
# **Rebelettes To Meet Springhill In Bi-District Tilt**

The Rebelettes are winners of District 20 A and Springhill is the winner of District 19A. The winner of the Bi-District contest will advance to the Regional Tournament to be held in Huntsville on March 2-3.
