## Rebels Attain Victory Against Prairiland, 13-6

Another chapter was written in the book last Friday night. The book about the long-standing feud between the Prairiland Patriots and the Rivercrest Rebels. And once again the Rebels came out as the heroes by beating the Pats 13-6. But the battle was not an easy one. These two teams seem to play better against one another than against other opponents. And last Friday's game was no exception.

The Patriots drew blood first. Rivercrest fumbled a Patriot punt and the Pats recovered off the Rebels' 8 yard line. Three plays later, though, Prairiland was still at the 8, but on 4th down Todd Davis hit Rick Harrell in the end zone and put the Pats up by six. James Strickland then brought the kickoff back 26 yards to the RHS 46 where he then cranked up the Rivercrest express. The Rebs drove to Prairiland's 29 yard line before Strickland was intercepted at the 25 on a third and long play. But just a few plays later Billy Stewart

returned the favor by picking off a Todd Davis pass and returning it to Prairiland's 15 yard line. Five plays later, Jerry Merchant took the ball over from two yards out for his second touchdown of the year. Charlie Skaggs then added the extra point, and the Rebs were up 7-6. But Prairiland is not so easy to discourage. They took the ball on their own 25 and began a 71 yard march downfield. Brad Sessums picked up nearly half of that march in one play, a 34 yard run down the sidelines with only Bradley Moore between him and paydirt. And Moore was not letting him by. The Pats then drove down to RHS's 4 yard line where a tough Rebel defense toughened even more and held the Pats. The rebels then took the ball from their own 4 to Prairiland's 37 before punting it away. The Pats then tried to get going but halftime foiled them.

The Patriots took the second half kickoff and began a drive to RHS's goal line, but they fumbled the ball and gave Rivercrest

possession at Prairiland's 41 yard line. But the Rebs turned the ball back over on downs when a fourth down pass from Strickland to Craig Clemmons fell just inches short of a first down. The Rebels then took a Prairiland punt on their own 27 and cranked, once again, the Rivercrest express. Cline and Merchant took turns at the line until finally they had put the ball on the Pats 29 yard line. Then, with just seconds gone from the fourth quarter, Strickland again went to the air and again found Clemmons, this time on the other side of the goal-line for a touchdown.

The point after was no good and Rivercrest now led 13-6. Again Prairiland was not discouraged. They took the ball from their own 23 to Rivercrest's 9 yard line where Stan Wood broke up a fourth down pass and saved a touchdown. The rest of the game held no threat by either team, and the Rebels went to the locker room with their first victory of the 1981 season under their belt.

