Two Points Separate Rebs From Victory
Rebels Win Bi-District, Lose Area

The Rivercrest Rebels closed out their 1982-83 basketball season Tuesday night as they dropped a heartbreaker to the Troup Tigers, 61-59 in Springhill.

The Rebels held the lead for most of the game and dominated the first three quarters scores. Troup came up with some lucky breaks in the fourth period to clinch the win.

Rivercrest missed some shots that they would usually make—especially free shots. But overall the Rebs played a hard pressing game. They outplayed the Tigers but Troup won out on the scoreboard.

The Rebels took a first quarter lead of 11-8. David Rozell, who was closely guarded throughout, hit for four, Stan Wood for five and John Hines for two.

The second period strengthened Rivercrest's lead to 7 points, 28-21. Six foot senior, Bradley Moore scored 9 points and David Rozell, Wyatt Bush, John Hines and Larry Davis each hit for two.

The third period was much the same as the Rebels held a six point lead, 44-38. John Hines came up with 6 markers, Rozell hit for four and Bush, Moore and Davis added two each.

The final stanza brought some Tiger steals and long court passes to set up lay-ups. The decision came down to the final minutes. David Rozell and Bradley Moore each hit for four, Stan Wood for five and Wyatt Bush for two.

In the final seconds, Bradley Moore came to mid-court and put up a long shot. The ball arched through the air and popped the net amid a tremendous cheering Rebel crowd. Moore raised both hands and faced the crowd as if to say "We are still the best!"

Scoring for the Rebels were Bradley Moore with 15, David Rozell with 14, Stan Wood and John Hines each with 10, Wyatt Bush with six and Larry Davis with four. Coach Wake Wood had these comments, "We had the best team but we didn't make the key shots when we needed to. We were tight and Troup was behind 10 points and didn't have anything to lose. Troup was lucky to stay close enough to us for a last minute win."

We can really be proud of these boys. They have played very well all season. They have given all of us many hours of enjoyment along with Rivercrest's first boys' bi-district championship. Congratulations Rebels on a very impressive season!

The Rivercrest Rebels trekked to Sulphur Springs last Friday night with high hopes. Previous trips to bi-district have brought home defeats. Not this time! The Rebs brought home a bi-district championship! They defeated Edgewood 59-50.

The first quarter was too close for comfort. The Rebs were tight and missed some shots they would normally make. Rivercrest ended the first stanza down by one, 14-13. Stan Wood put up five points and David Rozell, Bradley Moore, John Hines and Kelly Jeffery each added two.

The second period the Rebels hit 14 points to the Bulldogs' nine, and took a halftime lead, 27-23. David Rozell hit for seven, Bradley Moore for four and John Hines for two.

Rivercrest dominated the second half in quarter scores. They popped the net for 12 more while Edgewood

