Board Votes To Change Girl's Athletics Team Name In Spite Of Petition

A petition with 250 names on it was presented to the Talco-Bogata CISD School Board Tuesday night at the board's meeting, asking that there be no name change of the Rivercrest Girls Team Name. However, the Board voted 5-2 to change the name from the Rivercrest Rebelettes to the Rivercrest Lady Rebels.

John Brooks presented the petition to the board.

The girls basketball coach, Valenda Arbuckles, was also on hand with members of the current basketball team.

In other business the board accepted

the transportation report.

They accepted the calendar designated first and second appraisal periods.

They also accepted early dismissal days for the 1990-91 school year. They will be November 21, December 4-5, December 18, March 8.

They appointed school committees for different school activities.

They adopted a policy statement according to the instruction sheets for TASB Localized Update 36.

It was discussed and action was taken on building a back-up well for water at Rivercrest High School.

Items to be put out for bids were: Bogata Elementary School Roof, Bus Barn, Talco, Air conditioning, Administrative offices.

Grievance ordinance co-ordinators were named. They will be Barbara Russell. Vocational will be Craig Ingram.

A principal's report was heard from all three principals, stating student enrollments and the goals each principal wanted to achieve over the year was out.

Minutes were read and approved, financial report heard and payment of bills approved.

Talco School Awarded By Governor's Committee

The Talco School has been congratulated for their academic accomplishments by the Governor's Educational Excellence Committee.

The school qualified for nomination as one of the select schools whose performance is being considered for recognition in one of the three programs administered by the committee. The nomination is based on achievements for the past three years; and the nomination ranks the school

among the top 10% of schools based on performance indicators approved by the committee and the State Board of Education this past spring.

The committee will announce its selections in October following a review of applications and the appropriate data from the Texas Education Agency. The awards will be made at a recognition ceremony in the state capitol in late October.

Robert L. Roberts, Jr. Dies August 9

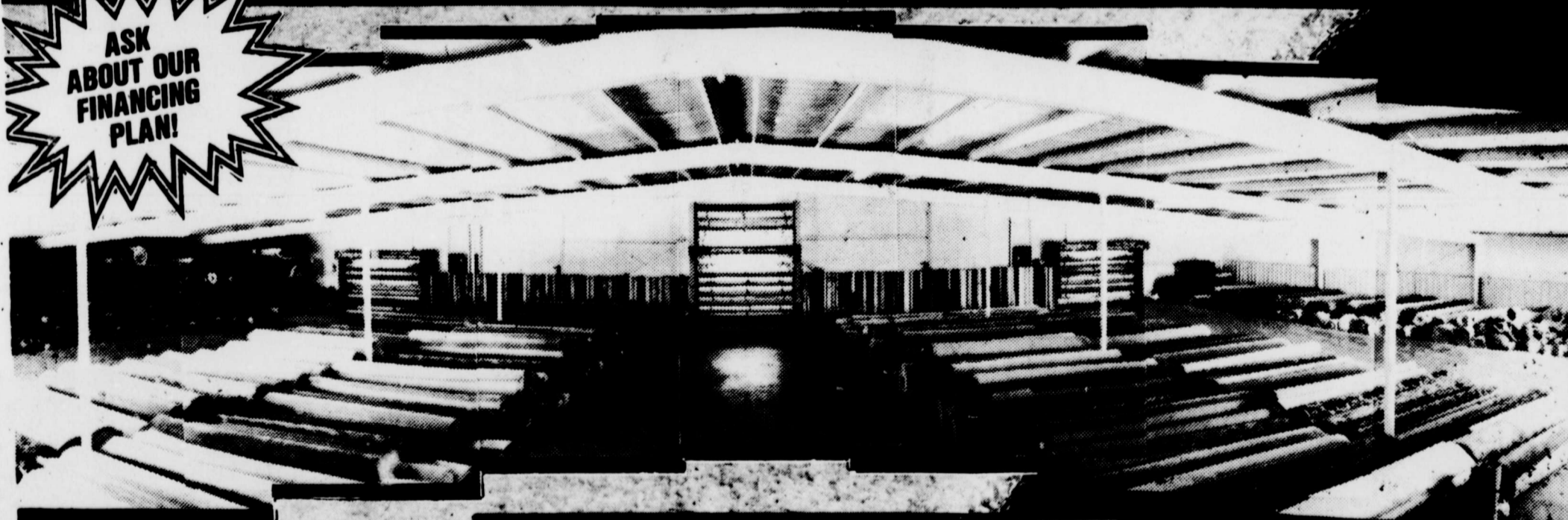
Robert Lee Roberts, Jr., 78, died August 9 in Mother Francis Hospital in Tyler.