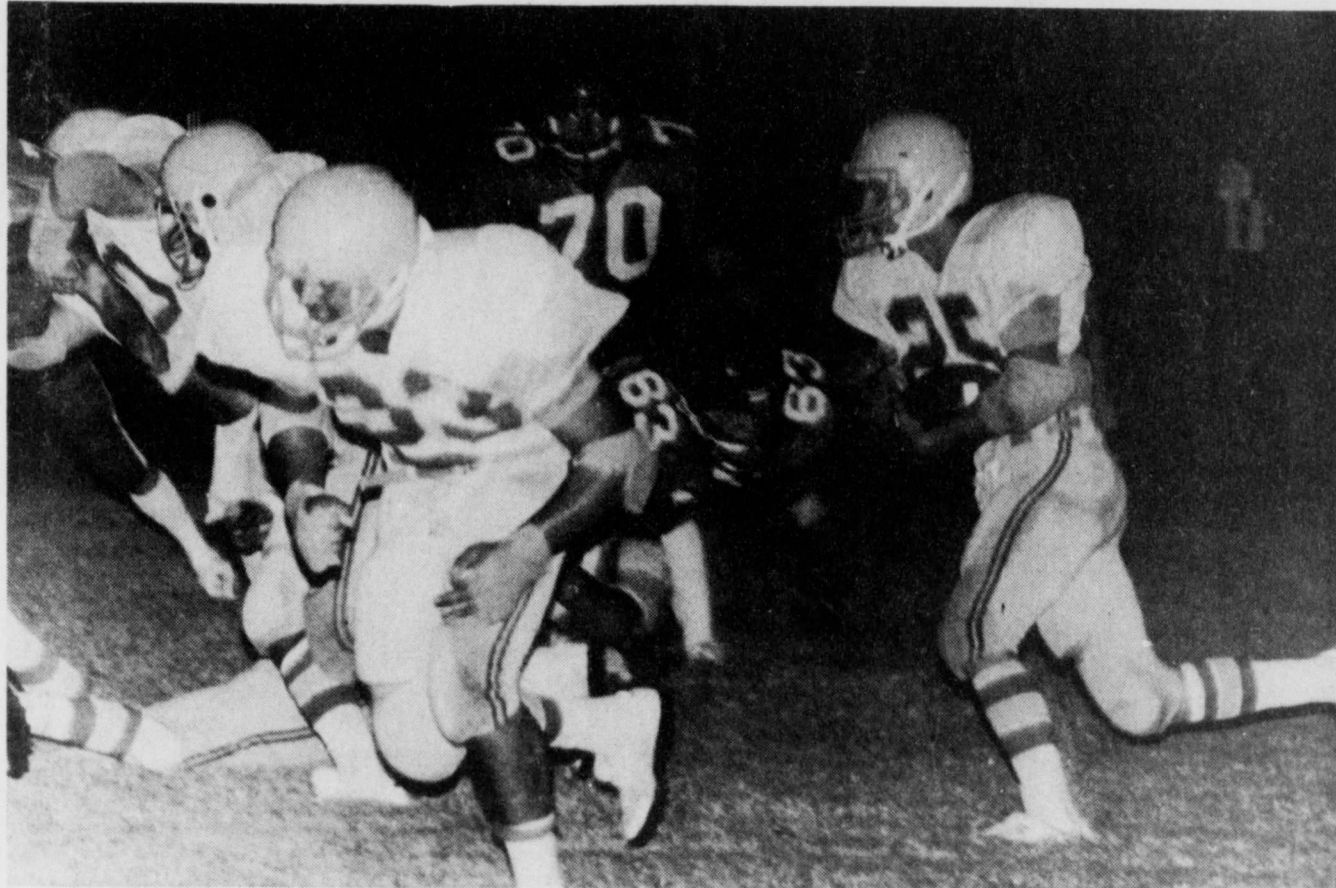
The Rebs netted 164 yards rushing on 15 first downs

with Jerry Merchant as leading ground gainer for the Rebs with 85 yards; Wade Cline added 47 and James Strickland ended up with 32 yards. Billy Stewart, Merchant, Damon Ward, and Bradley Moore led the defensive squad in tackles and Craig Clemmons had two pass receptions for 38 yards.

And thus finishes another chapter of the raging battles in the book of Rebel-Patriot history. Next week, the Rebs play host to the Mt. Vernon Tigers in the annual homecoming game. Coach Milford Groves, pleased with the fine performance against Prairiland, looks at next weeks game with anticipation, as it will prove to be another hard battle for his Rivercrest Rebels.

## Parish, Reese Plead Guilty To Fraud

Titus County Commissioner, Precinct 3, Alvin (Scooter) Parrish, Jr., who had been scheduled to face a U.S. District Court Jury on Wednesday, September 16, plead guilty to one count of extortion and mail fraud before U.S. District Judge William Steger on Wednesday.

Former Titus County Commissioner, Carthel (Shorty) Reese also plead guilty to one count of extortion and mail fraud at the same time. Titus County Commissioner Burt Binmon Parr was granted a continuance to

October 19 in the opening of his trail on kickback charges.

