

Bogata City Councilmen wrestled with the problem during the regular meeting of the council Tuesday night, and have asked for comments by citizens on the matter.

A letter from the Health Department cited several problems with the existing dump which do not meet the necessary standards. The following standards must be met or the dump will be closed by the health department:

An all weather road must be built into the area.

A diversion ditch must be constructed and maintained to prevent runoff of water from the dump area.

No burning of trash will be permitted in the area.

The trash must be compacted and buried in trenches, covered with two feet of dirt, compacted, and seeded.

After discussing the requirements the council decided that the cost of equipment and personnel to operate the trash dump in such a manner that would satisfy the State Department of Health would be more than the city budget would allow


Earl Humphrey, county commissioner of precinct 1 in Red River County, outlined for the council the desirability of purchasing the old railroad right of way that parallels Highway 271 from the Lamar County line to the Titus County line from Texas Power and Light Company, the present owner of the property.

Humphrey explained that the land can be purchased now by one deed, and if the land is sold to private individuals, then later purchased for highway development, the cost would be quite a bit more than the present price. The Texas Highway Department will now pay 90 percent of the cost, while Red River County would pay the remaining 10 percent. The county part would be \$8500. Humphrey stated the construction may be several years in the future and due to the present financial condition of the county, he is hesitant to

HOWEVER. THAT NO PENALTY SHALL BE GREATER OR LESS THAN THE GREATER OR LESS THAN THE SAME OR SIMILIAR OFFENSE UNDER THE LAWS OF THIS STATE: EFFECTIVE DATE IS FEBRUARY 6, 1979. WHEREAS. the City Council of the Town of Blossom Prairie has deter-mined that it is necessary to prescribe

Town of Blossom Prairie has deter-mined that it is necessary to prescribe sewage disposal standards and regulations, violations of which may be punishable by fine: BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BLOSSOM PRAIRIE, BLOSSOM, LAMAR COUNTY, TEXAS: SECTION I

SECTION I. DISPOSAL OF UNPOLLUTED WATERS GENERALLY

WATERS GENERALLY No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged any storm water, surface water, groundwater, roof runoff or subsurface drainage to any sanitary sewer. Storm water and all other unpolluted drainage shall be discharged to such sewers as are specifically designated as storm sewers, or to a natural outlet approved by the City Council; provided that, unpolluted process waters may be discharged into the sanitary sewer system upon prior written approval of the City Council or Water & Sewer Superintendent.

the City Council or Water & Sewer Superintendent. SECTION II. RIGHT OF ENTRY TO ENFORCE ARTICLE The City Council and other duly authorized employees of the City bearing credentials and identification shall be permitted to enter upon all properties for the purpose of in-spection, observation, measurements, sampling, and testing, in accordance with the provisions of this article. SECTION III. VIOLATION OF ORDINANCE (a) Any person found to be violating any provision of this article shall be served by the City with written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice, pertime stated in such notice, per-manently cease all violations. If the offender continues any violation after the expiration of the time stated, the City Manager may prohibit the further use of the sewage system by the of-fender and may remeve or cleare the use of the sewage system by the of-fender and may remove or close the offender's sewage and water con-nections by action of the City Council. (b) Any person who shall continue any violation of this article beyond the time limit provided for in the notice given pursuant to subsection (a) shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as prescribed below. Each day in which any such violation shall con-tinue shall be deemed a separate of-fense.

CUSTOMERS NOT USING CITY WATER Single family residents sewerage customers, who are not water customers of the City, shall pay a flat rate charge of \$4.60 per month for sewerage service. All other sewerage customers, who are not water users of the City, shall pay a flat monthly rate to be determined by the City Council. SECTION III. COMPUTATION WHEN WATER METER FAILS TO REGISTER In cases where a water meter shall

TO REGISTER In cases where a water meter shall fail from any cause to register water useage and consumption for any month or portion thereof, the water and sewerage service charge shall be computed on the estimated actual useage based on an average of metered or registered useage during the three months immediately preceeding. SECTION IV.

SECTION IV. BILLING: WHEN AND WHERE PAYABLE

BILLING; WHEN AND WHERE PAYABLE Sewerage bills and accounts shall be due and payable on the 10th day of the month following the billing date and shall become delinquent after the expiration of 21 days following the billing date. All bills and accounts shall be due and payable at City Hall. Biossom Prairie, Biossom, Lamar County, Texas. SECTION V. DISCONTINUANCE OF SEWERAGE SERVICE FOR FAILURE TO PAY If any person shall fail to pay the bill for sewerage service rendered to such person by the City before the ex-piration of 10 days after the date which such bill is due and payable, the sewerage service of such person shall have paid the delinquent sewerage bill in full, together with a reconnection fee of \$10.00. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a duly authorized employee of the City to reconnect such service.
