SWEET POTATO FLANS

Makes 10 servings Preparation: 20 to 25 minutes Cooking: About I hour pounds sweet potatoes

to 2 tablespoons lemon juice cup hot (170 degrees) melted unsalted butter Salt and ground white pepper

Nutmeg Hot red pepper sauce tablespoons softened unsalted

1. Put potatoes in 4-quart soup kettle; cover with cold water. Cover and boil until potatoes are soft, about 35 to 40 minutes. Drain, cool, peel, and cut potatoes into 11/2-inch chunks; set

2. Put eggs, egg yolks, and 1 tablespoon lemon juice in a food processor fitted with the metal blade. Process, adding hot melted butter. Pulse in 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, a pinch of nutmeg, and several dashes hot pepper sauce. Adjust seasoning to

3. Add half the potatoes and process until minced. Add remaining potatoes and process to a fine, silky puree. Adjust seasoning, adding lemon juice, salt, pepper, nutmeg, and hot red pepper sauce to taste.

4. Adjust oven rack to lowest position. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Use oftened butter to generously coat ten cup porcelain ramekins or heatproof ustard cups. Spoon puree into the molds. Cover each mold with a buttered wax-paper square, buttered side

5. Put filled molds in a baking dish lined with a thin tea towel. Add enough hot tap water to reach halfway up the sides of the molds (do not allow dishes to float). Bake 30 to 35 minutes. (Can turn off oven, leave door ajar, cover with foil, and keep warm for 30 min-

6. To serve, remove wax paper, and loosen each flan from its mold by carefully passing a thin knife around the inside edge. Carefully invert the molds on warm plates. Serve immediately.



ier, since federal standards have been met, allowing them to continue shipping breeding cattle out of state.

For years, Texas ranchers, veterinarians and the Texas Animal Health Commission staff have worked against the clock to meet U.S. Department of Agriculture goals for reducing brucellosis infection.

In 1988, the USDA set new stringent goals for eradicating the disease, threatening to virtually quarantine breeding cattle from Texas and five other states if infection was not

Texas ranchers may breathe eas- substantially reduced by October 1990. The high-incidence, or Class B states are Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma an dFlorida, all of which came under federal review earlier this month and were determined by the USDA to b emaking adequate eradication progress.

Brucellosis infection in Texas dropped to 698 quarantined herds during federal fiscal year 1990, down from 1,037 for FY 1989. This translates to .49 percent, or about five infected herds for every 1,000 herds
