

# Bivins Leads Rebels To Victory Over Maud

Jeffery Bivins was hot as a firecracker in last Friday's homecoming game against the Maud Cardinals.

He found the goal line and scampered across to score four of the five Rebel touchdowns.

James Anderson picked off three Cardinal passes and others in the Rebel secondary came up with three more. Other defensive standouts were Shane Wright, Rusty Damron, Joel Mangrum and Harold Holt.

Wright and Mangrum also had interceptions.

In pre-game ceremonies, Leilani Barnett, escorted by Randy Randolph, was crowned Homecoming Queen for 1983. Leilani, senior head cheerleader, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Barnett of Bogata and Randy is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Adams of Bogata.

Others in the Queen's Court were Kristi Foxworthy, escorted by Kyle Clemmons; Pam Ward,

escorted by Rusty Damron; and Melissa Brown, escorted by Richie Winkler.

Greg Russell recovered a fumble to start the Rebels on their way to victory. Russell carried for several plays to set up Jeffery Bivins' first six points from the 5 yard line. The point after by Stanley Jessee was good. The Rebs led 7-0 with 6:12 left in the first period.

Rivercrest's second score was the result of Anderson's first interception. The Rebs marched 30 yards in two

plays as Bivins powered in from the 18 for his second TD. The extra point was blocked, the score 13-0.

The second quarter was uneventful as neither team managed to add any points to the board.

The bands from Maud and Rivercrest marched through the halftime rain to provide entertainment for the Rebel homecoming crowd. Some of the fans ran for shelter but the true patrons stayed and watched the shows.

With 5:56 left in the third

quarter, the Cards connected on a 14 yard touch-down pass. The two-point conversion was good.

Bivins, with one second left in the period, zipped 31 yards for another score. The conversion failed bringing the tally to 19-8.

Early in the fourth stanza running back, Randy Galloway, charged in from the 25 to add a comfortable six more. The conversion was no good. The Rebs stretched their lead to 25-8. Linebacker Lonny Shef-

field latched on to a bad Maud pitchout and raced to the Cardinal 10 for a carry of 23 yards. With 7:59 to go in the final period, Jeffery Bivins bolted over from the 9 for his fourth and final TD. Charlie Roberts concluded the Rebel scoring for the night by adding the two-point conversion for a 33-8 lead.

Maud came back with another score with 42 seconds left in the game. The conversion failed - the Rebels were on top 33-14!

The excellent scoring ability of the Rebs allowed Coach Milford Groves to play some of his younger and more inexperienced boys. These players met the challenge and played exceptionally well.

Rivercrest made 15 first downs to Maud's 9. Rushing yards were overwhelming for the Rebs with 338 to the Cardinals 75. The Cards dominated the passing game with 126 yards to 50 for the Rebels. Rivercrest gave up

no interceptions while capturing six from their opponent. The Rebels were penalized for 42 yards to the Cardinals 60.

Rivercrest will trek to Ore City Rebel territory Friday night for yet another district clash.

