

Rebels Handle Pirates With 28-14 Win

The Rivercrest Rebels handled the James Bowie Pirates last Friday night for a 28-14 victory at Rivercrest. The offense and defense were ready for action. The Rebs scored a touchdown in each period while the Pirates were held to two the entire game.
Randy Galloway was the deciding force in the clash.

He found scoring territory three times during the evening.
James Bowie was plagued by fumbles early in the game and set up the Rebel's first score with a fumble. Galloway carried from the one following a 33 yard drive. Stanley Jessee's extra point gave the Rebs an early 7-0 lead.
The score held until 8:59

left in the second quarter. Galloway and Jeffery Bivins gained most of the yardage in their second touchdown march. Quarterback, Kelly Jeffery, slipped over from the one after a nice 12 yard run on the play before. The Rebels carried a 14-0 halftime lead into the locker room.
The Rivercrest Rebel Marching Band put on an impressive country halftime

show. The band danced to the all popular "Cotton-Eyed Joe" and band member, Jerry House, broke out the fiddle and busted loose with "The Orange Blossom Special"! They received a hearty round of well-deserved applause.
The Rebels came back with a vengeance as Jeffery Bivins eluded stray Pirates for a 21 yard gain. It was

Galloway again a few plays later going in from the nine for the points. The kick was good and gave the Rebs plenty of breathing room with a 21-0 lead.
The Pirates weren't licked yet though as they took the ball into the endzone on their next possession. The Pirates tromped 72 yards in 13 plays with 4:23 left in the 3rd quarter. The score was 21-7 at the end of the period.

James Bowie still wasn't ready to call it quits when the Rebels fumbled the ball to them on the Reb 49. Then with 5:08 left to play the Pirates crossed in from the one for the score. They came within seven to 21-14.
The Rebels weren't ready to call it a night either, however, as they covered 57 yards in 9 plays. Galloway's light shone again on a twenty yard trip around the

left end. With 1:06 left in the contest the score was 28-14.
Galloway came up with an interception on the last play to stop the Pirates drive. Randy Galloway and Jeffery Bivins accounted for all but sixty yards rushing for the Rebels.
Rivercrest had 18 first downs to James Bowie's 19 and 277 yards rushing to the Pirates 204. The Rebels completed one of six passes

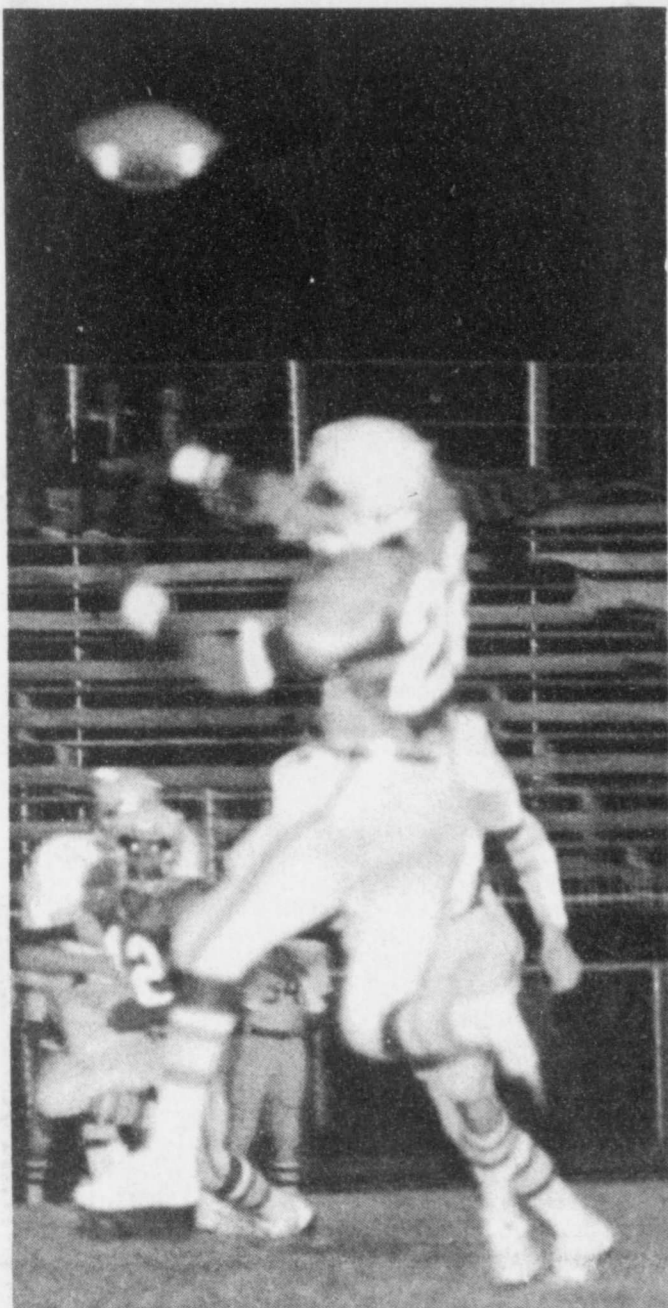
for 32 yards. The Pirates passed eight of seventeen for 67 yards. Rivercrest intercepted one pass to James Bowie's two. The Rebels were penalized 39 yards and the Pirates 20.
The Rebels are 4-2 in district play. They will host Como-Pickton Friday night. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. This will be the final regular season game.

