## Glaciers, Goats and Gasps A Delight!

We've been back off vacation for nearly two weeks now. So many people have been to Alberta, Canada, that we didn't think anyone would really want to hear our vacation tales. We usually try to confine them to the unusual trips.

But dozens of people have begged us to write our little trip up, so we finally decided to go ahead. After all, for those who aren't interested, they can skip over this part of the paper. So many people say "We'll never get to go any other way".

Calgary, Alberta, Canada. Our flight arrived at 10 at night. It wasn't dark. During the following week and a half we figured out that it wasn't going to be dark until nearly eleven. Since we're used to staying up until after dark, we certainly didn't waste much time on sleep!

Downtown Calgary is a beautiful city, new, built since the oil boom, and interspersed with lots of pristine parks. Two rivers meander through the city, the Bow...and (are you ready for this) the Elbow!

It was so late we didn't want to go out from our hotel to eat, so we ordered pizza from a nearby place known as "Baby Blue's". The pizza was delicious, and had shrimp on it!

Next morning we collected our rental car and headed west, past the Olympic park where the 1988 winter games were held, and on up the Icefields parkway, billed as one of the most beautiful highways in North America, and not in the least over-billed!

As the glorious mountains began to tower overhead the road revealed panorama after panorama of flowing rivers, majestic mountains and glaciers tumbling down through valleys.

We were supposed to be in the little town of Jasper that night, and kept stopping so much that a 280 mile journey turned into an all-day affair.

The further west we traveled the more gorgeous the scenery became.

The water turned an amazing shade of turquoise and aqua blue, caused, we found out, by "rock flour" which is scoured by wind and ice from the mountains and refracts light in the water.

At Dead Man's Flats we began an odyssey...a full fledged bear hunt. For years Thomas has wanted to see a bear in the wild. We've stayed every place there was bear trouble, but never seen so much as a beary backside vanishing over a hill.

We stopped at the Grizzly Bar Cafe for a quick hamburger, and spent plenty of time with the waitress, talking about the country, and the bear that lived across the highway on the mountain. They had a picture of him, and affectionately called him "Granddad". This helpful lady promised us that if we would go out early along the rivers west of Jasper we would see the black bears playing in the river.

After filing this info away we headed west some more, passing Banff and Lake Louise, since we would be coming back to them.

At the Columbia Icefields we took a snow coach tour out onto the Athabasca Glacier. Ice 40,000 years old and nearly a thousand feet thick is pretty impressive!

Heaved up in bumpy layers, the blue-tinted ice seems to stretch forever, while a fierce, cold wind slashes across it.

The idea of the glaciers ever disappearing is inconceivable, but if they continue melting at their present one quarter inch and hour they only have about 500 years more before they are completely gone.

Shortly after skidding around out on the glacier surface we continued on our drive, only to be halted by the sight of a family of mountain goats grazing on a steep mountainside.

These animals are wild, but because they are in Canadian National Parks they have never been hunted or chased. They ignore people as just

something that happens.

With their little kids at their sides, the mama goats would wander into the road, confident, and correct in assuming that cars would stop for them. The big billies are quite a sight, and if they give the signal, the whole family can vanish up a sheer rockface as quick as a wink.

A little later we found ourselves stopped for waterfalls, cascading down thousands of feet to splash right at our feet.

Alongside the road was the blaze of purple Fireweed, tiny blue clusters of blooms, and an Indian Paintbrush very similar to our own.

It seemed we were always stopping, taking roll after roll of film.

When the big horn sheep appeared, I was in heaven. The majestic beasts were like the goats, completely oblivious to us.

One big ram wandered by me as I was tracking him up a mountainside and I said softly "Hey, buster, give me a break, I need you standing still with the mountains as a backdrop".

Honest, folks, he walked across the road to the edge of a cliff, raised his head and stood as still as a statue. Then he looked at me as if to say "Okay" and strolled off!

