Rebelettes To Meet Springhill In Bi-District Tilt

After a practice game at 6:30 p.m. tonight, Thursday, Feb. 22 at Pittsburg, the Rivercrest Rebelettes will go to Quitman on Tuesday, Feb. 27 to play Springhill for the Bi-District Championship. Game time is 7:00 p.m. and admission is \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students.

The Rebelettes are winners of District 20 A and Springhill is the winner of District 19A. The winner of the Bi-District contest will advance to the Regional Tournament to be held in Huntsville on March 2-3.

The Rebelettes duplicated their 55-42 Thursday night win over Avinger with a 60-54 win over North Hopkins Monday night in the Rivercrest Gym.

The North Hopkins team, coached by Rivercrest graduate Bruce Knowles, gave the Rebelettes a run for their money, with the Rebelettes setting foul records rather than scoring records. A total of 29 fouls were made in the game by the Rebelettes, with team leader Scotti Wood fouling three times in the first quarter.

Although no one fouled out, Annette Harris, Marilyn

Mills, Judy Via, Wood and Donna Hines had four fouls

each. Tina Vickers and Margaret Hines had three fouls each.

Annette Harris made six steals and 16 points, with Marilyn Mills good for nine points. Judy Via made eight points, 10 defensive rebounds and two steals for an outstanding performance for the Rebelettes.

Thursday's 55-42 game was a confidence builder for the Rebelettes, with Avinger rated the number three school in the state in Class B.

"The Rebelettes played the best ball they have played all year" Coach Frank Stubblefield said. "I expected to play Avinger a good game and hold the score close to not be drummed out of the ballgame, but we did a lot better than that."

Rebelette Scotti Wood was hitting a high percentage of her shots early in the game,

and the Rebelettes took a quick 20-5 lead by the end of the first quarter. The Rebelette one on one defense seemed to confuse Avinger, but it also put Rivercrest in foul trouble early. Wood finally fouled out early in the fourth quarter, but she had already put 20 points on the board.

Also in third quarter foul trouble were Annette Harris and Robyn Reeder. Sarah Scales substituted for Harris and Reeder to score eight points and to take the foul pressure off.

"Judy Via played the best defensive game of her life," Stubblefield said, "and made 10 points offensively. Via made seven defensive

rebounds, five offensive rebounds, five steal and four tie balls.

"Every kid contributed something positive to the ball game," Stubblefield said. Avinger's Jo Ann Mathes and Montgomery, the strong shooters for the team, made 16 and 13 points respectively.

A Beef Production short course for adult farmers will be held March 12-15 under the sponsorship of the Rivercrest High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. Talmadge Morgan, Superintendent.

Dr. Richard C. Thomas, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will be the

During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Thomas will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-farm instruction.

Total Eclipse Will Occur Feb. 26

Texans should not look directly at the sun February 26, according to the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. Although Texans will notice no visible difference in the day's brightness, a total solar eclipse will occur in a path from the Pacific Ocean crossing the northwestern United States. The eclipse will occur partially in virtually all the rest of the continental United States.

The solar eclipse will begin in Houston at 9:11 a.m. as the moon first touches the sun's upper right corner. The moon will hide 57.8 percent of the solar disk at 10:23 a.m. when the eclipse reaches its mid-point. The eastward moving moon will slowly pull away from the sun after mid-eclipse. At 11:41 a.m., the dark new moon will leave the sun's upper left corner.

Prevent Blindness recommends indirect watching as the only safe way to view the solar eclipse. The simplest indirect way is the "pinhole" method. Take two pieces of white cardboard, make a small hole in one, and with the sun at the back, focus the eclipse through the pinhole onto the second board. The size of the image can be changed by altering the distance between the cardboards. One may use the binoculars or a telescope as the projector, replacing the pinhole cardboard. With the sunlight at his back, a person should position the instrument over his shoulder with the eyepiece down so that the light passing through it focuses on the white cardboard.

Using either method, the circle of light on the cardboard will show the sun being slowly obscured by the moon as it passes between the earth and the sun. Never look at the eclipse through the pinhole or through the binoculars or telescope. Photographers should also remember not to look at the sun through their camera viewfinder.

