# Weekly Agricultural Update

Many producers are concerned about their winter pastures. Although some areas of East Texas had some rainfall, it has basically been spotted. With rainfall, seed that were dusted-in earlier should germinate and do well.

Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that some producers may want to plant ryegrass alone in some areas. Good results were obtained last year in Henderson County with seeding rates of 35 to 40 pounds per acre. Marshall ryegrass did well under these conditions.

If the ryegrass is planted in a sod, Reeves advises to hold back on applications of nitrogen until after the first frost. Otherwise, the nitrogen may cause the permanent grasses to compete too heavily with the

seedling ryegrass.
Once winter forage plants get a little growth, Reeves says that they are pretty tough and can withstand some dry weather. With adequate rainfall, many of se plants can survive.
