Well, it had to happen. For years, as I worked at the part time job at the travel agency, I've heard horror stories about airports and missed flights, and lost luggage.

But, until now, it's never even come close to occurring. I suppose pride goes before a fall, for the fates looked down and decided our time had come!

When this tremendous deal on a spring bulb tour of Holland came up, it was too good to pass up. So we took off for Amsterdam in high spirits.

It fell apart rather quickly. We sat behind twenty other planes in a violent thunderstorm at Dallas Ft. Worth Airport. No problem...we were to connect with KLM at Atlanta, Georgia for our overseas flight...but we had 3 and one half hours between planes.

Finally, it was our time to take off...but instead we taxied back to maintenance with a navigational problem. We sat in the plane for three hours.

We arrived in Atlanta with 10 minutes to spare...only to find that our plane was full and we couldn't get on!

Then we discovered they had lost our bags. Then we discovered that there wouldn't be any more flights to Amsterdam for three days that weren't booked solid. About that time I suggested what we should do with the trip. Thomas said no, gritted his teeth, and we hung on.

They finally booked us on a flight to Miami, Florida, and then on to Holland on Martin Air (no, I hadn't heard of it either).

We spent the night in Atlanta, then went back to the airport to look some more for our luggage. No luck. Everyone kept saying that no way had the bags gone on ahead of us. It just doesn't happen.

Because of the danger of someone checking a bag with a bomb in it, then not getting on a flight, such things just don't go on.

Still, it was soon discovered that we had no bags in Atlanta. They wired KLM in Holland, no reply. Of course, all this time our tour group had arrived, been met, and transferred to Valkenburg while we were still in the good old U.S.A.

We decided to go without luggage. We had toothbrushes and one change of clothes in our carry-on bag, and we stood to lose all the money we had paid on the trip if we didn't go.

For some reason I asked them to reconfirm our flight out of Miami. It came back with no space available!

Soooo, they sent us to Frankfurt. When departure time came, no plane was on hand! Apparently it took them almost two hours to find that plane! Of course, that meant that when we arrived in Frankfurt, we had missed our connecting flight to Holland! We grabbed on to a nice little English girl who was sent by the airline to help us out. She loaded us on a golf cart, and we went flying through customs and immigration with Germans shouting all kinds of things and her waving our passports and continuing on! (Our passports haven't been stamped in Germany yet!)

We sat in the waiting room as they finished loading the plane for Amsterdam, praying that there would be two extra seats we could be jammed into. There were.

Soooo there we are, exhausted, dirty, late and luggageless in Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport.

We are still 160 miles away from our tour group (which by the way, was having a grand time in Belgium at the time we were going through all this). We were told the only way to get to Valkenburg, where our hotel was, was by train. Of course, there was no DIRECT train to Valkenburg.

Now we're country folks. Trains are something we have never dealt with, and it was really frightening to be running, tickets in hand, to catch a train into the city. Then, at Amsterdam Central Station, we had to find someone who spoke English well enough to tell us where the track was we

State Comptroller Says Rebates Show Healthy Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that his office sent checks totaling \$74 million in local sales tax rebates to cities and counties in Texas.

"That's a healthy increase over last April's payments and good news for the state's cities and counties," Bullock said.

Checks to cities totaled almost \$67 million, an increase of 7% over last year's total payments at this time, Bullock said.

Rebate checks to counties totaled \$7 million this month, for an increase of nearly 16% over last year's payments to this time. The increase is partly due to more counties collecting sales tax now, Bullock said.

Blossom received \$1,295.09 for

this period, indicating a 14.17% decrease over last year's payment.

Deport received no payment this period, in comparison to no payment last year at this time.

Bogata received \$1,354.57, for a 4.25% increase over last year's payment of \$1,207.10.

Clarksville received \$10,957.57, marking an 11.35% decrease over 1989.

Detroit received no payment for this period, compared to \$925.85 last year at this time.

Mt. Pleasant received \$75,285.02, a 4.90% increase over the comparable payment in 1989.

Talco received \$1,091.68, for a 1.86% increase over the payment

received last year.

This month's checks include taxes collected on February sales and reported in March by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Merchants collect the sales tax and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6% share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

School Board Election Is Set For May 5, Saturday

The Talco-Bogata Independent School District has set the general election for Saturday, May 5.

Two positions will be on the ballot for election, Trustee, Position 3; and Trustee, Position 6.

Running as incumbent for Position 3 is Eddie Brown of Talco. He will run against Earl Hale, also of

Talco. Running as incumbent for Position 6 is Buford Hervey of Jolintown. Running against Hervey will be Mary Joplin of Bogata.

Polling places will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on May 5, at the Bogata School Gymnasium and at the front door of the Talco Elementary School.

White Oak Creek Bridges To Be Replaced on C.R. 211

Final plans to replace three condemned timber bridges crossing White Oak Creek bottom on County Road 211 in northern Titus County were approved this week by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The three bridges to be replaced are located at White Oak Creek, White Oak Creek Relief and White Oak Creek Slough. They will be completely torn out and replaced with higher, wider and safer concrete structures.