The whole trip continued that way... We took pictures of more mountains, more glaciers, more goats, more sheep, Jackdaws, Marmots, Ravens, ground squirrels, rivers and lakes than we had ever seen in Colorado, Wyoming or Montana!

At dark we pulled into the picturesque town of Jasper, and after a hasty supper settled in for a night's sleep.

The next morning, our alarm sounded. Now, why set an alarm on vacation? To go look for those bears, remember?

We drove slowly along the river, keeping an eagle eye out for bears.

They must not have felt like playing the river that morning (as cold

as it was, I don't blame em).

We did see more big horn sheep, including a tiny baby whose mom got aggravated at our invasion of her territory. She "bahhed" him to her, gave us a dirty look and departed, leaving a cloud of dust.

We spent time out at Jasper Park Lodge, an elegant place way beyond our financial budget, but graced with beautiful gardens, gold courses, restaurants and shops, including museum quality Indian artwork. They don't mind visitors, even if they can't afford the prices!

After that we wove our way up to Maligne Canyon and Maligne Lake.

The Canyon is fabulous, with roaring, rushing falls carving chasms hundreds of feet deep and creating rainbows of colors.

Of course, all these feet, inches, miles per hour and miles to the next town are a translation. In Canada everything is in meters, kilometers, etc. It doesn't take long to catch on though, and the money is so simple that it's just like being at home.

When it comes to food, Thomas and I tend to be adventurous. We usually eat one good meal a day on vacation, picnicing at lunch.

That night in Jasper we descended on a place called "Tokyo Tom's" and featuring authentic Japanese food.

Chinese food we are familiar with, Japanese, no.

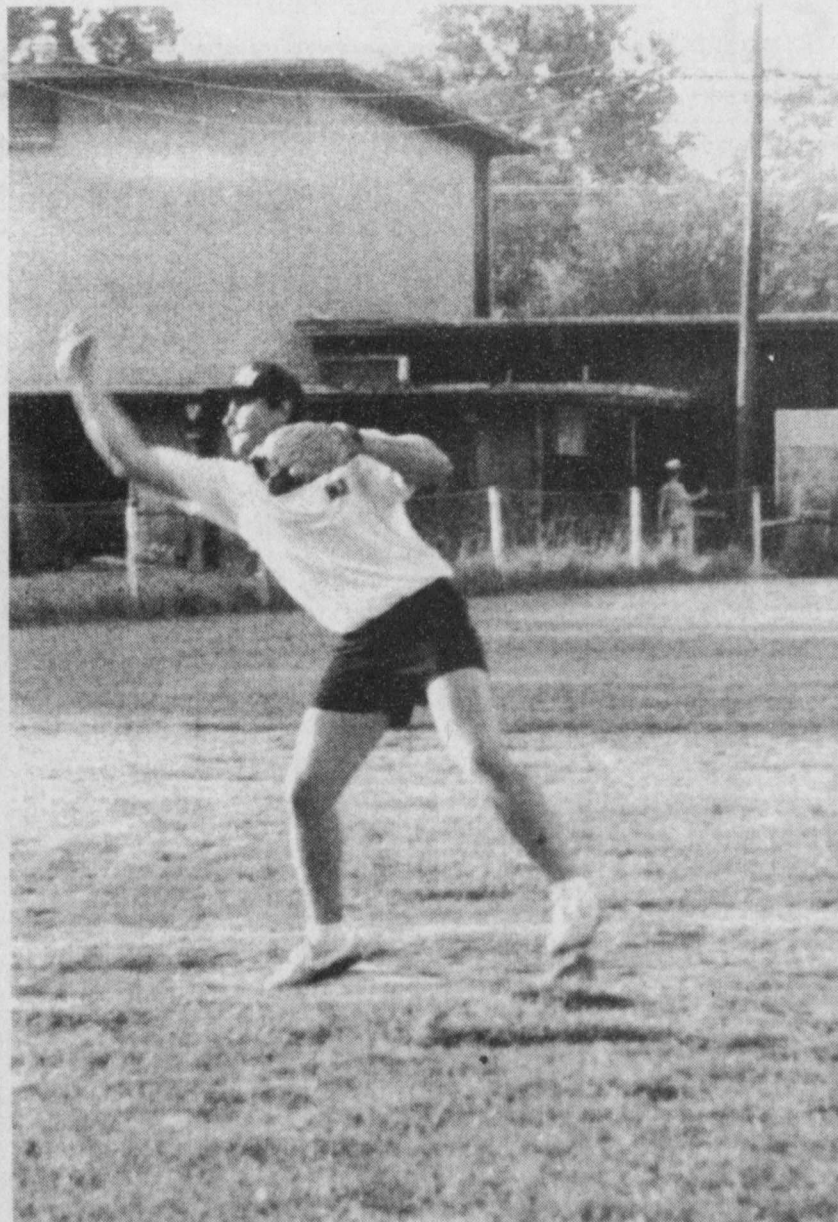
Seaweed and cold noodle salad drew some really disgusted looks from Thomas. I ate it, but confess it wasn't tremendous.

