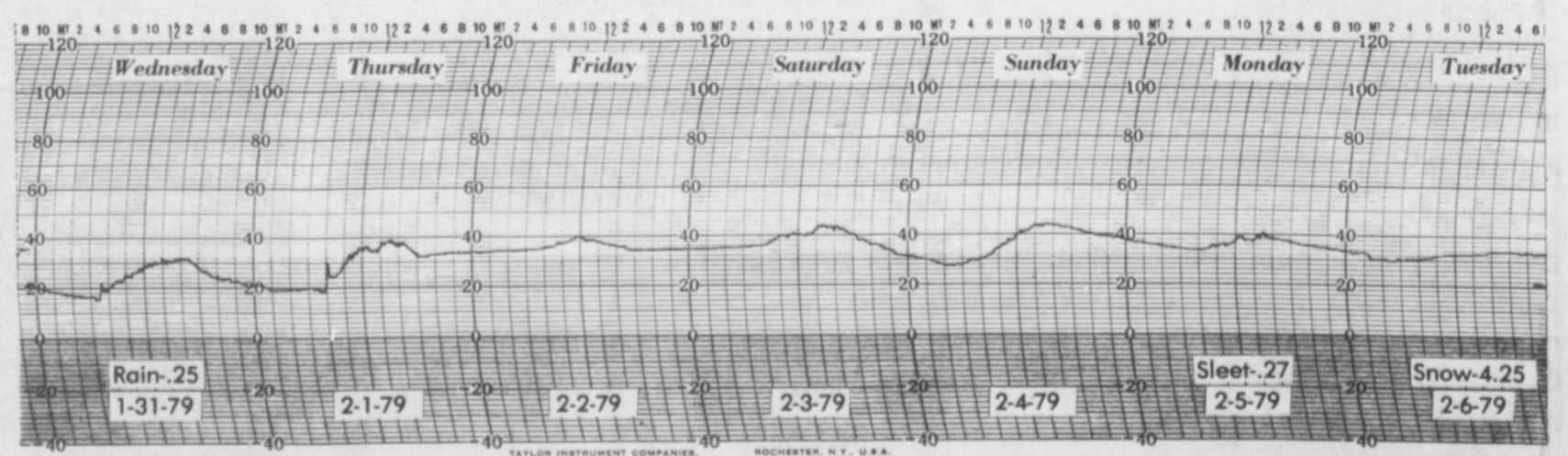