Talco Halloween Carnival Success

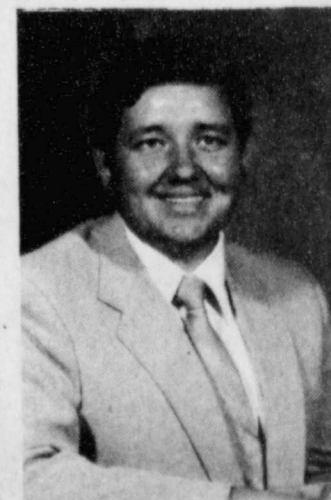

FmHA Assist Farmers

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) provided loans to 6,700 Texas farmers in fiscal year 1983 which ended on September 30, 1983, FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch announced today.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers who need credit but cannot get it from a private bank or other lending institution. The loans are to be repaid in full, plus interest, to the U.S. Government. FmHA has over 2,000 field offices throughout the country with 137 offices in Texas.

Early, preliminary figures show that nationally the Agency provided about 75,000 loans to farmers across the country. The total amount loaned through FmHA farmer programs was approximately \$3 billion.

The breakdown of farmer program preliminary totals show that Texas FmHA provided 4,790 farm operating loans for \$174,160,000; 220 farm ownership loans for \$18,902,000; 1,580 natural disaster emergency loans for \$88,637,000 and 27 soil and water loans for \$325,600 for a total of 6,617 loans for

FmHA Helped Families Buy Homes

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) made 2,465 mortgage loans to Texas families in fiscal year 1983 that ended September 30, 1983. FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch announced today that FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to farmers and other rural residents who need credit but who cannot get it from private banks or other lending institutions. The loans are to be repaid in

full, plus interest, to the U.S. Government. FmHA has more than 2,000 field offices throughout the country with 137 in Texas. Preliminary figures show that nation by the Agency provided more than 60,000 loans to families across the country who were without safe decent and sanitary housing. Another 20,000 families were afforded an opportunity at better housing through 1,000 loans that financed rental housing construction.

The total amount of FmHA housing loans for the fiscal year was \$2.6 billion. In Texas, FmHA provided 2,465 single family homes loans totalling \$71,740,660. J. Lynn Futch said. Forty-two rental housing loans totalling 1,350 units were made for \$35,625,520. Total housing loans for the year amounted to \$107,366,180.

Stinson One Of Two "Trooper Of Year"

Two Tyler based Texas Highway Patrol troopers have been named "Trooper of the Year" by the Department of Public Safety Officer's Association during the group's 10th annual conference earlier this month.

Joe Don Abernathy and Jackie Stinson were nominated for the honor because they saved the life of Gulf Bates, 65, when they rescued him from his burning rural home, said Marshall Smith, a public information officer for the DPS.

The troopers were on routine traffic patrol just before midnight Feb. 10 about 16 miles east of Tyler when they smelled smoke. They discovered a smoke-filled house with flames leaping from the roof into surrounding trees.

The officers, after spotting two vehicles in the garage, began shouting to arouse anyone who might be in the home, but got no response. They kicked in the front door but could not enter because of the intense heat and smoke.

When they went around to the back of the home, Abernathy and Stinson found Bates, who was almost overcome by smoke. The troopers kicked in the window and rescued Bates.

They were presented with plaques stating, "For Outstanding and Dedicated Service to the Department of Public Safety and the Citizens of Texas -1983", by the association's president, Mauricio Cantu, Austin.

Earlier this year, both troopers received the Directors Citation from DPS

Director, Col. Jim Adams, in recognition of the rescue. Abernathy has been with the DPS for 11 years, while Stinson has been a trooper for 12 years.

Stinson is the son of Mrs. Mary Crooks of Mt. Pleasant and the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. W.C.Fry of Talco. He is married to the former Katy Fry.

