Late Summer Rain Has Kept Area From Some Drought Woes

From the KickingHorse River in Alberta to the Guadalupe near San Antonio, there's a world of difference.

Against the advice of an expert, I persuaded Thomas and friends Dicky and Jayne King to make our annual Labor Day trip a trek down to the Guadalupe for rafting.

I knew good and well there weren't going to be any big rapids, or major whitewater, but thought it would be good experience.

It was, in more ways than one! It's a long drive down, but the view from our little deck made up for it. The Guadalupe winds through the Texas hill country in pristine beauty, surrounded by cliffs of limestone, live oak and pecan trees and blessed with clear water.

We began our Guadalupe raft trip with a lot less ceremony than our Canadian one...no wet suits, no instructions, just a zip-bagged map and "have fun".

We toted our raft down to the water's edge, pitched it in and began to paddle. Our first little rapid we maneuvered through quite well...what with hollering to "paddle on the left, backpaddle, now straight forward" we zipped right on through. There really isn't much difference between the front of a raft and the back, after all, so the fact we went over backwards is of little consequence!

We saw lots of wild life that day. Not the four legged kind, however. As the day progressed the tubers appeared. Tubers are the most common folks on the Guadalupe. A tuber down there isn't a root vegetable. Usually, but not always, a tuber is a student from one of the several universities in the area.

They float on inner tubes with no other power than the current and their hands, down the icy water for hours, usually in groups of four or five, occasionally in a tube-cluster of twenty or so.

These kids all had one thing in common...that was an ice chest wedged in a separate inner tube, and inside the ice chest was a liberal supply of some form of alcoholic beverage. In case they didn't bring enough, "food alley" had stops for them to resupply themselves!

By the middle of the afternoon they were...How to put this delicately?...soused. That's the only word for it. They were still cheerful, polite, courteous and no problem to anyone except themselves. They gave vent to gails of laughter and an occasional howl or "YeeHa", but other than that continued merrily on their way.

Late in the afternoon they began to sing. Surprisingly, they sang quite well.

The songs ranged from chants, to current favorites, but were mostly fraternity or sorority songs. Sometimes indelicate, sometimes poignant, they echoed up and down the river in astonishing harmony!

After our own five hour trip we headed back to the cabin, avoiding driving after dark on the simple principal that all those people who had spent their day drinking had gotten the river and into a vehicle! The roads down in that neck of the woods are narrow and twisting, and we didn't want any part of that.

The next morning we tried inflatable canoes and tiny rafts instead of a single big raft.

One of the young men working at the raft company helped us carry the things down the hill to the water.

Now Dicky and Jayne spent five years at the University of Texas, and we were talking about the singing we had heard the day before.

Dicky made the comment to the young man that "I don't remember any of those songs while we were at the university". Cheerfully, the boy lied "Well, I guess that really makes you an old turkey, right?"

Without further ado he deposited his end of the canoe and trotted up the hill with a wave!

We learned a lot that day, we managed the little rapids with more skill than 99 percent of the people on the river.

We gave tows to exhausted tubers, pulled a few rafts off the rocks in shallow water, and had to be towed off once or twice ourselves. We

only 14 inches, while the entire mid-western states have to count corn, almost their only crop, a total loss.

July was the wettest one on recent record, with weekly to bi-weekly thunderstorms sweeping the Northeastern portion of Texas. If one missed, in a few days another would usually "hit", providing much-needed moisture to crops and hay, reservoirs and timber.

A hay crop disastrously short the first cutting has been boosted locally by the late July and August rains. This should help alleviate some of the shortage, but by no means, all. Again, this has been a local advantage for Northeast Texas.

Cattle prices, which would have dropped locally as they have in dryer areas, have remained high because of the late rains.

Pasture which was short has managed to recuperate some due to the abundance of moisture.

Several days of solid-gray skies and slow rain gave the appearance of fall weather, too. These areas covered most of the eastern half of the state, while the western portion of the state remained dry, as did the southern portion.