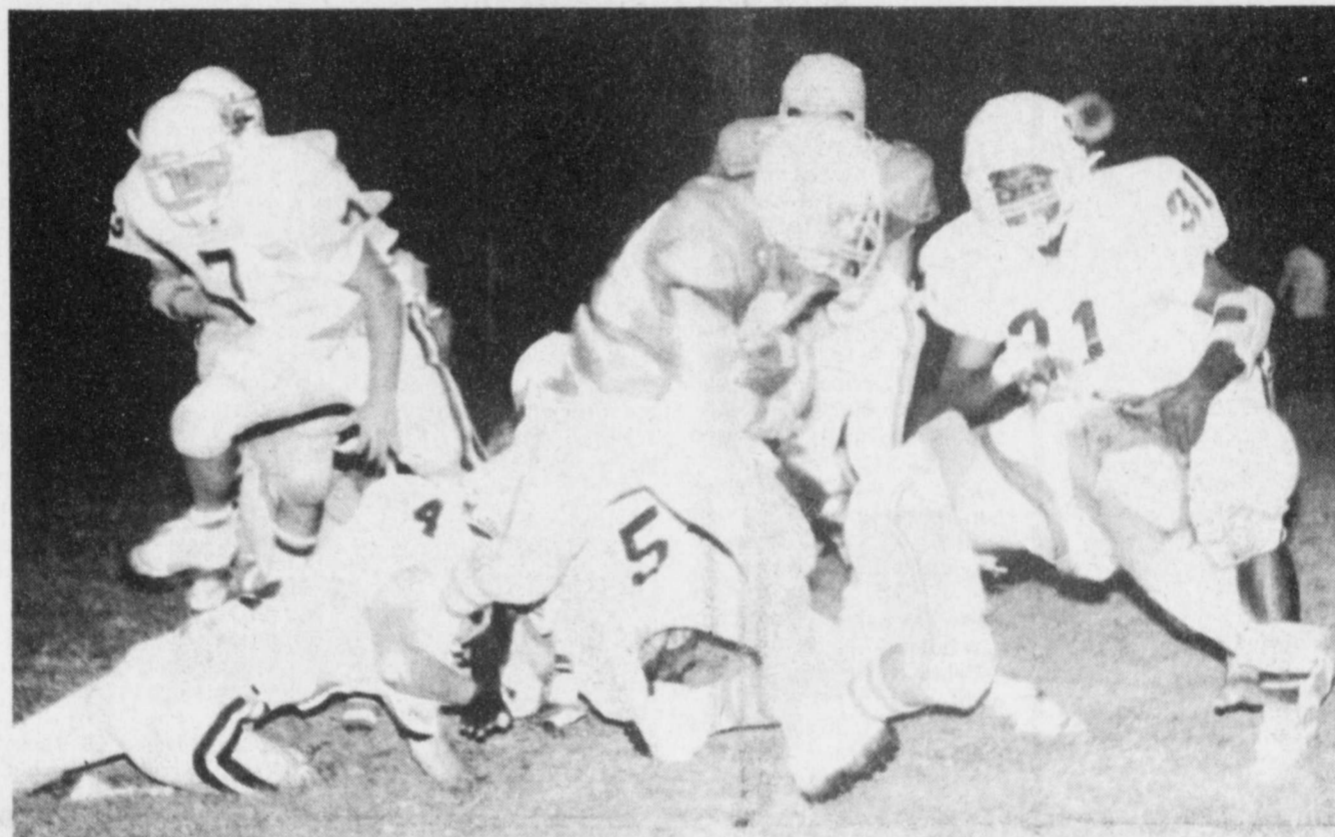

## Talco-Bogata CE Sponsoring CPR

Saturday, October 22, 1983, a CPR course will be offered. The course will be taught by Danny Bockman, Bockman Insurance Agency, Daingerfield, Texas. The course will be held in the Rivercrest Cafeteria beginning at 9:00 a.m. and ending at 4:00 p.m.

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (C.P.R.) is a simple-but effective-method of applying mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and external cardiac compression to victims of heart attacks and other heart-related emergencies. The idea: to restore breathing and blood circulation in the first crucial minutes after cardiac arrest. Even if less than expertly administered, some C.P.R. assistance is better than none.

The C.P.R. class which will be taught will utilize films, lectures, and printed material to educate participants about how C.P.R. works. Participants will also learn to recognize heart attack victims and will be taught the correct C.P.R. techniques through practice on lifelike mannequins. To become certified, students must pass an examination at the end of the class.

