### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and permitting either the husband or the wife to pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

SECTION 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting." And all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting."

SECTION 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution, and existing laws of the State.

SECTION 4. That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20

Relating to the amending of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the prison system under the supervision, management and control of such officer or officers as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

SEC. 2. The above constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "For the amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the Amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

SEC. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

SEC. 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### Election Order and Notice

On this the 28th day of March, A. D. 1921, came on to be considered a petition signed by Courtney Hunt and more than 20 other qualified property tax paying voters of the Haskell Independent School District, praying that an election be held within said school district to determine whether or not there shall be levied, assessed, and collected upon all taxable property within said school district a maintenance tax of and at the rate of not to exceed one dollar on the \$100 valuation, and after a due consideration by the Board of Trustees of the Haskell Independent School District it was determined that said petition was signed by the required number of tax paying voters of said district and that the same was in all things in conformity with the law.

It is therefore ordered by the Board of Trustees of the Haskell Independent School District that an election be held at the Court House in the Town of Haskell, in said Haskell Independent School District on the 30th day of April A. D. 1921, to determine whether the Board of Trustees of said District shall have power to annually levy, assess and collect a tax upon all taxable property within said District, for the support and maintenance of public free schools in said Haskell Independent School District, of and at the rate of not to exceed One Dollar on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.) valuation of taxable property within said district, if said tax is voted the same shall be levied and collected for the year 1921 and annually thereafter unless it be discontinued as provided for by law.

S. A. Hughes is hereby appointed manager of said election, and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same. None but property tax payers who are qualified voters in said Haskell Independent School District shall vote at said election.

A copy of this order signed by the president and attested by the secretary of this Board shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the president of this Board shall cause to be posted at three different public places within said Haskell Independent School District for at least three weeks before the day of election, true copies of this order, and he shall make due returns showing when and where said notices were posted.

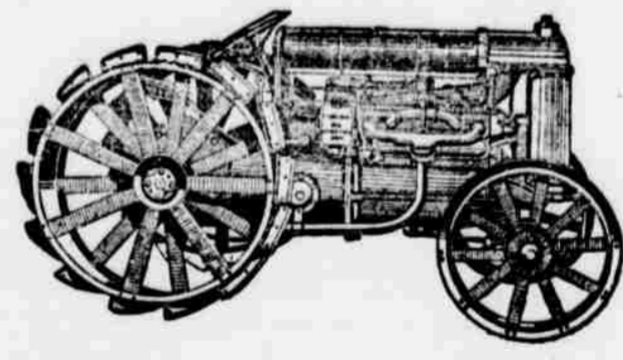

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4**

A Joint Resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas amending Sections of the Constitution of the State of Texas as follows: Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 relating to the compensation of executive officers, and Section 24, Article 3 relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of said State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, and Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary not to exceed Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same, and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by the law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold his office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and, from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power, or mandating or collecting any species of taxes, toll, freight, or wharfage, not

authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor or other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary not to exceed Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$7,500.00) Dollars, and no more.

Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shall each hold office for the term of two years, and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office; and perform such other duties as are or may be required of him by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive for their own use, any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be paid by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section, or in his office shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury.

Section 24. Mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature shall be paid from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may, from time to time, be provided by law, not exceeding Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each regular session of one hundred and twenty days; and not exceeding Five (\$5.00) Dollars per day for the remainder of such session; and provided, further, that Members of the Legislature shall receive not to exceed Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each special session of the Legislature that may be called from time to time by the Governor. In addition to the compensation above provided for, the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government which mileage shall be ten cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct travel by land regardless of railways and water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter

to be established, and by such table the mileage of each Member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

SEC. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election these amendments shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words: "OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers." "Against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers."

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers." "Against the amendment to Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers."

Those voters who favor such amendments shall erase by marking a line through the words "against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "for the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election; and

Those voters who favor such amendments shall erase by marking a line through the words "against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "for the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election; and

ment relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall be erased by marking through the words "Against the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." Those who oppose such amendment relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall erase by marking through the words "For the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature of the State of Texas," and the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast at such election.

SEC. 3. If a majority of the votes cast in the election herein provided for shall be in favor of the amendments proposed, the maximum sum named therein shall become effective and be the compensation thereafter to be received by the officials named therein on and after the first day of January, 1922, and so remain until otherwise provided by law, and the compensation so provided shall be paid out of any moneys in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

SEC. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of these amendments and the election to be held hereunder.

(\$0.7 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.

**Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

SECTION 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51: The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the States served in organization for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders of Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this Section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$0.7) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate

herein levied, and provided the provisions of this Section be construed so as to prevent of aid in cases of public debt.

SEC. 2. The foregoing amendment shall be subject to the vote of the qualified voters of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, and all voters shall have printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows who are residents of this State prior to January 1, 1910," and "Against the amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."

SEC. 3. The Governor is directed to issue the proclamation for said election and have such laws of this State, and the thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars thereof as may be hereby appropriated out of funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of said election; and the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election; and

 several years. It would be economy

 The first statement covering the cir-  
 culation of money in the United States  
 issued by the Treasury Department on  
 March 1st, 1921, places the total  
 amount of the various kinds of money  
 in actual circulation in the United  
 States on March 1st, at \$6,297,190,570.  
 This represents a gain for the month  
 of February over January of \$65,925,-  
 458. For the year ending February  
 28th, 1921, it represents a gain of  
 \$208,404,069. The general stock of money  
 in the United States declined \$86,-  
 301,501 during the month of February.  
 For the year ended February 28th, 1921  
 the general stock of money in the

United States gained to the extent of  
 \$278,624,516. National bank notes out-  
 standing on March 1st, 1921, totaled  
 \$709,671,000, a gain of \$12,484,000, when  
 compared with those outstanding on  
 February 1st, 1921, a gain of \$52,343,-  
 000 over those in circulation on March  
 1st, 1920.  
 Federal Reserve notes in circulation  
 on March 1st, 1921, amounted to \$3,-  
 072,735,000. This compares with \$2,-  
 999,699,207, the amount of notes in cir-  
 culation March 1st, 1920. While the  
 Federal Reserve Bank notes has been  
 increasing as has the gold coin of the  
 country, silver certificates and sub-  
 sidiary silver has also been increasing  
 so that despite the contraction in Fed-  
 eral Reserve notes issued the total vol-  
 ume of money in circulation continues  
 to remain at a high point.  
 On March 1st the per capita circula-  
 tion of money in the country was esti-
