

Commissioners Support Prison Plan

Corrections Concepts, a Bedford-based non-profit organization, is currently planning to build four minimum security corrections facilities during the coming year. One of the locations now being considered for one of the 500-inmate minimum security prisons is the Clarksville area. Plans to present letters of support to CCI officials were made after Bill Robinson, Executive Director of the organization, made the presentation.

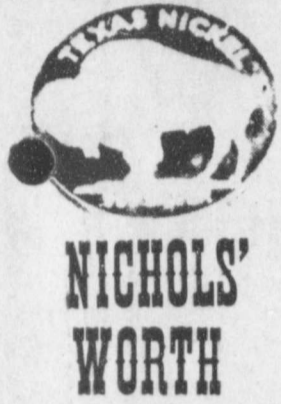
Robinson told the Commissioners' Court that the county would be asked to secure a 30-acre plot of land in or near Clarksville, perform necessary site work and pour 90,000 square feet

of concrete foundation. The plan, which County Judge L.D. Williamson said was almost too good to be true, is that Corrections Concepts would place \$8 million in an escrow account and the city would receive interest from it. That interest would amount to more than \$400,000. In addition to the escrow account's

interest, the county would receive a payment of \$445,000 annually from CCI to cover rent on the property and a per diem payment on each prisoner held at the facility. These payments would be made for five years. The county would then pay CCI \$1 for the building and the deed for the facility would be turned over to the county.

The county would at this time begin receiving \$1,195,000 per year for use of the facility. The average stay of the prisoners, according to Robinson, would be about 14 months. These inmates would have no history of violence, sex crimes or escape attempts. The Correctional Facility would

employ 90 people with an annual payroll of more than \$1.6 million. Another attraction of the plan is that the facility would bring with it two or three satellite industries that would create employment for about 200 people.

Rebels Lose Season Opener

The Rivercrest Rebels opened the 1986 football season Friday against the Prairiland Patriots, only to have the Patriots take a 15-0 win in a hard fought defensive struggle.

The Rebels took the opening kickoff and moved the ball well the first four plays, but were forced to punt after gaining only one first down. The Rebels and Patriots exchanged punts the rest of the half.

With neither team able to generate much offense until late in the second quarter, when Steven Johnson plunged into the endzone from one yard out. The two point conversion was good, giving the Patriots an 8-0 halftime lead.

After the half, the Rebels again received the kickoff. But once again could not establish the running or passing game. The Rebels did manage to hold the Patriots out of the endzone until the Rebels fumbled a pass deep in their own territory, thus giving the Patriots the ball just eight yards out with 30 seconds left in the

contest. Steven Johnson again carried the ball in for the Prairiland touchdown and the extra point was good, making the final score 15-0.

Junior tailback Clint Stephenson led the Rebel rushing attack with 34 yards on 20 carries. He also returned a third quarter kickoff 62 yards, before being tackled by the Patriots.

Quarterback Jimmy Lewis was 0 of 12 passing for the game. Despite the loss, much can be said for the Rebel defensive unit as they held the much larger Patriots to only 153 yards total offense and recovered 3 of 7 Patriot fumbles.

Friday night the Rebels travel to Farmersville to take on a tough AAA team in a non-district contest. Kick off is at 8:00 p.m.

CHILD SUPPORT PAYMENT BUYS JUDGE'S FREEDOM

BELTON(AP)-A district judge put an East Texas county judge in jail Thursday, releasing him after the jailed judge agreed to write checks for almost \$10,000 in back child support payments, attorneys' fees and court costs.

Initially, 169th District Judge J.F. Clawson sentenced Harrison County Judge Richard Anderson to 10 days in the Bell County Jail for contempt and non-payment of child support.

However, about 30 minutes after beginning to serve his sentence, Anderson, 31, agreed to make up the back payments and Clawson suspended all but four hours of the sentence.

Anderson, a Marshall lawyer, wrote checks for \$9,100 in back payments, \$500 in attorneys' fees and \$87 in court costs.

Anderson returned to Clawson's court from the jail about 4 p.m. and made out the checks. He then returned to jail to serve the remaining hours of punishment imposed by Clawson.

Clawson said the sentence was suspended after 8 p.m. on condition the checks would be honored when presented for payment to the First National Bank in Marshall by Anderson's ex-wife, Dale Owens of Harker Heights, a Bell County Community.

