The new test well that will be put down by the Glenn Royalty Company of Chlergs on the X ranch in the south east part of the county, has completed the derrick and is reported to be making preparations to spad in Saturday of this

ARE IMITATION BLUE POINTS

Product Generally Sold as Pick of Oyster Family Not Really Taken From Famous Beds.

It has been computed that six barrels of Blue Point oysters are ordered and eaten for every barrel taken from the Great South bay, in Suffolk county, New York. About 10,000 acres in the bottom of Great South bay are under oyster cultivation, and Blue Points now come from many other places along the Atlantic coast. Even those that are taken from the waters of Great South bay are not the Blue Points which made that name famous considerably more than a century ago. but are descendants of Virginia oysters, which were planted in Great South bay many years ago, and which probably came from Chesapenke bay Nearly a century ago-that is, about 1825, cysters in the waters which were the home of Blue Points, became so scarce and costly that they were worth five cents aplece, which was a scandalous price for oysters at that time. Those old-fashioned Blue Points were not small oysters with comparatively smooth shells, but were of giant size, more like those we call Saddle Rocks or Tangler "selects." Finally the Blue Point oyster bottoms became barren. After this condition had prevailed for a number of years, it was determined to restore the Great South bay oyster industry, and boutloads of seed systems were taken from old Virginia and put overboard. Their descendants are there today, yet even they are able to furnish only a small proportion of the Blue Points that are

THREE RINGS AROUND SATURN

Fact Known to Astronomers, but Their Composition Has Not Been Definitely Determined.

The inner ring of the planet Saturn, known to astronomers as the "crene ring" because it is much less brilliant than the others, bas a thick ness of 2,000 miles, while the other rings are very much thinner, a couling to observations made by Prof. William H. Pickering of Harvard at the Harvard astronomical station at Mandeville. Jamaica.

The thickness of the rings Saturn has long attracted the interest of astronomers. This planet is surrounded by what appears through a small telescope to be a stude that ring of exceeding thinness. Turough a larger telescope this is seen to be in reality three concentric rings.

Every 16 years or so the enril passes through the plane of these rings, which are then in a position edgewise to the earth. So thin are they that for a while they disappear and cannot be seen until the earth moves out of their plane.

Astronomers believe these rings to be composed of innumerable small meteors revolving in dense swarms. about the middle portions of the planet.

Professor Pickering is also engaged in studying the canals on the planet Mars, and is searching for the still undiscovered planet which is believed to revolve around the sun far outside the orbit of Neptune, the outermost planet yet discovered in the solar system.

Perfidious Albion.

The phrase "Albion perfide" (perfidious Albion) is generally attributed to Napoleon, who undoubtedly used it, though the idea long antedated the great emperor. Thus Perlin in his "Description des Royaulmes d'Angleterre at d'Ecosse" (1588), says: "One may say of the English that in war they are not strong, and in peace they are not faithful." The Spaniard says: "Angleterre bonne terre mala gente" (England, good country, bad people). On the other hand Francois Maxemilien Nisson, the noted French writer, who had lived among the English many years while in exile, and knew the people well, says in his "Travels" (1719): "I cannot imagine what could occasion the notion that I have frequently observed in France that the English were treacherous. It is certainly great injustice to reckon treachery among the vices familiar to the English."

Parliamentary "Whips."

The parliamentary origin of the term "Whip" goes back to 1768. In that year, according to Sir Courtenay libert (clerk of the British house of commons from 1902 to 1921), there was a great debate in the house on a petition against the return of Calonel Luttrell for Westminster in place of John Wilkes, who had been expelled from the house by its order. The government made strenuous efforts to bring together all their followers for the division, and Edmund Burke, referring scornfully to the manner in which men had been summoned posthaste even from the continent, likened the activity of the ministers to the whipping-in of a pack of hounds. The phrase caught on. The treasury officials became "whippers-in." and, by rapid process of ab breviation, whips.

Disposing of the Dead.

Cremation was common in ancient days among the Greeks and Romans, the funeral pyre marking the final disappearance of many heroes. Certain tribes of American Indians wrapped the bodies of their dead and fastened them in cradles on the branches of living es. But burial remains the com-

EGEDE HONORED BY DANES

Deeds of Great Missionary and Pat. riot Have Not Been Forgotten by Those He Benefited.

Two hundred years ugo Hans Egede set sail from Bergen, Norway. for Greenland with the idea of acting as a missionary to the descendants of Norwegians who had preceded him by eight centuries. With him on the "Haabet," or "Hope," were his wife, his four small children and 34 others. They arrived in Ball's river July 3. Though he found no colonists he did find what he felt was a rare oppor-

Hans Egede was a hundred per cent Norwegian. But in his day Norway was under Danish sovereignty and it was, after all, Frederick IV who did what he could to finance his undertaking.

Although Egede, when he arrived in Greenland, was disappointed, he was not discouraged. He at once began his work among the Eskimos. translated the Bible-with the invaluable assistance of his young children-into their language, and what is probably of greater signifleance for civilization, re-established trade relations with Denmark that have continued to this day His book entitled "A Description of Greenland," has not been entirely superseded even now. When he returned to Denmark in 1736, his son Paul continued the work he had begun. He died at Copenhagen in 1758 justly regarded by the Danes as one of the most courageous and astute missionaries the world has known. It is to him that the Danes are indebted for their one and truly great overseas possession.

SEAL ALWAYS WORK OF ART

Almost Everywhere Stones of Peculiar Beauty Were Chosen for These Marks of Identification.

Seals and their impressions, whether antiquarian or recently made, have always stimulated the fancy of the connoisseur and art student by their charming effect and the ingenuity displayed in putting so much on so small a space.

