Possible Rabies Case In Talco

Last Wednesday afternoon around 3 p.m., Gary Carroll killed what may have been a rabid skunk.

Carroll reported the skunk chased his dog onto his porch and chased him when he tried to shoot it. When he finally got it to chase him away from his home, he shot it and called the Mt. Pleasant Police Department. No one came to pick the skunk up for testing.

Carroll reported this is the second

skunk he has killed in the past month in daylight hours, although the one he shot three weeks ago didn't act sick. "If a baby had come across this skunk, I have no doubt it would have been attacked," Carroll said.

Everyone is encouraged to be on the lookout for sick animals. It is not confirmed the skunk was rabid, but few wild animals react as this one did, unless it is ill.

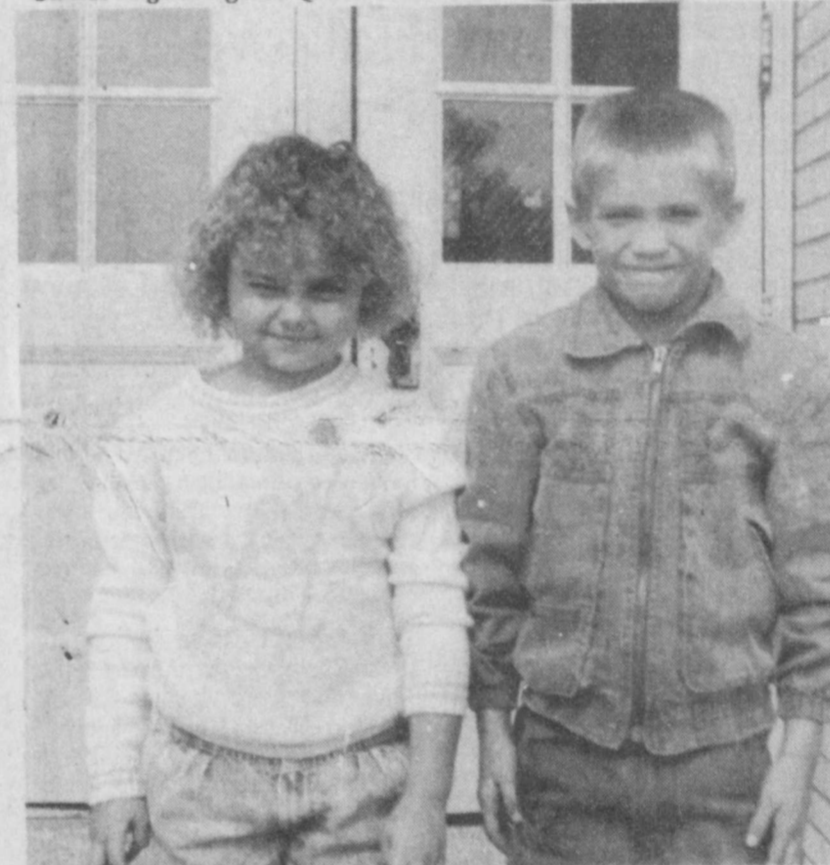

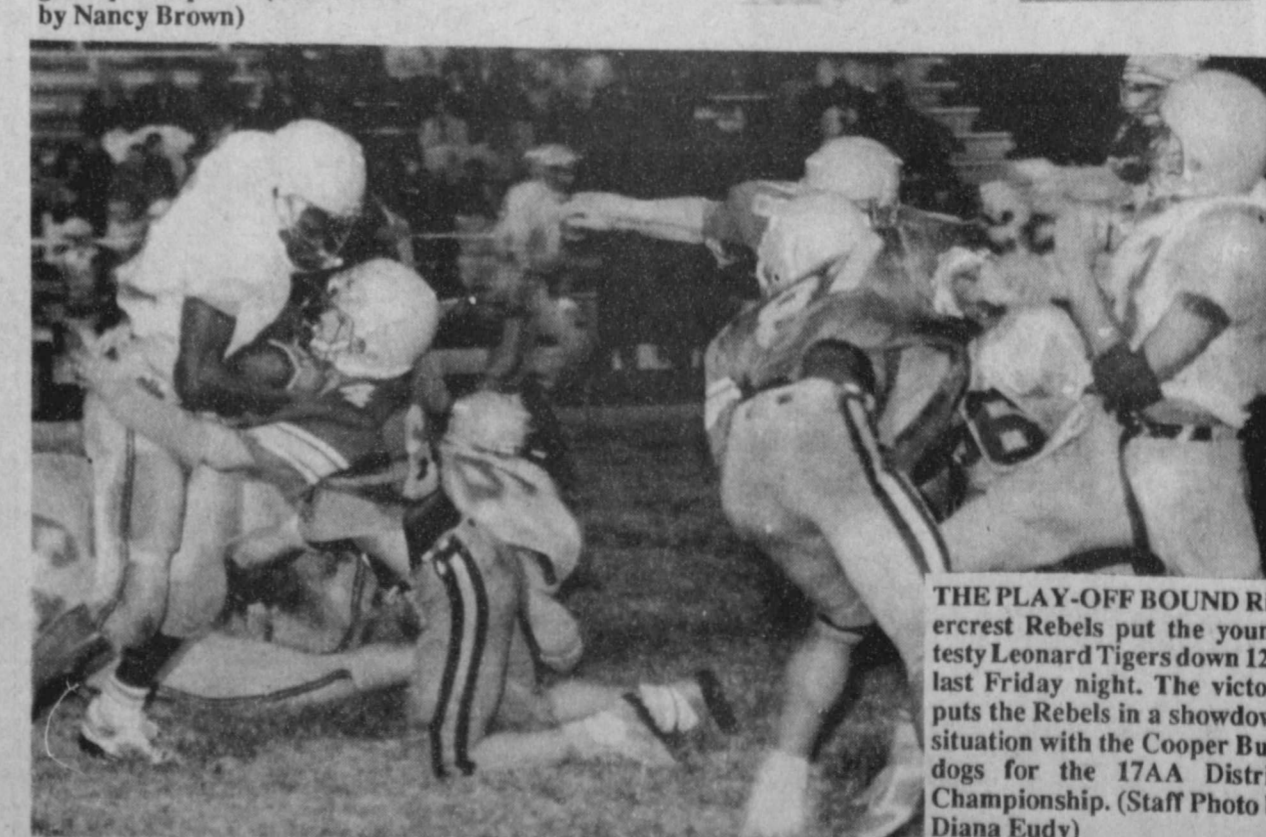

Rivercrest Is Playoff Bound!

The Rivercrest Rebels will enjoy post season play in 1988 as the re-

ward of their nail-biting 12-6 victory over the young but testy Leonard Tigers Friday night. The win assures

the late blooming Rebel squad, who have four straight District 17AA encounters under their belts after going 0-5 early on, the runner-up spot in the loop. The Rebels will face an awesome Cooper Bulldog squad, ranked number seven in the Texas schoolboy polls, but with an identical 4-0 district record for the championship next Friday night in Rebel Stadium.

The outcome of the Leonard contest was in jeopardy until the final minute. The Rebels, unable to advance the ball on the wet turf, went overhead to secure their two touchdowns. On the other hand, the Tigers, behind the running of Shawn Wilkerson (83 yards), Jim McIntosh (56 yards) and quarterback Judd Marshall (53 yards) controlled the flow of the game throughout. It was the Rebel defense coupled with untimely errors by Leonard that secured the win for Terry Tiddens squad. The defensive charts credited Craig Easley with seven tackles or assists, Jimmy Lewis with five and Woods with at least four. After a give and take first quarter which included an exchange of fumbles due to the wet conditions, the Tigers drew first blood midway in the second quarter. McIntosh capped a 43-yard march with a five yard explosion into the Rebel endzone. The key play of the drive was a fourth and inches advance by Wilkerson, good for the first down at the Rebel 34, by only the nose of the ball. In fact, the Rebel defense forced five fourth down attempts by the Tigs. Electing to go for the two-point conversion, coach Lynn Marshall's play was stopped short of the goal line when Wilkerson was smothered by the Rebel defensive line. At the 5:07 mark, Leonard led 6-0.