The charges of the Titus commissioners resulted from an FBI probe probe which covered a three state area and resulted in a number of charges of fraud, extortion and mail fraud to

commissioners in counties in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

The trials of Red River County Commissioners R.L. (Lundsford) Edwards and Darwin Floyd, and Fannin County Commissioner Charles E. Edwards, are still set for November 6th in the western division of the U.S. District Court, presided over by Judge William Wayne Justice, in the Paris Term of the Court.

The next meeting will be held Tuesday, October 20, 1981 at 7 p.m. in the Rivercrest Homemaking Department. New members are welcome.



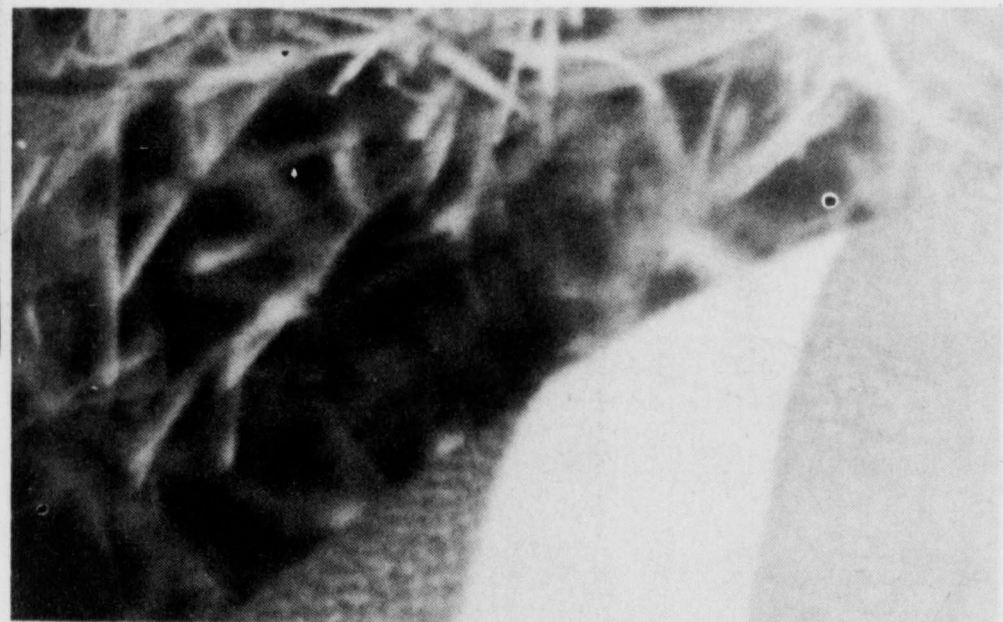
Dear Editor:

## City Sales Tax Rebates Up 14.7%

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said 750 Texas cities received \$40.9 million in city sales tax rebates for September.

The September payments push the city's rebates for this year to \$480.3 million, up 14.7 percent over yearly payments to date during 1980.

The optional one-percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the four-percent state sales tax and returned each month by the Comptroller to the city in which it is collected.

Rebates in our area were: \$15,242.34; Deport-\$4,797.90; Blossom-\$6,197.75; Bogata-

and Talco-\$28,608.84.

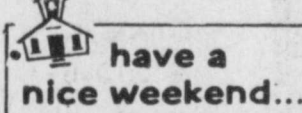

**Metric Course Set**  
A short course on the Metric System will be taught at Paris Junior College beginning Tuesday, Sept. 29, from 7 to 9 p.m. in room 124 in the Administration Building. Nancy Long instructor of Math at Paris Junior College will teach the course, sponsored by the PJC Continuing Education Division. Three classes will be held on three consecutive Tuesday nights for a fee of \$10. June Jones Director of Continuing Education said. This system, used for measurements in most major nations of the world, is rapidly being adopted in the United States and will soon become standard. A large segment of industry has already initiated the system. The metric system is measurements based on units of 10 and the decimal system. Once learned, the metric system is much simpler and more logical than our customary measurements. The system was devised in France in 1795 and is legally recognized in the United States. With the system becoming more and more widely used in the United States, the course should be beneficial to all citizens.

