Have You Seen Them In Action?

We all appreciate our volunteer firemen, right? Or do we? Do we really appreciate the thin line they form between us and disaster?

Unless you've watched them in action repeatedly, or even been a part of some of that action, you just can't appreciate what these people do.

Have you seen firefighters entering blazing buildings with only an air pack between themselves and asphyxiation, wielding a hose and desperately trying to make sure that an elderly person isn't still within the confines of the blazing structure?

Have you seen them on their hands and knees, vomiting and gasping for air after suffering smoke inhalation.

Have you seen them overcome by heat, pouring sweat, faces flushed as red as the flames they fight, on a 100 degree day, battling a house fire? Or beating at a tearing line of flames, higher than their head, with rubber paddles because the terrain is too rough for a truck?

Have you seen them trying to get a hose hooked up when the water is freezing to ice faster than it can run?

Have you seen them inadequately dressed, with ice on their eye brows and a wind whipping the flames they are trying to tame, at 2 in the morning?

But there's another aspect of the volunteer fire fighter that doesn't deal with flames.

Have you seen them time after time at wrecks and accidents, working rapidly to free someone from the twisted wreckage of a vehicle, or hosing down flammable gasoline to prevent a fire?

Have you seen them breaking out the plastic body bag to put some poor soul into, or locating a sheet to lend dignity to someone's remains?

Have you seen them climbing down into the icy, trash-filled depths of an abandoned cistern to recover a child's body?

Or wading chest deep while they recover a long-drowned victim?

Have you seen them searching the ashes of a house for the body of a fire fatality?

Have you seen them combing woods and neighborhoods for a lost child?

Have you seen them with their hair and eyebrows singed by a butane explosion?

I've seen them doing all of that, and a whole lot more.

I've seen them comfort the dying, and those who have sustained the loss of all they own.

I've seen them pull back to the fire station to drain lines, refill tanks and make sure there is plenty of gas when all they feel like doing is crawling home for a hot bath and bed.

During twelve long years of following the red trucks I've come to

have an incredible amount of respect for these people.

They aren't professionals...oh no. No one has ever paid them a dime for their services. Many of them work shift work, and give up the time they should be sleeping to help. Many of them are local businesspeople, who cost themselves money by being away from their business.

They aren't always young, and they aren't always in tip top physical condition.

They don't always have the very best equipment to work with.

The trucks are frequently old, understaffed, and under equipped.

But they are there. Always, they are there.

We take them for granted. We don't worry that there will be no big city, tax-supported firefighters to show up at our rural or small-town fires or emergencies.

We don't have to worry, we have our own. Bogata, Blossom Cunningham, Deport, Faight, Taylortown, Talco, Detroit, Cuthand, Pattonville, the list goes on. Community fire fighting units, equipped by local donations, staffed by local people.

The next time you think about it, tell them that they aren't taken for granted, and that they do have your respect, and appreciation. It's the only pay they ever get. They don't expect that...but they are bound to appreciate it.

Talco PTO Meets

Kenison stew will be made by Nancy Brown, cornbread will be made by Mrs. Kim Stansell. Pies and cakes will be donated by parents and residents. The meal will be \$2.50 adults and \$1.50 children. Athletics took a secondary stance last week as Academics took charge. Semester exams were the primary focus, even though they were sandwiched between a pair of important district games.

The Rebelettes opened the week by facing the number three rated team in Class 2A basketball in Texas, the Honey Grove Warriorettes. Although not intimidated, the Rebelettes poor shooting in the early stages revealed their nervousness, and in the final analysis, cost them a victory as they fell 41-35.

Senior Post Amy Gladden scored all twelve of the Rebelettes first half points, and finished with a game leading 22 markers.

The Rebelettes cut the 20-12 halftime margin to a single point, 24-23, six minutes into the third quarter as low post Kristie Stansell hit for six straight points, and the Rebelette defensive play of Jerilyn Russell, Kristi Brooks and Tonya Hawkins rattled the Lady Warriors. But Rivercrest's failure to score during a four minute span in the late third and early fourth quarter allowed Honey Grove to build a 34-25 lead, which the Rebelettes could not overtake. The loss was a tough one, for the Rebelettes, although Coach Wake Wood added "Don't count our girls out, for three of the best teams in the state are in this District". His words were borne

out on Thursday night as Leonard handed Honey Grove their first district loss. The Rebelettes face Leonard, who beat them on the road earlier this month, at home next Tuesday night.