The Rebels used little of the clock to retaliate. On the first play following the kick-off, quarterback Bradley Woods lobbed a pass to split end Clint Tidwell on the right sideline for the completion. Tidwell fired the afterburners to spring down the sidelines for 87-yards and the score. David Stansell's go ahead point after attempt was wide left, but in 24 seconds, the Rebels had tied the score.

The Rebels passing attack was in sync, as Woods completed four of eight for 105 yards and both touchdowns.

The second came in the third quarter, following an exceptional Rebel defensive stand. The Tigers faced a third down and a half a foot from their own 40, when Chad Parish and Shane Beers stopped Wilkerson cold. With

only the nose of the football needed for the first down, the Tigers went for it. This time the entire Rebel defensive line shut down Marshall's sneak attempt. The Rebels took over at the Tiger 40. It took but one play for them to score the go ahead, and what would prove to be the decisive touchdown. Woods found wingback Jimmy Lewis on a quick pass across the middle, and Lewis ran untouched through the Tiger secondary, the two point conversion was missed, but with 8:22 left, the Rebels led 12-6.

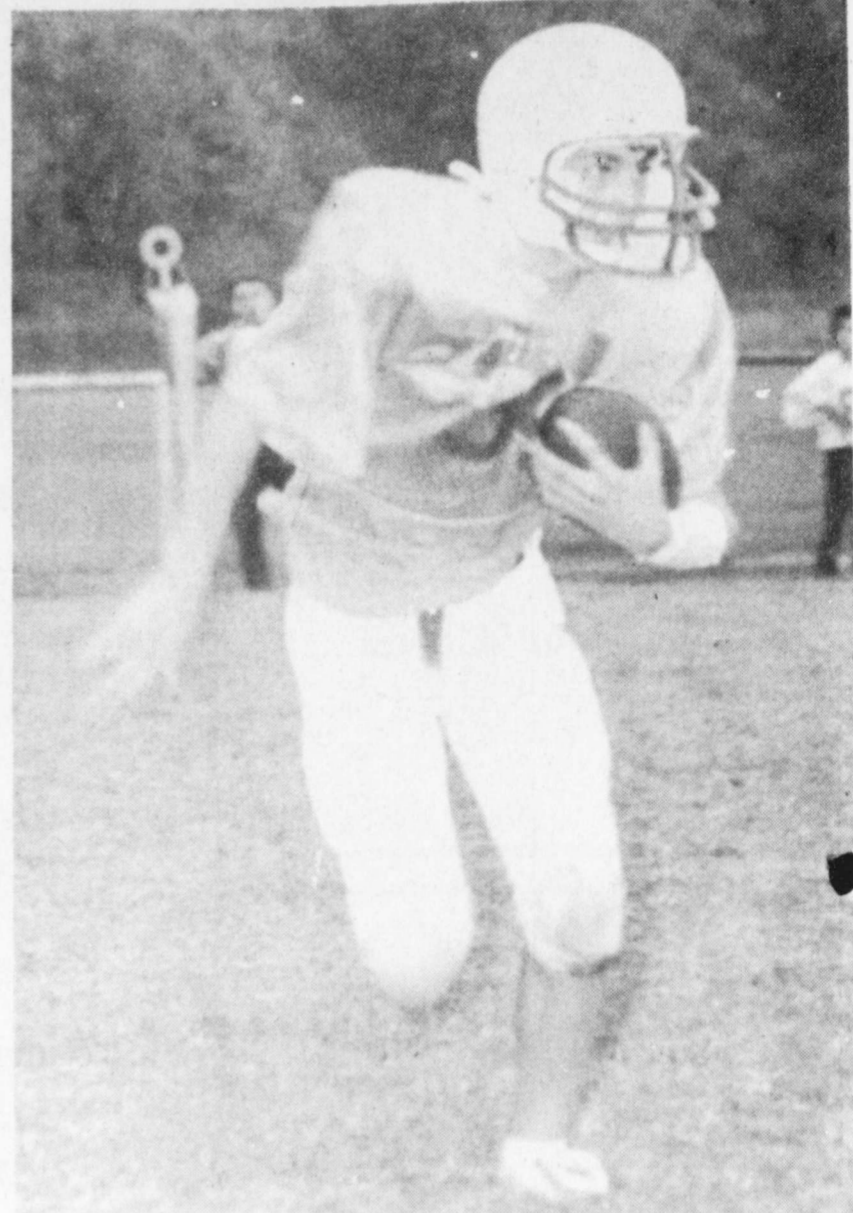
At this point, the youthful Tigers inexperience began to manifest itself, starting at their own 46, the Tigers steadily moved toward the Rebel endzone. Confronted with third and thirteen following a four yard loss, the result of linebackers Woods and Eric Cabell's tackle of Wilkerson, Marshall found Bax Kegans at the four yard line for an apparent first and goal. But a Leonard Tiger was guilty of clipping, wiping out the advance and thwarting the drive.