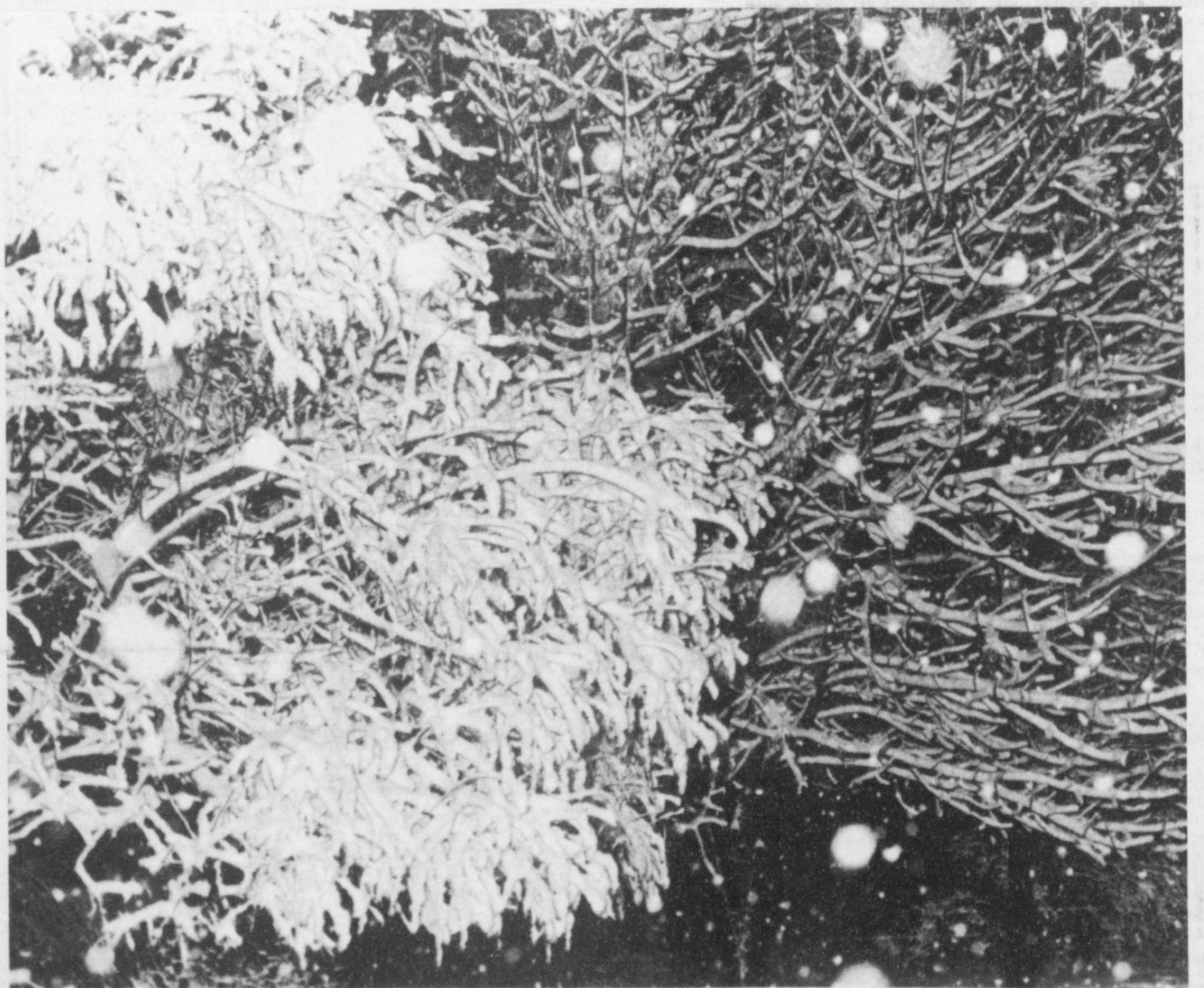