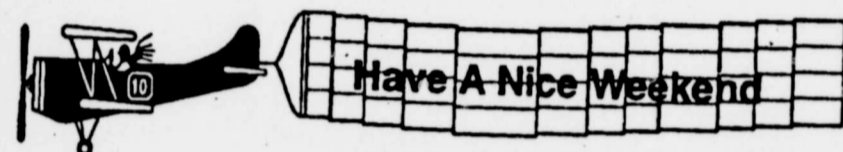

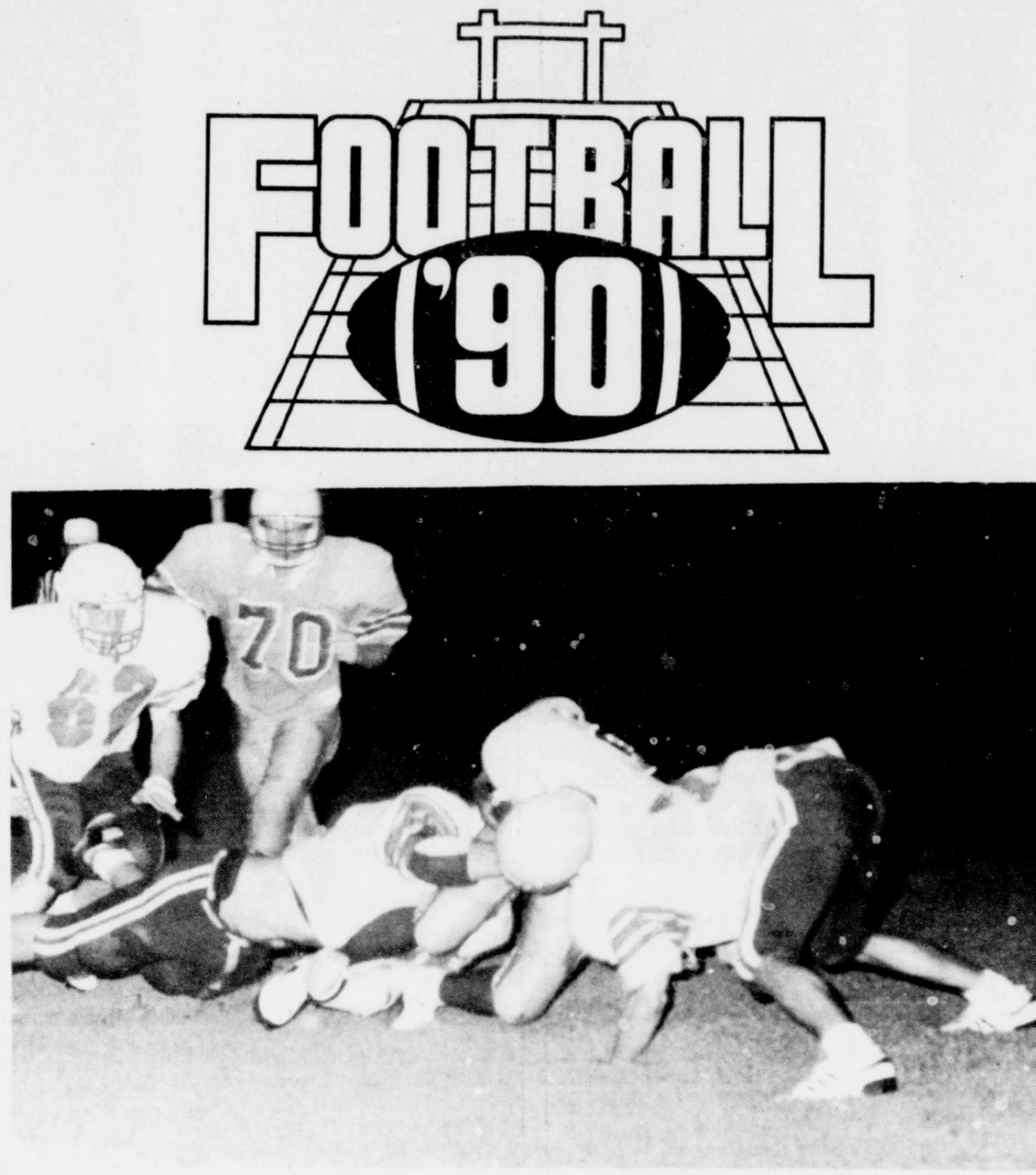

Halesboro School Memories

My memories of Halesboro School begin in 1908. The Dick Denny family, along with some neighbors, left their homes seven miles west of Mt. Pleasant in the summer of 1908 and came to Blossom Prairie to help harvest a bumper cotton crop. We landed at Lone Oak, three miles south of Deport, with a school and gin and store, just after Christmas. We moved to the E.K. Gunn farm, one mile from Halesboro Cemetery Union Church. There were always one or more stores there and chicken peddlers.

The Patten brothers ran one store, also a peddling wagon, along with Will Crump who also had a wagon. Dr. Craddock moved there and practiced medicine for several years before returning to Bogata. I believe he replaced Dr. Shy after his death. My two sisters started school at once. I think I started in 1912, at age seven. We only had six months of school in

those years. We were all farmers and children learned at an early age to work at whatever needed doing.

We walked a mile and a half and there was plenty of black mud then. Our one room school house was on the left hand side of the road, below Uncle George Hobb's house, before crossing the creek toward Morris Chapel.

There were no modern facilities of any kind. A deep ditch out back and an uncovered well in front provided water unless rabbits fell in, then we used creek water or carried a fruit jar of water from home.

We played "crack the whip over the river", "drop the handkerchief" and the boys played ball but I don't remember about the balls and bats. Probably handcrafted, most balls those days were made from yarn raveled from men's work socks with a rock in the middle.

