Most everyone around has heard about the proposal to establish a low-level nuclear waste dump in the area. If not, just take a look over to the right on this page and update yourself.

It fascinates me that time after time this area is picked for such a project. Indeed, we know that no one wants such a disposal site, and obviously, such wastes have to go somewhere.

But just because the soil seems promising, why can't they take into account the fact that we have a high waterfall, flooding in the fall and spring (the chemical waste dump proposed near Cunningham in 1981 has had flood water with mere yards of it since they abandoned the proposal) and a number of major lakes, including three that are being proposed, Pine Creek, Cooper Lake and one without a name yet.

But what absolutely irritates so badly is that officials behind these projects blatantly state that such dump sites must "obviously" be located away from heavily occupied areas. Then, in turn, they blithely tell people in the area the dump is proposed for that such sites are safe.

If they are so very safe, why would it hurt to put them near heavily populated areas? It certainly would save a lot of transportation costs!

It is also irritating to feel that we don't "count" in the scheme of things...that because we are not a heavily populated area, we aren't as important to protect as big cities such as Dallas and Houston.

Bluntly, big cities are producing the vast majority of these hazardous wastes, yet the minority of the population is expected to take the risks involved in handling it.

Surely there must be better sites, sites with no population at all for many, many miles, low rainfall or more willingness to accept this problem?

If not, then very deep research must be done to consider this problem. The future, not just in a few years, but for generations to come, must be considered. A solution must be found for more than just ten, twenty or fifty years...or else what price will mankind have to pay for our carelessness now?

## Nuclear Waste Dump Meets Opposition

Opposition to the proposal to establish a nuclear waste dump in the area is steadily mounting, as city councils, commissioners courts and citizens pass resolutions and gear up to protest the proposal.

A large portion of Northeast Texas, which includes all or parts of Lamar, Delta, Fannin and Red River Counties and named the Northern Black Prairie Area by the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority, is one of 15 areas which are being considered for the dump site.

Apparently the soils in the

area are considered prime for such a use.

The dump site proposal is being established by the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority.

Currently Texas has no nuclear waste disposal site, and the state is trying to establish one. Congress passed a law in 1980 which stated that states which haven't arranged to take care of their own waste will not be allowed to ship it out of the state after 1986. The nuclear waste comes primarily from hospitals, laboratories and industries.

Red River County Judge Scotty Whiteman, contacted

Tuesday morning, said "I'm 100 percent against it. I don't think it would be good for the area. There are other areas without our heavy rainfall, population and watershed which I believe would be more suitable."

Three of the county commissioners, Bruce Scott, Ben Storey and Lane Duncan also stated that they were unconditionally against it, and although they could not speak for the commissioner not present, felt that a resolution against

the dump site would be passed if it became necessary to do so.

Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher, when contacted, said that he was "Definitely opposed to the idea. When you are talking about the health and safety of an area, there just isn't any price to be put on it."

The Lamar County Commissioners Court has already passed a unanimous resolution opposing the establishment of such a site.

The Paris City Council has

refused to let the Nuclear Waste Authority present their views on the subject, and Monday night passed a resolution opposing the dump site, not only in Lamar County, but in all the area "contiguous to the city".

A number of area citizens have already expressed their intentions to organize against the proposal.

These people are many of the same ones who have helped to block efforts to establish other waste dumps

in the area.

In the mid-1970's, Southwest Nuclear also called the area a good location for such a site. At that time, massive public opinion arose against it, and the Lamar and Delta County commissioners passed resolutions formally opposing such a measure. The issue was dropped in 1976.

In 1981, Chem-Security Systems proposed a toxic chemical dump site which would have been located near Cunningham, in Red

River County. Again, public opinion arose, the Red River and Lamar County Soil and Water Conservation Districts and Commissioners Courts passed petitions and resolutions against it, and public citizens rallied to sign petitions and write letters to public officials.

Whatever the end result of the attempt to establish a nuclear waste dump in the area is, it seems a fact, that it will only be created over and against the public will.

