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## Houston Calf Scramble Positions Open

Enrollment for members who wish to participate in the Houston Livestock Show Calf Scramble is coming to a close and if you fit the criteria and are interested in a possible participant slot you have until Wednesday, September 12 to sign up in our office.

To be considered for a scramble position, the Houston Calf Scramble has set a few guidelines that must be met. Some of these are: participants must have reached their 12th but not their 18th birthday as of January 1, 1991 and not be enrolled past their

junior year in high school; participant's minimum weight should not be less than 100# and be in top physical condition; member catching a calf may purchase either a registered beef or dairy heifer and must be willing to keep records and correspond with the show and sponsor for one year. Winners must also have suitable facilities for developing a registered heifer. Finally, winners must be willing to return to the show in 1991 and exhibit their heifer in the Houston show.

If you would like more information on exactly what goes on during a winner's year, feel free to check with Gina Harrington, Jimmy Metzger or Brian Payne. If you meet the specifics and would like to add your name, address and birthdate to the list to be considered, call the office before the deadline.

As of September 1 each year the Texas 4-H enrollment goes to zero. This means that each member, parent and leader must re enroll for the new year. According to the Texas 4-H

Club Managers System, this should have been done in May of this year. If for some reason you have not done so, you need to reenroll immediately.

Another stipulation of the program is that each club in Texas elect new officers and club managers each year. If your club has not done this, it should be taken care of immediately. When the new officers and managers have been elected, each club should submit a list of the newly elected officer and manager to our office. We have several clubs that we haven't received a list from and this is important to our records so please take care of this ASAP. All new club officers, county council members and club managers take office as of September 1.

The success of each club is directly related to the involvement of the managers and officers. Whether you are a 4-H veteran or a first year member, you should rely on the leadership that these folks will provide. If you have questions feel free to call us.

We bottle fed him about a month and then put him on lamb food and started letting him in the back yard. But when it became dark back into the dog pen he went which he had got attached to at the time.

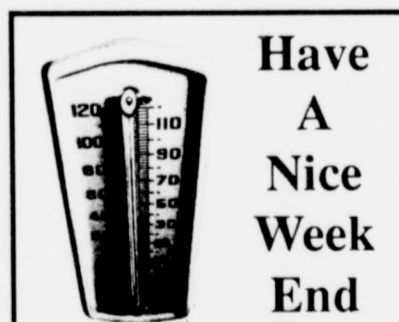
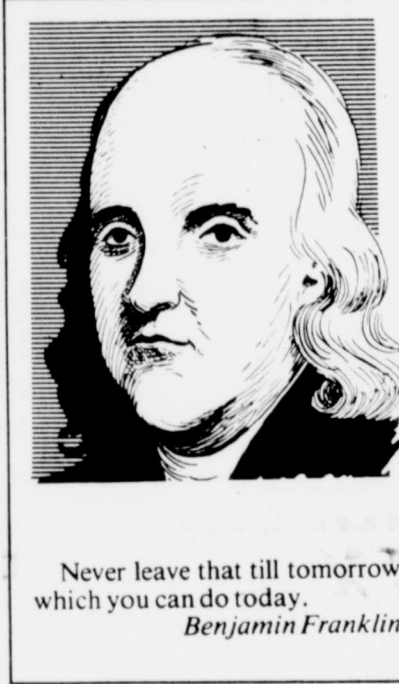

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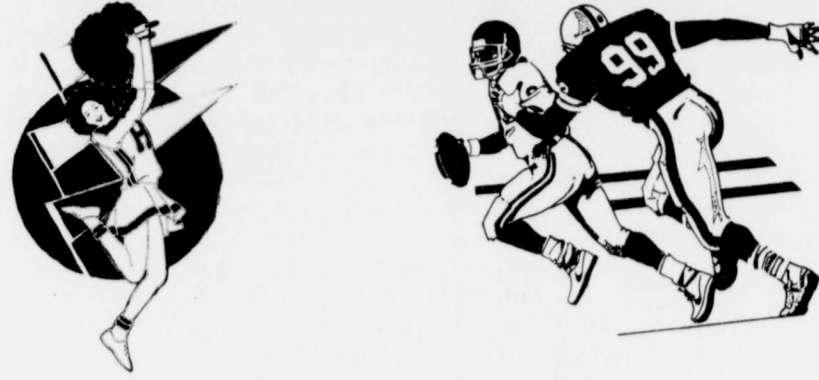

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**Last Days Of Halesboro  
School Remembered...**

On a warm day in May, 1947, we turned out the light and closed the door for the last time at Halesboro School. It was an occasion long overdue.

