Finally, it was our time to take off...but instead we taxiied back to maintenance with an avigational problem. We sat in the plane for three hours.

We arrived in Atlanta with 10 minutes to spare...only to find that our plane was full and we couldn't get on!

Then we discovered they had lost our bags. Then we discovered that there wouldn't be any more flights to Amsterdam for three days that weren't booked solid. About that time I suggested what we should do with the trip. Thomas said no, gritted his teeth, and we hung on.

They finally booked us on a flight to Miami, Florida, and then on to Holland on Martin Air (no. I hadn't heard of it either).

We spent the night in Atlanta, then went back to the airport to look some more for our luggage. No luck. Everyone kept saying that no way had the bags gone on ahead of us. It just doesn't happen.

Because of the danger of someone checking a bag with a bomb in it, then not getting on a flight, such things just don't go on.

Still, it was soon discovered that we had no bags in Atlanta. They wired KLM in Holland, no reply.Of course, all this time our tour group had arrived, been met, and transferred to Valkenburg while we were still in the good old U.S.A.

We decided to go without luggage. We had toothbrushes and one change of clothes in our caryon bag, andwe stood to lose all the money we had paid on the trip if we didn't go.

For some reason I asked them to reconfirm our flight out of Miami. It came back with no space available!

Soooo, they sent us to Frankfurt. When departure time came, no plane was on hand! Apparently it took them almost two hours to find that plane! to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 18, 1990. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases of \$54,879,334, or 17.00%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 1 of TNP One, the first unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, the costs of Unit 1 will be included in rate base in a three (3) step, ten (10) year phase-in plan. If adopted, the phase-in plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$43,074,934 or a 13.34% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 163,083 customers located within the state of Texas.