Following the last total eclipse seen in the U.S., 145 cases of eye injury were reported in a Prevent Blindness survey, 121 of them eclipse burns. Sixty percent of the casualties had looked at the sun directly with the naked eye. The remainder had tried to protect their eyes with various devices—sunglasses, totally exposed photographic negatives, smoked glass and welder's goggles.

Prevent Blindness is the only voluntary health agency solely concerned with preventing blindness through community service programs, public and professional education and research.

Stained Glass Course Scheduled At PJC

An organizational meeting to discuss a stained glass course is scheduled for March 8 at Paris Junior College, announced June Jones, director of continuing education at PJC. Mary Ann Schooler of Sawyer, Oklahoma, will teach the course, to begin March 29, but persons interested should attend the organizational meeting and order supplies. Reservations for the meeting should be made by calling the PJC Continuing Education Office, 785-7661, extension 145.

In the course Ms. Schooler will teach participants the craftsmanship of stained glass and leading and copper foiling techniques of assembling. Students will complete specific projects such as windows, terrariums, jewelry boxes or candle holders.

Fee for the 30-hour course will be fifty dollars and the supplies for course projects will cost about fifty dollars. Classes will be from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m., Thursdays for ten weeks, but the organizational meetings on Thursday, March 8 will be at 7:00 p.m. in the Natural Sciences Center 109.

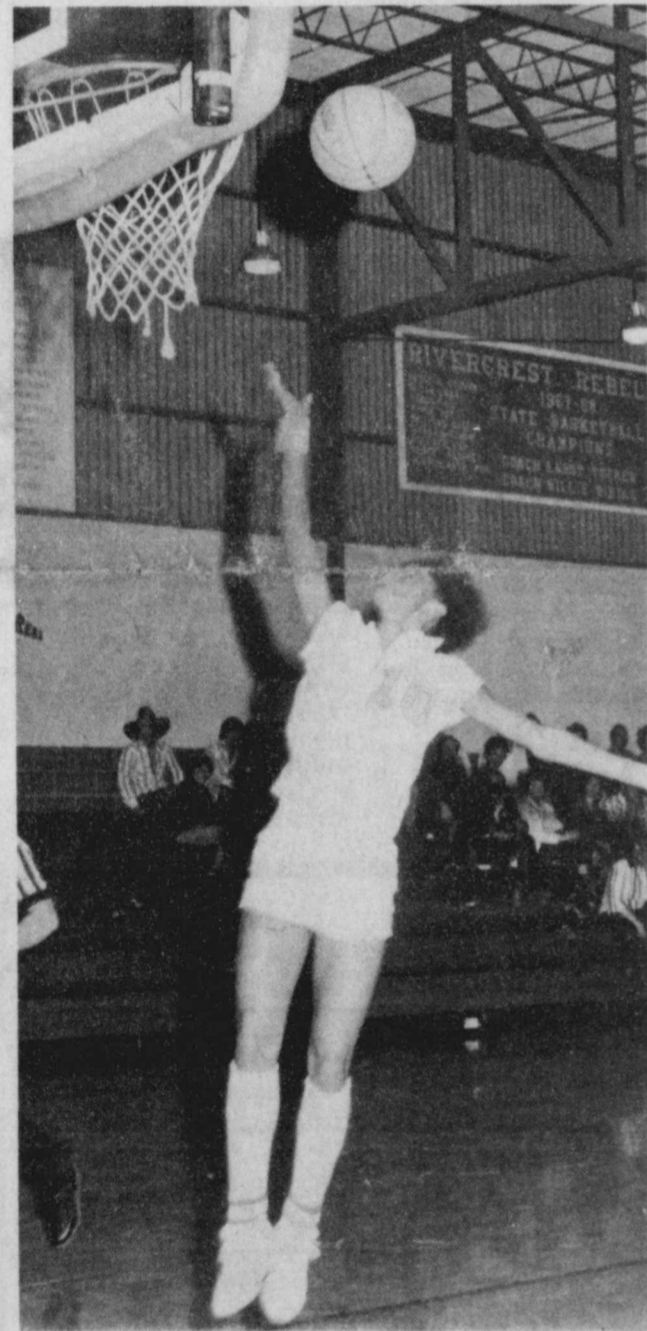

SBA Continues Drought Disaster Assistance

The U.S. Small Business Administration today issued suggestions to aid Texas farmers and ranchers who play to apply for SBA's Physical Disaster Loan Program.