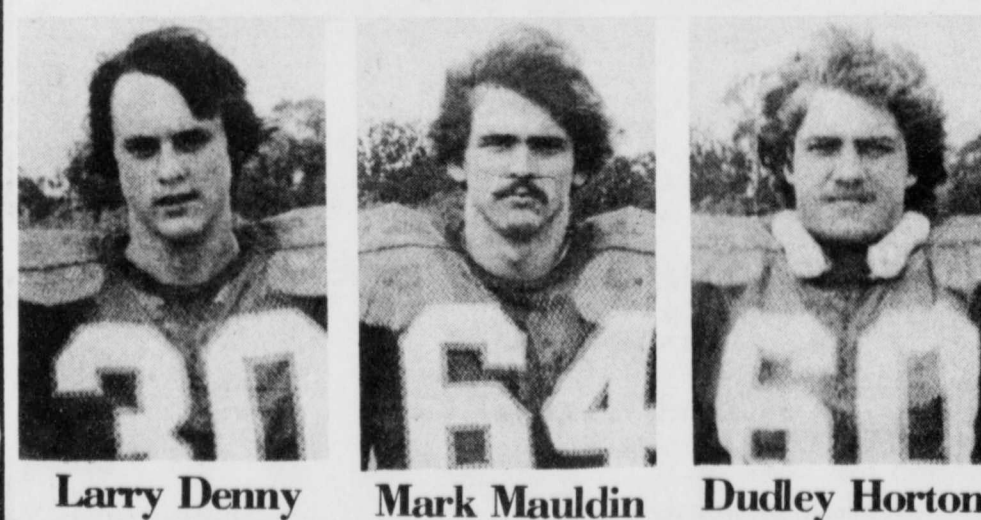

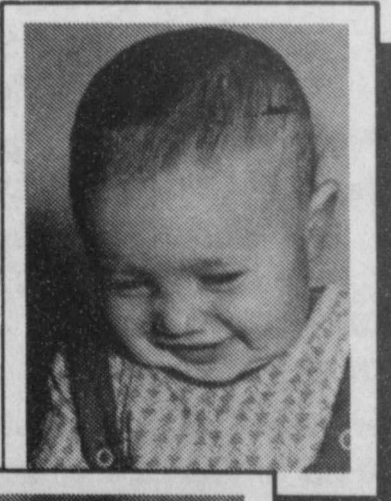

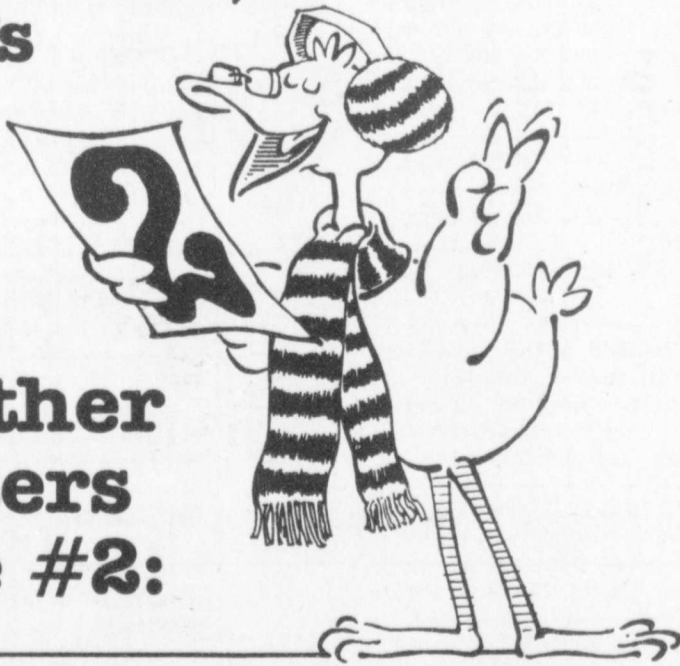