My sisters had a teacher named Miss Ida Thomas. My first teacher was Miss Eulalia Kitchens. My next teacher was her sister, Miss Murky Kitchens. I believe they were from Detroit, then Miss Willie Craddock, her sisters, Joda and Dorcas, were classmates of mine. Miss Willie married Horace Jeffus, a neighbor. He passed away at an early age. Miss Willie and Joda taught school here in Bogata and came back home to live. She also died here.

Other students then were the younger Popes, Bud Arthur, Clara, Lessie, Mae, Daisy and Edna Allen, John, Hiram, Jake Wright and two sisters, Clara Baugh and a brother, Donnie Ward, Dick, Pete and Dessie Daniels, Hubert, Magnus, Thad, Jodie Pittman, stepbrother, Mack Barton and a half-sister, Villa Mae Barton, who died here a few years ago, known as Mae B. Partridge. The woods were full of Hobbs, Ruby, Morris, Phillip George, all cousins. Basil Hockler, Emmitt Goodwin, half-brothers, Billy, Pete Spear and there were others but I can't remember their names now.

I have been back there, but nothing is left but memories.

I would love to attend the reunion but I expect to be in Shreveport that weekend visiting my sister. I doubt very seriously there's anyone left that I went to school with but I have many fond memories of those days.

It's Cow Culling Time In Texas

Weaning time is an excellent opportunity to identify and cull poor producing cows, says a livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Dr. Randall Grooms.

With annual cow costs amounting to about \$350 per head, profitability is an elusive goal for any cow-calf producer. Inferior calves have inferior parents.

Mothers of non-profitable calves are inferior because they calve late in the season or fail to give adequate milk for the calf's growth. In either case, it is highly probable that she will repeat her inferior production next year.

Generally, the bottom five to 20

percent of the cows in a herd produce calves that are significantly below the herd average. Producers determine their culling level by the availability of replacements or the desire for profit.