Anderson who was divorced from his wife in October 1974, was ordered to pay \$175 per month in support of his daughter, who is now 12. Court records show he had skipped payment for the past four years.

Dearest Mollie,
It was wonderful to talk to you yesterday. I read the clippings and they brought back so many memories. Thanks for sharing them with me. Telling you about the house brought back memories too.
There are so many things about the Underwood home that I didn't tell you. As I was leaving Saturday afternoon, the sun was casting long slanting beams, and a fierce nostalgia gripped me. I felt like I was seeing the sun set on a segment of my life.
I gave you a little history of the

house, but I didn't tell you much about my personal history in it. My mother and father Mary Anne Underwood and Lenox Hudson were married in the living room in 1934. On December 2, 1936, I was born in the front bedroom. It had come a norther that night and Edd had driven in from El Paso. Daddy and Jimmie tried to keep a fire going in the fireplace with green firewood.

I remember Sunday dinners—the heavenly odor of hot rolls baking and the endless waiting to get to eat. If there were many visitors and children had to wait for the second table or eat on a small table in the kitchen or maybe in the hall. That was O.K. though because if you ate with the big people you had to hold your fork right, and the conversation was dull.

I remember Christmas mornings, high ceilings can accommodate a magnificent tree. I doubt if it was as wonderful as I remember, but when I was small, the tree touched the upper reaches of imagination, and Santa Claus surely knew we had come to spend the night. I don't remember many gifts I got there, but I remember mostly the ritual of passing out the gifts. Once Mama gave Daddy a pair of shoes and wrapped them separately so he wouldn't guess what it was. Daddy never put Mama's gift on the tree until she had gone to bed because she would open it. It was not the gift she wanted though, it was a card. I remember only one, I suppose the last one. The gift was dusting powder. The card said "I would love you if you were a millstone around my neck."

I remember Mama and Auntie sewing on winter afternoons. I remember canning corn in the summer that Jimmie had planted in his field. He hated it and said in no uncertain terms that he was not a gardener. It took a long time for him to talk Auntie and Mama and Tom out of it.

I remember the old crank telephone in the hall. I felt very grown up when I could reach it without standing on a chair. I remember lying on the daybed in the hall in August of 1947 when Beryl Gibson called family and friends to report my mother's death.

Now I have more recent memories—the months after we found out that Jimmie was ill that I had the chance to repay Tom and Jimmie a little of the care that they had given me. I was glad to come to cook or clean or just to share fellowship with them.

About a month before Jimmie died my daughter Carol asked him if she could be married at the house. She knew that he could not travel to be at the wedding anywhere else. He said "Of course you can. You come and do anything you want to this old house." Jimmie died a month before the wedding, but Carol was married there on October 26, 1985.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