I could go over to the Red River, that big old sluggish giant the color of blood and the consistency of syrup.

Perhaps I could go 900 miles down to the Rio Grande, the temperature (of the water, not the air) is about 100 degrees these days, and one can hike on the bank faster than the current flows.

It's a little bit like discovering you love deep sea fishing when you live in Kansas, or rock climbing in Louisiana.

Still, I have a wonderful day's memories, came home and went on a diet, and have started pushing the lawn mower instead of using the tractor. That raft trip was the best thing that ever happened to me. If I get too stressed out, I just remember the trip. If I get tempted to go off my diet I remember the wet suit. It works like a charm.

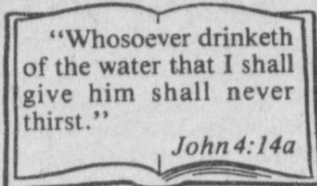

## Texas Historical Commission Awards Grant To Old Red River County Jail

State Senator Richard Anderson of Marshall and Rep. Barry Telford of DeKalb have announced that the Old Red River County Jail in Clarksville has been awarded a \$5,000 Texas Historic Preservation Grant. The grant, administered by the Texas Historical Commission, will be used to remove and replace the

building's metal roof and conduct other miscellaneous rehabilitation work.

The Texas Historic Preservation Grant Program, established by the Texas Legislature in 1981 to encourage the protection and use of structures significant in this state's history, has made it possible to rehabilitate many of Texas' most historic

landmarks. The grants are awarded in three categories, planning, acquisition and development, and must be matched two-to-one at the local level. "We are pleased to be able to fund such a worthy project and participate in the rehabilitation of some of Texas' finest historic structures," said Stan Graves, AIA, director of the THC's Division of Architecture.

Plans are now being made for the ninth Annual Fall Arts and Crafts Bazaar set for October 1. This event is sponsored by the Red River County Historical Society.