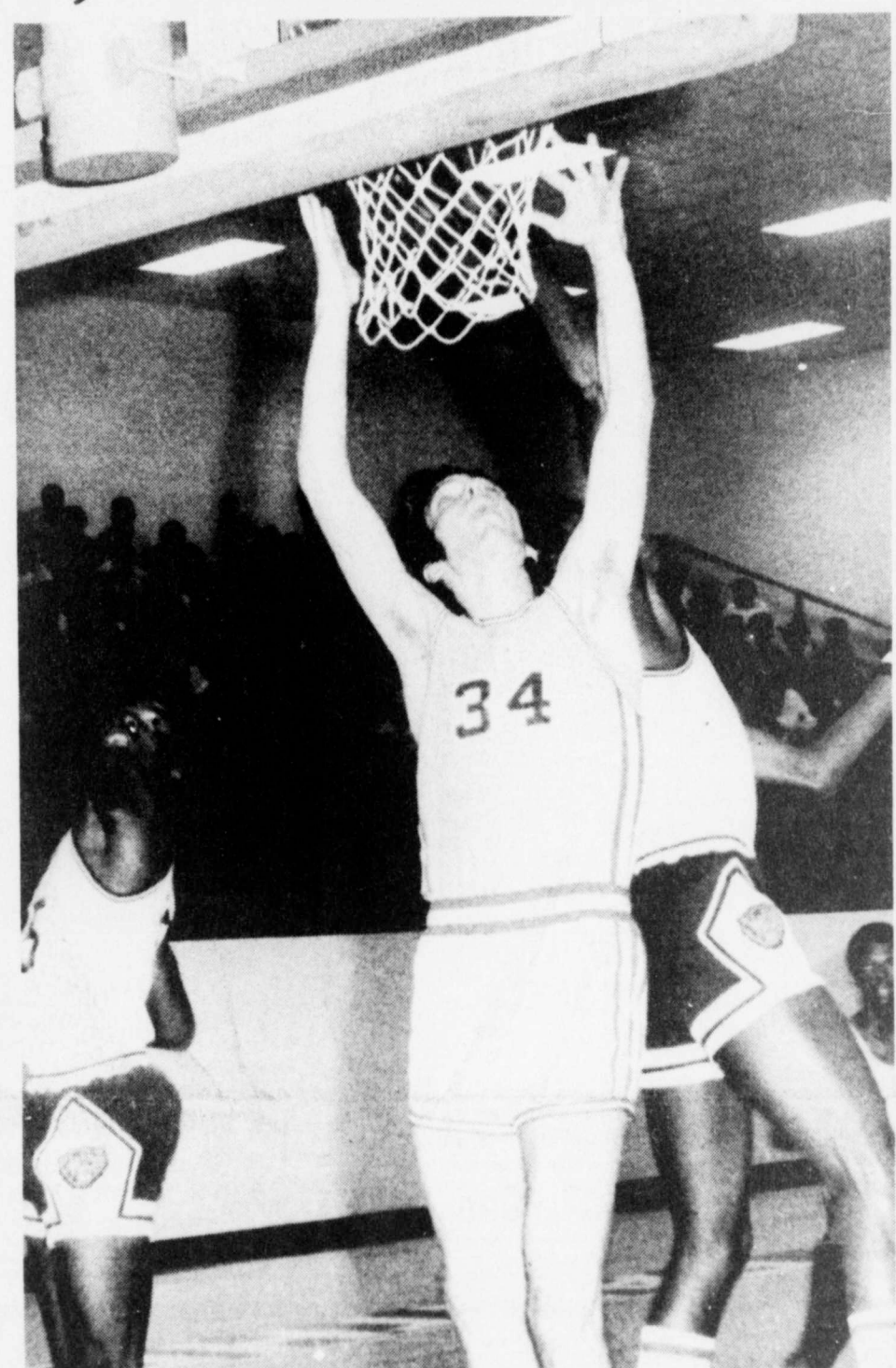
netted 10 in third period play. David Rozell added six and Wyatt Bush, Stan Wood and Bradley Moore earned two apiece.

The Rebs were hot now and couldn't be stopped. They racked up 20 markers during the final eight minutes. Edgewood answered with 17 but came up short at the final buzzer. Rozell netted nine points for a second half total of 15. Coach Wood was quick to praise Rozell's second half play. David also came down with several key rebounds. Bradley Moore hit for six, Stan Wood for four and Wyatt Bush for one.

Coach Wake Wood said of his Rebels, "We played well at times, but didn't keep up our intensity when we got ahead. I really thought we could have won by more than nine points, but our players were very happy with the win." Wood was lavish with his

praise as he said, "A very bright spot was Wyatt Bush coming off the bench and playing a tremendous game. I feel that Kelly Jeffery and Randy Galloway did an excellent job with strong defense and hustle. Stan Wood had an excellent floor game as well as scoring 11 points. Bradley Moore also had a good defensive game along with several steals and 14 points. Larry Davis played smart defense and made several key plays for us. John Hines held Edgewood's leading scorer to two points in the second half and I really didn't expect this." He added, "I feel this game was typical of our play. We came through when it really counted."

Player totals for the Rebs were David Rozell with 24, Bradley Moore with 14, Stan Wood with 11, Wyatt Bush and John Hines each with four and Kelly Jeffery with two.

All-Season Comfort by homecrest

Moist, succulent meat beneath a crispy, golden brown skin has long made roast chicken a popular East Texas mealtime favorite. Proper roasting seals in most of the flavor-packed juices and preserves the valuable protein without adding appreciable calorie laden fat.
Wash and pat dry an approximately four pound broiler-fryer. Rub inside and out with butter. Salt and pepper the interior cavity. Place on a rack in a low, uncovered roasting pan and put into a pre-heated 450 degree oven. Reduce the heat at once to 350 degrees. Roast the chicken about 20 minutes per pound. After the first 20 minutes in the oven, baste frequently with pan juices, or as there is not much pan juice from a four pound chicken, use one cup chicken broth and 1/4 cup melted butter. Frequent basting is the secret to the crisp skin and the preserved juiciness.
The chicken is done when a leg moves easily and the skin is a beautiful dark golden brown. Remove from the oven and let cool slightly before slicing. A traditional and delicious next step might