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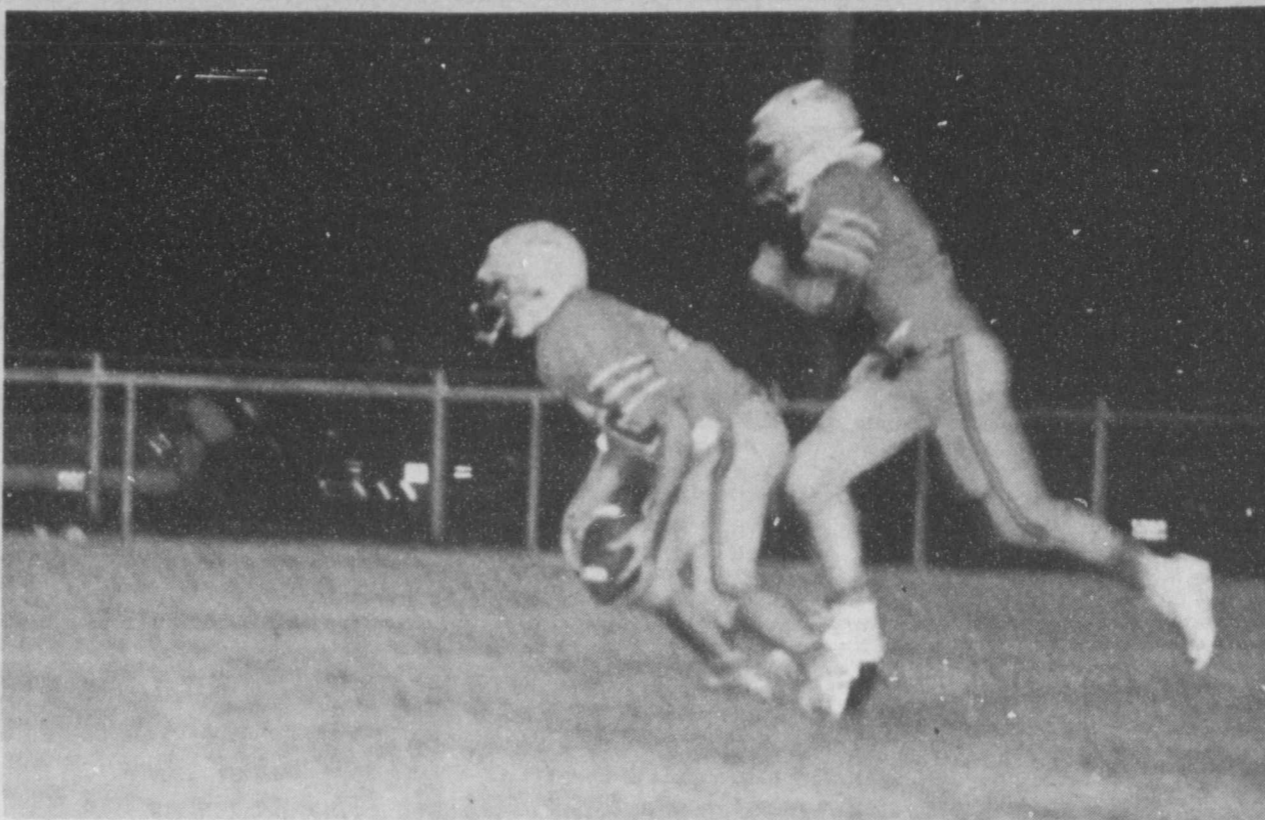

had a rough game against Prairiland, playing good defensive ball, but unable to get any points

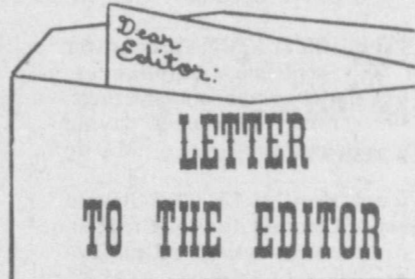

To the Editor:
As a member of the Lions Club International, I belong to the largest service organization in the world, represented by over 36,000 clubs with a membership exceeding 1,358,000 in over 157 countries and geographic areas. Some of the major activities of the Lions International are: sight conservation and work with the blind, citizenship services, hearing and speech action and work with the deaf, educational services, environmental services, recreational services, health services, public services, social services, and drug awareness. A portion of the dues that I pay goes to my local club for club expenses, another portion goes to the district, and another portion goes to Lions International. As a result of those portions that go to the district and international, the members of the community in which I live are eligible for several services provided for by the district and international. Some of them are: leader dogs for the blind in Rochester, Michigan. To be eligible for a leader dog and training, any blind man or woman over 16 years of age, in good health, emotionally stable, of good moral character and physically able to walk at a fairly

brisk pace. The dog and training costs the recipient absolutely nothing. The Diabetic and Crippled Children's Camp in Kerrville. If eligible, these children are sponsored by local clubs and receive training as well as medical therapy during sessions each summer. Again, this does not cost the recipient anything. Each district has its own organ bank. These banks primarily coordinate the location and issue of corneas for eye transplant recipients. The location for the organ bank in my district is Tyler. The Lions International is very active in Sight and Hearing Conservation, and also Drug Awareness. On a more local level, the Bogata Lions Club is very active in raising money to help those in our community who are in need. We buy eyeglasses for needy children. To qualify, the child must be eligible for the school lunch program and contact and be approved by the Lions Club before glasses are purchased. We help victims of accidents, sickness and those who are unable to help themselves. We also donate to the local emergency organizations such as fire department and ambulance when needed. The Bogata Lions Club maintains the Bogata Community Center for the use of the members of this community. As a member of Lions Club International, I am proud to be able to play a small part in helping those who are in need. Regan Bell

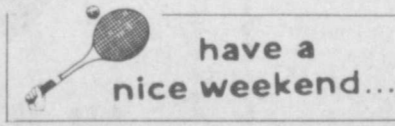
NTCC Fall Enrollment Up