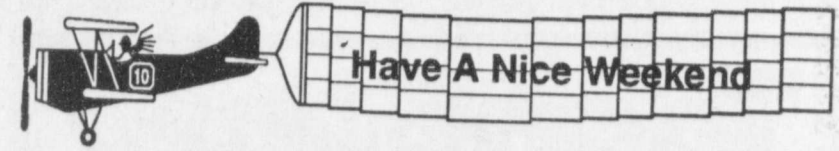

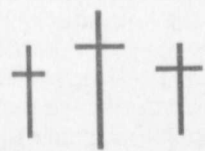

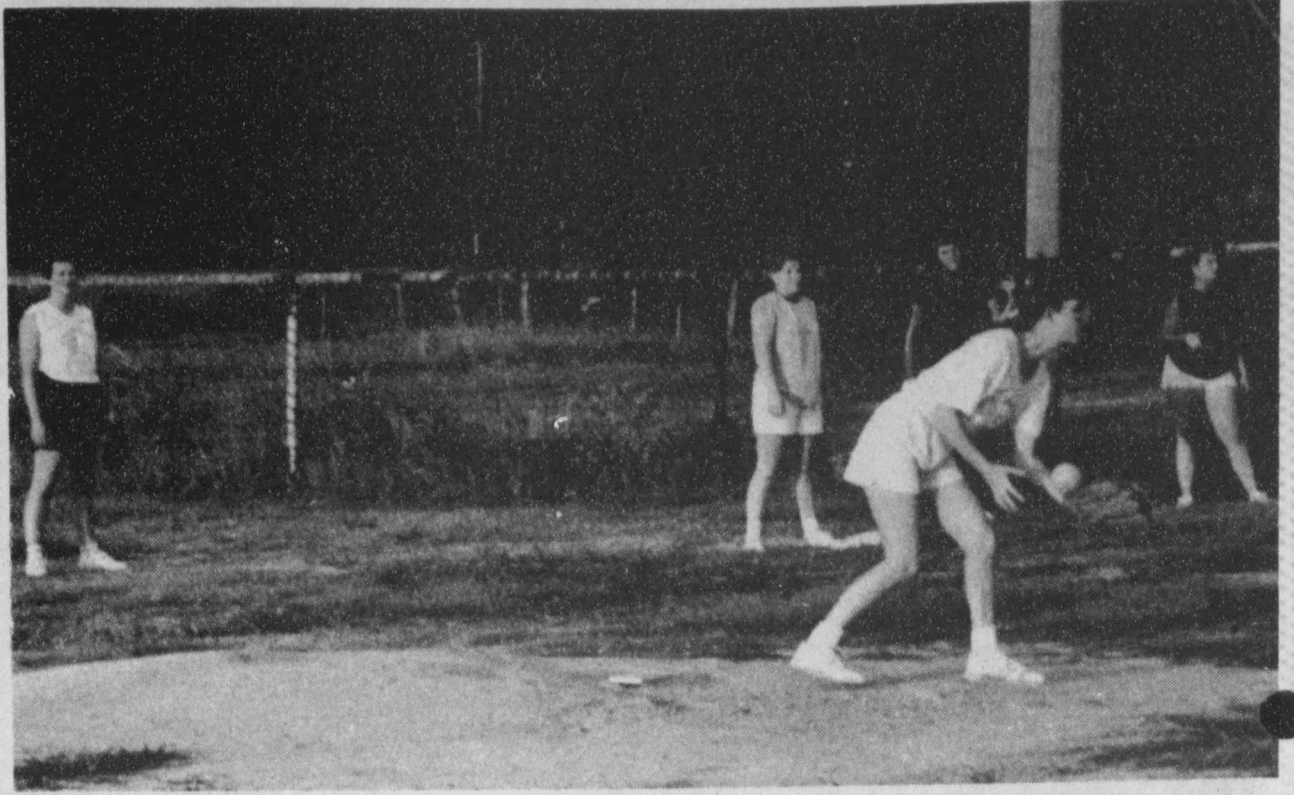

## Livestock Producers Should Be Looking For Fly Fever Symptoms

Horse fly numbers have increased during the last week and that normally means an outbreak of fly fever in cattle. There had been very few horse flies observed on cattle all summer, but a fresh batch hatched out last week. Their appearing now is weather related as the insect pupates in marshy, damp soil.

There is no insecticide that will control the horse fly. One could spray the cattle every day, but the insects will continue to attack cattle. Oilers and dust bags seem to help some. Brick bats are the only sure weapon known to work successfully.

Many producers keep out a Fly Fever supplement containing a tetracycline. These are available in various brand name products. The important consideration in the use of these products is that each animal consume an adequate amount daily. For best results, one should provide access to the tetracycline containing product about one month prior to the Fly Fever season.

Fly Fever is a common name for the disease. It is more accurately named Anaplasmosis. It first appeared in the area about 25 years ago. At least this is the time most cattle producers remember. Several hundred head were lost that year and there has been scattered cases each year.

It is a blood disease that is spread by blood-sucking insects such as horse flies and ticks. It also may be

spread at the time of dehorning, castration, blood sampling and vaccination.