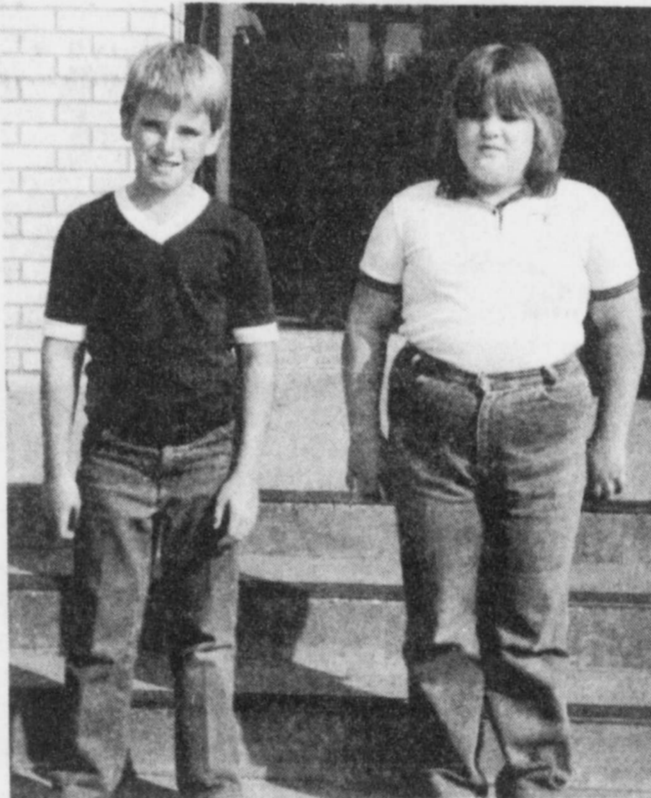

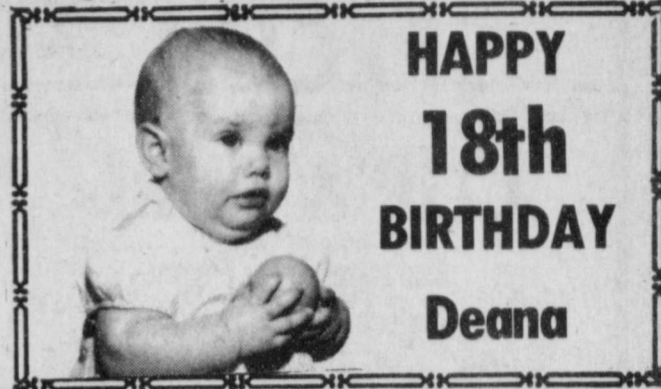

You could go on a date with only about a dollar and

still have some left over for the next time you wanted to go out.

This was an exciting time of the year as you were finishing up with the gathering of the crops and also going to school and getting settled in for the long winter and you also had football practice to keep you after school and then when you got home there was time to pick a sack full of cotton and still have time to do your chores, such as milking the cow and feeding the stock and bringing in the wood for the fires and on Friday nights there were the partys to go to.

Sometimes all the boys would get together and have a possum hunt or we would invite the girls and have a weiner roast if we could get some of the parents to go along as sponsors, of course the boys would have liked it alot better without the sponsors, but that was a no-no and sometimes we would just all get together and go to someones home and study for our lessons for the next day. That was always alot of fun as we would always have something good to eat and besides we would wind up having a small dance of a square dance if we could get some one to call it.

Friday nights was always the best night of the week as we did not have to get up early and we could stay up as late as we wanted to or atleast as late as our

parents would let us. Friday was also special during football season for all the players would get together at some place of business to replay the game.

One of our favorite places to gather was at a service station run by Mr. Boyd Reece. He would put up with us boys and on this day I don't see how he could as we were always in the way when one of his customers came in and Boyd would have to run us out of the way so the customer could get to the gas pump, but he did not seem to mind too much as he would always say that he got as much enjoyment out of reliving the game as we did and he never missed a home game.

Sure wish some of the old bunch would take the trouble to get us all together again, some could not make it as they have played their last game and have gone onto the BIG GAME, but there are some left who would like to get together and we could relive old times.

**BUDDY'S WORKSHOP Inadequate Extension Cords Cause Many Home Fires**

If your home is equipped with circuit breakers, do you have protection from fires caused by inadequate extension and power cords?

Circuit breakers and fuses are designed to protect house wiring. Inadequate power cords and extension cords can overheat when appliances are in use without affecting the house wiring to trip the circuit breaker or fuse. The major cause of home fires is the use of extension and power cords that are inadequate. If you replace a power cord or must use an extension cord, be sure they meet the manufacturer's recommendations for the appliance. It's also wise to use extension cords sparingly. Do not use several lengths of extension cord.

What is the problem when gutters that have been painted and kept obstruction free still do not drain properly?

The problem could be that the gutter hangers have received no attention. They should be inspected each year and replaced as necessary. Rusted gutter hangers are often loose and throw the gutter out of line so that water must run uphill to the downspout.

Why are slip-joint pliers so named? Slip-joint pliers have two center slots in which the fastener pin can be located. One slot enables you to grip small objects; the other allows the jaws to open much wider to grip larger objects.

Weekly Agricultural Update

Now is a good time to either stock or harvest catfish, says Dr. Joe Lock, fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is best to handle the fish during the morning or cooler part of the day.

Practically every county in East Texas has at least one fingerling producer. At least two species of cockroaches are moving into this time of year, according to Dr. James Robinson, entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The American cockroach is approximately one and three-fourths inches long and the Oriental cockroach is approximately one and one-fourth inches long. Both have long life cycles and do not reproduce nearly as fast as the German cockroach, the most prevalent

