Three nurses, Nell Gardner, Terri Norman and an unidentified stranger who administered first aid and comfort, along with other citizens, were to have been included in a small tribute to kindness, decency and the compassion of small towns.

But before the story could be told, another incident occurred that has left everyone who knows of it with a feeling of degradation and outrage.

The night of the accident, Mrs. Clayton's home was broken into and burglarized.

Whoever did it obviously knew of her death and the distraught state of her family. And whoever did it has caused far more pain than just that to the immediate family.

Such an act affects all of us...not just in one town, but in every town that knows of it. It is another stone in the wall of fear, bitterness and anger that is becoming part of every honest person's life.

People who have prided themselves on being part of a community of decent, compassionate individuals must stop and wonder who among their midst would do such a terrible thing.

We are faced with the fact that such things no longer happen elsewhere in the world...but HERE, where we live.

The feeling of shock and violation runs from community to community, family to family and person to person.

The burglary is nothing short of graverobbing. Let us learn a lesson from this. If anyone can possibly contribute any clue to aid in the capture of the thief or thieves, let them come forward.

And if this crime cannot be solved, let us unit now into a spirit of cooperation to stamp out such acts in the future.

Let each watch over his neighbor, that we might better protect ourselves.

The chance to regain a community spirit of protectiveness must not be lost. The lesson is bitter, and hard, but let us all take the opportunity to learn it...and in the course of events make each and every community, from the smallest on up, a better place to live for all good people.

Wave Of Accidents, Crimes Plague Area

Two major accidents, a burglary, a murder and theft, the discovery of 900 pounds of explosives on Sulphur River and an apparent attempt to tamper with a radio directional beacon for airplane pilots have constituted an apparent wave of disturbances and tragedies that have plagued various areas of Lamar and Red River Counties over the past few days.

Thursday was a busy day for a number of law enforcement officers in Red River County, as the discovery of nearly 900 pounds of explosives turned an area near Bogata into the scene of action by Red River Sheriff's deputies, Texas Department of Public Safety officers and officials from the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Bureau.

Wes Mills of Bogata came upon a trailer loaded with the dangerous material in a remote area south of Bogata while fishing with several other companions. The trailer was near where White Oak Creek flows into Sulphur River, and the fishermen had reached the area by boat. Air assistance was requested from the DPS because of the inaccessibility of the area.

A DPS helicopter met Deputy Gerry Allen at the Bogata gin lot, sparking rumours that a body had been found in the gin, and setting off a string of rumours that spread like wildfire.

Seven hundred and fifty pounds of ammonia nitrate fuel oil and booster in plastic 25-lb. containers were found on the trailer, plus 150 pounds of explosive in canisters, according to Sheriff's Deputy Allen.

Sheriff Bob Storey said that some of the explosives were homemade, contained in cans. To further complicate removal of the explosive, the trailer was said to be infested with large snakes, which had to be driven off by throwing sand and shouting. Shooting the reptiles, obviously, was out of the question.

AFT officials, after identifying the ammonia nitrate, diluted the chemicals, thus neutralizing it.

Friday, after more information was obtained about the cans of explosive, it too, was destroyed.

Since the cache was located near a huge log jam which has caused flooding along the river, it was speculated that perhaps someone had planned to try and blow up the jam. However, investigation is

continuing, and the Red River Sheriff's office has made no statement as to what the stockpile of explosives might mean.

Saturday night, Steve Cannon and Vincent McCoin received serious injuries in a one-vehicle accident near Rosalie when the pickup they were passengers in rolled over.

Driver of the car was Stewart Wayne Cannon, Route 1, Bogata, who received only minor injuries.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety report, the vehicle was traveling south, lost control, ran into the right roadside ditch, re-entered the roadway, then hit the left ditch, came back onto the road, rolled over and wound up resting in the right ditch. All victims were transported to Red River County General Hospital, where Stewart Cannon was treated and released, and the other two were admitted.