### Begins Address

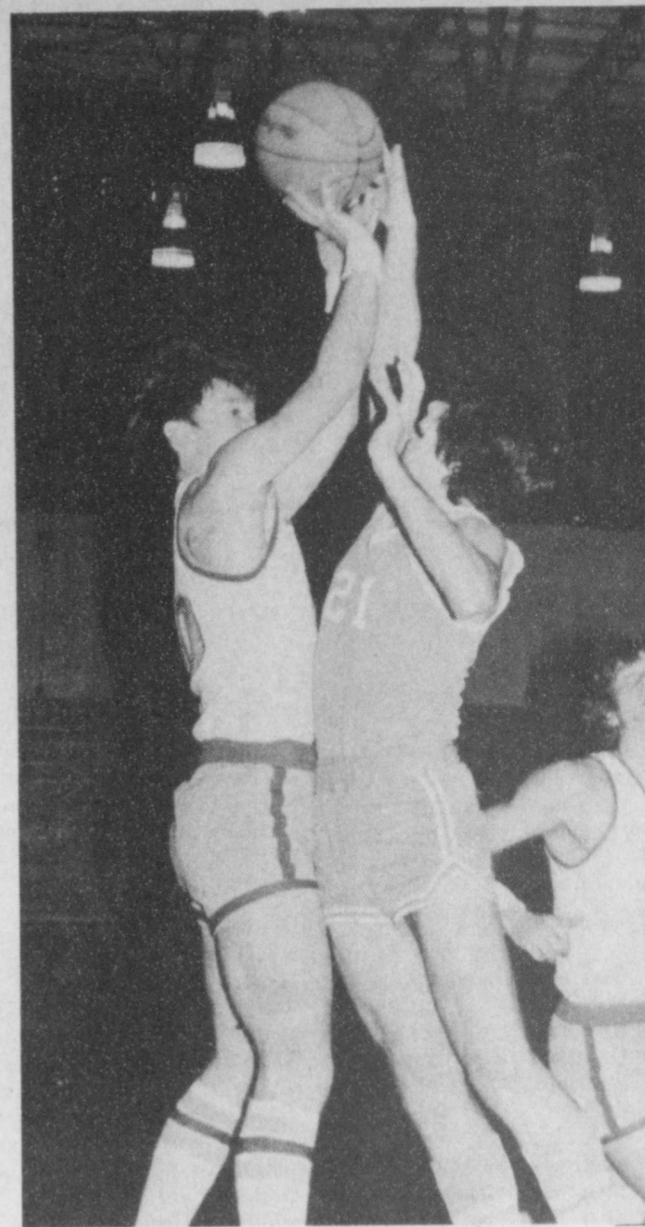
### Listing

Census Bureau address compiling operations for the 1980 census have begun in Texas from an office located in Dallas, said Julian Moseley, office manager.

Temporary workers are being hired now to begin putting together lists of addresses from which mailing labels will be prepared for use on the 1980 census questionnaires. They will be mailed to each of some 80 million households nationwide in late March 1980. Census Day is April 1, 1980.

Moseley said the address-collection phase of the census operation will take several months to complete. Also involved are checks of the lists to make sure all area dwelling addresses are included.

Census workers will drive or walk thousands of miles of streets and roads asking at each household for a correct mailing address. These address lists play a vital role in taking an accurate census since they are used to record completed questionnaires returned by mail.

## Needy People Receive Supplemental Income

About 270,000 needy aged, blind, and disabled people in Texas received \$314,000,000 in supplemental security income payments in 1978, according to Ray F. Hudson, social security district manager.

Of that amount, \$159,500,000 was paid to aged recipients, \$6,400,000 to the blind, and \$148,100,000 to the disabled.

Nationwide, 4.2 million persons are receiving SSI. Payments totaled \$6.4 billion in 1978.

Supplemental security income is a Federally-administered program that pays monthly checks to people in financial need who are 65 or older and to people

in need at any age who are blind or disabled.

The aim of SSI is to provide monthly checks so that needy people 65 or older, or blind or disabled, can have a basic cash income—\$189.40 a month for one person, and \$284.00 for a married couple.

"Not every person gets that much in his supplemental security income check every month. Some people may get less because they have other income. Some get more because they live in a state that adds money to the Federal payment."

Supplemental security income is not the same as social security, even though

the program is run by the Social Security Administration. The money for SSI checks comes from general funds of the U.S. Treasury. Social security benefits are paid from contributions of workers, employers, and self-employed people. Social security funds are not used for SSI checks.

People who get social

security checks can get SSI checks, too, if they are eligible for both. But a person does not have to be eligible for social security to get SSI.

If you think you may be eligible for SSI, or if you want more information, call your social security office at 785-0761 or Enterprise 60100 for residents of Titus, Camp, Morris, and Franklin Counties.

## Prepare For Crop With Soil Tests

With the present favorable supply and cost of fertilizers it is important to adequately fertilize this year, believes Bob Moody, County Agent.

Even though most soils contain some of all the essential nutrients needed for plant growth, most also need one or more fertilizer nutrients to produce economically profitable yields. The amounts of a given nutrient available in a soil vary greatly between soils due to past fertilization and cropping as well as native fertility. However, a soil test can help determine the level of nutrients available in a soil.

The first step in collecting samples is to use a map or sketch to divide the farm and fields into sampling units. If the sampling unit is too large, the information obtained may not be much better than a general fertilization guide.

Under today's conditions, a major objective in soil testing is to identify those soils with nutrient levels that are not adequate to meet crop requirements. This enables the producer to

select fertilizers that will supplement soil nutrients and provide enough for top yields, notes Moody.

Soil test results for phosphorus are especially valuable for measuring buildup that occurs in fields receiving regular applications of phosphorus for several years. However, the residual from row applications is difficult to measure until it is thoroughly mixed with the soil. In addition soil tests will identify those soils high in potassium so that this nutrient need not be applied. Since soils are low in nitrogen, a soil test will generally not give a reading on nitrogen levels in the soil. But it is important to consider the level of each nutrient in a soil when selecting the most profitable fertilization practices.

If you have not included soil tests in your farm

planning program, start now to prepare for this year's crop, suggests Moody.

Instructions for collecting and mailing soil samples are available at the county Extension office.

