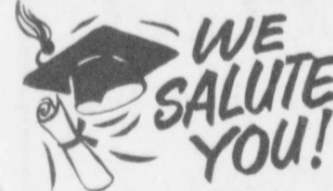

Kridler Garden Offers Unique Treasure

Every gardener knows that gardening is largely a matter of faith, the faith that the tiny plant set in the ground will grow and produce in the future. But for Kridler Gardens, there may be very little future, in spite of the overwhelming amount of faith that has been lavished there.

Kridler Gardens is located on Monticello Road about four miles from Mt. Pleasant. On its 43 acres, there are orchards, nature trails, a nursery and landscape business, and acres and acres of beauty. Anything like it is unavailable in the state of Texas, and not available in many places in the nation.

But what grows in the soil is now threatened by what lies beneath it—coal.

When the Kridlers, Chet and Helen, moved from Ohio in 1965, they knew that there was a perpetual lease for minerals extending back to the 1940's. They did not realize that there were plans for strip mining in the area.

Their son, Barrie, says that they signed a continuation of the lease without fully realizing that they could have dropped it. They also thought that oil and gas were the only interests at that time.

But the coal is there, and Texas Utilities Company has the lease. Twenty years ago, strip mining wasn't even thought of in the area...the Kridlers say that they did not even realize it was a possibility.

Although the mining company has brought a measure of prosperity to the area, the loss of the gardens, after a close look at them, seems tragic.

After twenty years of faith, dedication and an amount of work and energy that is truly awesome, Barrie Kridler, the rest of the Kridler family and co-owner Barry Nichols have turned the land around them into a series of gardens and nature trails unequalled anywhere for thousands of miles. And they have never charged any form of admission or fee for viewing them.

An estimated 15,000 visitors come each year to see the gardens and take the trails. Among them are girl and boy scout groups,

curricular organizations, who gave short talks concerning their activities.

Coach Groves, head football coach, gave remarks concerning the athletic program at Rivercrest High School.

The Student Council officers served as guides for a tour of the school which ended in the cafeteria where refreshments were served by Future Homemakers officers.

garden clubs, bird watching groups, nature study groups and many, many families.

Although it is the elder Kridler who owns the land, it was Barrie who began the landscaping and nursery business which supports the gardens.

One of the biggest attractions in the spring is the daffodils. Around twenty acres of multi-colored blooms unfold in the early spring, and as many as 500 people a day come on the weekends.

Tulips, iris, flowering shrubs and trees continue the spring spectacle, and roses and other flowers carry on into summer.

But it is perhaps the nature trail that serves as the brightest jewel at the gardens, even though it is not the most breathtaking spectacle.

As Barrie Kridler wandered along the trail, explaining why it is worth saving, his boundless energy took him off to show rare wildflowers, water lilies and native trees.

Carefully lifting the hasp on a bluebird box, one of hundreds, he reveals tiny, fragile baby birds. At another box, there are tufted titmice infants, chickadee eggs or perhaps older bluebirds.

Some seventy species of birds have been identified on the 43 acres, some migratory, many coming for the food, shelter and nesting conditions that are so generously provided. Water birds, some such as the wood duck, quite rare, can feed in safety at the woodland ponds.

