

# Rivercrest Rebels Lose District Opener

The Rivercrest Rebels got off to a slow start last Friday night in Big Sandy. The opposing Wildcats struck early in the contest with two touchdowns in the first quarter for a 14 point lead at the buzzer.

Early in the second period on a 1st and 10 Randy Galloway took a handoff on the 50 yard line and carried for five. Charlie Roberts added one and on 3rd down and 4 Galloway picked up three yards on a draw play. It was 4th and 1 and Galloway yet again...this time for a first down.

The Rebs managed to get two more first downs before quarterback Kelly Jeffery carried to Big Sandy's 15 yard line on a bootleg.

On 1st and 10 Roberts picked up one then carried again to the Wildcat 3. Jeffery, on a QB keeper eased into the end zone for the score.

Big Sandy drew a personal foul on the extra point...roughing the kicker, Stanley Jesse. The Rebels put together a 2-point conversion with Galloway crossing the line. This drive brought the score to 14-8, Big Sandy.

The Wildcats came back

with another TD in the second period with about three minutes left. Senior QB for Big Sandy kept the football for the 2-point conversion to make the score 22-8.

Big Sandy recovered a Reb fumble on their own 45. They completed a pass to the Rivercrest 30. Charles Don Lewis stopped the next play at the line of scrimmage.

James Anderson and Joel Mangrum teamed up to stop a pitch out and brought up 3rd and 2. The Wildcats picked up the first by driving to the 10. They fumbled the ball but

retained possession.

On 2nd and 12 Glenn, Wildcat quarterback, lofted a pass that was broken up by James Anderson. It was 3rd and 12 with 16 seconds left in the half. Big Sandy connected on a pass for an apparent touchdown but hold everything...flags went flying. The Wildcat quarterback made an illegal pass while across the line of scrimmage. A field goal was attempted but fell short. The Rebs took over with 7 seconds left. The score stood at 22-8, Wildcats.

Rivercrest made it to the opponent's 38 yard line before failing to pick up the

necessary 4th down yardage.

Big Sandy took over on their own 38. Galloway and Bivins joined forces to stop a Wildcat runner at the Reb 47. Stanley Jesse, Lonny Sheffield, Charles Lewis, Joel Mangrum, Rusty Screws and James Anderson were also in on Wildcat stops.

Despite all of Rivercrest's efforts Big Sandy hit in the score zone on a 15 yard pass. The kick was good for a 29-8 score.

Opening the fourth period was Galloway as he carried on several plays to place the

ball on the 48. Bobby Thomas gained a big 37 yards on a reverse to make it 1st and 10 from the Wildcat 25.

Galloway picked up 11 on two consecutive carries to the Big Sandy 14. Jeffery handed off to Charlie Roberts who sprinted across the goal line for the TD. The conversion failed...score 29-14. Wildcats. There was 8:57 left to play.

Big Sandy started their drive on their own 47...They were stopped by Shane Wright and Stanley Jesse. Jeffery Bivins

forced the Wildcats to punt by sacking their quarterback.

The Rebels moved the ball to the Big Sandy 22 with the combined efforts of Jeffery, Galloway, Roberts, and Anderson.

On 1st and 10 from the 22 Jeffery sailed a pass to, unfortunately, a Wildcat on the 15.

Big Sandy took over and proceeded to run out the clock. Aiding the defensive line was Harold Holt and Randy Kennedy.

Rivercrest was denied a victory in their District 19-

AA opening game. 29-14.

Total statistics were pretty even as the Rebs had 17 first downs to the Cats 15, passing 35 to 79 and rushing 243 to 253. Big Sandy drew 25 yards in penalties to Rivercrest's 0.

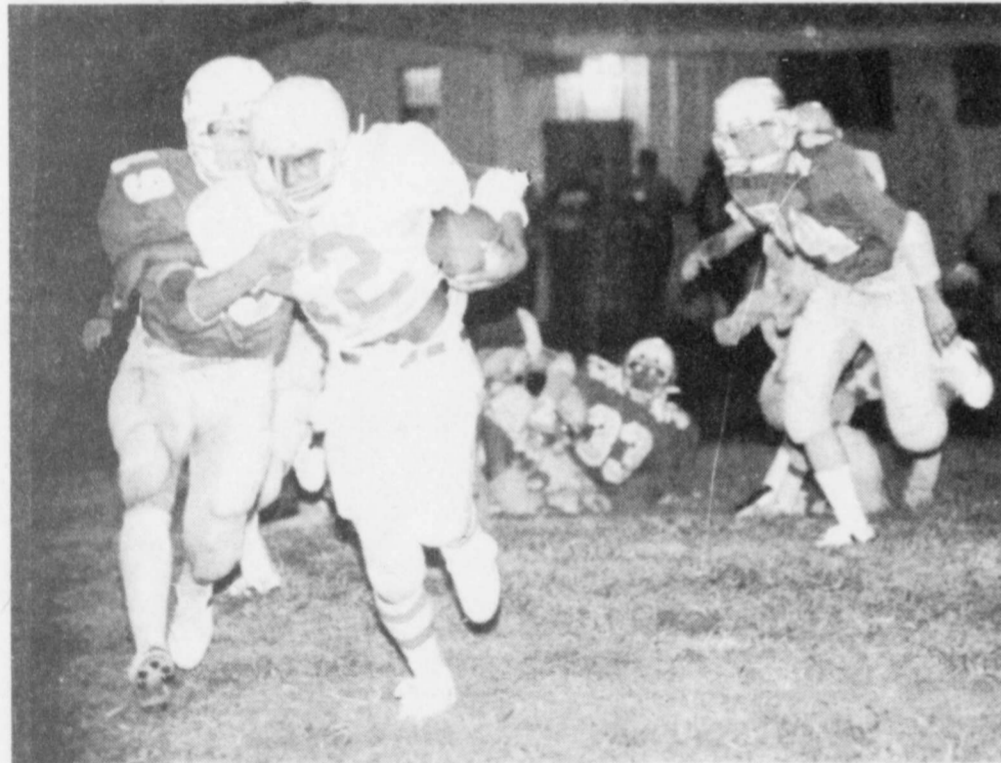
The Rebels will travel to Redwater next Friday night for their second district contest. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m.

