Most Area Sales Taxes Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$54.8 million in local sales tax to 1,022 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Bullock said the 1986 payments to date were down .5 percent as compared to the payments to date in September of 1985. The decrease in August and September checks

amounts reflects a downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

Houston's check for \$8.6 million was the largest, bringing total payments this year to \$108.3 million, down five percent from last year.

Mt. Pleasant received \$68,873.66, a 3.24 percent increase over last year's payment of \$67,291,46. Talco received \$978.86 for their payment this period, compared to a \$1,555.75 payment for the same period last year, marking a 15.99 percent decrease in total payments to date.




R.R. Haven Residents Compete In Senior **Olympics**