Sort the smaller, inferior calves from the others. The following morning, put the inferior calves with the cows. Cows claiming these calves can be identified and culled. After weaning calves, many producers prefer to keep cull cows until frost. This allows the cow to regain body condition and weight. With current low prices, now is an excellent time to shape up a cow herd and put it in a more profitable mode.

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at 1014 N. Jefferson in Mt. Pleasant on September 19 from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and from 1 to 3 p.m. Future clinics will be held on the first and third Wednesday of each month.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 18 months and 60 months. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above listed field office.

Social Security Notes

Beware of direct mail solicitations...Many people have reported to me that they received solicitations in the mail that offer to do many things--provide information about the Social Security death benefit, obtain a Social Security number for an infant, help a new bride change her name in Social Security records, to name a few.

All of them have one thing in common--they all ask money to perform the same services provided free by Social Security. Please read these solicitations very carefully and if you have any questions about them,

call us. Usually we can give you the information you need over the telephone, and it won't cost you anything.

If you use one of these firms to get a Social Security number for your child or to change your name in our records, the best thing that could happen is that the process will be delayed. At the worst, you could lose your money and have nothing in return.

These firms cannot get a number for you. All they do is send you an application for a Social Security number card, tell you to fill it out, and mail it to the Social Security office serving you. You can do this yourself and save money by just calling us.

You will get your number card about two weeks after you send us your application and supporting evidence.

The aim of those firms who want to give you "free" information about the Social Security death benefit is to sell you insurance, or perhaps to build a list of prospects they can sell to an

insurance company. So, unless you really want and need additional insurance, just toss this junk mail into your wastebasket. You can get any information you want about Social Security benefits by just calling us.

Some other firms offer to get you a free "personal earnings and benefit estimate statement" if only you buy their product, a book or newsletter for example.

You can get your own free "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement" by calling Social Security and asking. There is no other obligation. And the book being offered, well I have never seen one that contained any information that was not available free from Social Security.

We are concerned that you may needlessly pay for services that the Social Security Administration provides free, and that these businesses promote their services by fostering a false impression that either Social Security will not provide these services or it is difficult for the public to obtain them.

Remember, our services are free. So just toss those direct mail solicitations in the trash and call your nearest Social Security office.

Beef Stroganoff

- 2 lbs. top sirloin, cut into 1-inch-wide strips
- 3 tbsp. shortening
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
- 2 tbsp. cornstarch added to 1/2 cup water
- 2 cups beef bouillon
- 3 tbsp. Sherry
- 3 tbsp. tomato paste
- 1 tsp. dry mustard
- 1/2 cup sour cream

Brown meat in shortening. Add all ingredients except sour cream and cornstarch/water. Simmer for 1 1/2 hours. Before serving, thicken with cornstarch mixture and add sour cream. Can be served with rice or noodles. Serves 4-6.

CREAMY LEMON CHICKEN

- 2 whole chicken breasts, split, skinned and boned (about 1 pound)
- 1 can (10 3/4 ounces) Campbell's condensed Cream of Mushroom soup
- 1/2 cup shredded Swiss or Jarlsburg cheese
- 1 medium lemon
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- Chopped fresh parsley for garnish

Reduce heat to low. Cover; simmer 5 minutes or until chicken is fork-tender, stirring occasionally. Garnish with parsley. Serve with rice if desired. Makes 4 servings.

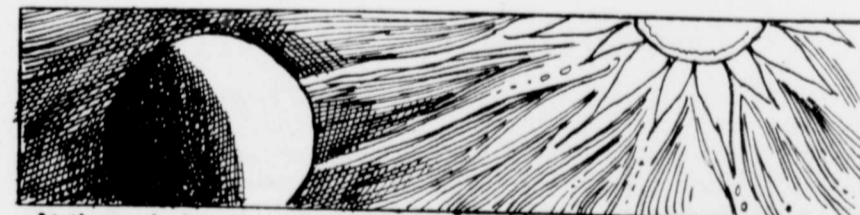

So please if you have any reason to believe that a child you know of is being abused in any way, please contact someone. If you don't do it then no one else will. You could save a child's life with one phone call!

