## Rain, Cold Bring Feeling Of Fall

Fall weather moved into the area in a big way as cloudy skies and colder temperatures sent people scurrying for coats and jackets.

The low was 41 degrees and on Tuesday, accompanied by cold winds the high was only 53 degrees.

Sunday yielded up 1.72 inches of rain, and Monday through Monday

night there was 2.21 inches, according to official reports.

Farmers desperately trying to get their cotton harvested before heavy rains hit were cut short in their efforts, leaving a lot of the crop, much of which was planted late, still in the fields to await a drying trend.

Some people reported a very light

frost Wednesday morning in low areas.

The outlook, with typical Texas fickleness, is for warm, sunny weather during the latter part of the week.

Temperatures should climb back into the eighties by weekend.

But, in the meantime, it's been the first real taste of fall.

## TAAS Testing To Be Held At RHS

For the past five years, the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) has measured minimum skills in mathematics, reading and writing for students in grades 3,5,7,9, and 11.

This October, only the TEAMS testing program will continue for exit level, and a new testing program, the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS), will be implemented. The TAAS program measures a broader range of essential elements than the TEAMS program and better addresses the academic goals of the 1990's which stress the importance of teaching students higher order thinking skills.

As required by Section 101.0(c) of the Texas Administrative Code, the assessment instruments in mathemat-

ics, reading and writing will be administered for grades 3,5,7,9 and 11 in all school districts in the state. For all levels the writing test will be October 16, and the reading test on October 17 and the mathematics test on October 18.

Students who are eligible to take exit level TEAMS will be administered the English language arts test on October 17 and the mathematics test on October 18. No make-up sessions will be allowed for any TAAS or TEAMS test.

Students are encouraged to obtain sufficient sleep the nights prior to testing, and to eat a good breakfast at home or at school on these days. As there are no make-up tests, students are strongly encouraged to be in attendance and be alert.

### Butter milk Cake

Cream together 3 cups sugar, 1 cup Crisco.

Add 2 T lemon extract and 6 egg yolks. Put 6 T corn starch in cup and finish filling cup with flour. Sift flour 3 times and add 2 more cups of flour and 1/2 tsp. salt. Combine flour mixture alternately with: 1 cup buttermilk and 1/4 tsp. soda. Mix well. Beat egg whites and fold into mixture. Bake 1 1/2 hours at 325. Don't open oven while baking!

### Frozen Salad

1 large Cool Whip, 8 oz.  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 1/2 cups pecans  
5 bananas (mashed)  
1 pt. sour cream  
4 Tbs. lemon juice  
1 large can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained  
1/2 cup maraschino cherries  
Mix pineapple and lemon juice. Add banana and cherries. Stir in sugar and pecans. Fold in sour cream and Cool Whip. Freeze. Makes a large amount.

### Banana Nut Cake

2 1/2 cups sugar  
3/4 cup Crisco or butter  
3 eggs  
6 Tbs. buttermilk  
3/8 tsp. salt  
3 cups flour  
1 1/2 tsp. soda  
4 1/2 bananas  
1 cup chopped nuts  
1 1/2 tsp. Vanilla  
Cream Crisco and sugar, add eggs one at a time and beat well. Sift flour, salt and soda. Add dry ingredients alternately with buttermilk. Add mashed bananas, nuts and vanilla. Cook slowly in tube pan or 2 loaf pans about 1 1/2 hours at 325.

### Lemon Chess Pie

1 1/2 cups sugar  
2 heaping tbs. flour  
3 eggs  
1/2 stick butter or oleo, melted  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
2 tsp. lemon extract  
Cook in unbaked pie shell for 10 or 15 minutes at 425 and bake rest of time about 45 minutes at 325.

