Ice, Snow, Bitter Cold, Then Ice Again! More On The Way!

After an unusually mild autumn, the first official day of winter turned out to be a real chiller.

Friday morning, December 21st, a massive arctic cold front moved into the area, sending temperatures plunging, and falling rain began to freeze.

Soon a layer of ice coated roads, fences, fields and homes, and sleet took the place of the freezing rain. Afterwards it was fine snow, which layered over the ice, leaving the area looking Christmas-card perfect.

Conditions on roads and highways were much less than perfect, however, as accidents occurred throughout the area, ranging from minor to

major. Law enforcement officials and wrecker crews worked round the clock to attend to accidents.

Motorists were warned that unless it was an emergency they should stay off the highways.

Plans were soon in disarray as people trying to get home for the Christmas holiday found themselves stranded or hours and even days behind schedule.

Schools, already out for the holidays, fortunately were not forced to cancel, while youngsters availed themselves of the chance to slide,

glide and crash on the icy surface.

Snow and sleet fell through Saturday, and clear skies Sunday sent nighttime temperatures to about 9 degrees. Wednesday conditions were safer, but late afternoon and night time ice created a buildup on porches, steps and trees that was beautiful to behold.

Thursday morning the temperature hovered right at freezing, but roads continued their clearing trend.

However, the weather prediction is for massive ice and snow to hit just in time for New Year's. So, after a long mild spell, the area is firmly in the grip of old man winter.

Titus County To Get Seal Coating In 1991

Titus County will be receiving a seal coating on several highways during the 1991 year.

Following are the roads in Titus County, with its limits and miles: FM 3417 from US 271 to FM 127, 4.2 miles; US 271 from Franklin County line to FM 1896, 5.9 miles; Texas 49 from 0.8 miles east of US 271 to 0.6 miles west of Hart Creek, 0.6 miles; FM 71 from Franklin County Line to

US 271 in Talco, 0.9 miles; FM 71 from 2.8 miles east of US 271 to FM 1402, 6.5 miles; I-30 from 0.8 miles west of FM 1001 to 0.9 miles west of Morris County line, 7.2 miles; FM 899 from US 271 in Mt. Pleasant to I-39 service road, 2.9 miles; FM 1896 from Franklin County line to US 271, 2.3 miles; FM 2348 from Texas 49 to Texas 11, 8.3 miles.

A customer asked the other day if we charged for putting in a wedding announcement. A few days later an elderly lady asked in Bogata if there was a charge for putting in local news! The answer to both is a resounding NO of course, but it set me to thinking it might be a good idea to list exactly what the papers charge for and what they don't charge for.

We do not charge for putting in local news such as who is visiting whom, or who has returned from a trip.

We do not charge for put in standard birth announcements, and we do not charge for putting in wedding or engagements. We don't charge for pic-

tures that accompany these, and we do not charge for anniversary announcements.

We do not charge to put in write ups about people's promotions, achievements or other activities.

We do not charge to run a story announcing a revival or special church program, but we do reserve the right to limit the length of such

announcements.

We don't charge for non-profit fund raisers such as church bake sales, school or civic club events.

We do not charge for school news. We welcome, indeed, positively beg for such items as are listed above.

We DO charge for cards of thanks, ads that are selling something.

We do charge to publish poems, even those in memory of someone.

We do charge for happy birthday or anniversary ads that read "Happy 30th birthday John" or "Lordy Lordy, Look Who's Forty". The reason we have to charge for poems and ads like that are that if we didn't we would have no more room in the paper for news.

We receive several dozen poems each week from all over the nation, requesting publication. We charge for legal notices.

So, you see, we charge for much less than we publish free!

That means you should feel free to call in all upcoming events, all news, all things of interest.

We hope this will clarify thing anyone who had a question.

Sales Taxes Show "Nice" Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that his office sent checks totaling \$88 million to cities and counties across Texas that collect local sales taxes.

"This month's checks show a nice increase over last December's and that's a good indication of a healthy and growing state economy," Bullock said.

Sales tax rebates to Texas cities this month are up 9% over last December's figures and up 8% over last year's total payments at this time.

Payments to cities totaled \$79 million and Houston received the largest check, \$13 million. Dallas received the second largest check with \$8 million.

Mt. Pleasant received \$88,454.79 for a 3.88% increase.

Talco received \$521.00 for an 18.08% decrease over last December's payment.

Bogata received \$2,311.11 for a .18% increase while Clarksville received \$14,072.37 for a 2.23% increase. Detroit received no payment

for this period.

Blossom received \$1,053.23 for a 2.66% decrease.

Deport received \$970.87 for a 1.11% increase over the payment for last December. Paris received \$211,711.37 for a 13.10% increase.