The use of the seal for the identification of objects by making a unique and inimitable mark upon them was adopted in early times by nations.

We know from the Old Testament that the ancient Jews had them in use, and recall the dialogue between Judah and Tamar in Genesis 38:18. which says; "What pledge shall I give thee?" to be answered with Thy signet and thy bracelets." This signet was probably similar to those used in ancient Egypt, a cylinder of hard stone, engraved with a personal levice. There are many such in the British museum.

In Egypt the impression of a seal was usually taken in Nile mud and attached to documents. Later on among the Latin races seals were used for bags of money, documents and pressed in wax. The delight which sparkling objects led to the choice of bard transparent stones of peculiar beauty which lend themselves to engraving, and so it is that the sent attracted the attention of men curning in producing lovely little works of

Gladstone Explains His First Budget We owe to the late dake of Argyl an account of the cabinet meeting in

1853 at which Mr. Gladstone, then for ty-three years of age, explained the proposals of the first of his series of famous budgets. "He came into the room," writes the duke, "with a large. flat, shallow official box, very old and shabby, covered with drab-colored leather. He sat on a chair nearly fronting the window, whilst we all sat in a kind of loop around him. Opening the box on his knee, so that its lid stood upright and afforded a rest for any paper placed upon its edge, he began a conversational exposition, which endured, without a moment's interruption, for more than three hours." The speech in which Mr. Gladstone laid this budget before the house lasted close upon five hours.

Burial Most Common Practice. There are two ideas of the proper disposal of the body when its spirit has fled-one that it shall be preserved so long as possible, the other that it shall be destroyed by the natural process of decay or by fire. Burial in the earth, the most economic method, is the common practice the world over at the present time.

Religious beliefs usually control action in this matter. Death has been long utilized by priests as the most effective natural event for the instruction of men in faith and doctrine, whence came the solemn ceremonles with which all are familiar. The word funeral, meaning "drawn out" in the Latin from which it is derived, marks a universal tendency in its ceremo-

Egyptian Embalming.

Among the ancient Egyptians, whose civilization was the earliest we know about, embalming was practiced by all who could afford it for their dead. It required some ninety days, the body being steeped in natron 70 days, then washed inside and out, and treated with cedar oil, after which it was enveloped in linen bandages-at a cost of about \$1,500. A cheaper process cost \$300. How effective it was, the nummies in many museums attest after thousands of years.

THE THOUSAND ISLANDS THE River St. Lawrence "As grand as the Rhine", was discovered by a French explorer in 1535. In 1615. Champlain explored the upper reaches of this majestic stream and discovered these islands.

The origin of the name is evident to the beholder. Below Lake Ontario for a distance of some forty infles the river broadens to a width ranging from four to seven miles. Here begins this world-famous archipelago. These islands-sometimes in a string like iinks in a chain-again in just pellmell confusion, appear to block the channel. Apparently there are a thousand of them. Some authorities assert there are as many as 1,700.

Composed mainly of rock or granite. their surfaces are not high. Some are no larger than to provide a foundation for a house—the largest contains about 10,000 acres. Many are privately owned and here man and his money have created castles which look as wondrous as fairy tales sound.

Magnificent English Seal.

The high-water mark for English official seals was reached in the magnificent seal of Henry IV, which was also used by his two successors. The matrix is of gold and is a marvel of the goldsmith's art. Not only does this seal take pre-eminence amongst seals, but it is also often pointed to as illustrating the zenith of English art of this period. It was made in 1408. A Gothic framework on the obverse side divides with niches and canopies the space into numerous sections enshrining no less than 21 figures, besides the charges on the shields and banners. Herein is reflected the perpendicular style of architecture just beginning to assert itself. The figures all have a political significance to convey.

Ford Plant Builds 108,962 Cars in June

Demand Exceeds Output as Ford Breaks All Previous Records

During the month of June, the Ford Motor Company, thru its Detroit Factories and 22 Assembly Plants throughout the country reached the production of 108,962 Ford cars and trucks, setting up a new high record for one month.

Production of Ford cars and trucks has been steadily increasing since early spring, and shows substantial gains over the same period last year. The second quarter of 1921, viz., April, May and June, shows an output of 301,796 Ford cars and trucks against 220,878 for the same three months of last year, or a net increase of 89,918.

Despite the fact, however, that the Ford plants have been running at maximum capacity, the demand for Ford cars and trucks is not being met, and at the present time, many thousand unfilled orders have been piled up ahead so that Ford sales are still limited by manufacturing facilities rather than marketing possibilities. Particularly is this true with respect to enclosed cars, for which the demand has been unusually heavy.

One reason cited by Ford Officials for the unprecedented demand for Ford cars is the present tendency toward economy. Many of those whose names have been added to the long list of buyers might well have afforded larger and more costly cars than the Ford, but it is the belief that most prospective motor car buyers are investigating all of the costs incident to motoring much more carefully than at any period during the past five years.

The estimated output of the Ford Factories for July calls for 109,000 cars and trucks, or a reduction of 4,360 a day for 25 days. Since the assembling of cars is being handled during an eight hour work day only, the hourly output will be 545 cars. In other words, one Ford car or truck leaves the asembly line every 6 1-2 seconds.



Sugar From Corn Stalks.

Investigating the sugar production of corn stalks, P. Vielland, a French chemist, has found that the stem of the maize plant normally contains no sucrose, or cane sugar, and very little dextrose, or grape sugar. If the ears are removed when the grain begins to be milky, however, sugars accumulate in the stem, and in 7 to 34 days after removal of the ears the extractable amounts may reach 7 to 10 per cent of sucrose and 1 to 3 more than one-third of the sucrose can is immaterial in the production of alcohol. 