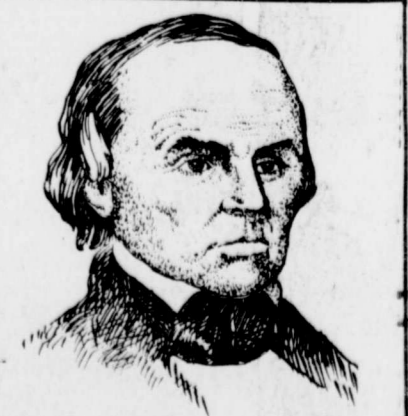

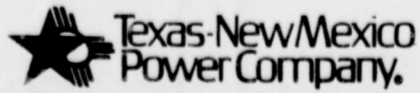

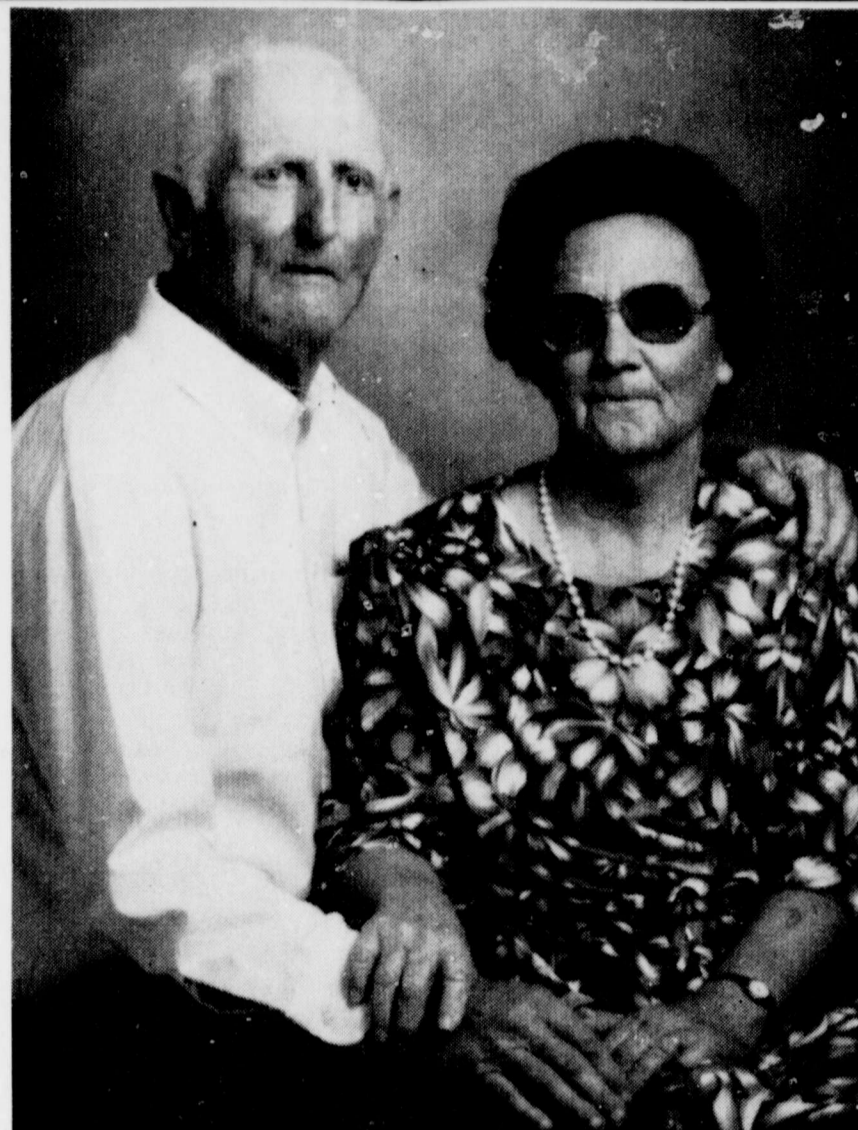

**Booster Club Meets**

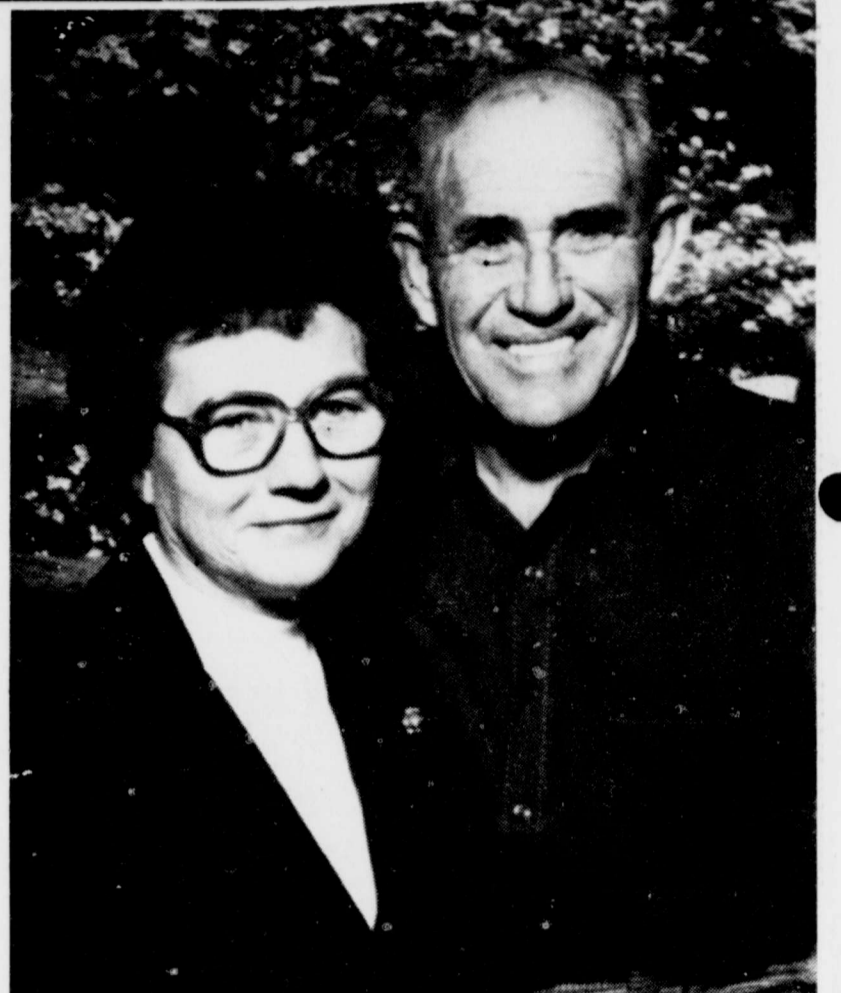

**Arigo Riders To Sponsor Coggins Testing**

The Arigo Riders will sponsor a Coggins testing for horses, which will be open to the public, on Saturday, October 13 at 1 p.m. at the Bogata Rodeo Arena. Dr. Don Anderson will test the horses for \$8.50 per animal. With this summer's heat, combined with heavy rains, conditions are ideal for insect population growth and all horse owners are alerted to watch for symptoms of equine infectious anemia, or EIA. EIA produces anemia, intermittent fever and severe loss of weight in horses and is not curable with medical treatment. Symptoms of the disease include a sudden rise in temperature; profuse