During the 1940's, World War II had started and had its impact on the nation. The population shifts from small communities to city-based aircraft industries, coastal shipyards, western copper mines and military bases had its impact. The nation had vigorously staggered back to its feet after a first round knockdown at Pearl Harbor. Men had gone off to war, families had moved to work in industries related to the war effort, and communities were changed forever.

The Halesboro community that once had its post office, stores, churches, school, telephone exchange, Masonic lodge and brewery was no exception. The Halesboro school that once offered an educational program from "primer" through the eleventh grade, was now down to 13 students in grades one through six. It seems that the once respected institution of learning at Halesboro was painfully reflecting the demise of a culture that was to be no more...another casualty of war.

In December, 1941, men went away to war with Pearl Harbor in their minds, and I officially started to Halesboro school. The school was in trouble from the first day I arrived to the very last day when we turned out the light.

Starting school in December was by design and not my idea. Leaders in the now diminishing community already feared losing the school because of rapid decline in student population. I was often allowed to visit school as a five-year old with my older sister. I was given a book so that if the school inspector came by, he would think I was a student. My parents and the teachers felt that I should start immediately after my sixth birthday in December, in order to help prop up the declining enrollment. Now, nobody asked me for my opinion at the time, but after a while, I was not too keen on the idea. My most noticeable reaction to school was that I cried for weeks. School wasn't much in my opinion and over the next few years, it turned out I was correct in my judgment.

For the first few years at Halesboro, there were enough students for two teachers. Ms. Smith and Ms. Roberts were two kindly women, who were competent in their field and brave beyond belief. Their job was to educate students at about eight learning levels in two classrooms, build fires, sweep floors, supervise recess, counsel troubled, crying students and plead for materials and a signed voucher for their pay. They probably had their greatest lack of success in the latter, and soon moved on to greener pastures or, at least, to paved roads. Older students moved on to other schools in Deport or mostly Bogata.

Most, however, just moved somewhere and, as we who were left would observe, must have taken the basketball, the softballs and the bats with them.

I was recognized as a student with a great deal of potential in about the fourth grade, since I could read on about the second grade level and do our column addition and subtraction. Our teacher at this time had actually been to college and knew about things like that, but by that time we were down to one teacher and she lived at our house. But, alas, she too tired of the endless duties, muddy roads and crying children and moved away. Things got sticky around Halesboro school about this time. My intellect told me that my dad was my best source of learning. We were down to a few ragged books, two broken saws, three swings with no seats swinging from bois' d arc posts, and the weeds on the school ground were growing about as fast as I was. There had not been a hot lunch served in Halesboro school since the 30's. Lunches were brought to school wrapped in "The Deport Times". If one wanted a drink of water and didn't care for the added enrichment of mosquito larva, then a mason jar of water was added to the old booksack. The REA had touched the school along with the rest of the community and a light bulb swung from the ceiling, and the school had a radio/phonograph that worked for perhaps a year. Nevertheless, the school was in trouble.

We got a new teacher in about 1946. She was another brave soul armed with determination, if not certification, and she was at least 18 years old. By this time, the number of students was down to about 14 or 15, and we had learned about all there was to know. On thing we did notice during the last couple of years at Halesboro was that recess became longer and longer and the teacher stayed inside the building with her head on her desk. Someone even observed that she cried at times. I had finally stopped crying by about the fifth grade.

Playground equipment had gotten down to a very soft softball obtained by students' saving of Masterpiece seals from notebook paper and a 12 pound bat that my father carved from a hickory tree. The softball lasted about a month and I'm sure the bat continues to exist in someone's fence. I'm also sure we still managed to have a few books and at times were actively in pursuit of learning, but rumors persisted about the imminence of consolidation with Deport and/or Bogata schools.