Bluebirds, cardinals, wrens, mockingbirds and

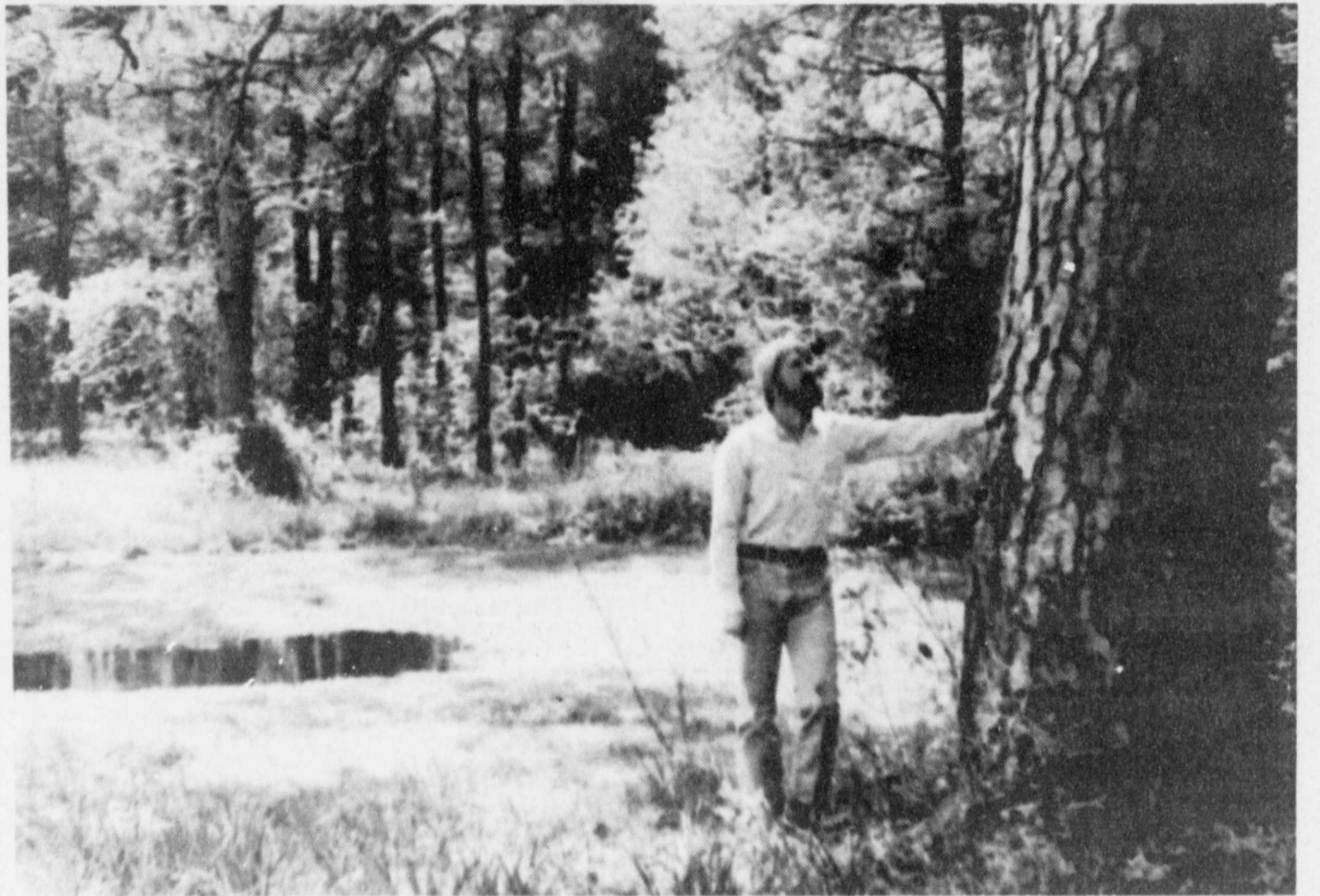
woodpeckers, along with a wide variety of other birds, flash by in abundance.

The normal contingency of small mammals such as raccoons, possums and rabbits abound, and graceful deer wind their way to special feeders in the late evenings. The small area affords a view of what early settlers saw from the native post oak bottom to the higher sandy pine knolls.

A 200-year old shortleaf pine has its ancient roots there, as does a mutated pine that grows needles directly on the branches and trunk. Buckeye, hickory and other flora abound. Hiding in the grass or leaves are wildflowers, one, a yellow grass iris, is very rare.

Kridler's knowledge of the woods and plants is astonishing. He says that "this whole thing has been a family affair from the beginning. My mom has been a constant help. My dad (a builder) has done work, and my brother and sisters have pitched in." In addition to the Kridlers and Nichols, around ten employees share in the workload.

They feel that they are not trying to stand in the way of progress, but that progress See KRIDLER, Page 8

PJC To Hold Beginning Photography Course

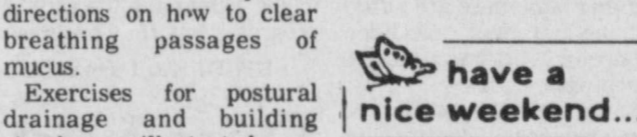
A beginning photography class will be offered through Paris Junior College's continuing education division this summer, said June Jones, director of continuing education.

