The nation's money supply is similar in ways to commodities, like wheat, oats, cattle, and corn. Most bankers and other financial people consider the money supply. as the total of all checking and savings accounts, plus the cash in public hands. The most recent total given of all these was in the area of \$300 billion.

Just like agriculture commodities, if the supply of money is large, then the price paid for money, interest, will generally go down. On the other hand, if money is in short supply, then the bidding for it will cause an increase in the cost of borrowed money.

But, unliike the commodity markets the money supply can be and is, managed by the Federal Reserve Bank (Bankers call it the FED). The Fed controls the supply of money by how much new money they print. If there is inflation, they may choose to decrease the amount they print in new money; if there is recession, they may choose to print more.