Twice more in the fourth quarter, the Tigers saw long gains on punt returns negated by clipping penalties. First, running back Herbert Phillips returned a Woods punt 50 yards into the endzone, then midway in the final stanza, a 42-yard ramble to the Rebel seven was erased for the same reason.

The final stake in the Tigers' heart came with only 1:21 left to play. The game Rebel defense had been on the field most of the night. The Tigers were driving for the decisive score. On first down, their 13th of the game, Marshall lofted a pass from the Rebel 31 to Kegans at the seven. The near perfect toss was tipped, not once but twice by leaping Rebel cornerback Justin Roach, who then made the game saving interception while flat on his back, to preserve the Rebel win.

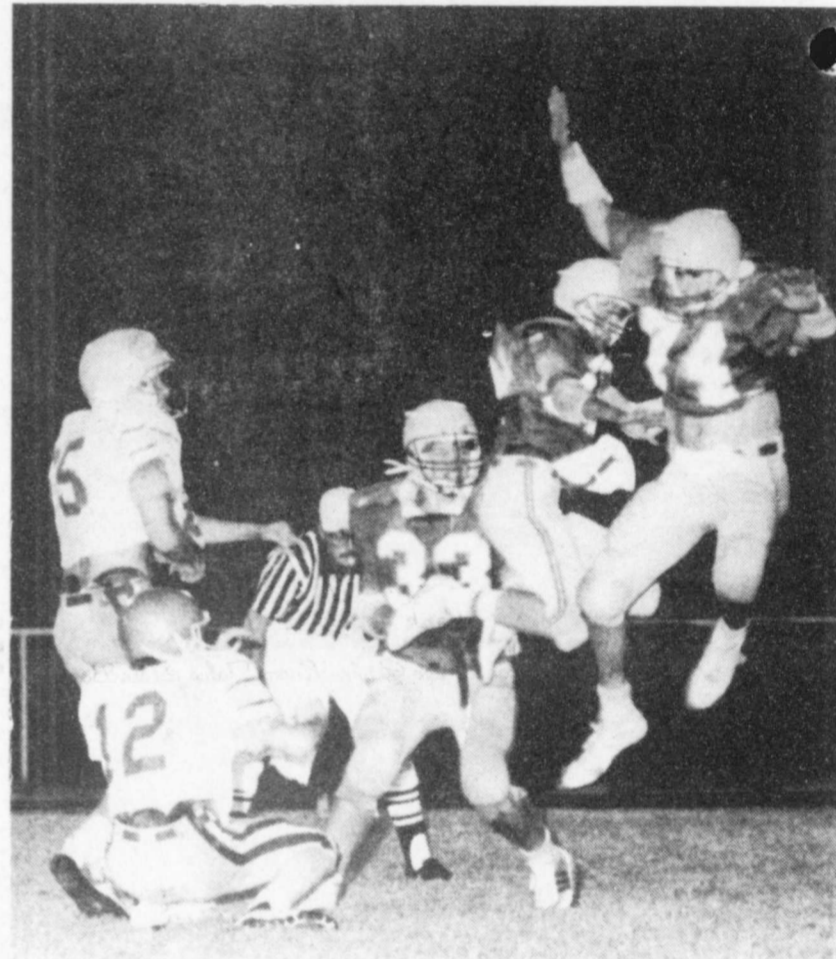
The Rebels then proceeded to run out the clock, although the Tigers gave them a scare on the last play. On the snap, the ball was bobbled, and recovered by the Tigers at the Rebel two; however, the Tigers were flagged for being offside, the ball was given back to the Rebels, who watched the final two seconds elapse before bursting into celebration, which included the water-dousing of a jubilant Coach Giddens.