## Meal-A-Day Program To Help Elderly

A "Meal A Day" program was set up under the guidance of NET Opportunities, Inc. at the Wilkinson School Building Sept. 19, 1967. Two years ago the Community were notified of their plan to shut the program down for economic reasons. The senior citizens wanted to keep their meal a day program and the community was willing to help.

Citizens of Wilkinson met together and voted to carry on the "Meal A Day" program and elected a committee of seven people, to oversee the program. They were Ronnie Logan, president; Johnny Thompson, vice-president; Shirley Holt, secretary-treasurer;

Everette Logan, Henry Collins, Larry Hearron and Akin Fain, board members. By laws were adopted and the "Meal A Day" center would be called The Wilkinson Community Center housing the "Meal A Day" program and other community activities. The Wilkinson school property was turned over to the community by the Mt. Pleasant School District and some improvements have been made.

Mrs. Luenono Blalock, manager for the "Meal A Day" program is paid by the community center. Her helpers are Mrs. Leola Posey and Mrs. Annie Bell Dyke who are Green Thumb Workers, sponsored by National Farmers Union and funded by U.S. Department of Labor. Mrs. Blalock said that the meal a day program was completely run on donations and the \$1.25 senior citizens give for their meal those under 60 are charged \$2.50. Sometimes fruits and vegetables are donated to the Center which the workers freeze or can for later use.

Serving begins at 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday and stops when the last person has been fed. Last Monday several senior citizens from Mt. Pleasant were at the center enjoying the delicious food and good fellowship with senior citizens of Wilkinson and Talco. They were all regulars at the Center.

President Logan said that six separate local groups used the gym last winter for sports activities. Church and civic groups also use the Center regularly and on Saturday night Oct. 22 the center will again be used to benefit the community. A Halloween Carnival will be held with proceeds going to the De Shields Cemetery fund.

The Community of Wilkinson had a vision and that vision was the Community Center. They still have a vision and that is to see the Center grow as much in the next two years as it has the past two years.

### Weekly Agricultural Update

Swarming fire ants have been spotted in East Texas recently, according to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This generally happens twice a year, once in the spring and again in the fall. Robinson says this is the reproductive form of the fire ants and after breeding, new colonies will be established.  
As a result, landowners and homeowners may discover new fire ant mounds in their lawns or pastures. For the homeowner, treatment of the lawn with an insecticide such as diazanon or dursban should give some control of the adult ant. Landowners will probably resort to individual mound treatment.  
Home gardeners who have experienced problems with nematodes should treat the garden area with Vapam before cool weather sets in, says Dr. George Philley, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The material may be applied by several methods, so Philley suggests following label directions for the method best suited to individual situations.  
Since treatment of large areas may become quite expensive, gardeners may prefer to treat the most heavily infested areas or where season-long crops such as okra are grown. There is a two week waiting period between application and planting or transplanting vegetables. Do not apply Vapam when the temperature is below 60 degrees fahrenheit.  
Philley also suggests that producers start thinking about fruit trees for next year. Decisions should be made on adapted varieties, disease resistance and the source of trees.

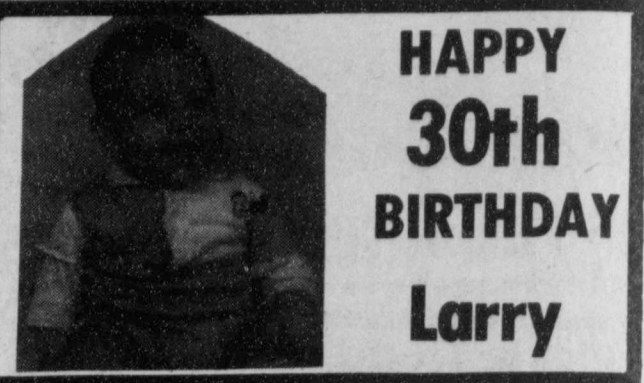

The nation's money supply is similar in ways to commodities, like wheat, oats, cattle, and corn. Most bankers and other financial people consider the money supply as the total of all checking and savings accounts, plus the cash in public hands. The most recent total given of all these was in the area of \$300 billion.

Just like agriculture commodities, if the supply of money is large, then the price paid for money, interest, will generally go down. On the other hand, if money is in short supply, then the bidding for it will cause an increase in the cost of borrowed money.

But, unlike the commodity markets the money supply can be and is, managed by the Federal Reserve Bank (Bankers call it the FED). The Fed controls the supply of money by how much new money they print. If there is inflation, they may choose to decrease the amount they print in new money; if there is recession, they may choose to print more.