"Agricultural producers who had losses on 1978 crops because of the extreme drought conditions which have plagued much of the state may be eligible for a low-interest loan," said

Alicia Chacon, SBA Regional Director. "Loan applications must be completed and returned to SBA before the March 6 deadline."

Copies of tax records and legal documents such as deeds, leases and mortgages must be included in the application. A cash flow projection for the 1979 crop year is also necessary.

If the applicant is a partnership, each partner must submit a personal financial statement and tax return in addition to the partnership financial statement and return. In the case of a corporation, a personal financial statement must be submitted for each officer or director and for anyone owning twenty percent or more of the voting stock.

SBA disaster loans cover only the amount of the actual loss in yield as certified by ASCS. A producer may not borrow more than the amount of his losses, and SBA loans cannot duplicate other disaster or deficiency payments.

The Small Business Administration accepts ASCS figures on established normal yield for program crops. On other crops, SBA will accept the county average from the Statistical Reporting Service or another agricultural unit. Harvested yield is subtracted from the established normal yield to determine the actual loss, which then is certified by ASCS.

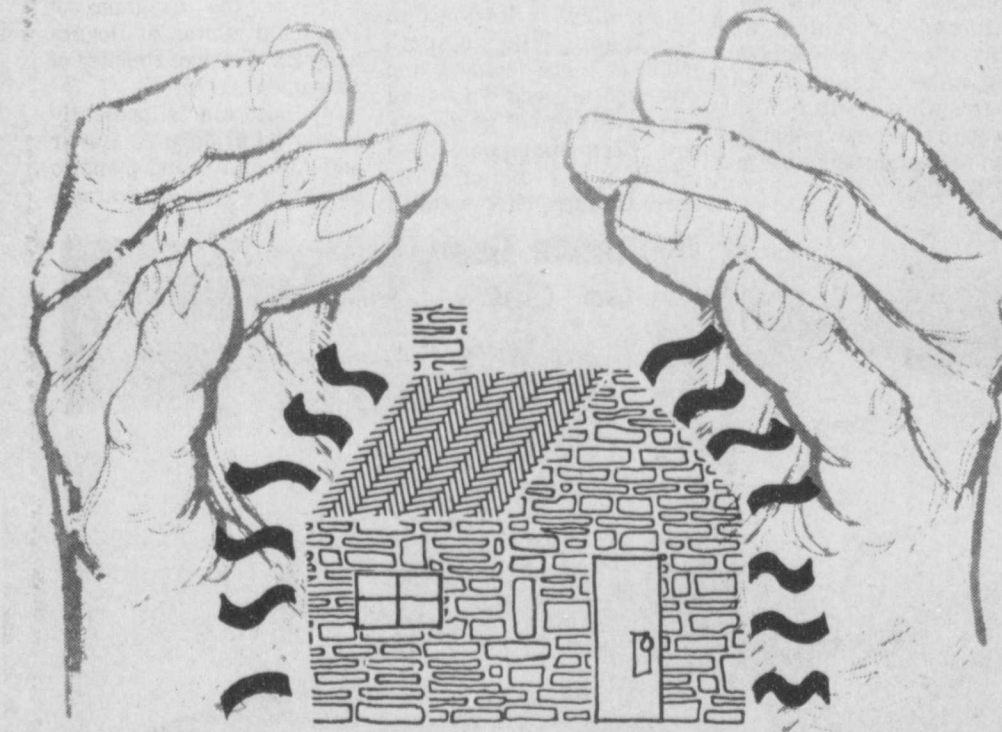
Donnie Wilmont served as best man. Groomsmen were Scotty and Phil Waters, brothers of the groom, all of Ft. Worth.