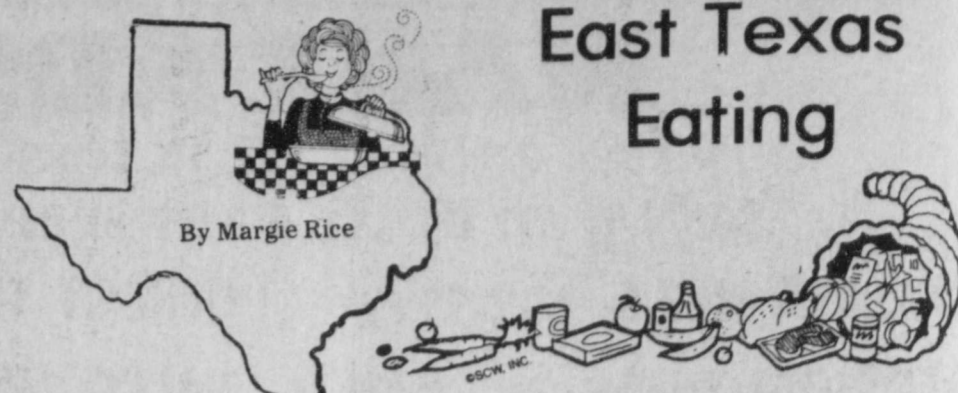
## Circle II UMW Meets

# East Texas Eating

By Margie Rice

The cake roll is experiencing a wave of renewed popularity. No wonder! It is remarkably simple and quick to make. And, the result is delicious to eat and elegant, even in its simplest form, in appearance.

The cake roll -- or jelly roll as it is often called when the thin sheet of sponge cake is spread with jelly before it is rolled -- has endless variations. The plain cake can be spread with the filling of your choice -- pie filling, an orange filling, lemon filling, chocolate cream, whipped cream, or jelly.

My mother remembers a good Wise County cook whose Wild Plum Cake Rolls were popular at church dinners at the old Rush Creek Baptist Church. The woman canned wild plum pulp in the summers. She simply sweetened the plum pulp, thickened it with cornstarch, and spread the cake roll with the plum filling.

I worked out what I hoped was a duplication of the Wise County cook's Wild Plum Cake Roll recently -- with wild plum pulp which my mother had canned specifically for my efforts. The result was delicious! I've also worked out a Fresh Apple Cake Roll which my husband and neighbors have liked. Here are both recipes. Do try one or both -- or choose another filling

for your cake roll.

### Cake Roll

Grease a 15 1/2 x 10 1/2 x 1" jelly roll pan (sometimes called a high sided cookie or brownie pan) and line bottom with greased aluminum foil.

Sift together and set aside:  
1 cup sifted all-purpose or cake flour  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. salt

Beat in small mixer bowl until very thick and lemon-colored:  
3 large eggs

Pour beaten eggs into large bowl. Gradually beat in 1 cup sugar. Blend in...on low speed one third cup water and 1 tsp. vanilla.

Slowly mix in dry ingredients...on low speed...just until batter is smooth. Pour into prepared pan. Bake in 375 degree oven until top springs back when lightly touched. (about 12 to 15 minutes). Loosen edges and immediately turn upside down on a towel sprinkled with confectioners' sugar. Carefully remove paper. Trim off any stiff edges. While cake is still hot, roll cake and towel from narrow end. Cool on wire rack. Unroll cake, remove towel. Spread with soft (not syrupy) jelly roll filling. Roll again. If

desired, sprinkle with confectioners' sugar. Cut in 1 inch slices.

### Zippy Fresh Apple Filling

2 cups peeled, diced (about 1/2 inch) Golden Delicious apples  
1 1/2 tsp. grated orange rind  
2 Tbsp. sugar  
6 Tbsp. orange juice  
4 tsp. cornstarch blended with 2 Tbsp. orange juice  
1/2 tsp nutmeg

In a 1 1/2 quart covered saucepan gently cook the apples, orange rind, sugar and orange juice until apples are tender -- about 10 minutes. Stir in the cornstarch mixture; cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and clear -- a minute or so. Stir in the nutmeg. Cool. Spread on sponge cake and roll as directed above.

### Wild Plum Filling

2 cups wild plum pulp (canned or fresh)  
sugar to taste  
5 Tbsp. cornstarch  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Heat plum pulp. Stir in the sugar and cornstarch which have been mixed. Heat only until thickened, stirring constantly. Stir in cinnamon. Cool. Spread on sponge cake and roll. Dust with powdered sugar, if desired.

Impossible Italian Tuna Pie  
The pie that does the impossible by making its own crust.

- 1 can (6 1/2 oz.) tuna, drained and flaked
- 1 med. onion, chopped (about 1/2 cup)
- 1 lg. tomato, chopped (about 1 cup)
- 1 can (2.2 oz.) sliced ripe olives, drained
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 3 eggs
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 3/4 cup Bisquick baking mix
- 1 1/2 tsp. dried oregano leaves
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. dried basil leaves
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

Heat oven to 400°. Grease pie plate, 10x1 1/2 in. Layer tuna, onion, tomato, olives and green pepper in plate. Beat remaining ingredients until smooth, 15 seconds in blender on high or 1 min. with hand beater. Bake until knife inserted in center comes out clean, 25 to 30 min. Cool 5 min. 6 to 8 servings.

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
