

#### RECORD OF FOREIGN TRADE OF U. S. SINCE YEAR OF 1821

The first government record of statistics showing Uncle Sam's foreign trade is for the year 1821. Of course, America had foreign trade before that, but so far as figures go, we have just completed a century of business with the other nations of the world.

In that century our population increased ten times. Our exports in 1920 were 185 times greater than in 1820 and our imports were 84 times as

great. American territory increased during the century from about 1,800,000 sq. miles to over 3,000,000 sq. miles.

Raw cotton held the first place in 1821 in our exports, the value being \$20,157,484. It maintained that position in 1920 with a value of \$1,136,-408,916. But cotton compriesd 46.16 modern place of business. per cent of our exports in 1821, whereas the percentage had fallen to 16.29

A hundred years ago the principal wheat, flour, rice, lumber, hog products, past two weeks receiving ed to a position second only to cotton. Breadstuffs came next, with wheat figuring as the largest single item.