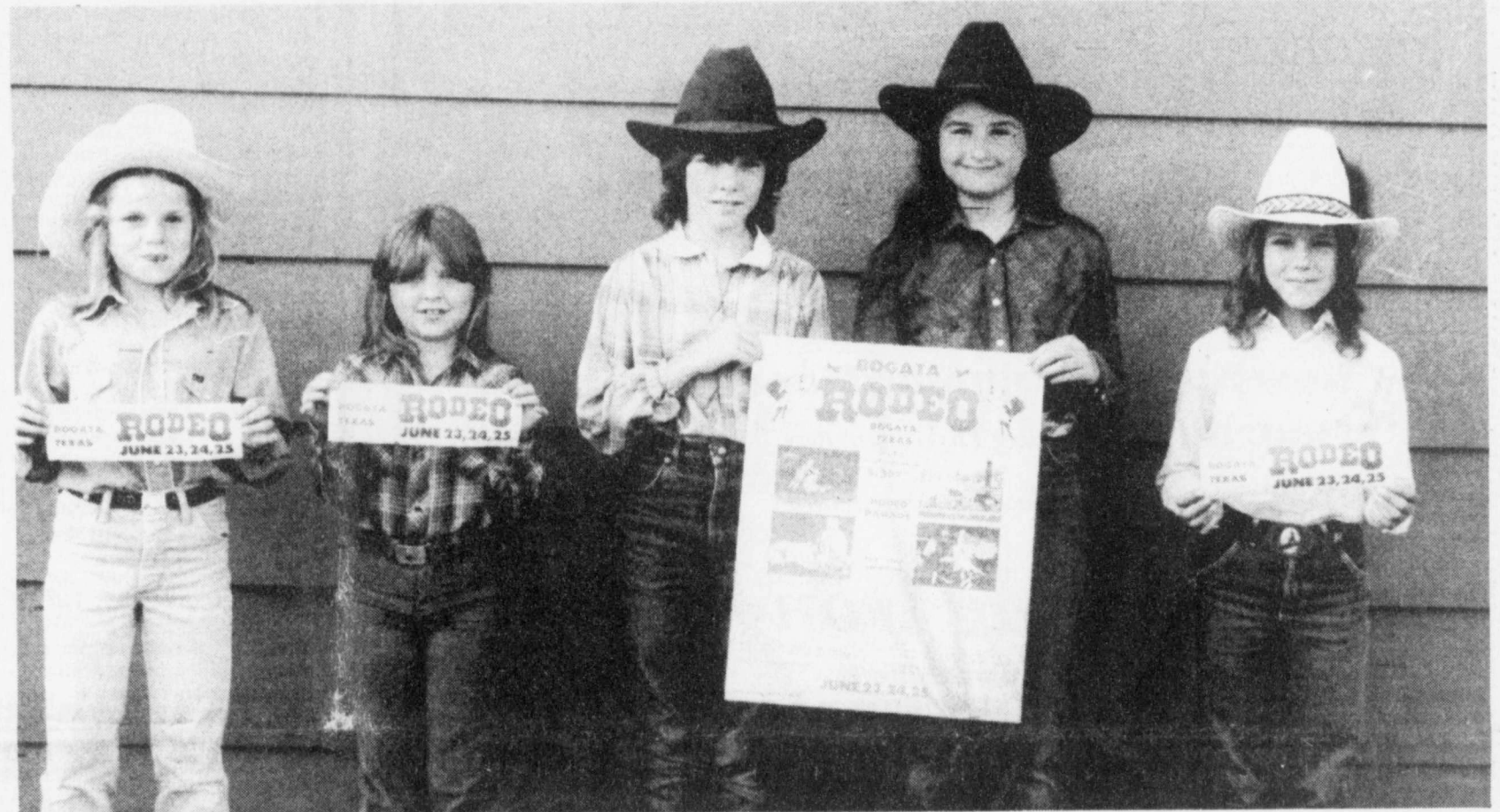

## Bogata Rodeo Will Feature Many Events

Beginning next week, all trails will lead to Bogata for the annual Bogata Rodeo.

A parade through downtown Bogata will kick-off the activities, while the first performance of the rodeo will begin Thursday night.

A large number of cowboy and cowgirl entries are expected for the annual event, which is co-sponsored by the Central States Rodeo Association and the Central Rodeo Association. Contest events for this year's rodeo include bareback riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, bull riding and cowgirls barrel racing.