"The elevation of the bridges will also be raised about five feet to help prevent flooding over the roadway,"

said Lawrence L. Jester, Jr., district engineer in Atlanta.

Concho Construction Company, Inc. of Dallas was awarded the contract for the construction with a low bid of \$1.3 million. Under the conditions of a Federal off-system bridge replacement program agreed upon by the county and Federal Highway Administration, the Federal government will pay for 80% of the construction cost and Titus County will be responsible for the remaining 20%.

Work should begin in June of this year and be completed by August, 1991, according to Jester.

Commissioners Approve Talco Deputy Constable

Titus County Commissioners approved the hiring of a deputy constable who will live in Talco and help Constable Underwood serve the increased workload of paperwork his office had taken on in the past several

months. The effective date for the new constable is May 15 and the starting salary is \$17,000 annually with \$600 per month travel pay.

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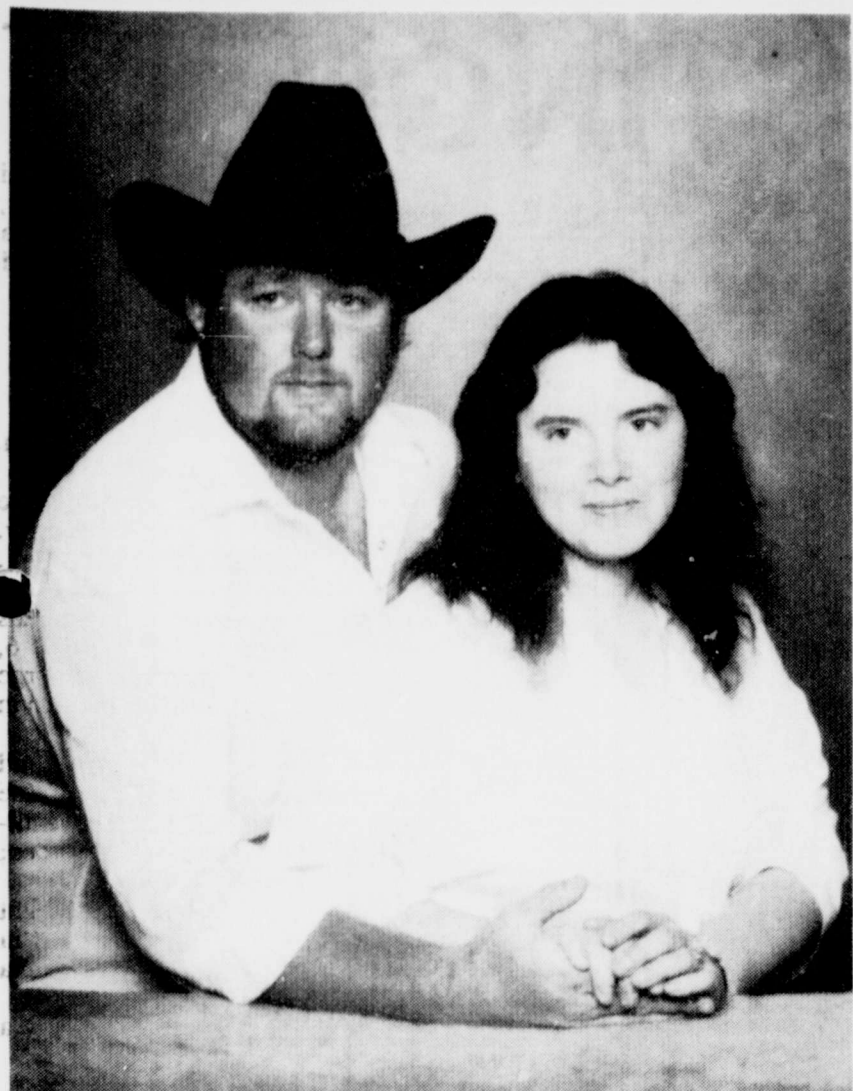

Piper-Smith Announce Engagement

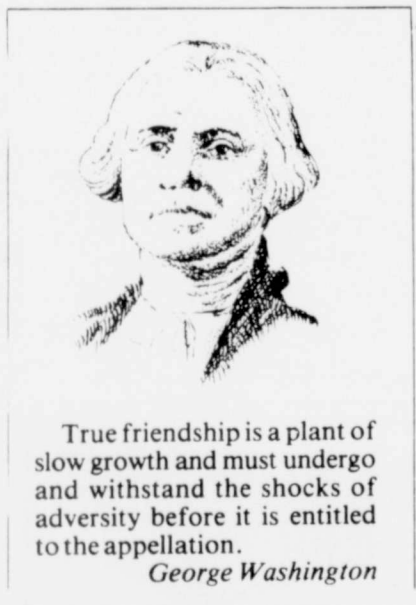

Bingo Held At Red River Haven

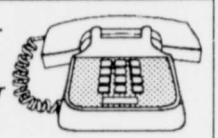

Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 163,083 customers located within the state of Texas.

scribed with "Time Out To Smell The Roses" and punch were served to the guests.