sweating; rapid breathing; depression; weight loss; bloodshot eyes with a watery discharge; and swelling on legs or the lower part of the body. Incubation period for the disease is from several weeks up to several months and in the chronic form, animals will often appear to recover, except for continued weight loss and body condition and may continue to live for years. Animals will die from the disease, and it is a long and painful process, one which should not be inflicted upon the animal. State laws require a current Coggins test every six months and every potential horse owner is asked to make certain that any horse they may purchase is "clean" before being introduced onto their property and into their horse herd. For additional information, horseowners should contact their veterinarian.

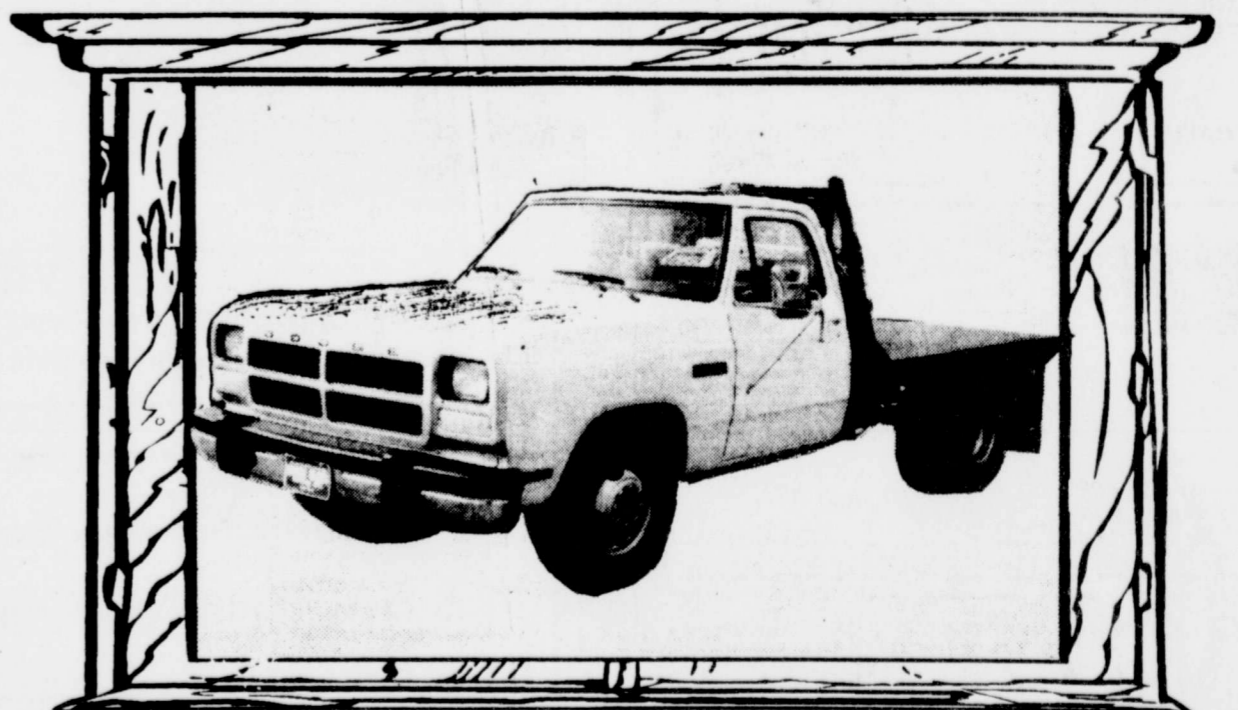