The Rebelettes took control early against Como-Pickton in Johntown Friday night, then held on for a 58-48 win. With Kristie Stansell at 19 points and Amy Gladden adding thirteen more, it appeared the Rebelettes had a cakewalk going, leading 43-19 after three periods. But C-P made a game of it scoring 29 fourth period points. Jerilyn Russell, an unheralded junior who always gives a steady performance for the Rebelettes, was the catalyst for this victory not only with her eight points, but also with her defensive rebounding and ball hawking. The Rebelette scoring was augmented by Krista Weatherall and Tonya Hawkins, the floor leader and play maker, with seven points each.

In men's varsity action, the Rebels won a pair of games to make their district Record 4-1 and knot them with Chisum, (whom they faced Tuesday night). The Rebels showed good offensive ball movement in overcoming the Warrior hex, and beating Honey Grove 72-60. The Reb win was sparked by playof Junior Kevin House, who netted twenty points in the victory, and gave his best defensive effort of the year.

But all five Rebel starters finished the game in double figures, the evidence of total team effort. Senior forward Jeremy Abshier had 17, while Post Jason Pogue finished with eleven, and guards Galen Logan and Donald Combs had 12 each. The Rebels two guard attack worked beautifully as they quickly passed to one another in search of the open man, who often would be close to the goal for an easy two-pointer. Woods called the win "the best overall effort of the season against the toughest defense we've faced."

The Rebels, exhausted perhaps from the strain of midterms, still played well enough to beat Como Pickton Friday night 62-42.

The outside shooting of Galen Logan and Jeremy Abshier gave the Rebels an early lead, as the duo sank three consecutive three pointers in the first quarter. The three point shot was an effective weapon in the game as Rivercrest hit six of eleven attempts. Abshier had sixteen points on the night to lead all players, while

Logan, a steady player, hit for eleven more.

Defensively, Jason Pogue enlivened the crowd by blocking five Eagle shots. The Eagles cut the margin to three after three quarters, 41-38, but the Rebels defense and offense snapped to attention in the finale. The defense allowed only four final period points, while the offense accounted for twentyone Rebel tallies of which Abshier had seven. Jason Lankford came off the bench in the mid point of the game to score five points in relief of a foul-plagued Abshier.

In junior Varsity action last week the Rebelstook a 49-45 decision from the Como Pickton Eaglets. The game was tied at halftime, 22 all, but Corey Gable scored 15 pions and Tony Sanders hit 9 more to give the young Rebels this win.

Have you seen the Rebels or Rebelettes in action this season? Only four home contests remain in the regular schedule, including Friday's non-district game against Celeste.