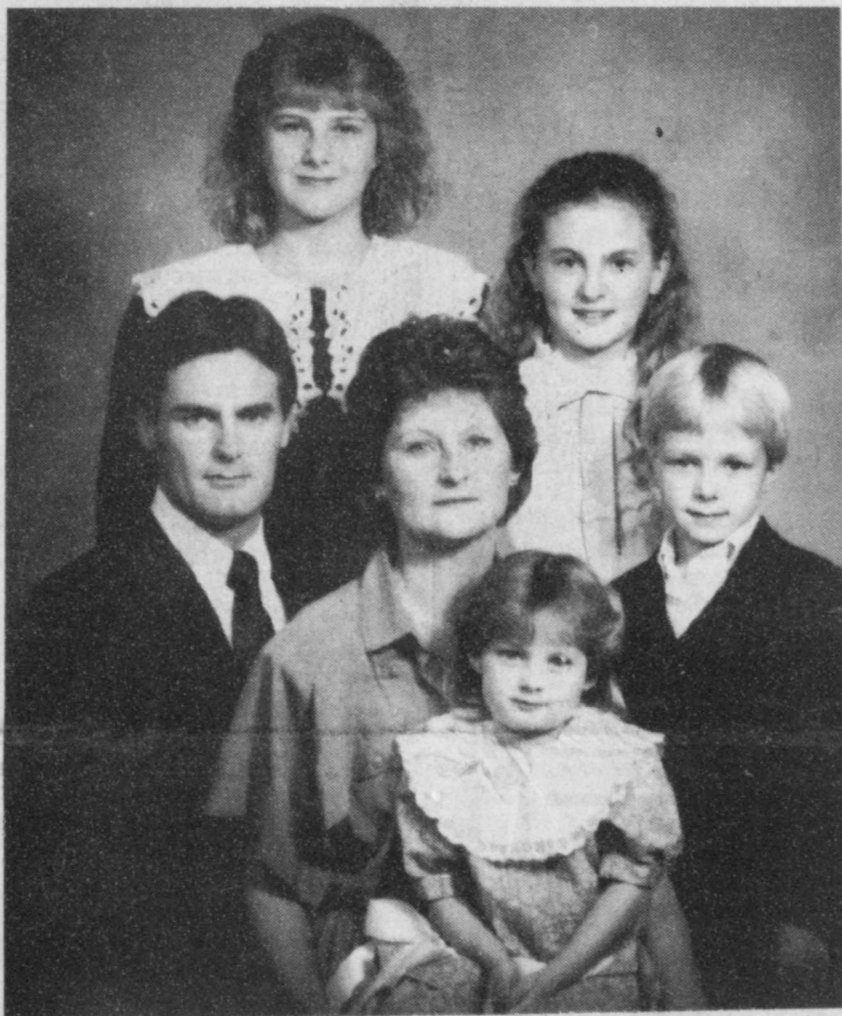
Soybeans and milo were light in weight because of the early drought,

but would have been much worse without the late rains.

Cotton, generally, is looking good. The later cotton is actually better than the early cotton, since earlier cotton lost much of its blooms.

Cooler weather has been providing welcome relief from the heat, and it is doubtful that this summer will furnish 100° temperatures again.

Cotton farmers, right in the middle of stripping their crops, hope now for a dry spell in which to harvest.