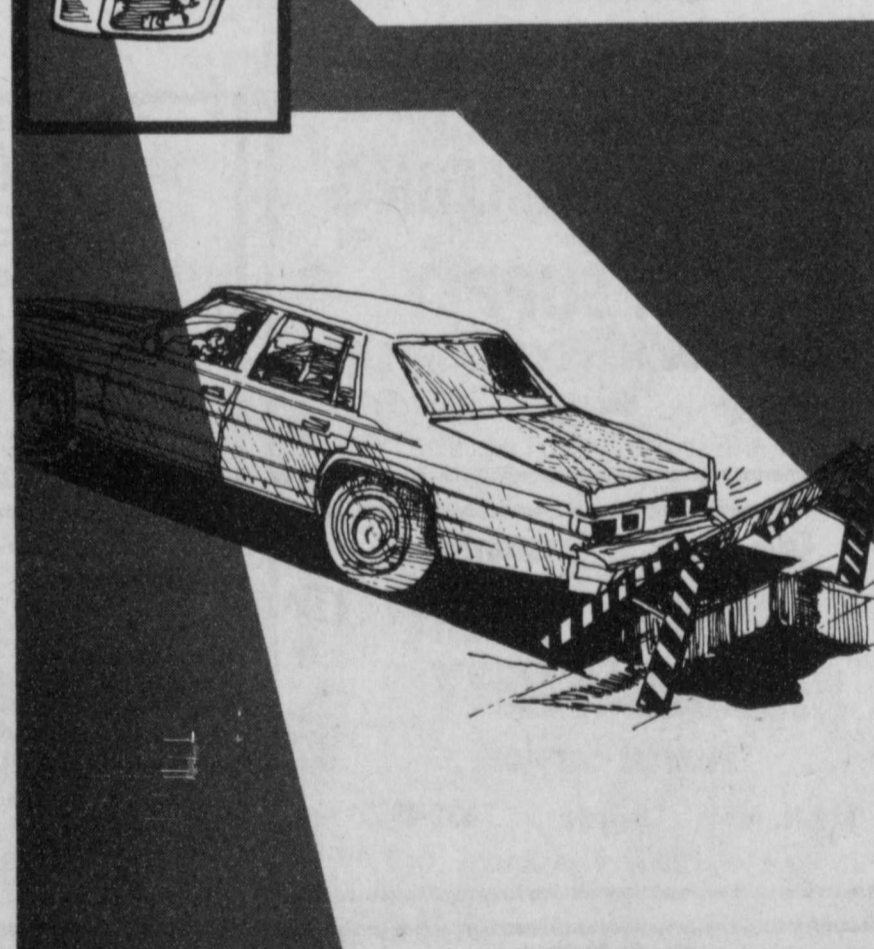

Weekly Agricultural Update

Current management decisions determine future income from the beef herd, says Dr. Randall Grooms, livestock specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Cows maintained and fed through the winter must be productive, functional cattle that calve early and raise a respectable calf. Grooms points out several ways to determine which cows are to be wintered. The most obvious way is to pregnancy check the cows and eliminate those that will calve after a given date. Most cows that calve after April 1 through 15 have little opportunity to produce a profitable calf. An alternate method suggested by Grooms is penning all the cattle,

separating the lightweight calves from the cows and pair them the following morning. Sell all cows that have proven their inability to produce a profitable calf. Chances are they will make the same mistake next year because they have habitually calved late or they have poor milking ability. Additionally, cows that are old, have bad udders, bad feet or bad teeth should be culled to eliminate wintering costs. Selling the poor producing cows eliminates costs, plus gets money to help pay notes. Producers may want to stocker the lightweight calves through the winter because they do have a probability of making money. All calves should be

wedged by this time of year to allow cows to regain body weight, replenish body stores and store fat which serves as insulation against winter cold and as a reserve energy source during periods of feed shortages. By following these practices, Grooms says that feed resources can be allocated to productive cattle, thereby increasing the opportunity for profit.

was an inspiring experience. We toured the Aquarium, Science, Space and Garden Center. The children also visited the midway.

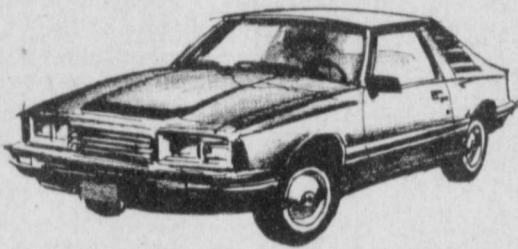
The last event at the fair for us was the fireworks and the new laser show. We had a late supper at the Red Lobster Restaurant and then on back to Bogata.
