

Rebs Defeat Eagles With Last Minute Effort

The Rebels captured a last minute victory over the New Diana Eagles last Friday night in a muddy battle at Rebel stadium, 14-12. The Rebs trailed until the final minute and nineteen seconds when Greg Russell tunneled into the endzone to take the lead. The conversion failed but

the Rebel lead would hold. The defensive squads on both sides showed extreme ability during the entire first half. The ball was handed back and forth with neither team being able to capitalize on their possessions. Both teams were plagued with interceptions with the Eagles coming up with one and the Rebels grabbing

three. Kelly Jeffery teamed up with Bobby Thomas on a 54 yard scoring drive with 10:01 left in the third quarter. Randy Galloway made good on the conversion for a 8-0 Reb lead. New Diana connected for 56 yards for a score two plays later. The Eagles missed what would prove to

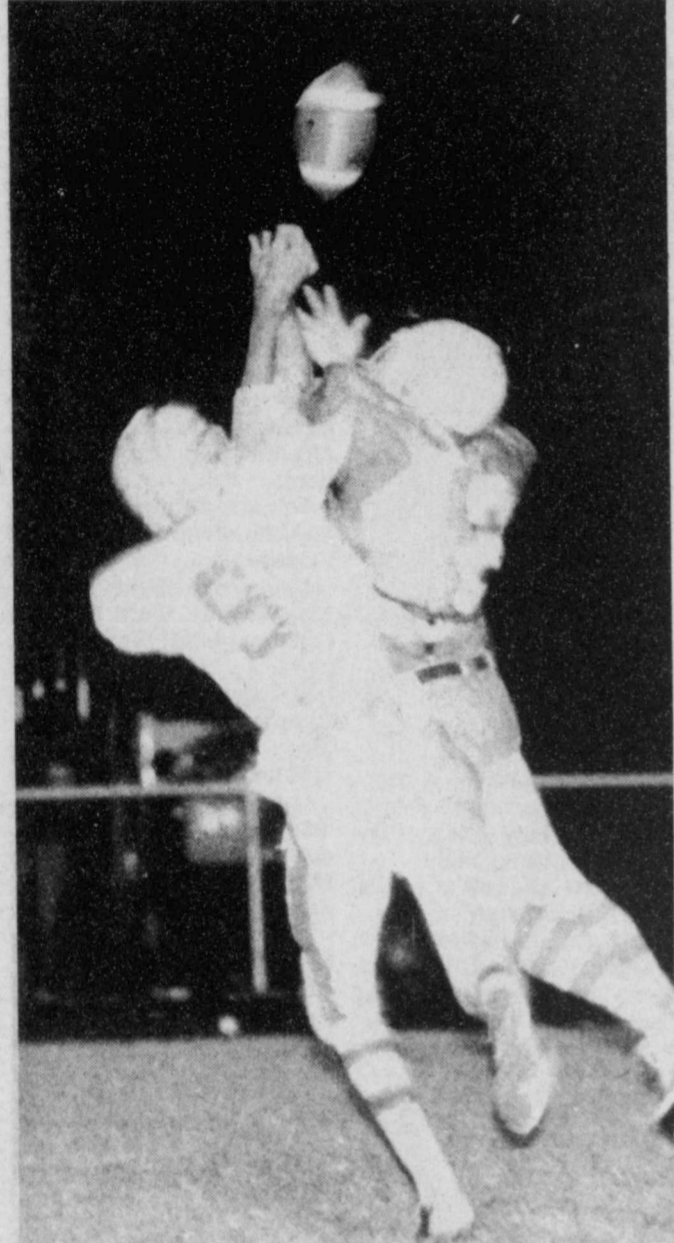
be a very crucial 2 point conversion. The players and crowd were rained on a bit during the third period. The extra moisture just added a little more slush to the already wet field. New Diana had good field position on the Rebel 38 -- the result of a blocked Mangrum punt. The Eagle

drive was halted by a James Anderson interception. The Eagles tracked 58 yards on their first possession of the fourth quarter. An alert Rusty Damron made a save at the six yard line. Then with 7:22 left to play the New Diana quarterback edged around and into scoring territory. The conversion failed giving

the Eagles a 12-8 lead. The Rebels put their heads together and marched sixty-nine yards in 17 plays. The key play was on fourth and 13 from the New Diana 47. Joel Mangrum, on a fake punt, rolled out left and sailed a 19 yard pass to waiting Bobby Thomas. Six more plays and the Rebels hit paydirt with Greg

Russell's two yard dive into the endzone. The conversion was no good and with 1:19 left to play, Rivercrest had its two-point lead. The Reb defense took over and stopped the Eagles cold -- the Rebels were victorious by two, 14-12. Rivercrest had 16 first downs to the Eagles 14 and 194 yards rushing to 156 for their opponent. The Reb's

passing yardage was lower with 73 yards on two tosses, but they were both key passes which led to scores. New Diana had 108 yards passing. Rivercrest was penalized for 58 yards -- the Eagles for 75. The Rebels will host James Bowie this Friday night at 7:30 p.m. Come out and give your support to these fine athletes!