Editors Note: Once more we are running a child's view of things...this time on a much more serious subject than "How I Spent My Summer Vacation". The simple, direct plea to adults to help her contemporaries is short and to the point.

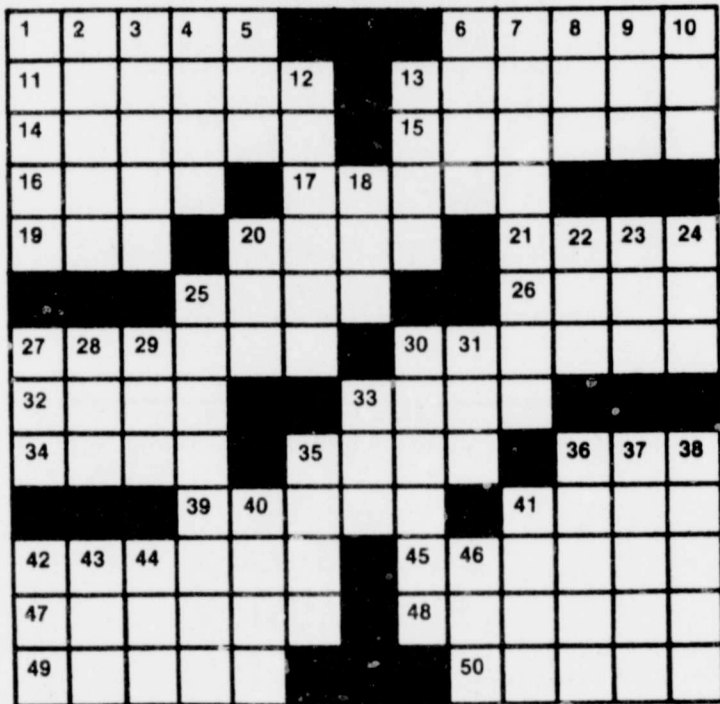

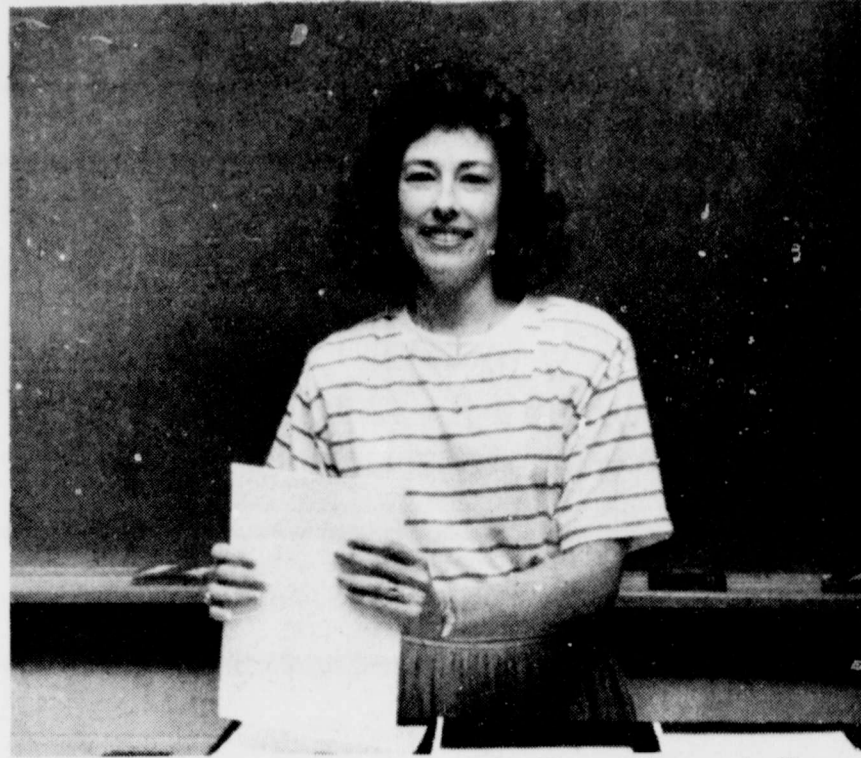
