

flicts about as much damage as if no poisoning had been done and the farmer loses, in addition, what he has spent in poisoning operations. The

only way to prevent that sort of result is to let wet weather interfere as little as possible with poisoning operations. says, regardless of weather conditions. The department realizes of course, that poisoning cannot be done in pouring rain but the farmer, the specialists

urge, should take advantage of the earliest opportunity to get back into the field after the rain, that he should make every effort to get the cotton







There is one cafeteria in New York where the dishwashers discuss relativity and the fourth dimension, where the countermen have master degrees, where the bus boys are prepared to give an opinion on the Genoa conference, or the Rapallo agreement. This cafeteria is located in a one-story building just back of the massive graydomed library of Columbia university and is best known by its title of "commons," the New York Sun points out. Needy students are given all the jobs in this cafeteria, with the exception of some managerial positions and those in the culinary department.

A visit to this cafeteria a little after noon on a week day in the company of one familiar with the place and its habitues will yield some interesting information. The man who serves the soup, for example, is a Nova Scotian. A student of journalism, he is earning his way through by free lancing and by doing old bits of work. Beside him is a Greek, in this country only a year, but already a master of English.

The dark-skinned man at the griddle is a native of Turkestan, a pre-medical student. He has announced his intention of leaving Columbia at the end of the present semester to continue his studies at Iowa State university, because the expenses are less at the latter institution. The 1,100 miles from New York to Iowa he is to travel by emulating Jack London in his adverse days. This man will practice in Persia when he has finished his education.







During a gale on the British coast it will be noticed that the waves begin to break a long way out. That is because these waves, being big ones, touch bottom the sooner. Their lower part moves forward at its old speed. The result is that the upper part curis over and breaks.

In very deep water a giant wave has been known to touch bottom and stir up the fine sand there at a depth of 1.200 Teet.

On a fine autuian day we may sometimes see a procession of big "groundswells" coming shoreward and breaking on the beach with the boom of distant thunder. They represent the disturbance of the sea caused by a storm far out to sea. By closely observing the direction from which these swells come one can form an idea of where the storm is situated. Sometimes the waves travel faster than the storm. and even give warning of its approach.

Smoke as Lightning Conductor. In a recent reference to the astronomical observatory on Mt. Etna, e prominent scientist called attention to the fact that thunderstorms are very rare phenomena there. The observatory is more than 9,000 feet above the level of the sea, and near the summit of the volcano, yet it has not found necessary to protect it with lightning rods. 



THE human body "goes to sleep" in order that the heart and the brain have time to build up the portions of the body which have been used up during the day, by exertion of one kind or another.

Generally speaking, the brain acts as sort of an alarm clock which wakens us when the process of rebuilding has been completed and it is for this reason that persons who have been unduly fatigued sleep longer than those who have taken but little exercise. The process of awakening is principally due to two factors-the necessary amount of rest and habit. The former being the stronger of the two, persons who are quite tired when they retire find it difficult to wake up at their accustomed time, though an equal amount of fatigue upon going to bed each night will soon enable one to acquire the habit of arising at the same hour, no matter how early or late this may be. The provess of natural awakening, therefore, is merely the result of being completely rested in all parts of the body-even though certain muscles may appear fatigued through unusual exertion on the preceding day.
