



#### **FmHa Resumes Emergency Loans**

Administration has resumed making economic emergency loans.

Frank B. Stroud, FmHA County Supervisor, made the announcement.

'Economic Emergency loans are designed for farmers who are in a cost

Farmers Home price squeeze or face other financial difficulty beyond their control,;; Stroud said. "In other words, the loans are for a financial emergency rather than a natural disaster such as a drought or flood.

The Economic Emergency or "EE" program was in operation from 1978 to 1981, when it expired. But, Congress re-authorized the program, and it is being reopened by order of a U.S. Washington, D.C., Stroud

"Under the program, loans will be available to farmers who are suffering an economic emergency through no fault of their own. They must show that they have tried unsuccessfully to get a loan from another source before coming to FmHA and that they can repay the loan over a period of time, depending on the use of the funds. The funds can be used to finance debts and related uses.' Stroud said.

"The interest rate for direct loans will fluctuate with the cost to the government of borrowing money," Stroud said. "The interest rates for guaranteed loans, which are made by commercial lenders and backed by the government, are negotiated between the borrower and lender.