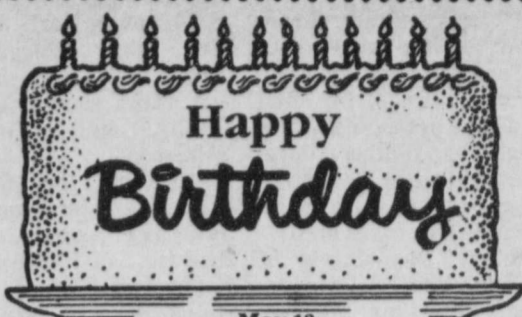

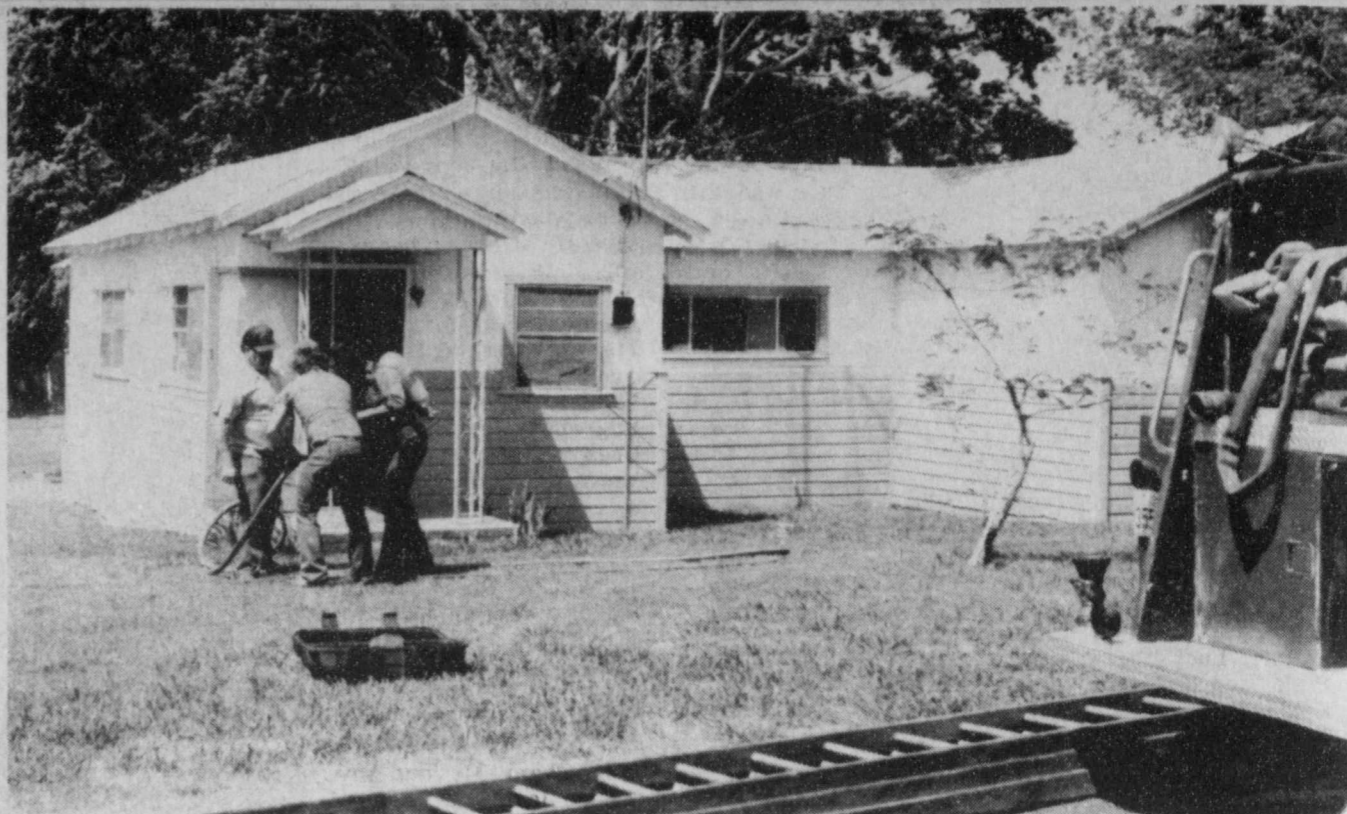

BANK CENT'S

The American banking system was born of the Revolution. When our country was struggling for independence, the lack of money often posed a greater danger than the British armies and navy.

In 1780, after the country had almost exhausted its resources and finances through lotteries and loans, and Congress found that its paper money was almost worthless, a group of Philadelphia citizens decided to undertake a salvaging action. On June 8, 1780 they founded the Bank of Philadelphia. While the bank began rather modestly, the same group initiated a larger subscription for 300,000 pounds (the colonies still were using pounds, instead of dollars). This money bought beef, flour, pork, salt, and other supplies for the Continental Army. By the time the bank closed its books in late 1784, it had provided the army with over one million dollars in rations.

Barrie Kridler says that "they cannot pay for what is lost here. It just cannot be done. Other land with the same potential is scarce, and expensive, and they want to pay only "undeveloped" prices for the woods!"

But the main point is that not only the owners will suffer from the destruction of the gardens, but thousands and thousands of others who have come to view the beauty, picnic and learn something of the natural world around them.

Perhaps the best excuse of all for saving Kridler Gardens is expressed in the old poem verse "Tell them, dear, if eyes are made for seeing, then beauty is its own excuse for being."

must not be allowed to destroy something that can never be replaced.

Although the utility company says they cannot go around the gardens, efforts are being made to convince them to Texas Highways magazine has done an article on the gardens, as has a Dallas TV station, a Dallas newspaper and several more local publications. Attention and support from hundreds, even thousands of people hearing of the situation is pouring in.
