The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at 1014 N. Jefferson in Mt. Pleasant on August 15 from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and from 1 to 3 p.m. Future clinics will be held on the first and third Wednesday of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations to be offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 18 months and 60 months. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above listed field office.

Residence Halls are scheduled to open at 10 a.m. on August 21.

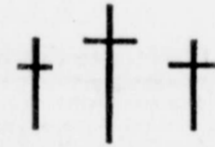

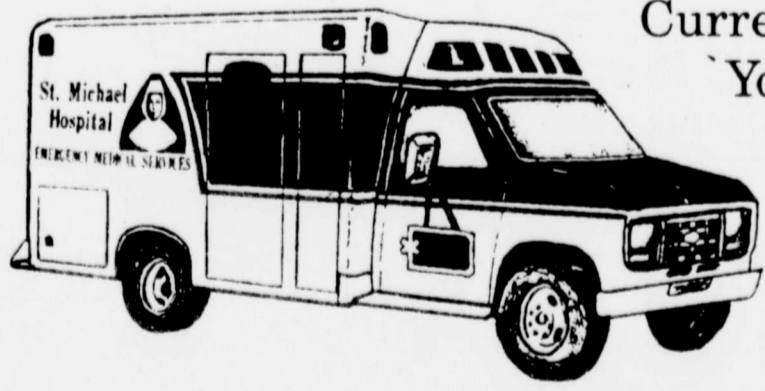

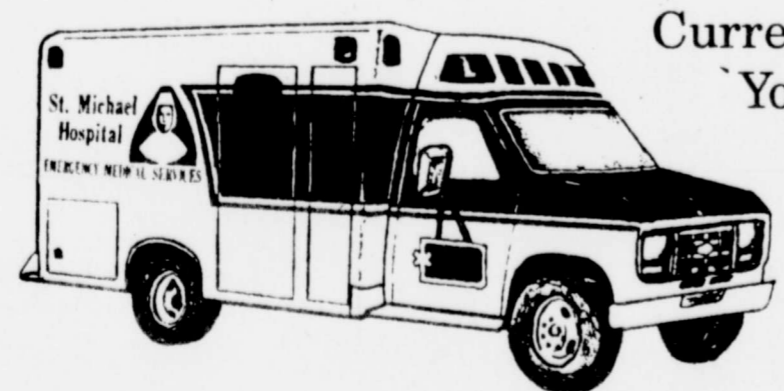

Insects Are A Threat To Pastures

Continued cool, moist conditions as experienced during the past two weeks could cause an army worm breakout in East Texas, says an Entomologist for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

"A few scattered reports of armyworms have already been received," said Dr. James Robinson, extension entomologist at the Texas A&M University Agriculture Research and Extension Center at Overton. "Producers should inspect hay meadows and pastures frequently through August and September, especially if forage and hay are in short supply."

"Small army worms, less than one-half inch in length, do not consume much forage," Robinson said. "How-

ever, large armyworms eat about 90 percent of their total diet in the last two or three days of their life cycle. This characteristic causes large losses of forage in a short time if producers are not watching their pastures close enough for armyworms."

"Some damage from grasshoppers is also occurring in East Texas," Robinson said. "Eight or more grasshoppers per square yard or three or more army worms per square foot is the general guideline for making decisions for treatment."

"Sevin is the standard pesticide for armyworm and grasshopper control in East Texas," Robinson said. "Other insecticides which are labeled for pastures include Diazinon, Malathion, and Orthene."



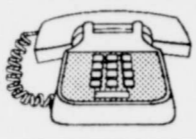
Friends and family gathered again at the Cuthand Methodist Church for the annual homecoming on July 29.