The new teacher married during the last few months of existence of the school, but she didn't move away. Instead she and her husband moved into an old house directly across from the school and set up housekeeping, and oftentimes on very cold days, her young husband would come over to the school and held classes. This was my first experience with a male "teacher". I remember that he would sit near the large stove in the corner so that his cigarette ash could flip into the ash dump. Little did I realize that the future for me held another male teacher, the late G.W. Seay, at Bogata Elementary School. Things were going to be quite different to say the least. It's hard to remember in much detail very much about schooling at Bogata. I noticed that Mr. Seay probably concurred with this statement, since he awarded me with two "D's" on my first six weeks report card at Bogata.

There was no celebration, no grand finale, no crying or cheering, we just turned out the light, locked the door and walked home in 1947.

Those who walked home that day included John Charles Trussell, E. Fay Trussell, Sarah Lou Womack, John Hobbs, Charles Hobbs, Cecilia May Pope, Edward Vaughan, Cecil Wright, Virgil Ray Crump, Yvonne Armstrong, Conrad Hobbs, Margaret Humphrey and Mary Humphrey.

**Wheat Variety Selection  
Is An Important Decision**

The planting of wheat in the Red River Valley area is just around the corner. The time of planting depends on the intended use of the crop. If one has plans to graze their wheat, then the seed should be in the ground by the end of September. However, if the crop is to be grown only for grain, then planting should be delayed until October.

It would appear that the 1990-91 wheat crop will not be a profitable enterprise. But, then what's new about that? All of the agricultural economists are in agreement that very little profit can be anticipated from the upcoming crop. So, one needs to put a pencil to the budget prior to putting the seed in the ground.

It makes sense to graze wheat in order to increase the profit picture for wheat. However, not all operators are situated to where they can make this work. Consider grazing for the other person rather than investing a "ton" of money in stocker calves this fall.

Just as there have been a reduction in the number of producers, there are also fewer seed companies, chemical companies and about every type of agricultural service business supporting the producer. This is the sign of the time. For instance, Pioneer Hi-Bred International just announced that they were going out of the hard red winter wheat breeding business and were donating their breeding stocks to Kansas State University. No mention was made of their soft wheat breeding phase.

So, there will be fewer varieties from which to choose as a result of this action by Pioneer and by Coker Seed Company a few years back.

Most wheat acreage in the country and area is of the soft red winter wheat variety. As a general rule higher yields are made on the soft than on the hard varieties. We are even seeing more of a shift to soft in North Central Texas.

There are no "best" variety. The tenure of a variety is short-lived and plant breeders are constantly upgrading their research techniques to infuse genes into plant material that will result in varieties that have dis-

ease resistance, resistance to the Hessian Fly and on and on.

Coker 9877 and Pioneer 2548 were the two top varieties in the Lamar County wheat variety result demonstration last year. Their yield was 64 and 63 bushels. The demonstration was planted on land farmed by Dwain Jantz of the Maxey Community located northwest of Paris.

Coker 9877 is a new variety that was released last year and had very good disease resistance to all the major diseases except powdery mildew. Pioneer 2548 has been out about three years and has been one of the top yielding varieties in the Lamar County result demonstration plantings for the past three years. Pioneer 2548 had

light septoria leaf blotch this past year, but no problem with leaf rust.

Yield of other varieties included in the demonstration are as follows: Saluda-53; Florida 302-51; Caldwell-47; Florida 303-45; Coker 9733-38; Pioneer 2555-36 and Pioneer 2551-34.

Pioneer 2551 is a perfect example of how a top variety one year "loses" its resistance to a disease such as leaf rust. In the 1988-89 season pioneer 2551 was the top yielding variety with hardly any leaf rust problem. But in the 1989-90 season the variety had no resistance to leaf rust. This just goes to prove that a producer should not plant his entire acreage to one variety.

The article appeared in the Artesia, California paper, and is a director's profile.

