Another was that it was neat and tidy looking.

Today I'm very much convinced that the latter is the real kicker...it looked neat and tidy.

Everything else on the place received it's frequent coat of paint, so why not the trees!

Like I said, it's something we don't see much anymore...but the sight of one yard was enough to bring back a flood of memories yesterday.

Watts Bait Shop Robbed

On July 5 the Watts Bait Shop in Talco was robbed, with the person or persons gaining entry through a small window at the back of the building.

\$100 or more was taken along with an undetermined amount of merchandise. A bucket with several dozen minnows and a sack with various fishing equipment was left outside the point of entry. The robbery was

interrupted when Lester Watts awoke and thinking they had accidentally left the shop light on, went out to turn it off.

Mt. Pleasant Police Department was called and anyone with information on the robbery is asked to contact them.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Well, the Bogata Rodeo has come and gone once again. For me and my family, we're glad it's over for another year. When cars began to gather, we have to become prisoners in our own home. Our children can't play outside or even look out the windows because of grown men urinating in broad daylight. We can't go anywhere because when we get home we can't get back in our driveways.

Young and old alike park in front of our home and drink alcohol and use foul language so loud we have to drown it out with noise. Each year our property is damaged or destroyed, and each year we have people parking in yard and garden, destroying it. We can't go in our house and mind our own business because we have to guard our home.

When we get up each morning during Rodeo season we have to

gather beer bottles, beer cans and trash off of our yard. These people

who are doing this damage are people who never intend to enter inside the rodeo arena. There are hundreds of people who go to the rodeo each night that never even go inside. When you call the Sheriff Department you can't get anyone out to help you. There are some young people drinking alcohol and driving and we wonder why this is allowed to happen. This past rodeo season, we had young drunk men urinating in our yard, parking across our driveways, crossing our fence and breaking it down and promising to fix it the next day and that day never came.

It seems with all the Rodeo Association takes in that they could hire law enforcements to secure the safety of the rodeo crowd and the people and property around the rodeo arena. Our rights are violated.

Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson, District Mgr. Self-employed people will find significant changes in computing their 1990 Social Security taxes. Both the Social Security tax rate and the formula used to compute the taxes changed this year.

The 1990 tax rate for self-employed people is 15.3 percent, up from 1989's 15.02 percent rate. In 1989, a 2% credit reduced the effective tax rate to 13.02%.

Beginning with the 1990 tax year, the credit has been replaced by two new deductions which reduce the tax liability for the self-employed. The new deductions are designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employers and employees are treated for tax purposes. For many

self-employed people, the result will be lower taxes than in previous years.

Internal Revenue Service Publication 505, Tax Withholdings and Estimated Tax, provides detailed information on the change in computing 1990 self-employment Social Security taxes. Contact the Internal Revenue Service for copies of this publication.

Additional information is available from your local Social Security office. You may call and ask for a copy of Factsheet Number 4, If You're Self-Employed. A representative will be glad to mail you a copy or you may come by the office and pick up a copy if you prefer.

AIDS is a disease caused by a virus that can damage your brain and destroy the body's ability to fight off immunity illness. AIDS by itself does not kill, but it allows other infections to invade the body, and these diseases can kill.

At the present time, there is no cure for AIDS, and no vaccine that can prevent the disease. Fortunately, AIDS can be prevented. It is a very serious illness, and you should know these facts:

AIDS is not spread by casual contact in schools, at parties, in swimming pools, stores or the work place.

You cannot catch AIDS by hugging, shaking hands or simply being near a person who has AIDS. No person has ever been affected by insect bites, or by sitting on a toilet seat.

There are 13 known cases of AIDS, according to Ms. Spence, in Red River County. Symptoms of the disease are: flu-like symptoms, rash, night sweats, 102 degree fever continually, swollen lymph nodes, continuous cough, diarrhea (continual).

Children think that sex is for entertainment because there is nothing for them to do. The county is the #1 county for teenage pregnancy in the state of Texas. This is a proven fact.

At the end of May, there were 136,000 people who had died of AIDS. Thirteen thousand women are known to have AIDS in Texas.

While retaining the original stand against abortion, seven legislative goals were added to work toward limiting second and third trimester abortions, those where the child could live separate from the mother, those for sex selection, those performed on young girls without their parents' knowledge, those done by incompetent practitioners or without counseling, etc. In this case, the voices of people who care were heard, but none of these laws will happen without sustained effort.