be to place the slices of roast chicken on top of a pan of cornbread dressing and bake until the dressing gains a slight, golden crustiness.
Just once, at least, try serving slices of the roast chicken with your favorite tossed green or fruit salad and vegetables. I, for some reason, lean towards English peas cooked with just a hint of mint and Cooper Penny Carrots or pan browned potato slices which have first been cooked in the microwave or with a small amount of water in a saucepan until almost tender and patted dry.
If there is any of the roast chicken left over, it makes great sliced chicken sandwiches, chicken salad or is an ideal addition to a low calorie chef's salad.
Here are some chicken stretching recipes.
Chicken Salad
2 cups diced chicken
1 cup diced celery
1 cup mayonnaise
2 Tbsp. of the crisp chicken skin (optional, but gives good flavor)
1 chopped, hard-cooked egg (optional)
2 Tbsp. chopped chives (optional)
Combine the ingredients and toss gently to mix and coat with the mayonnaise. Serve on cold, crisp salad greens--leafy lettuce. Garnish, if you desire, with fresh fruit. White grapes, orange sections, strawberries, and pineapple are delicious with chicken salad.
Chef's Salad
This is one of those recipes that does not have to be explicit, as to the ingredients and their amounts. Combine in desired amounts: Torn, crisp green lettuce, radish slices, little diced chunks of cheese, diced cooked chicken, slivers of avocado, tomato wedges. Dress lightly with salad dressing, if you desire. Makes a delicious, light lunch or supper.
Copper Penny Carrots
2 lbs. carrots, peeled and thinly sliced
1 green pepper, cut in rings
1 med. onion, cut in rings
1 (10 oz.) can tomato soup, undiluted
1/2 cup salad oil
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup cider vinegar
1 tsp. mustard
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
Boil carrots in salted water until tender. Do not overcook. Drain and cool. Layer carrots, pepper and onion in a bowl which can be covered tightly. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over vegetables. Refrigerate, covered. Serve with slotted spoon.