They were the best that ever was and they could beat any one. They were all laughing and talking about how they were going to beat the other team or that is what we used to think when we were on our way to play a game that we had practiced for all week. All the dirty work was done and now we were going to have some fun and come home winners. There was one or two things that I noticed that was different from them and us when I played. We did not have nice uniforms and very seldom was there more than two of them alike as we had to buy our own uniforms and we did not have a big pretty school bus to travel in. We had to settle for any way that we could get to travel to the game. That was one of the Coaches biggest problems. Sometimes we would get some of the fans to carry two or three to the game in their car and when we were really lucky

enough we had enough money in the treasure to hire us a big semi-truck to go in.
 If we were really lucky we could get Mr. Weaver Skaggs to rent us his truck and, his oldest son J.D. would drive us. When it was cold or raining we would put a big canvas tarp over a long pole that would fasten to the front end gate and then the other end would fasten to the rear end gate and that way we could keep dry if it was raining and we had the side boards and the tarp to help keep us warm.
 We all just loved it when we got to go in the truck as that meant that all of us would get to the game at the same time and besides we would talk J.D. and the coach into stopping at the Red River to get something to eat. One reason that we wanted to stop at the river was that they had some punch boards where you could win some prizes.
 Well we stopped and while we were eating one of the boys got carried away and he got the board and all the prizes and hid them in the truck so we could not win any prizes but after we had ate and were on the way home he got the punch board out and began giving all of

us one of the prize. I think that I got a comb or something like that anyway one of my good friends got a knife and the next Monday at practice the coach got us all together and he wanted to know who had taken the punch board. Of course, all us denied it and the coach told us that the man who runs the place had wrote him a letter and said that he was missing the board as we were the only ones who were in that night that he knew that some of us had taken it and all he wanted was the board back with all the prizes or whatever it would take to replace it in other words send him the board with all the prizes or enough money to pay for it or he was going to file charges on us. That really got our attention and we got busy and raked up enough money to pay for the board. I don't remember what it cost but I do know that it was all the money we had. He never knew who took the board and still doesn't but I do know that it did teach all of us a good lesson and that was not to take anything that was not ours.
 Sometimes we would go way up in Oklahoma to play some teams and they would give us \$50 to \$80 to come up and play them. We all liked it when we got payed to play as it meant that the coach would buy all of us either a hamburger or a bowl of chili on the way home. It did not bother us that we always got the stuffins beat out of us for we always thought that we could beat them and that we seldom did, but they had to show us for we thought that

we could until they proved other wise.
 We did have alot of fun and it taught us that we had to work together if we wanted to get anywhere in this world. Sometimes we did win but that was not the thing that stays with you as you grow older, but what does stay wi... you is the fun we had and the friends that we made and also the lessons that we learned.

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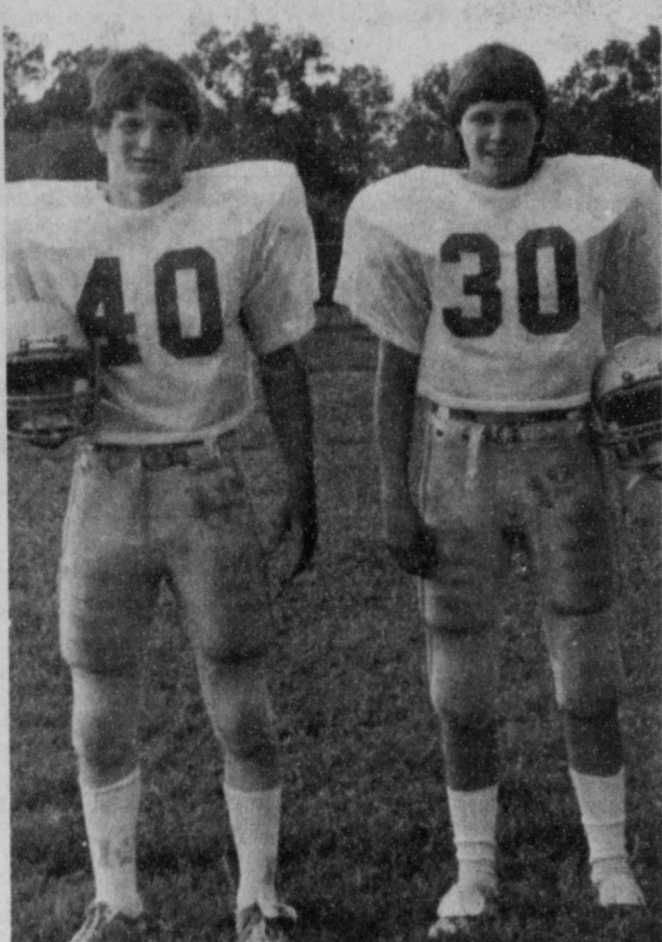