"The team dedicated themselves at the start of two-a-days to reach the playoffs," said Giddens. "Although they became discouraged at first, they continued their quest. Now they have obtained their objectives."

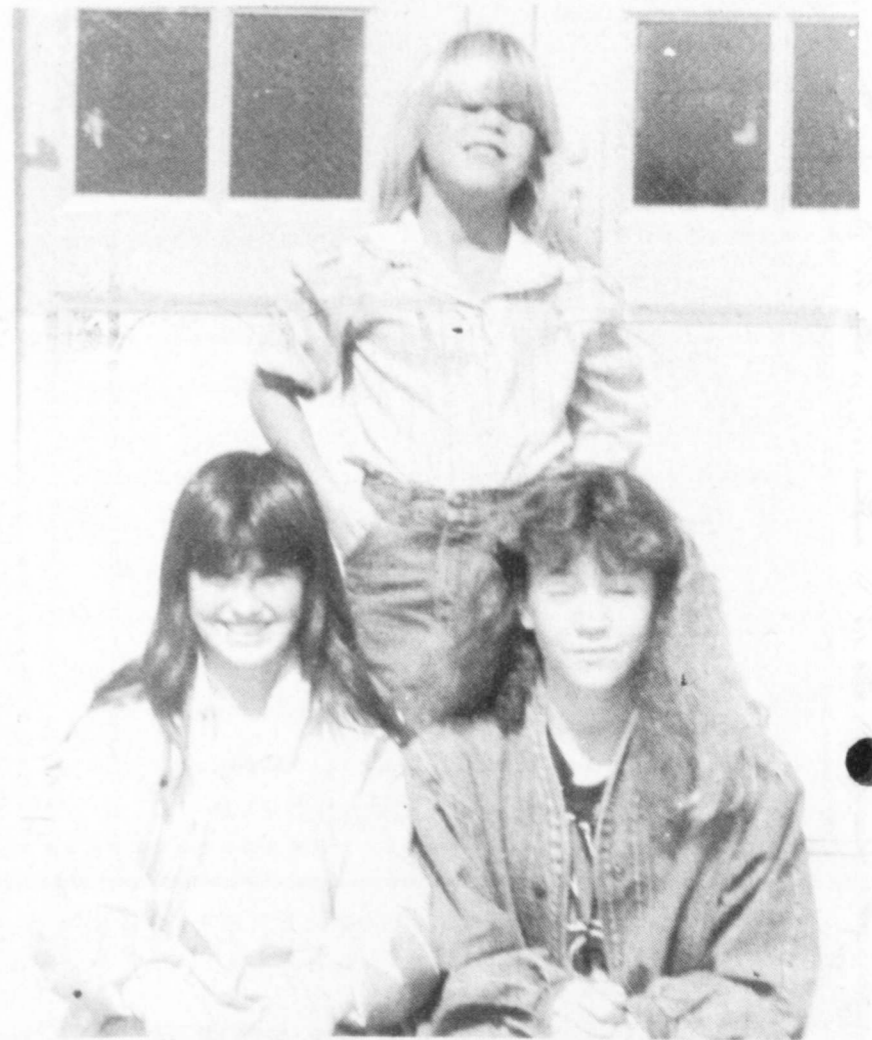

Farm Loans For Disadvantaged

The Farmers Home Administration is preparing to activate a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming. J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, said today.

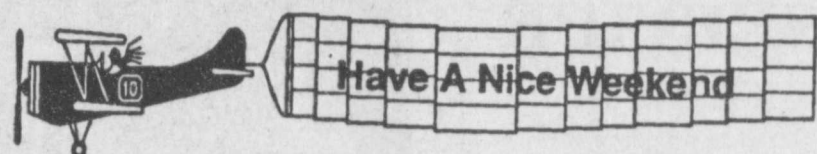
Under the new program, FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency would also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if any are available in that county, Futch said.

FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

The new program was included in the agricultural credit act signed earlier this year, Futch said, and funds have been reserved for farm purchases based on the population of socially disadvantaged persons.