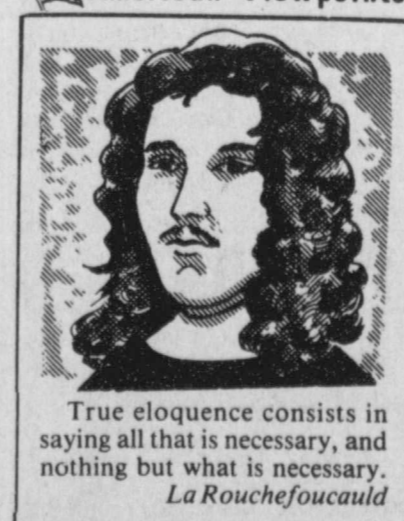

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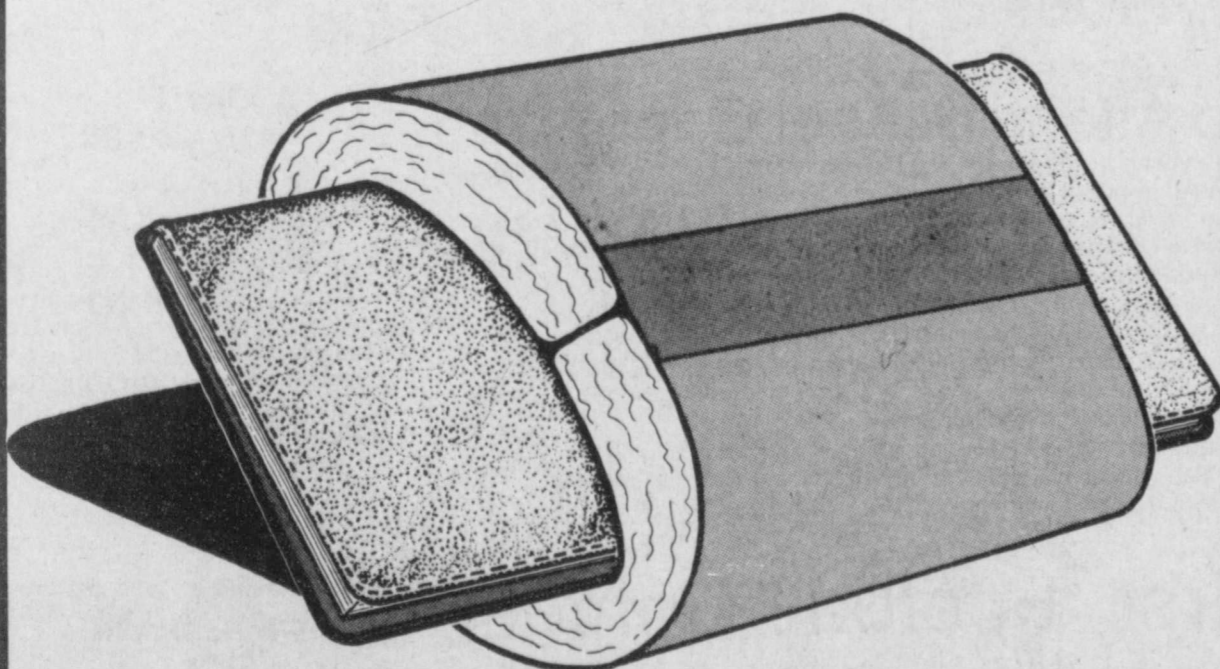
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Rebels Drop Game To Prairiland, 9-7

Sometimes a team can get too pumped up for a game. The Rivercrest Rebels proved that Friday night when they won every facet of their donnybrook against Prairiland, except the one that mattered, the final score. As a result, the fighting Rebs dropped a tough 9-7 decision to the Patriots.

The Rebels dominated the entire contest, save for the second quarter. They more than doubled (265 to 126 yards) the Patriots' offensive production. Senior tailback Scooter Brown singlehandedly outgained the Patriot backfield, accounting for 133 yards on seventeen attempts. Teammate fullback Marcus Savage also averaged eight yards per carry as he rushed for 89 yards on eleven calls. The Rebels drove three quarters of the length of the field repeatedly in the second half, only to be halted shy of the promised land by either their own mistakes, or a "bend but not break" Patriot defense.

The pre-game build-up was evident in the Rebs initial possession, as they catapulted to a 69-yard drive for their only score. Led by Brown, who popped for 34 yards on the first offensive play, and the power running of Savage up the middle, the Rebels crossed the goal line at 4:49 on a three-yard keeper by quarterback

Bradley Woods. Jeremy Abshire added the point after to give the excited Rebels their short-lived lead of 7-0.

But the second quarter saw a let-down in the Rebel enthusiasm, a condition which Rebel mentor Terry Giddens described as a normal reaction. "We let them get too fired up in the pre-game," said the coach. "But don't blame the boys, that was a coaching mistake." However, the breakdown permitted the Patriots to score twice in the final two minutes of the first half, and thus secure the margin necessary for victory. The Pats scored first on a 28-yard field goal by senior Jack Kindle, with 1:31 remaining, capping a drive of 55-yards. Kindle then executed a nearly perfect on-sides kick which was recovered at the Rebel 35 by Wade Sparks. Aided by two major penalties against the Rebel defenders, quarterback Martin Babb scored on a three-yard run with only 18 seconds to play in the half. The two point conversion attempt failed.

The Rebel defense returned to their first quarter form in the second half, permitting the Patriot wishbone attack to go nowhere. And between the twenties, the Rebel offense was virtually unstoppable. But the Rebels could not convert in essential situations. Two plays illustrate the frustra-

tion of the Rebs. A fourth and seven pass attempt from Woods to Abshire with two minutes left from the Patriot 15 was bobbled. Stopping the Patriots once more, the Rebels marched from their own 13-yard line to the Patriot 16-yard line. With 13 seconds left, Woods attempted a game winning 30-yard field goal.

The solidly kicked pigskin was abruptly turned from the crossbar when senior Jack Kindle leaped skyward to block the attempt and preserve the Patriots fifth straight win over the Rebels.

"Our boys played very well, except for that second quarter," evaluated Giddens. "It was an outstanding effort for an opener on the part of both teams."

The team travels to New Diana Friday night for an 8 p.m. encounter. Giddens stated that Brown is questionable for the game, having suffered a toe injury last week. He also said that the defensive scheme will be streamlined, and the offensive strategy will be power running and ball control against the Class AA foe.