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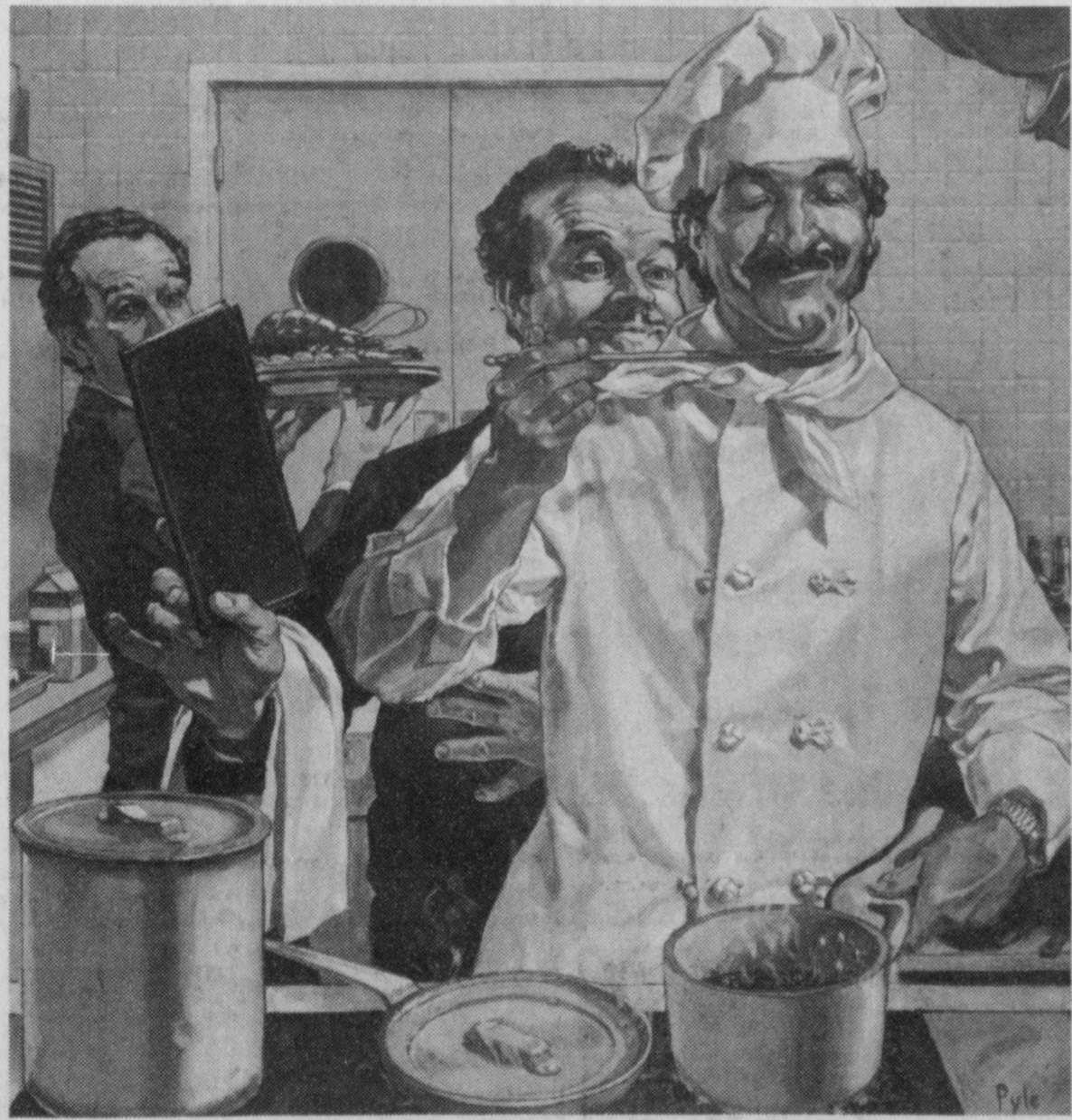
