1200 PEOPLE ATTEND





The fields have all been gone over by experts and the off brand stalks pulled out, to insure the purity of these seed. The farmers who are raising this cotton are more than satisfied with the yield as it is standing the drouth beter than the ordinary varieties.





Japanese Deity Whose Favor Naturally is Sought.

Worshipers at His Shrine, However, Are Comparatively Few Considering His Reputed Powers.

Japan's "Seven Gods of Good Luck" are a clan of deities from which phiborrowed much of their origin.

They are a queer set of deities, swept together from many incongruous sources - Japanese Shintoism, Chinese Taoism, Indian Bushlbism and Brahmanism. Orientals all, but cosmopolitan Orientals:

They comprise, to give them their Faburopuju, Bashamon, Jurijin and Hotel.

A full discussion of their origin and attributes would doubtless reveal how slender a basis the modern popularity of these divinities has been reared on, Their union in one group is the result of nothing more recondite than popular ignorance and confusion of ideas. They themselves never chose ideal state, for they have no king or even spokesman among them. Collectively they command perennial, perpetual and everlasting interest. Individually they celebrate their own festivals and each can boast of an entirely different group in his train of dev-

On Dalkoku's birthday a few of his disciples will worship at his shrine at Azabu and in Osaka. It seems so strange to say "a few," for of all the gods in the cycle of Japanese mythology, in this material age. Daikoku, the god of wealth, should find greatest favor! Dalkoku is a Hindu and a Buddhist. The word "Dalkoku" means "great blackness," and when he first came to Japan he was a god of physique and frightful aspect with a face as black as night. Since his naturalization Daikoku has thrown off some of his native characteristics and has adopted a new mode of living, the chief of his

In the old records this god was represented carrying a large bag on his shoulders. As there is a similarity ogy, in this material age, Daikoku, the Japanese people somehow mixed up the two characters and molded them and Mrs. Bruce Bryant of Austin. into one perfect delty who combines the good points of both. Makhala (Sanscrit) was the original name by which he was known in India, where he was feared as god of destruction. His immigration to Japan has changed

He stands or sits on three bales of rice, having in one hand the usudenokozuchi or the lucky hammer from which he can produce anything in the world he chooses to, from a palace down to gold or silver, man or beast! He carries on his back a bag full of treasures of all sorts, while rats are his earthly messengers and oftentimes he is represented with one on either side of him, waiting to do his bidding

Daikoku is generally coupled with Ebisu, the god of tradesmen. Though they are of totally different birth. race, religion, etc., they have been linked together and one seldom sees the one without the other in close propinquity. Although Diakoku is not a god to whose shrine worshipers flock, his popularity is told by the number of metallic images of his divinity which are bought and carried as amulets by people seeking wealth.

Shall we test this jovial little man's powers? Go to his shrine and beseech him to command a shower of gold, or carry his image in our pocket and see if we find it gold-lined by night?

Futhermore, the average test on Kanred was 1 % pounds better than the average of the other varities. On the fourteen farms considered Kanred had an average test of 59 1-2. The other wheats grown on these same farmes had an average test of 57 3-4. The average yield for Kanred is 16 6-10 bushels. This is the average for 874 neres on fourteen different farms. The average yields of other varities on these same farms was 11.4 bushels for an acreage of 1229 4eres, the difference being 7.2 bushels

Kanred Beats Turkey Red

In order to be entirely fair in comparing Kanred with other varities it is well to notice a comparison of two hard winter varieties. On five farms where Kanred and Turkey Red were both grown the Kanred averaged 23.8 bushels and the Turkey Red averaged 13 bushels, or 10.8 bushels less than Kanred. Kanred tested 60 1-2 and Turkey Red tested 59 1-3. There was 281 aceres of Kanred and 484 acres of Turkey Red on the five farms. These men lost about 11 bushels per acre by not having their entire crop in Kanred. Farmers who grew two varities of wheat on the same conditions may figure out their loss this year according to the yield they made from the varities grown.

Do Not Expect Too Much

In thi sarticle and in previous articles the figures on yields and tests have been given as reported in writing by the growers themselves. It is not hear say and for that reason much confidence is placed in reported yields. However, wheat growers should not expect in the future such large increase over other varities as we have had this year. The average increase in other states over large areas, the past few years, has run about 3 to 4 bushels more per acre. The writer never has claimed more than four bushels increase on the average yet this year the increase is nearly double that figure. This very favorable increase is probably due to the unusually hard conditions under which the wheat crop!