The rodeo will be produced by the C.S.R.A. Rodeo Producer of the Year, Jerald Smith and his Wing Ranch Rodeo Company, headquartered in Bogata. His rodeo company produces more than 40 rodeos annually, as well as providing livestock for rodeos in Denver, Colorado, San Angelo, Texas and the Astrodome rodeo in Houston.

Smith's hometown arena will be garnished with premier bucking stock for the 1983 version of the Bogata rodeo. Among headliners will be saddle bronc horse No. 40, Strawberry Hill, Saddle Bronc of the Year in 1982. Strawberry Hill has been qualified on only one time during the 1983 rodeo

season, unseating finalist bronc riders Dennis Crawford and Chuck Waldie, among others thus far.

The bull herd will be unequalled for the Bogata contest. K-Bob, No. 4 of the Wing herd, is unridden in 1983, and has been conquered only two times in as many years in over 200

outs in rodeo competition. No. 10, Pole Cat, weighing in at some 2,100 pounds, will also prove to be good watching, as the 1982 Bucking Bull of the Year will be at his best, trying to keep his record among the top.

Brother Taylor will team up with Bogata's Casey Jeffery to handle

bullfighting chores for the rodeo. Jeffery, injured earlier in the year at Pasadena's Gilley's Rodeo, will be making his debut appearance before the Bogata crowd.

Thursday night, opening performance of the rodeo, is

designated as Hub Whiteman Night, in honor of the Rodeo Hall of Fame cowboy, now deceased. Mrs. Whiteman will present a \$100 savings bond to someone in attendance at the Thursday performance, in memory of her late husband.

An Old Timers Reunion will be held during the rodeo festivities, under the direction of the rodeo association.

Increasing numbers of East Texans are discovering the joy of stir-fried foods. And, East Texas cooks are adapting the ancient Oriental cooking technique to our local meats and garden-fresh vegetables. The results are healthy, attractive, and a delight to the taste buds.

Stir-frying involves cooking small pieces of meats and vegetables in a minuscule amount of very hot oil. The meat and vegetables are coated quickly with the hot oil to seal in the flavor and juices and preserve the color and texture.

The meat and vegetables are tossed vigorously, but gently, in a wok, a slope-sided, round bottomed utensil—or in a large, heavy skillet with two wooden paddles or spoons, so the foods cook evenly but without burning.

Stir-frying is an extremely quick method of cooking. It rarely takes more than 5-6 minutes once the vegetables and meat are sliced. Frequently, recipes call for a soy sauce-cornstarch mixture that is added just before the last couple of minutes of cooking. This gives a pleasing and attractive low-calorie sauce.

The cooking oil in the wok or skillet should be just below the point of smoking when the first ingredients are added. It is important to have the vegetables and meat at room temperature and sliced in uniform slices when you begin stir-frying. This way, the ingredients

can be added in order of descending cooking time to avoid over cooking them.

Remember that stir-fried vegetables should be cooked only until crisp-tender and served immediately.

Here is a stir-fry recipe we are enjoying at our house this spring.  
**STIR-FRY CHICKEN WITH JUST ABOUT WHATEVER VEGETABLE IS READY IN THE GARDEN**  
Serves 3-4

- 1 whole chicken breast (1lb.) deboned
- 1 lb. fresh asparagus and/or broccoli, English peas or Sugar Snap peas, or yellow or zucchini squash (frozen asparagus, broccoli, or English peas can be substitutes)
- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
- 3/4 cup chicken broth
- 3 Tbsp. soy sauce
- 4 Tbsp. cooking oil
- 1 Tbsp water
- 1/4 lb. fresh mushrooms (optional, but good)
- 6 green onions
- 1/2 cup celery
- 1/2 cup water chestnuts, sliced
- 1 1/2 cups fresh tomatoes cut into wedges
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds (optional)
- Rice or canned chow mein noodles

Cut chicken across the grain in long thin slices. Slice celery, mushrooms, onions, and asparagus (and/or broccoli, peas, or squash) in large pieces (roughly 1/2-3/4 inch pieces).