Sunday afternoon, the intersection of U.S. Highway 271 and FM 1503 in Deport was the scene of a tragic accident that claimed the life of one woman, and left another critically injured.

Johnie Rebecca Clayton, 77, of Deport, a well-known citizen and known to many in the Fulbright-Bogata area also, was killed almost instantly in a two-car accident about 6 p.m.

Mrs. Clayton was riding with Beulah Shipp, her sister, in a 1978 Chevrolet. The Shipp vehicle was crossing Highway 271, traveling south when it was struck on the left side (the driver's side) by a 1976

Oldsmobile driven by Beverly Oney of Carthage. Also in the car driven by Oney were her brother, 20 year old Wayne Oney, her mother, Sara Fleming, age 40 and Ms. Fleming's 5-year old son, Joseph Fleming.

Fleming received a severe cut on the head, but all four were treated and released at McCuiston Regional Medical Center.

The Oldsmobile remained in the middle of Highway 271, while the Shipp vehicle traveled for approximately 80 feet into a deep ditch on the south side of the road.

Mrs. Shipp is in ICU at McCuiston Regional Medical Center with serious chest and other internal injuries. At last report, she was responding to treatment, but was listed in extremely guarded condition.

Sometime after the accident, burglars forced their way into Mrs. Clayton's home, located about a mile down FM 1503, and stole a television set and microwave oven.

The thieves ripped the hook and eye from a screen door, then kicked the door in. The door was not in use, and had shelves built across it. A number of items were broken during the entry.

Sometime over the weekend, Travis Eugene "Buddy" Garrison, who used to operate the Texaco station in Woodland, was apparently stabbed to death in his home, located in Woodland.

Garrison's 1975 Mercury was missing from his home, and his body was discovered by relatives around 2:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

The vehicle was located Monday morning in Lake Charles, Louisiana, abandoned.

Garrison, according to Red River County Sheriff Bob Storey, was last seen on Friday night with a white male described as late 20's, long blond hair and beard, wearing a straw hat, no shirt and jeans.

There was some evidence

of a struggle in Garrison's home.

Monday night, Rufus Merritt, who lives south of Pattonville, called Lamar County Sheriff's office to report that the OMNI (a radio navigational aid to both commercial and private pilots) had been broken into.

Investigation showed that two gates, one metal and the

other wooden, had been broken down, and a deadbolt lock on the door had been forced open, gaining entrance into the building.

Gene Bailey, a repairman for the equipment from Sulphur Springs was called, and could find no damage to the equipment. Apparently only some tools were stolen.

The FBI will also be investigating the matter.

Chief Deputy Ted Gibson said that the investigation is continuing, and a fingerprint team was sent to the scene on Tuesday morning.

Several smaller incidents, such as the theft of gasoline from gas tanks throughout the area, have also been reported.

Bogata Rodeo Association Long Standing Tradition

The Bogata Rodeo Association was formed in 1949. Before rodeos started in Bogata, there was an annual stock show. Then some men put their heads together and formed the Rodeo Association.

Charter members were Red Hudson, Guy Smelser, Lee King, Alvin Wood, William Rozell, Paul Williams, Robert Williams, Steve Biggerstaff, Travis Hale, Hokie Gibson, Lewis Clark, Jessie Gray, Paul Hill, Raymond Fennell, Paul Griffin and Marcus Gibson.

Lester Davis provided the stock for the first rodeo. Other producers over the years have been J.C. Ward, Clyde Crenshaw, Red River Rodeo Company and Wing Ranch Rodeo Company. Wing Rodeo Company is owned and operated by one of our own, Jerald Smith. He has provided the rodeo stock for the last 16 years. Doug Williams has been the an-

nouncer for the last 25 years.

The organization consists of 74 members. They hold a meeting the first Monday of each month to plan "the best rodeo in Northeast Texas". They work about one month getting the rodeo grounds in shape. They do maintenance on the arena and buildings and have rebuilt the announcer's booth this year. As soon as one rodeo is over, they get started on the next one.