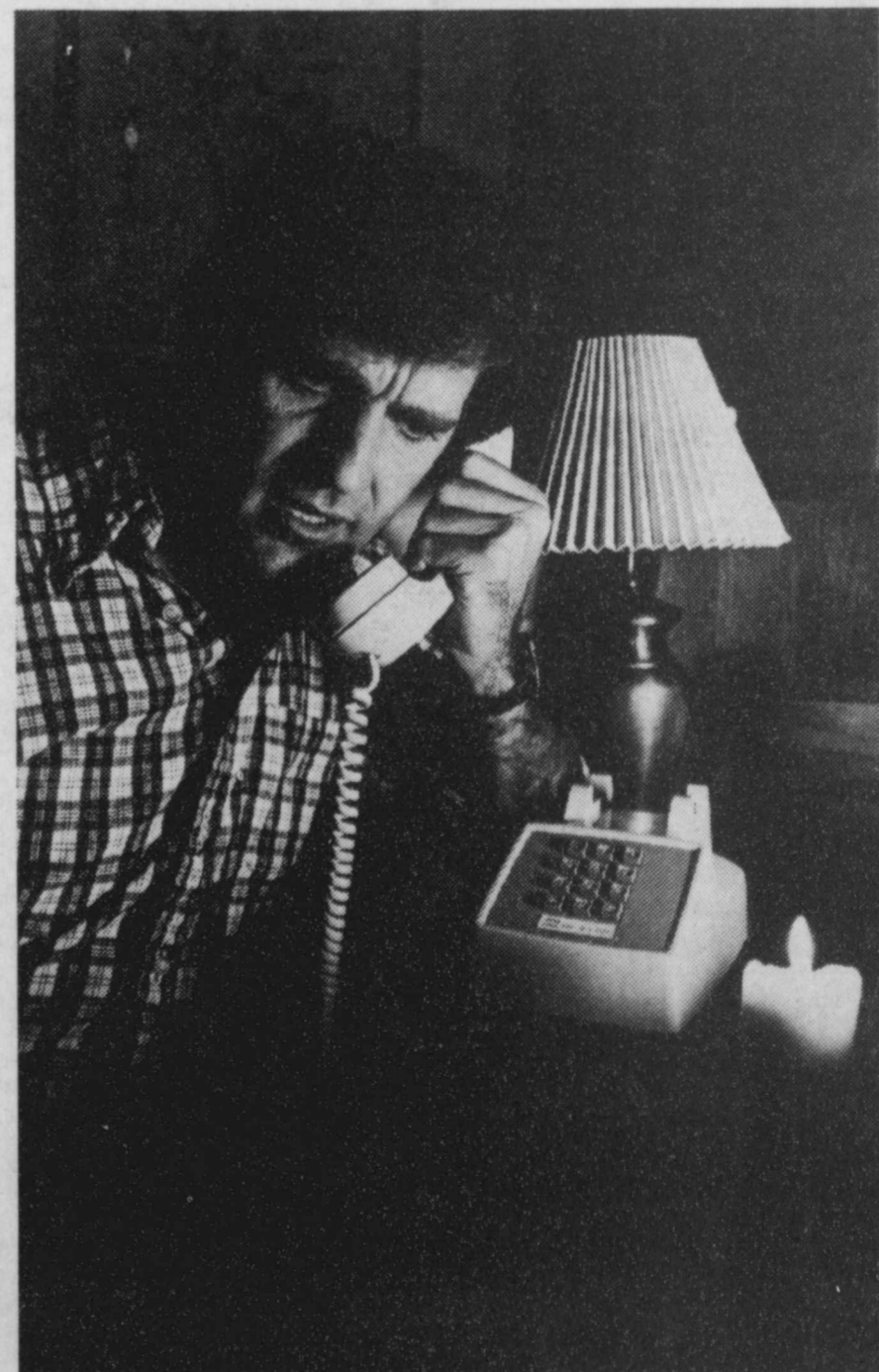

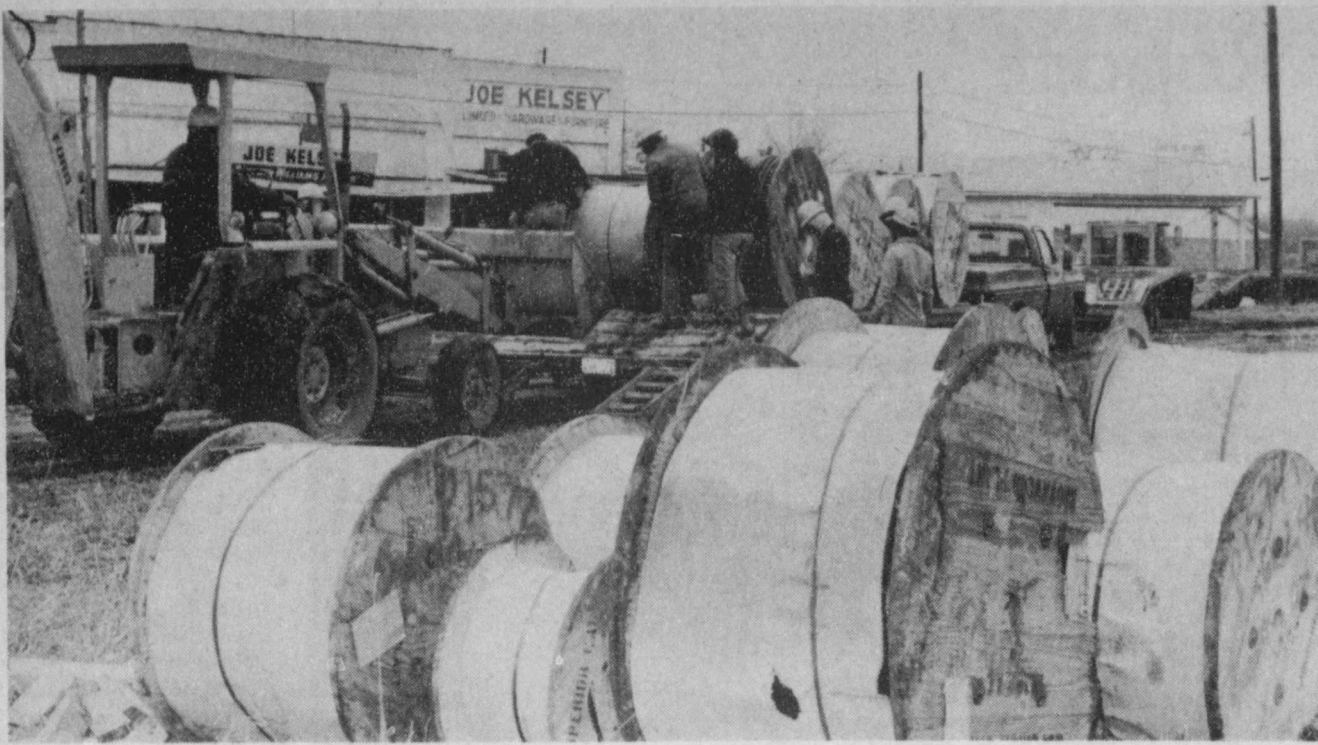

### Federal Excise Tax Due Reduction

Reduced federal excise taxes will save Continental Telephone customers in Texas an estimated \$400,000 in 1979.

Beginning January 1, the federal excise tax on telephone service was reduced from four percent to three percent. Under schedule established by federal law, the tax will continue to drop one percent each year until it expires January 1, 1982.

### USDA Proposes Regulations

#### To Help Schools Serve Breakfast

Two regulations that would help bring school breakfasts to more needy children were announced today by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carol Tucker Foreman.

Foreman said states will now be required to give their definition of schools in need of the breakfast program in their annual state plans.

"The agriculture department has requested this information for the past two years because of concern about the slow expansion of the school breakfast program," Foreman said. "This amendment to the regulations formalizes the request."

The amendment complies with a court order resulting from Charette vs. Bergland, where the court ruled the intent of Congress is to make breakfasts available in all schools where it is needed to provide adequate nutrition for children.

In addition, Foreman announced a proposed regulation that would set minimum criteria for states to follow in defining "severe need" and stipulate that these schools may be granted higher rates of reimbursement under the breakfast program. This definition of need will aid in outreach activities.

According to the regulations, a school is in "severe need" if 40 percent or more of lunches served under the school lunch program are provided free or at reduced prices, or if the school is required by state law to serve breakfast. These criteria are required by the Child Nutrition Amendments of 1978, enacted Nov. 10.