Quarter tomatoes. Blend cornstarch, chicken broth, soy sauce. Set aside. Heat 2 tablespoons oil in the wok or large skillet over high heat. Add chicken, stir and fry with two wooden spoons until opaque (about 2 minutes). Remove from pan.

Add 1 tablespoon oil to pan, stir fry asparagus to coat with oil. Add one tablespoon water, cover, cook three minutes.

Add remaining one tablespoon oil. Stir-fry mushrooms, onions, water chestnuts about four minutes.

Add chicken and tomatoes and stir in cornstarch mixture. Cook a couple of minutes. The vegetables are still crisp!

Serve over rice or noodles. Garnish with sliced almonds if you wish. Pass soy sauce.

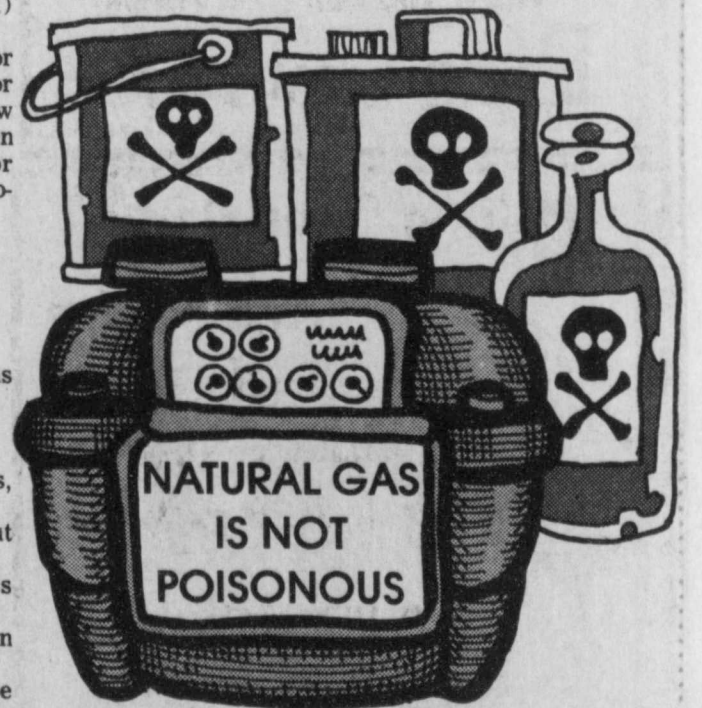