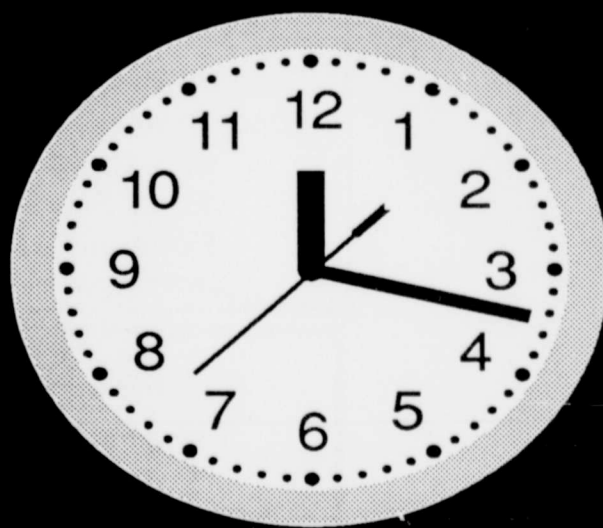
It says that Billie Thornton is also known by her friends as "Jitter".

Hunting season is here. While most hunters are safe, careful and observe game laws, there are some who do not. And it's a good time for those who don't pay attention to safety or laws to think about a few things.

For some reason, there are those hunters who think game laws are stupid, or unreasonable, or simply don't apply to them.

Game laws are made so that birds and animals will have a chance to remain just that...game instead of endangered species that cannot be hunted. While it may be easy to think that "I'll just take a little more than the limit" won't do any harm, what happens when hundreds of people think that? Obviously, game population goes down.

Hunting from vehicles, spotlighting, using illegal ammunition, all are laws made for the purpose of keeping hunting a sport instead of a slaughter, or for the safety of those hunting or in the area in which hunting may be going on.

One of the most common infractions is hunting from roads and firing guns from vehicles. This is not only illegal, but every year results in livestock being injured or killed, or even more devastating, results in the injury or death of a human.

Yet another problem is trespassing. Some people apparently don't realize that they don't have the right to hunt on other people's land without specific permission.

Landowners pay for land in order that they can use it as they see fit...not to provide a hunting place for unauthorized people.

Fishing is a major problem to landowners, as some fishermen fish without permission. It's wise to remember that just because a landowner gave one person permission, that doesn't mean it's wide open for everyone!

Laws aren't passed to harass hunters, or fishers...laws are made to protect, conserve and regulate sensibly.

This season, remember, abide by the rules. It will result in a continuation of enough game for future sport...and in much safer hunting conditions!

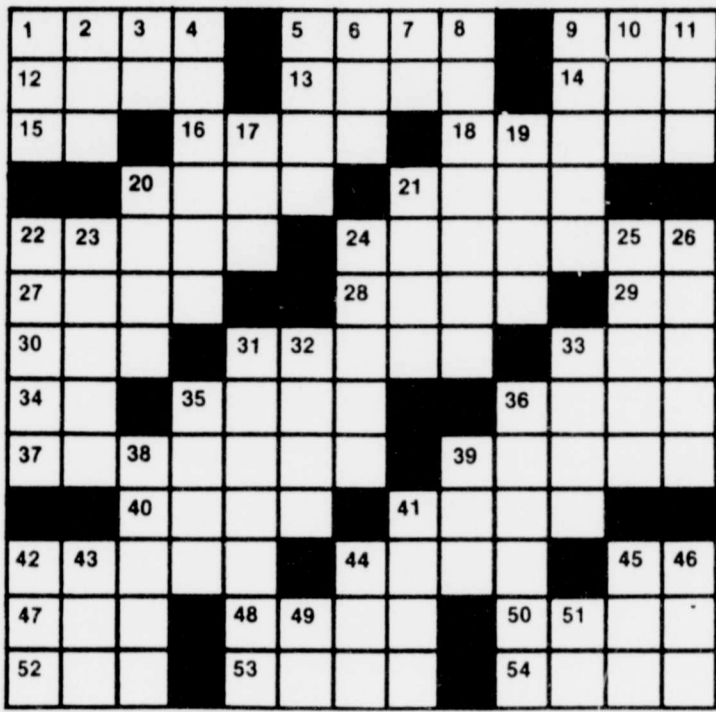