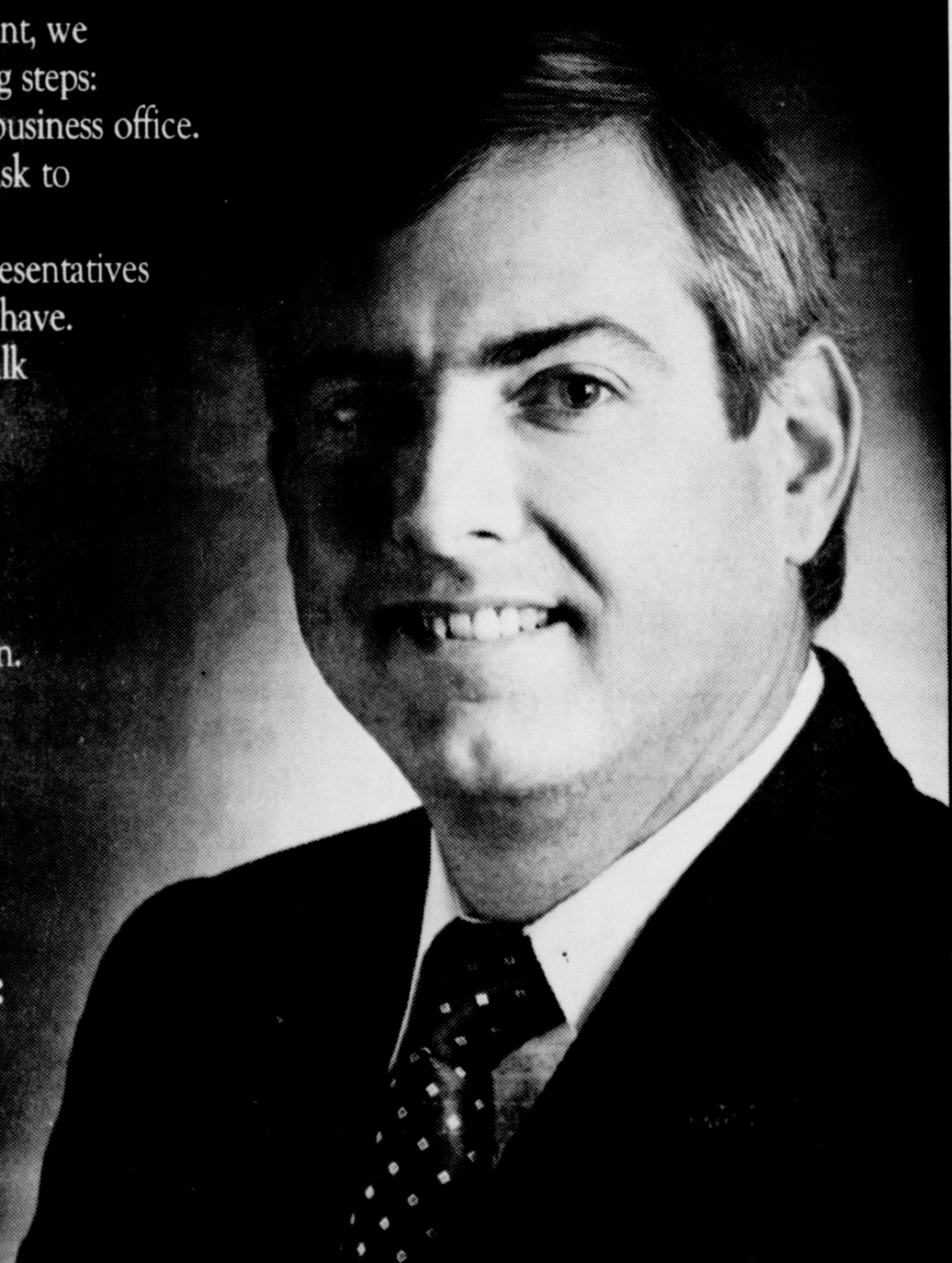

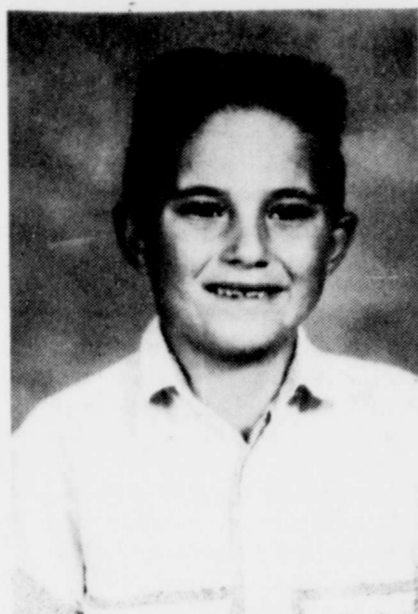

Weed Control Less Effective During Hot Weather

Chemical weed control becomes less effective during hot, dry weather, says an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Weeds are easier to kill while they are young and growing rapidly," said Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton. "Older plants have thicker, tougher leaves which make it difficult for the herbicides to penetrate."

"During hot, dry weather, plants close pores in the leaves to prevent

moisture escaping," Reeves said. "This action also makes it more difficult to get the herbicide inside the leaves. The herbicide must penetrate the leaves to be effective."