The Bogata Rodeo Association rodeo draws contestants and spectators from all over the United States. They award approximately 10 to 12 thousand dollars in prize money each year. The Association contributes \$250 to each of the six events and the entry fees of the contestants are added to this. There are about 300 contestants each year. The events featured are bareback riding, bull riding,

saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, calf roping and girls' barrel racing. There is also a calf scramble each night for the little ones.

This year's rodeo will be June 23, 24 and 25. There will be a parade on Thursday, June 23 at 5 p.m. There will be no Frontier Days this year. The nightly performances will begin at 8:30 p.m. This rodeo is CSRA and CRA approved. Specialty acts will be

provided by Brother Taylor and Vickie Taylor of Wimberly, Texas. The Canton Sunshine Girls Drill Team will perform Thursday and Friday nights.

Thursday night is designated as Hub Whiteman Night. Mrs. Whiteman donates a \$100 savings bond each year for a drawing. Two drawings will be held on Thursday and Friday for \$20 worth of gasoline. Thursday night is

also children's night. Children under 12 will be admitted free with their parent or guardian.

The concession stand is operated by various organizations in the area. This year the McCrury Cemetery Association will be in charge. The stand is operated on a split with the rodeo association.

Officers for this year's rodeo are Robert Kennedy,

president; Donnie Strain, vice-president; and Charlie Lewis, secretary. Directors are John Brooks, Rayford Yancey, C.R. Williams, Morris Foster, Joe T. Kelsey and Johnny Hudson.

The men in the Bogata Rodeo Association do a fine job in organizing our rodeos. They show true dedication to the sport. Come on out and make this year's rodeo the biggest and best ever.

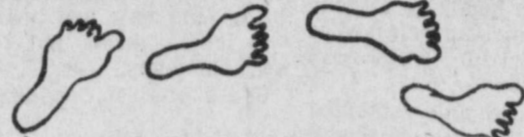
When that picture was made, we were two of the happiest kids that you ever saw.

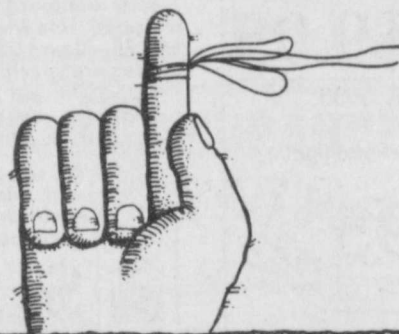
The bridegroom graduated from Paris High School, Paris Junior College

If you establish an Individual Retirement Account, commonly called an IRA, the interest the account earns at the bank each year is not subject to income tax. The depositor pays income tax only after withdrawals begin.

There are some ground rules on withdrawals that should be noted. If withdrawals are made before the depositor is 59½ years of age, a penalty of 10% must be paid on the withdrawn amount. After 59½ years of age, withdrawals may be made in a lump sum, or in monthly, quarterly, or annual installments. Personal income taxes are then paid on withdrawn amounts. These rates are much lower for the retired person because his income is normally less than while he was earning his living and contributing to the IRA.

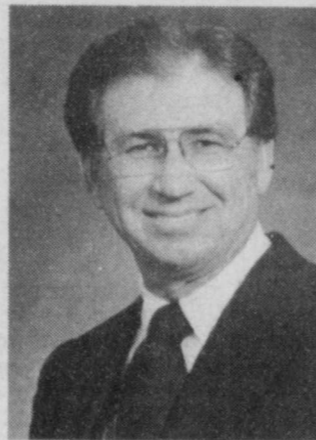
While with Oleum Incorporated, Pirtle served as a director of the cor-