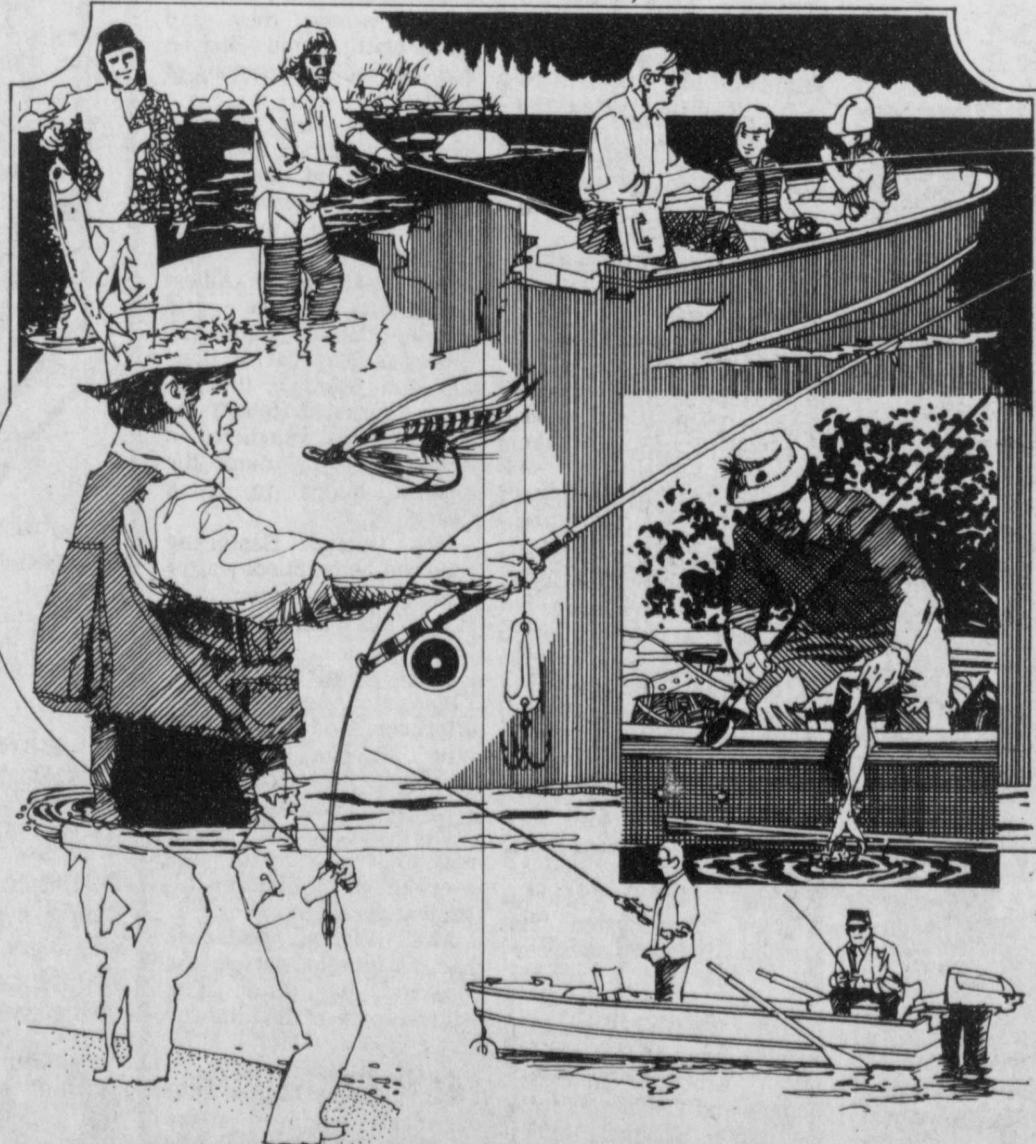

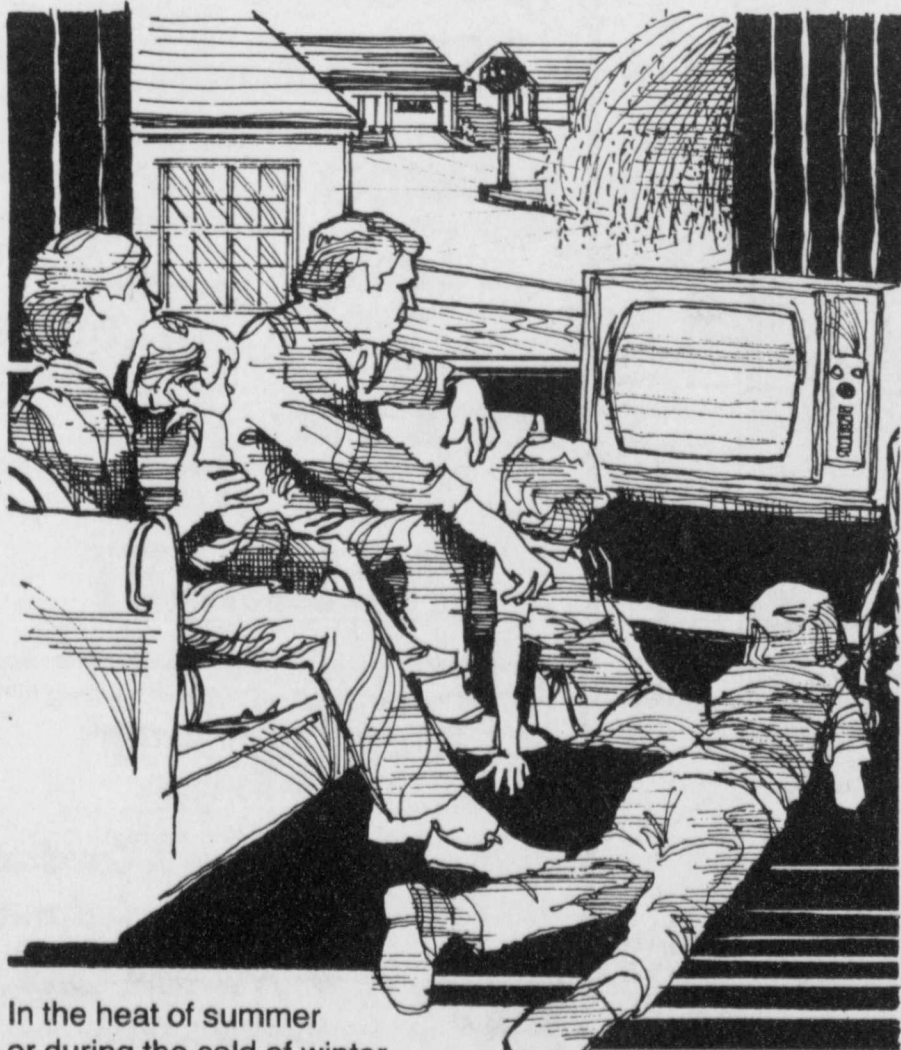

### Weekly Ag Update

Recent high winds in portions of East Texas did considerable damage to some trees, especially pines. Any injury to trees makes them susceptible to insect damage, says Dr. James Robinson.

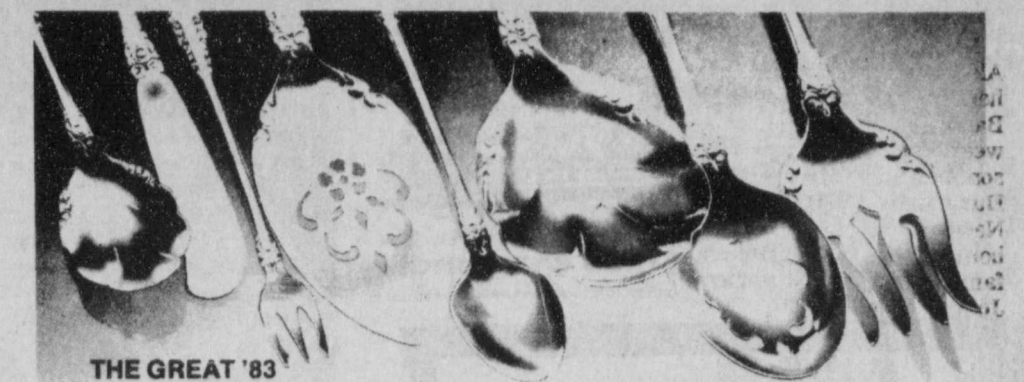
One of the most damaging insects is the southern pine beetle which is usually active in May and June. Therefore, the wind damage came at a time when that insect is most active.

Injured pines may also be attacked by black turpentine beetles, Robinson says to remove injured pines as soon as possible. Treatment with lindane or dursban will help reduce the chances of beetle damage.