Animals that survive the disease remain carriers of the disease and the source of future problems. The microscopic parasite that causes Anaplasmosis attacks and destroys the red blood cells and bring on a severe anemia. The blood becomes pale and watery.

In the acute form, the animal at first has a high fever and breathing is fast and labored. Other symptoms are exhaustion, a wobbly gait and loss of appetite. One should also look for

Hopefully, the disease will not be a problem, but the chances are great that cases will appear before cold weather arrives.

Bag worms can be found in some of the evergreen shrubs. These are the worms that eat the leaves from Junipers, Cedars and Arborvitae. They remain in their bag and take it with them. The bag is cone shaped and a mature bag reached one and one-half inches in length. Spray the foliage with Sevin. It will be effective if the worms are still feeding.

Many reports have been received from individuals seeking information on the big brightly colored wasp-like insects digging in lawns and flower beds. They are busy reproducing themselves at this time in the sandy type soils. They dig a deep hole, catch a cicada, place it in the

hole, deposit eggs, seal the compartment and get another cicada and so forth. I am not aware of them ever attacking a person.

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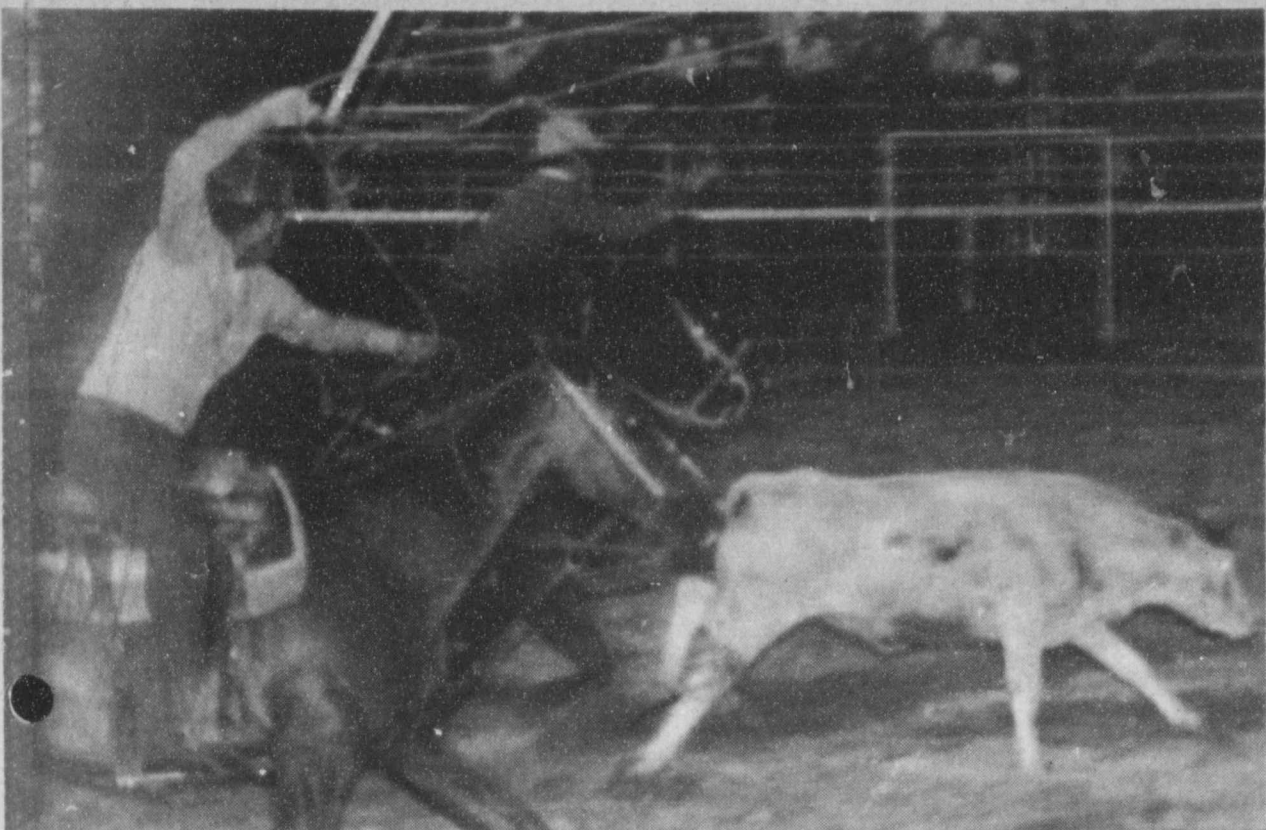