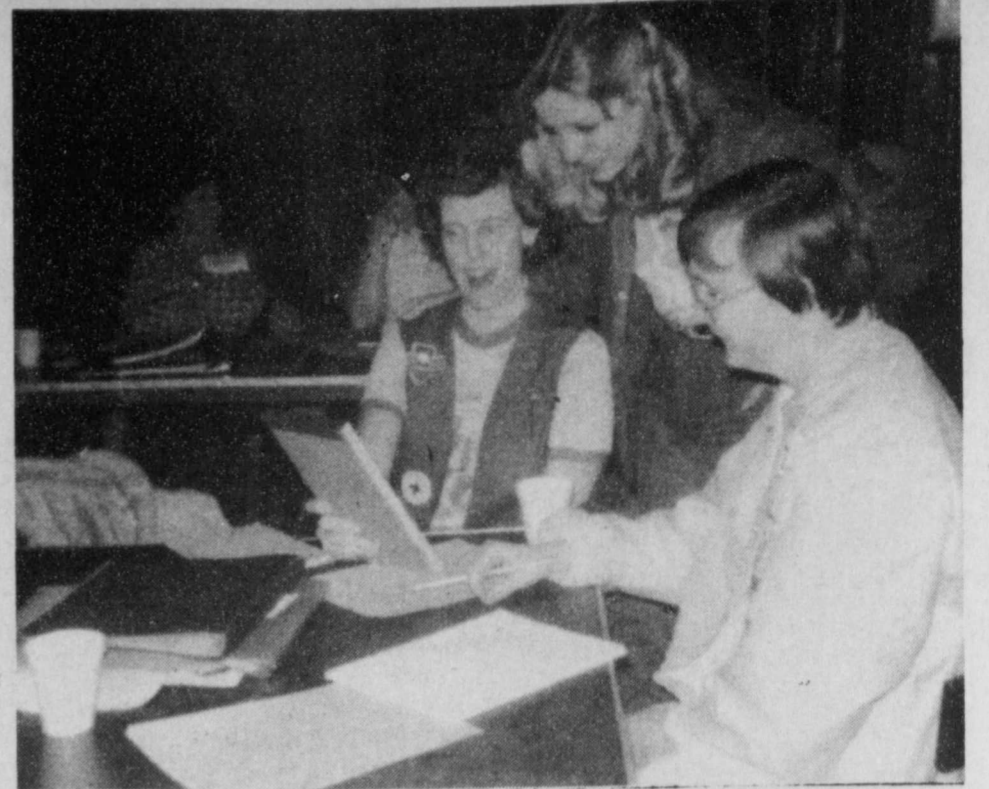

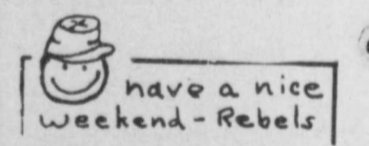
Free Immunization Clinic Set

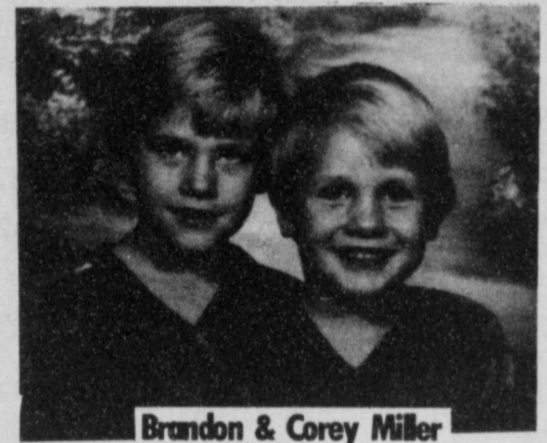

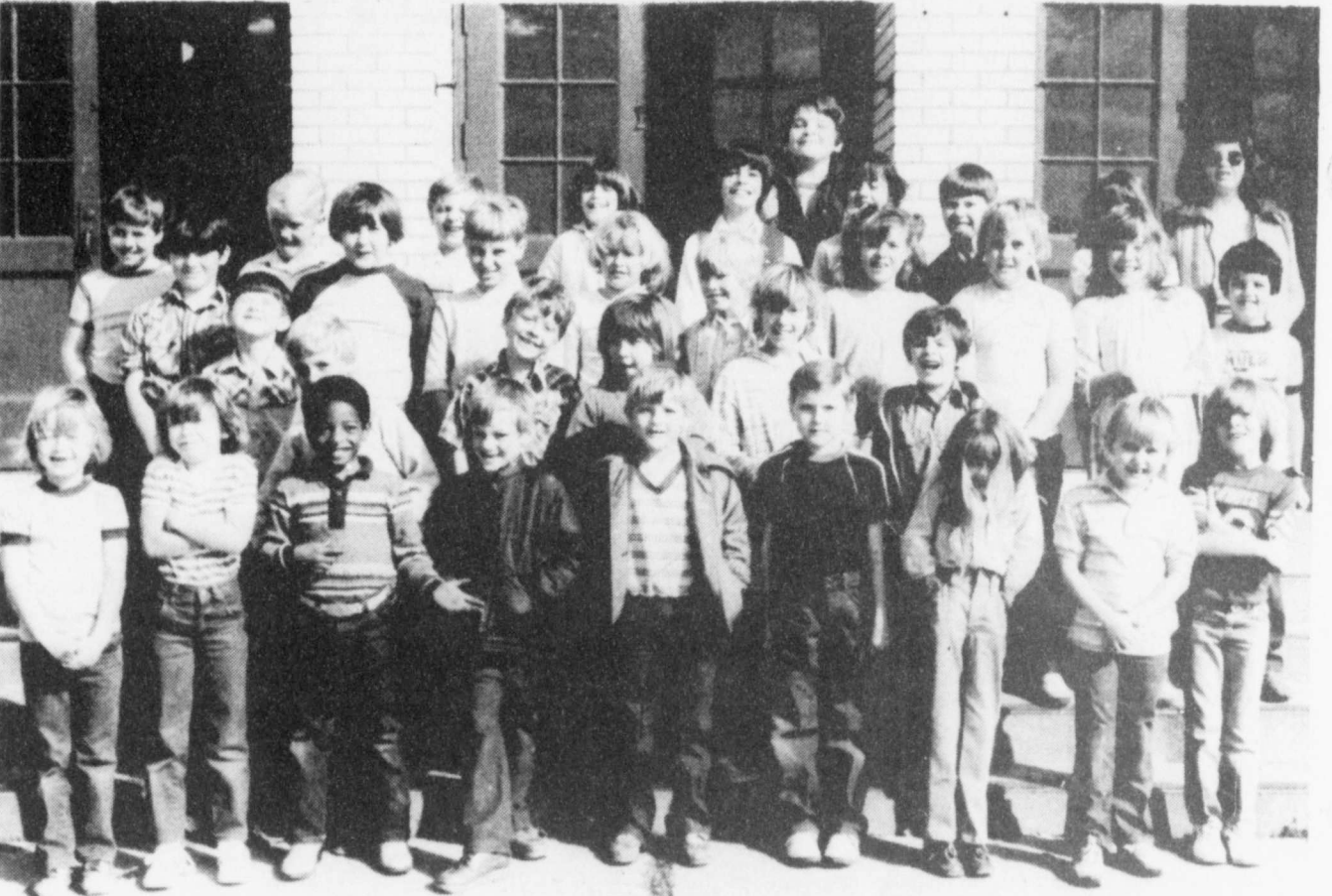