"A clear definition of severe need will make it easier for states to expand the number of schools that serve breakfast and will help us administer benefits fairly and efficiently," Foreman said.

The amendment and the proposed regulations were published in the Federal Register of January 26. Comments on the proposed regulation may be sent to

The group traces its roots to the late Congressman Sam Rayburn, of Bonham, who served as Speaker of the

House of Representatives longer than any other person. Speaker Rayburn believed in tight organization and insisted that the Texas Congressional Delegation work together on all issues before Congress that affected the State of Texas.

The Texas Democratic Delegation is usually first on the priority list of key government officials, including presidents, who are seeking advice and support on legislative matters pending in Congress. Over the years, the Delegation has given the state of Texas powerful leverage in Washington's political circles.

Representative Hall of the First Congressional District of Texas was first elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in June of 1976. He serves on the Judiciary Committee and the Veterans Affairs Committee.

You don't have to go out looking for con-artists—they're out looking for you, even to the extent of coming to your front door.

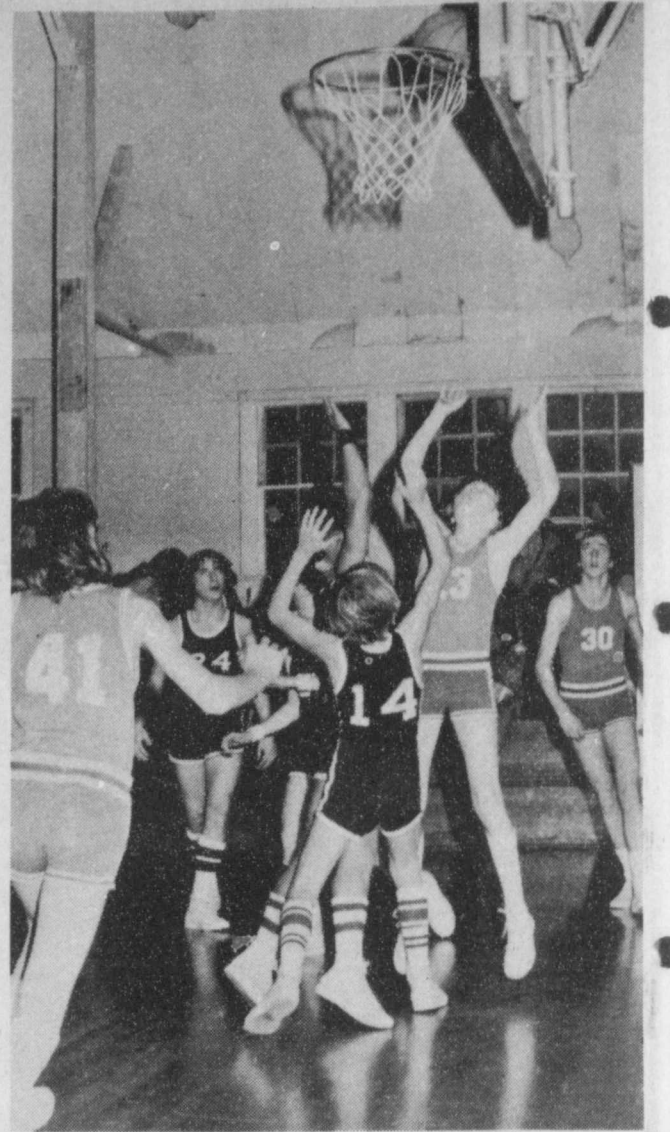
An old swindle that is often tried, and frequently succeeds, begins when a "fly by night" business mails second rate and over-priced merchandise C.O.D. to an individual who did not order it. Many times such material is accepted and paid for by someone who believes that another member of the family ordered it.

Another form of this same fraud is perpetrated by the con man who dons a delivery uniform and comes to the door asking the occupant to accept and pay for a package for a neighbor who is not home. In fact, the package contains nothing of value and was not ordered by the neighbor or anyone else.

A third common scheme is the home repair racket. After a free home inspection, the repairman advises the homeowner that the chimney is about to crumble or that the furnace could explode the next time it is turned on. The "repairman" insists