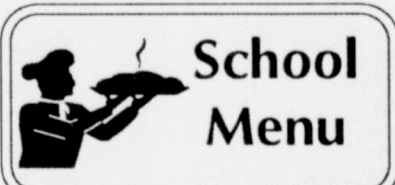

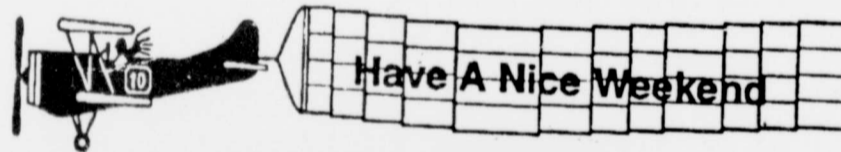

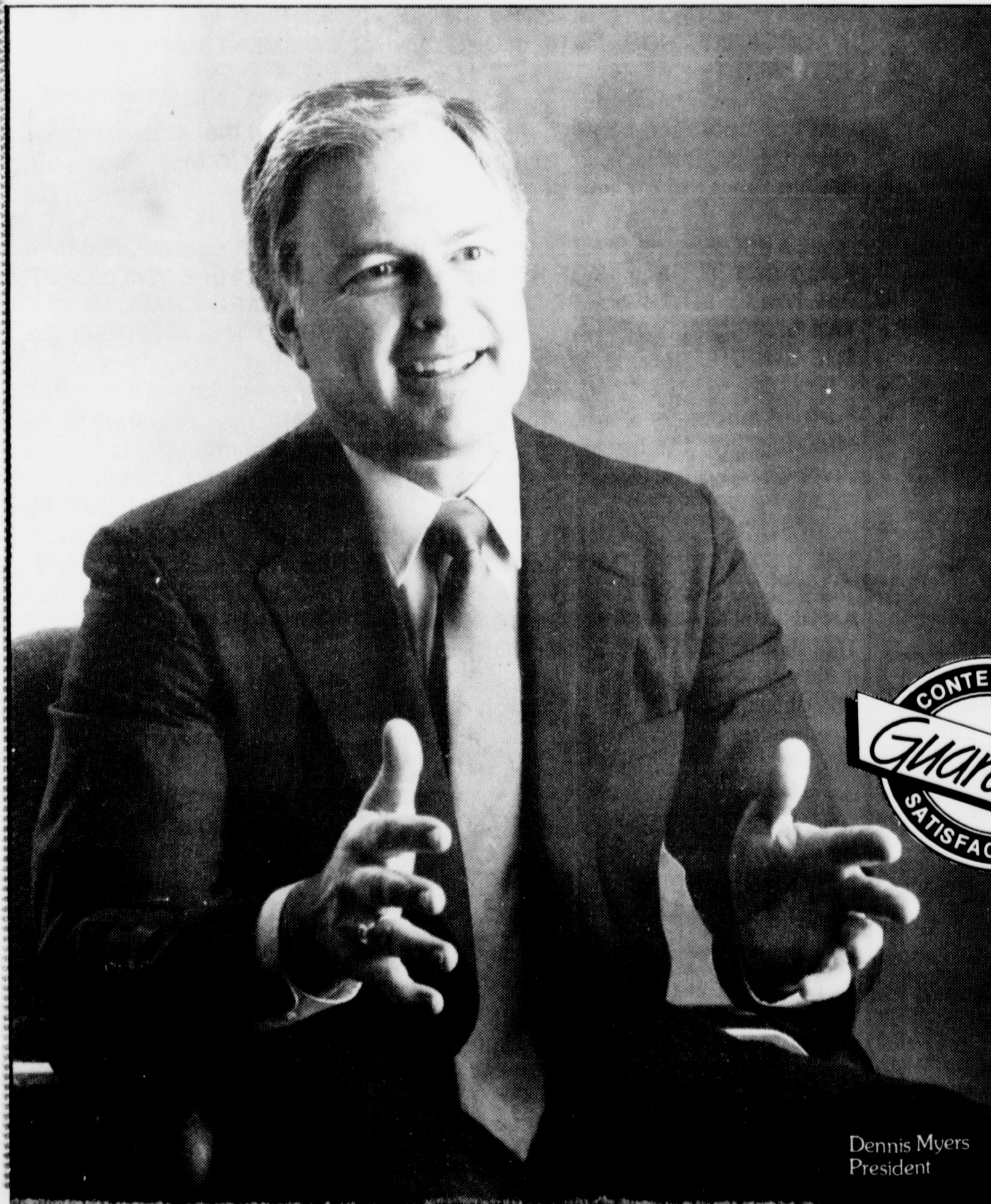

Sunday.

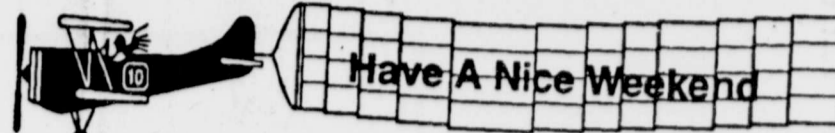