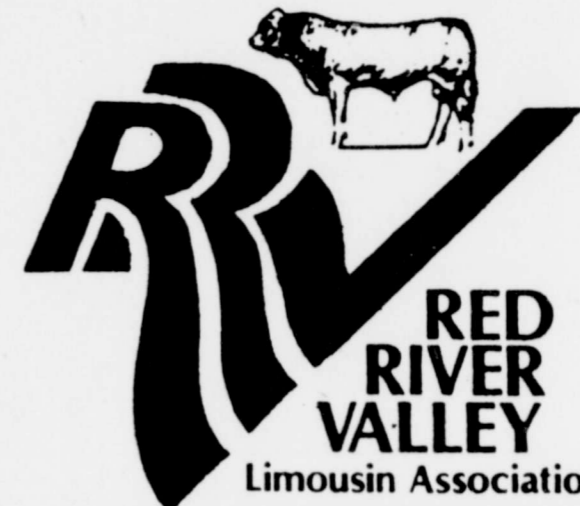

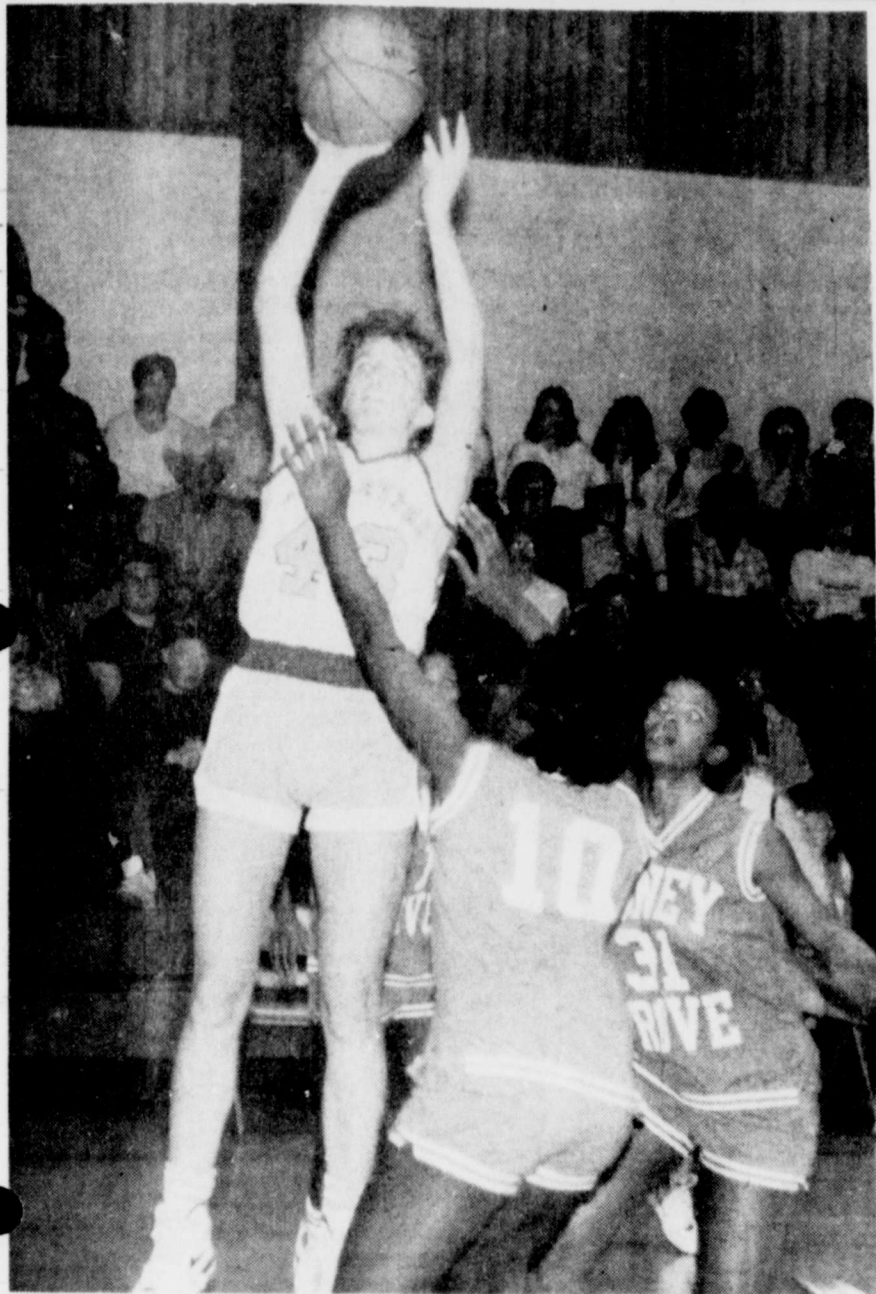

DID YOU KNOW?

As we enter a new decade, a lot of people are talking about our nation's crumbling, congested highways. Hundreds of billions of dollars must be spent, it is said, to pave over more land in order to ease highway congestion and to refurbish existing highways that were built 30 years ago to last only 20 years. Is money the only solution?

Maybe there is a better way--rail. While the nation's highways are crowded and crumbling, our rail lines are solid and underused.

Rail operations are environmentally benign in terms of energy consumption, air pollution, public safety and land use disruption.