The population of such persons range from as low as one percent in some New England and midwestern states to highs of 68 percent in Hawaii, 57 percent in New Mexico, and somewhat lower percentages in southeastern states. Population groups involved are Hispanics, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Persons who think they might be eligible and who are farming or who would like to become farmers are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office serving their area, Futch said.

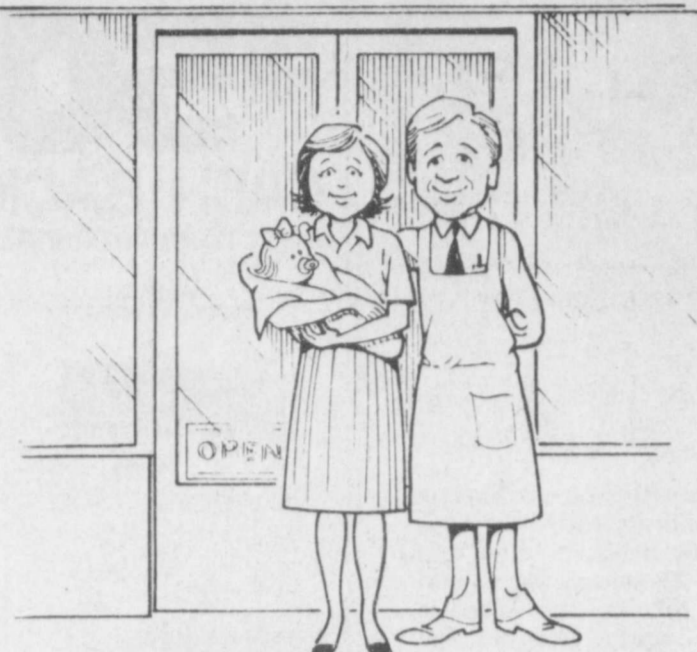

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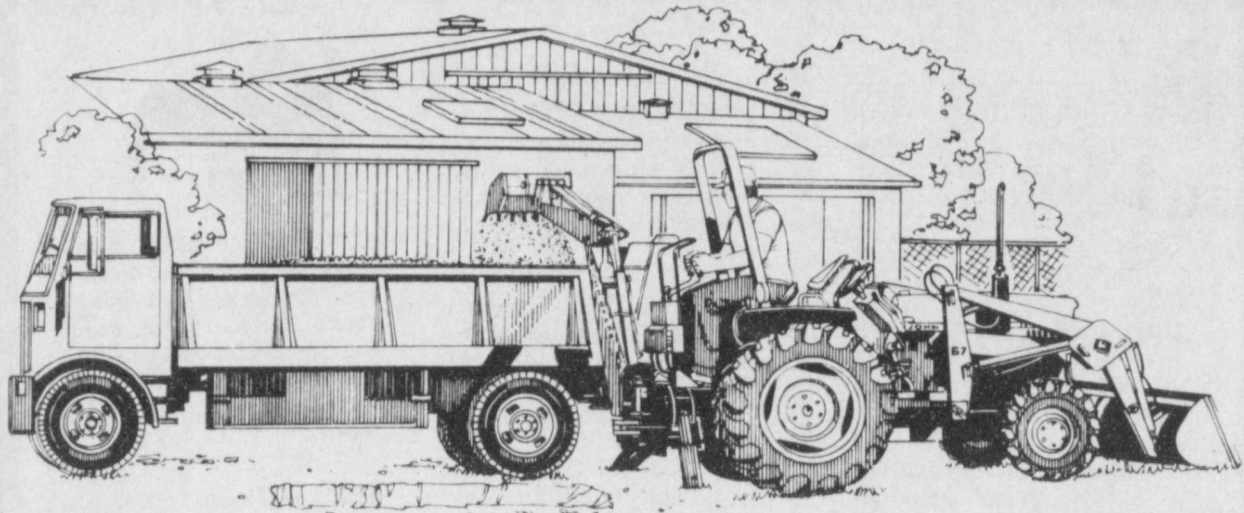

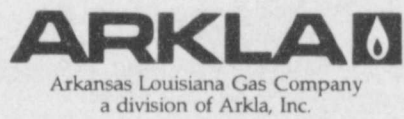