Hardwoods such as oaks are also susceptible to certain beetle damage. Several species of borers attack damaged hardwoods. Damaged limbs should be trimmed and destroyed to reduce the chances of borer infestation.

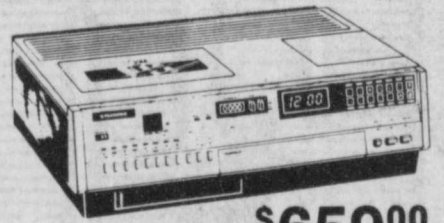

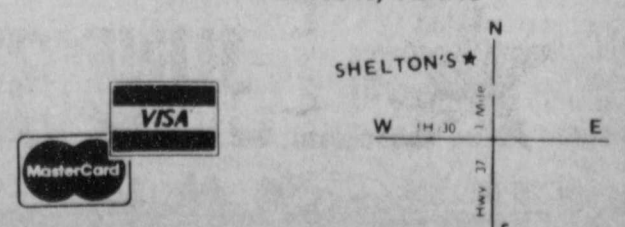

### Congressman Hall Announces Hearings

First District Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. this week launched a wide range investigation of various procedures used by agencies of the federal government to achieve regulatory reform. This effort by Congressman Hall is in connection with his chairmanship of the Subcommittee on Administrative Law and Governmental Relations, House Judiciary Committee.