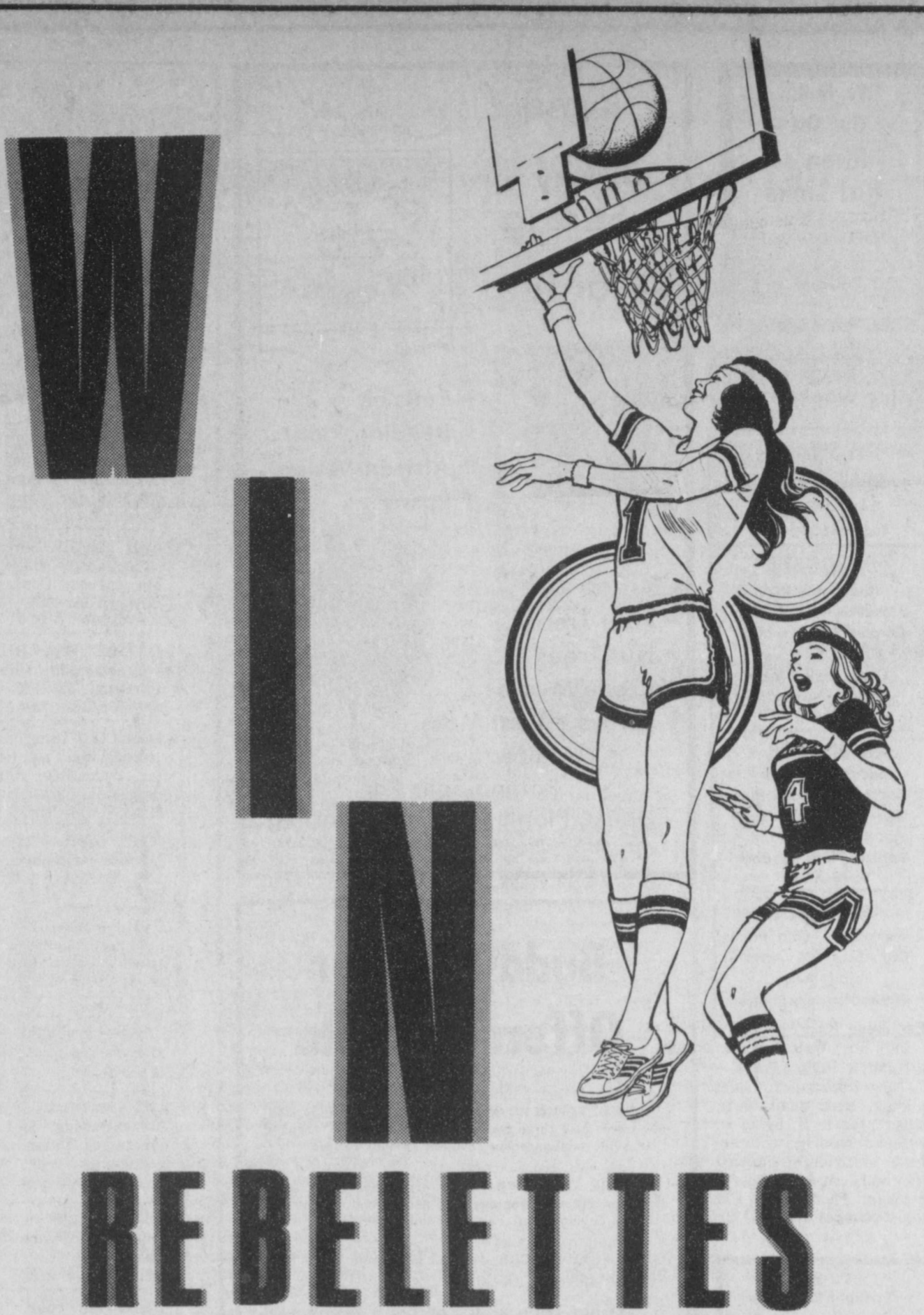

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