Rebels Attain Victory Against Prairiland, 13-6 possession at Prairiland's 41 with Jerry Merchant as

Another chapter was written in the book last Friday night. The book about the long-standing feud between the Prairiland heroes by beating the Pats 13-6. But the battle was not an easy one. These two teams seem to play better against one another than against other opponents. And last Friday's game was no exception.