Congressman Hall has decided on a series of hearings that could last up to several weeks, and he announced this week a number of specific hearing dates in which a number of key agency witnesses will testify as to how their respective branch of government is accomplishing regulatory reforms mandated by the Reagan Administration. Regulatory reform is a cornerstone of the Administration's legislative program and during the last Congress a number of bills were introduced on this subject.

Hall stated that for these reasons, the hearings will include an examination of regulatory process at 15 different agencies, including the Environmental Protection Agency, the Federal Reserve Board, the Department of Health and Human Services and the Federal Trade Commission. In addition, the hearings will include an examination of the operations of the President's Task Force on Regulatory Relief under Executive Order 12291.

Mr. Hall stated that as a result of these hearings, "the subcommittee will be able to produce a balanced and fair regulatory reform bill."

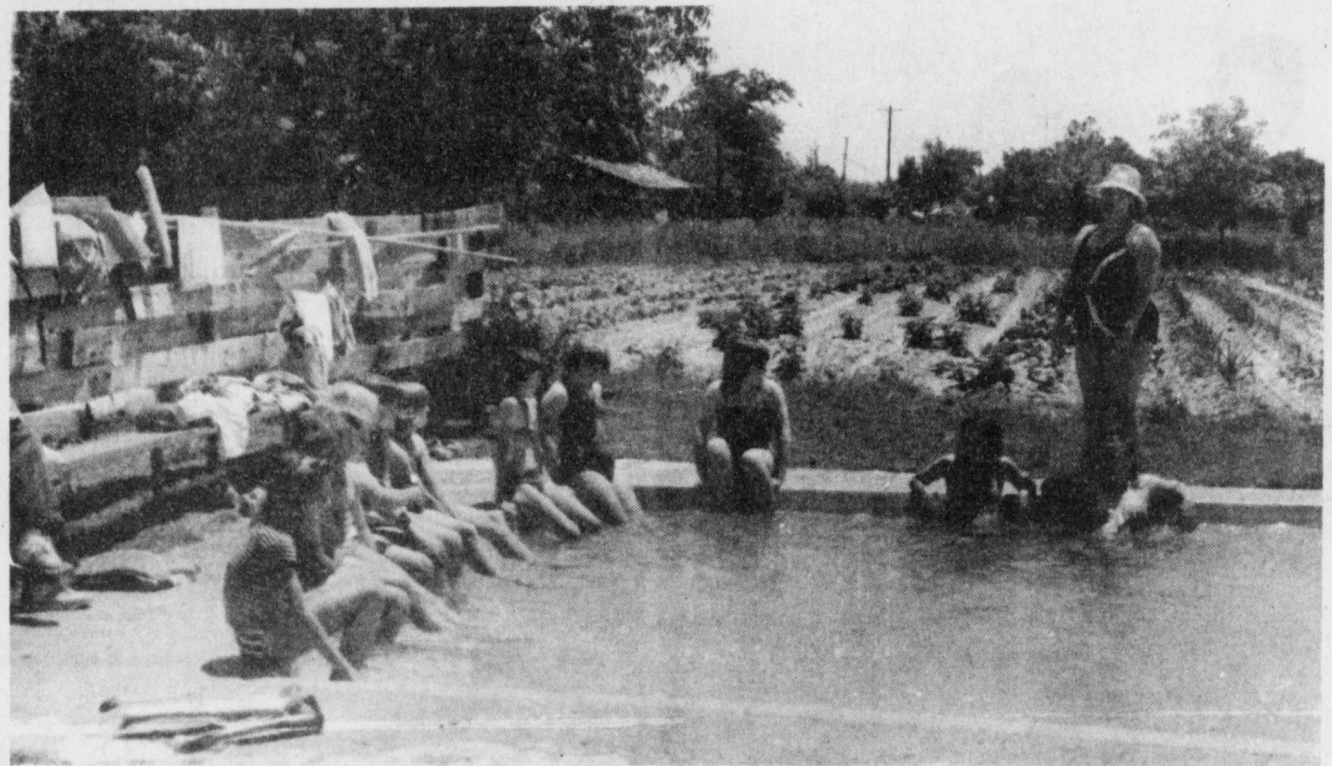