**Time To Treat Lawns For Grubs**

By Paul D. Payne

During the first part of August is the appropriate time to treat lawns for grub worms. Grub worms often devastate St. Augustine grass lawns by feeding on the roots to the extent that the turf can be rolled up like a carpet.

Grub worms are much easier to control at this time as they are young and closer to the top of the soil. Although control may be achieved at a later date, the best results are realized now.

Insecticides that are suggested are diazinon and dursban. Either of these should be applied evenly to the turf area and then watered. The watering is necessary to get the insecticide down where the grub worms are working. The insecticides are available in a granular and liquid formulation. As always, follow the instructions on the label.

Do you remember picking up pecan slast fall with a hole about the size of a pencil lead and wondering what caused the hole? That problem was caused by the Pecan Weevil and the first two weeks of August is the time to spray your pecan trees to control them.

The timing of insecticide application is critical in controlling the insect, as they must be present in the tree. The insect causes two types of damage. Feeding of the adult weevils causes the nuts in the water stage to drop. Then after it has entered the dough stage, the nut is susceptible to egg laying and attack by the developing larvae.

The adult resembles a cotton boll weevil. They are a brownish weevil about 3/8 inches long. The females snout is as long as the body.

After pecan kernels reach the dough stage, the female chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs in little pockets in the nuts. Eggs are not deposited in the nuts in the water stage. The grubs hatch and feed inside the nuts during late summer and fall. The entire kernel is eaten by the grub resulting in an empty pecan with a pretty little round hole at harvest time.

One should begin checking for the weevils around the first of August by placing a tarp underneath the tree and jarring the lower branches. When

adult weevils are found apply Sevin and repeat in 10 to 14 days.

Hickory shuckworms are another pecan insect to look for at this time of the year. The adult hickory shuckworm is a dark brown to grayish-black moth about 3/8 inch long. The larvae is white and tunnel in the shuck surrounding the pecan. Their feeding in the shucks often prevents the shucks from opening properly. Also, heavy infestation could result in improperly filled kernels.

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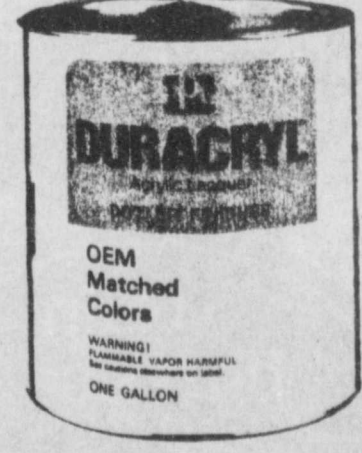
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### Johntown News