Also included in this month's check were quarterly payments totaling \$138 million for the state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department. The payments to MTA's reflect taxes collected in August, September and October.

Breakfast Pizza

- 1 lb. sausage (mild or hot)
1 8 oz. pkg. Crescent rolls
1 c. sharp Cheddar cheese, grated
1 c. Mozzarella cheese, grated
6 eggs, beaten
1/2 c. milk
1/8 t. pepper
3/4 t. oregano, optional

Cook sausage in medium skillet. Drain and set aside. Separate crescent dough in 8 triangles. Place in 12" greased pizza pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 5 minutes on lower rack of oven. Reduce temperature to 350. Sprinkle dough with sausage and cheese. Combine eggs and next three ingredients. Pour over sausage-cheese mixture. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes.

Pepperoni Pizza Dip

- 1 8 oz. pkg. Cream Cheese, softened
1/2 c. sour cream
1 t. oregano
1/8 t. garlic powder
1/8 t. crushed red pepper, optional
1/2 c. pizza sauce
1/2 c. chopped pepperoni
1/4 c. sliced green onion
1/4 c. chopped green pepper
1/2 c. grated Mozzarella cheese

In small mixer, beat together cream cheese, sour cream, oregano, garlic powder, and red pepper. Spread in 9 or 10" pie plate. Spread pizza sauce over the top. Sprinkle with pepperoni, green onion and green pepper. Bake at 350 for 10 minutes. Top with cheese, bake 5 minutes or until cheese is melted and mixture is heated through. Serve with crackers, broccoli flowerettes or sweet pepper strips.

Lemon Kiss Cookies

- 1 1/2 c. oleo
3/4 c. sugar
1 T. lemon extract
2 3/4 c. flour
1 1/2 c. finely chopped almonds
1 1/4 oz. pkg. Chocolate Kisses
1/2 c. semi-sweet chocolate chips
1 T. Crisco

In large bowl, cream oleo, sugar and lemon extract until light and fluffy. Lightly spoon flour into cup, level off. Add flour and almonds. Cover and chill at least 1 hour. Preheat oven to 375. Shape 1 T. dough around Kiss. Roll in hands to form balls. Bake 8-12 minutes on ungreased cookie sheets. Cool 1 minute. Remove to rack. Sprinkle with powdered sugar. Melt chocolate chips and Crisco on low heat. Drizzle over cooled cookies.

Mexican fudge

- 1 lb. grated Cheddar cheese
4-5 eggs, depending on size
1 jar green sauce, 8 oz.
Grate 1 lb. cheese in bottom of 9x13 pan. Beat eggs and add green sauce to eggs. Pour over grated cheese and grate second pound of cheese over egg mixture. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes. Let cool slightly and cut in small squares.

Santa Fe Chicken

- 1 1/4 lb. chicken breasts, boned and skinned
1 t. paprika
1 onion, chopped
1 t. salt
1/4 t. pepper
1 green pepper, chopped
1 clove minced garlic or 2 T garlic powder
3 T. oil
1 can Rotel tomatoes and chilies
1 10 oz. pkg. grated Monterey Jack cheese
1 can chicken broth
1 1/2 c. Uncle Ben's rice in an Instant
Cut chicken in thin strips. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Heat oil in skillet over medium high heat. Cook chicken in oil for 2 minutes. Add onion, green pepper and garlic, cook until tender, about 4 minutes, stirring. Drain Ro-tel. Add liquid to skillet, bring to boil. Stir in rice and tomatoes and green chilies. Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10-15 minutes and sprinkle with cheese. Reheat in electric skillet. This recipe works well in electric skillet.







Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson, District Manager

Despite advances in the economic status of most retirees, older women, especially women over age 85, remain one of the most economically vulnerable groups in our society. Social Security hopes that its current Supplemental Security Income outreach effort will assist some of these older women.

Because of differences in life expectancies, 70% of Social Security beneficiaries age 85 and older are women. Their benefits are usually lower than men in the same age group because historically women have had lower paying jobs or have taken time out of the labor force to care for their families.

Additionally, many women at 65 have savings and other resources

which are gone by age 85. Their resources may be depleted by a husband's final illness or the increased living expenses of living alone as a widow.

SSI provides an income floor for many older people with low Social Security benefits and reduced financial resources. Over 75% of the SSI recipients over age 85 are women, and advocacy groups believe many more older women may be eligible for SSI.

Social Security Commissioner Gwendolyn King has committed the agency to an outreach effort to ensure that all individuals who are potentially eligible for SSI know about the program, know what the benefits of the program can mean to them, and have an opportunity to obtain benefits.