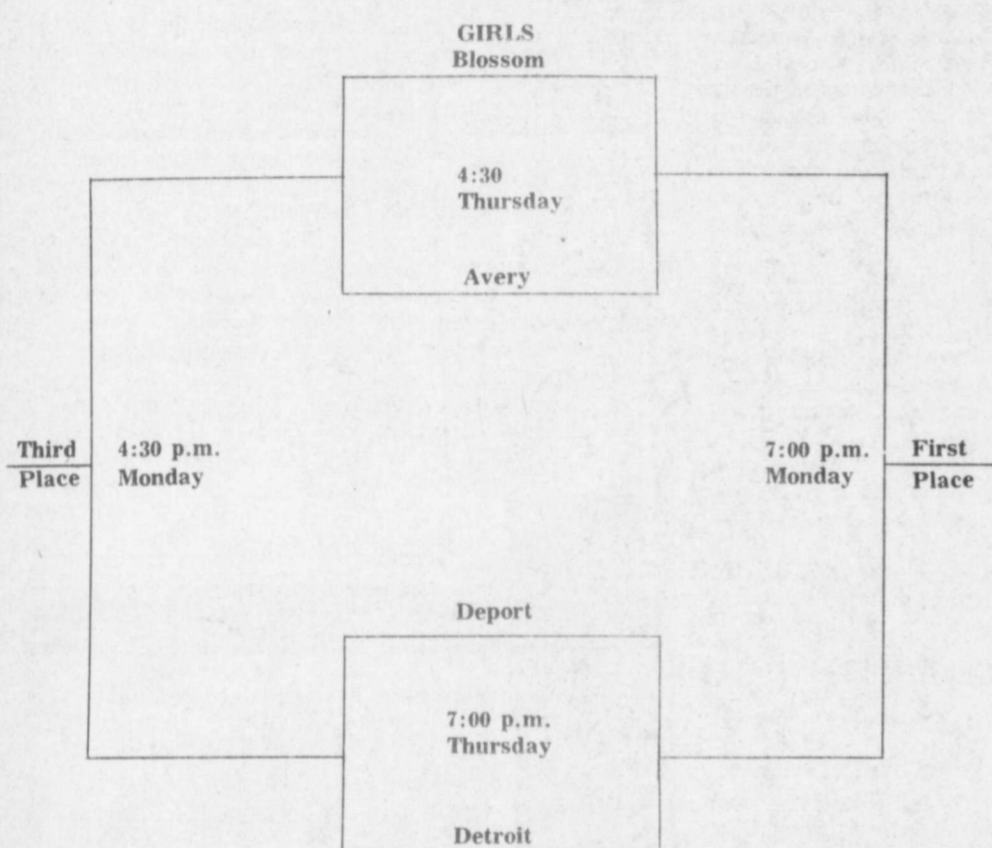
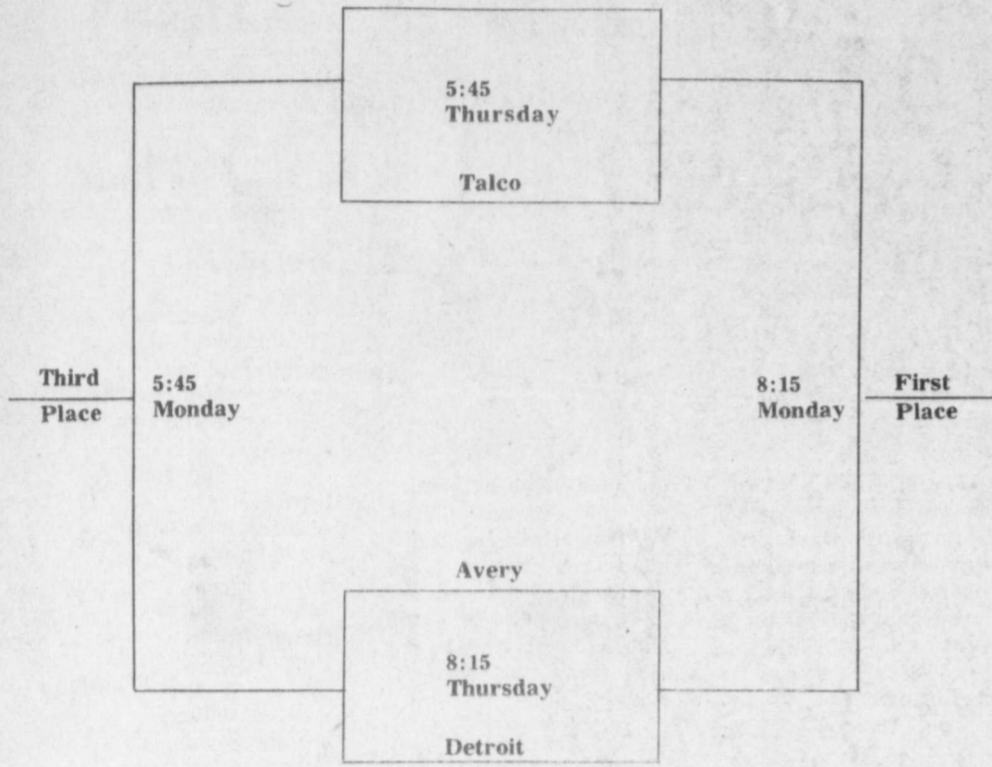