Easing the load on highways by moving more freight by rail would cost American taxpayers nothing, because railroads own, maintain and pay taxes on their rights-of-way.

On the other hand, large trucks--the railroads' major competitors--pay as little as 50 percent of their highway cost responsibility and make no contribution to highway overhead costs. The remainder is borne by taxpayers and highway users in cars and light trucks.

One heavy truck can cause the same highway damage as 9,600 passenger cars. Drivers say it's not fair to force other vehicles to subsidize trucks.

Our federal government can eliminate this subsidy. Then, more freight would move to the nation's rails--benefiting all citizens, while costing them nothing in subsidies.

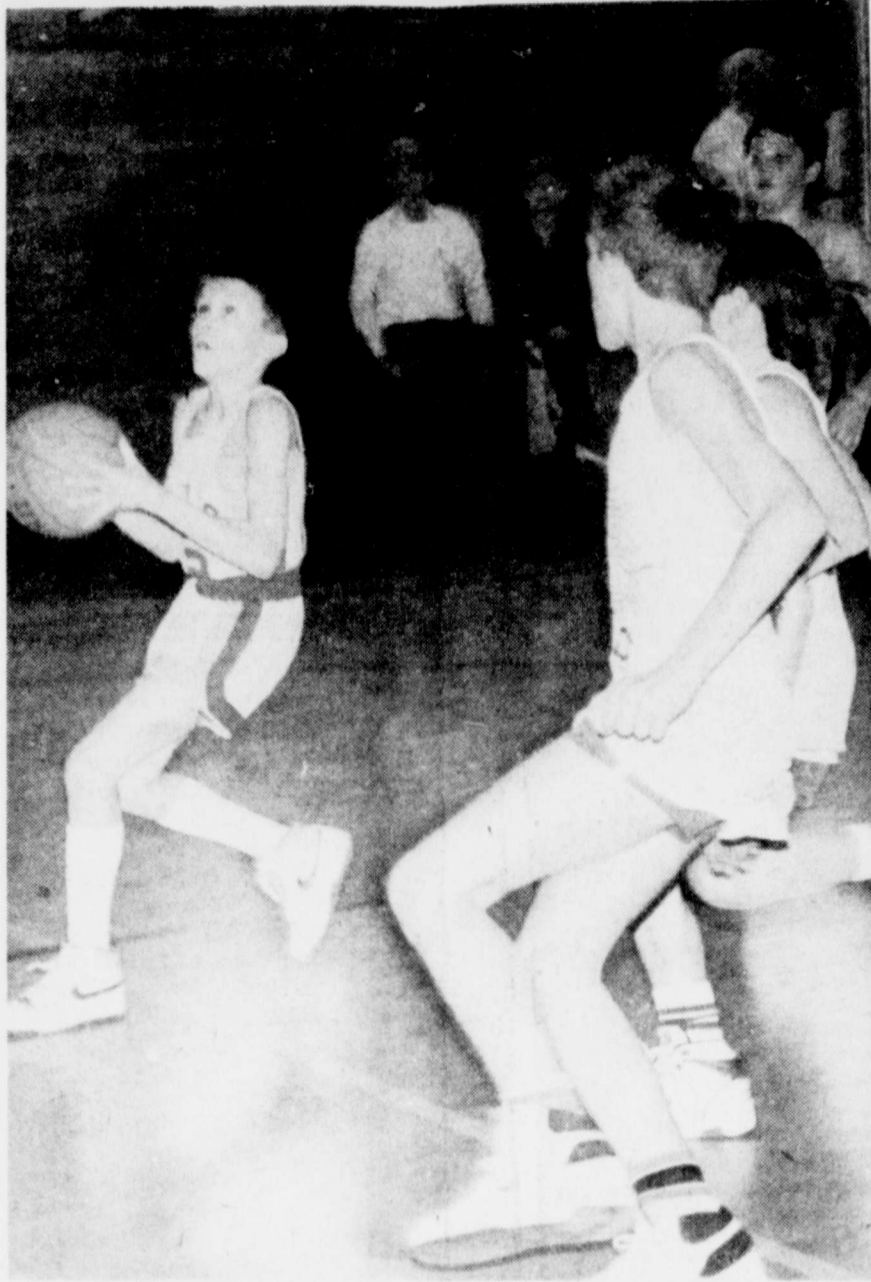

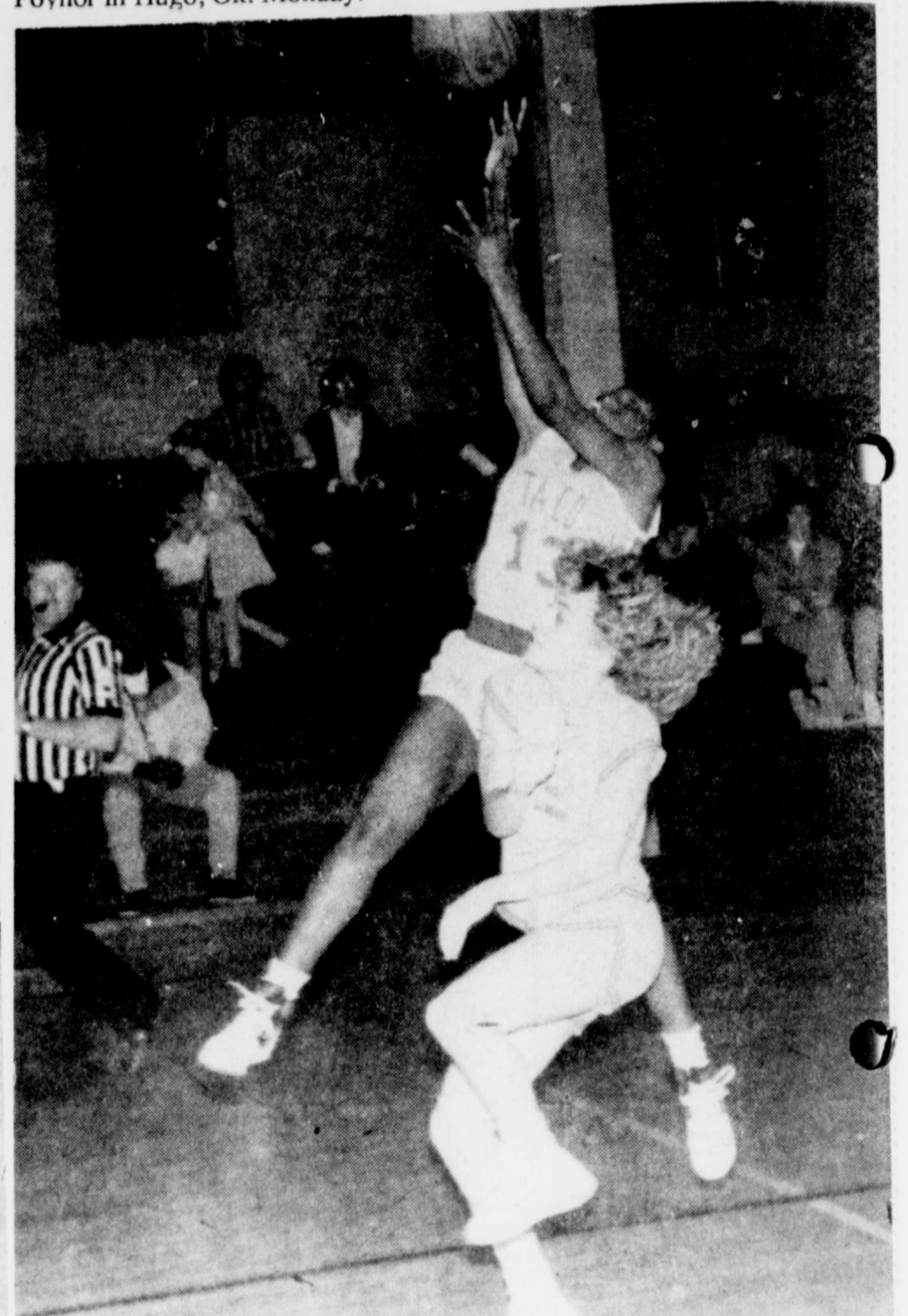