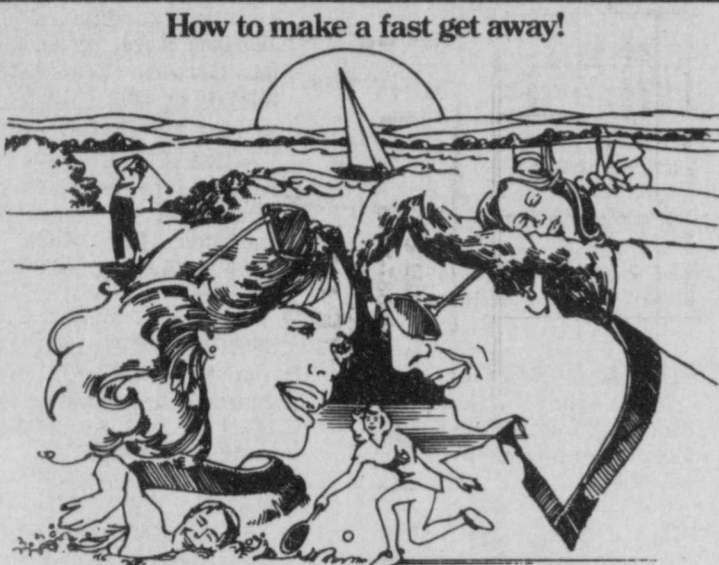

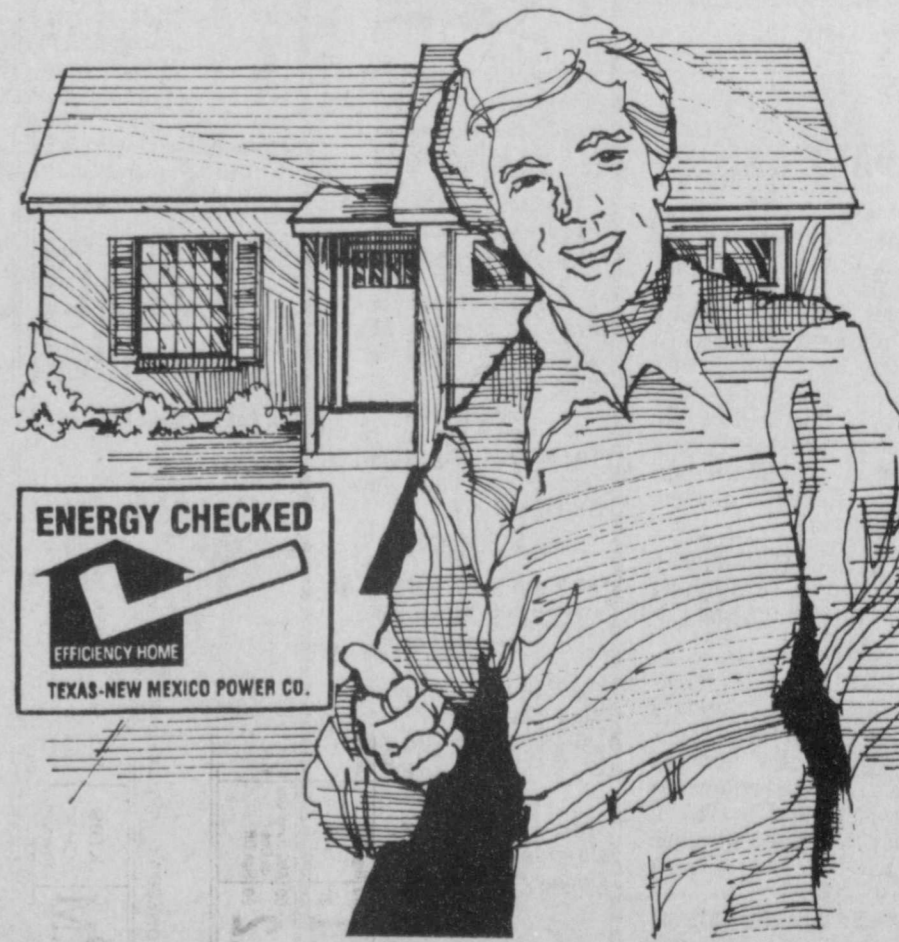