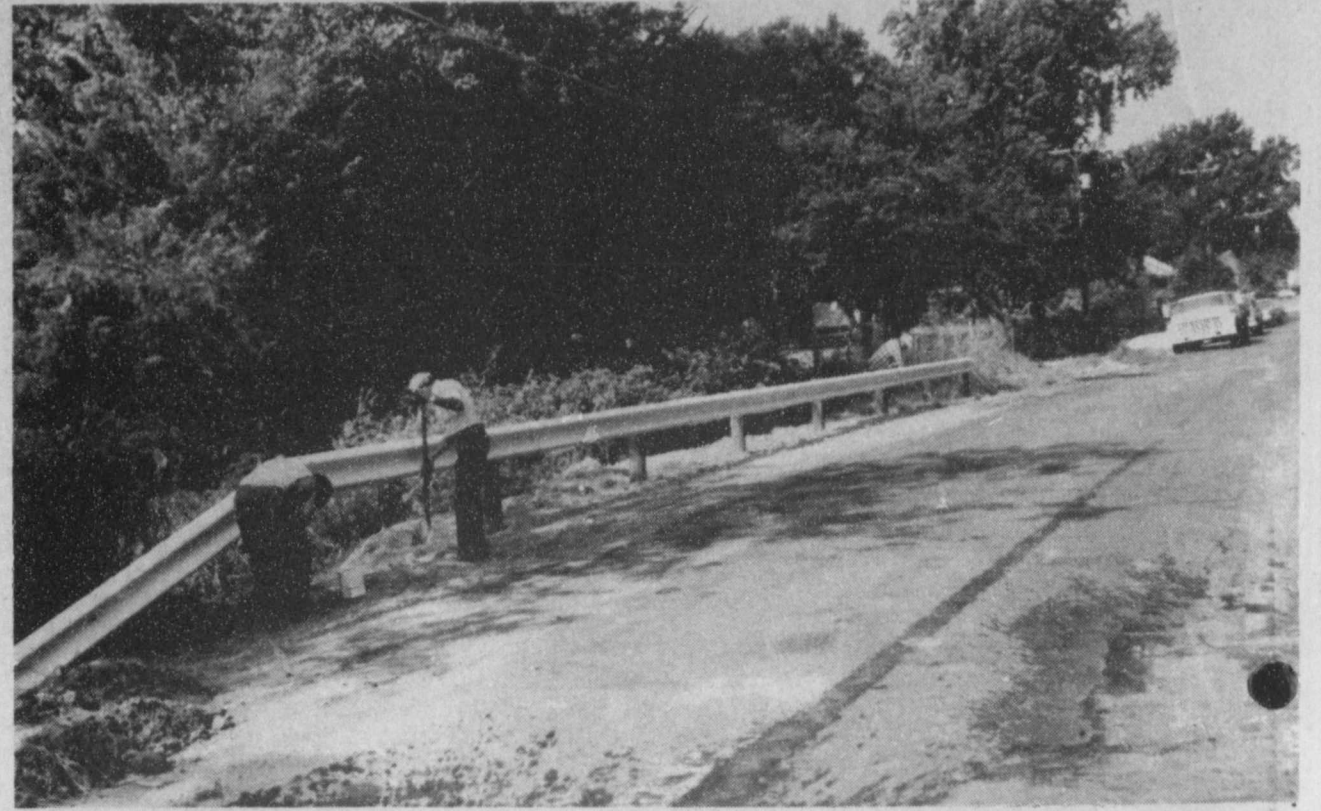

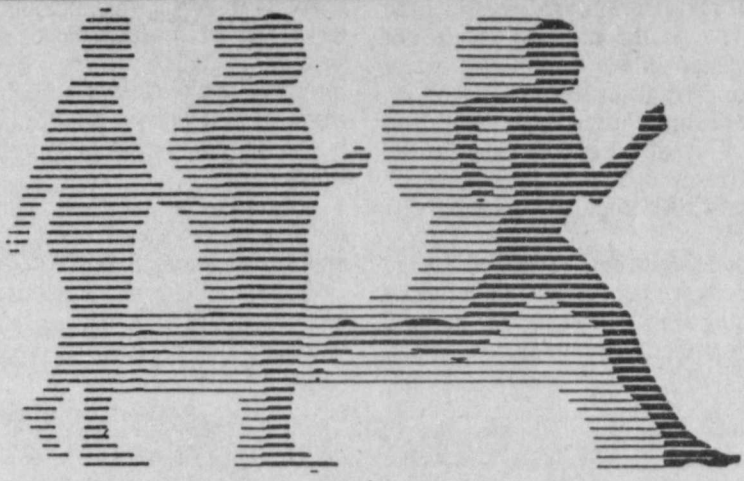