"If pastures are heavily infested with weeds, shredding this summer should remove the annual weeds," Reeves said. "Perennial plants will probably resume growth when moisture conditions become favorable again. Wait until next fall or early spring to attempt any further weed control with herbicides."

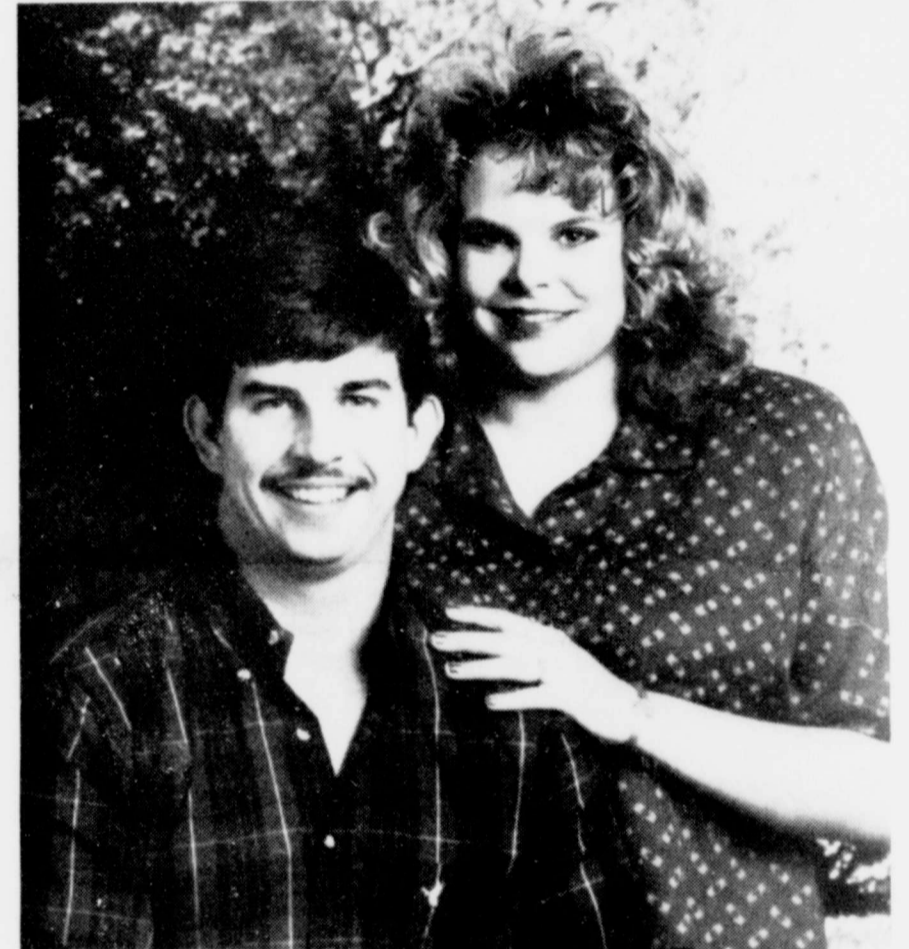

Shade Tree Management Tips Shared

By Paul D. Payne
One of the most frequently asked questions at our office each day concerns trees. And the tree with the most problems is the Oak. We seem to have problems with the Oak planted in the landscape when it is too dry, when it is too wet and when just about anything is done to the tree's environment out of the ordinary.

There are numerous things that can cause problems with our shade trees. Unfortunately, most of the tree situations can be traced back to manmade problems. I would like to share a few of my observations over the years with the hope that someone will be able to save a tree or two in their landscape.

The "no no" is never use a soil sterilant to kill vegetation in an area where the roots of your shade tree may be situated. Remember the roots

of those stately Oak trees extend way beyond the ends of the limbs. Time and time again I have looked at tree stress problems to discover that the homeowner, a neighbor or someone has used a soil sterilant to kill vegetation along a fence row, along a sidewalk or around a building. And you guessed it, the roots of the trees absorbed the chemical and sent it to the tips of the leaves.

When a tree has picked up some of these chemicals the leaves may drop off two or three times, however, a more characteristic sign is the loss of foliage from the limbs on the side of the tree where the chemical was used. It is difficult to correct this situation once this happens to the tree. It is possible for one to save the tree by

severing the roots at a safe distance back from the area treated with the chemical. One might want to dig up the treated soil and replace with fresh soil.

Another "no no" is never make abrupt changes in the depth of the roots. If top soil is needed, use a thin layer. Roots that are covered up with a concrete slab or an asphalt driveway will not survive. One may not notice any change in the tree for the first year or two, but the tree often shows death signs after a prolonged rainy season or dry weather.

Remember the tree roots need air to breathe and any practice that interferes with air movement in the soil should be avoided.
