Rivercrest Recognized For Exceptional TEAMS Scores

The State Board of Education and the Texas Education Agency has recently announced that Rivercrest School received recognition for the 1989-90 Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test.

The selection criteria includes the following categories:

Exceptional Achievement: Schools with 90% or more of the students tested mastering all TEAMS tests taken, or

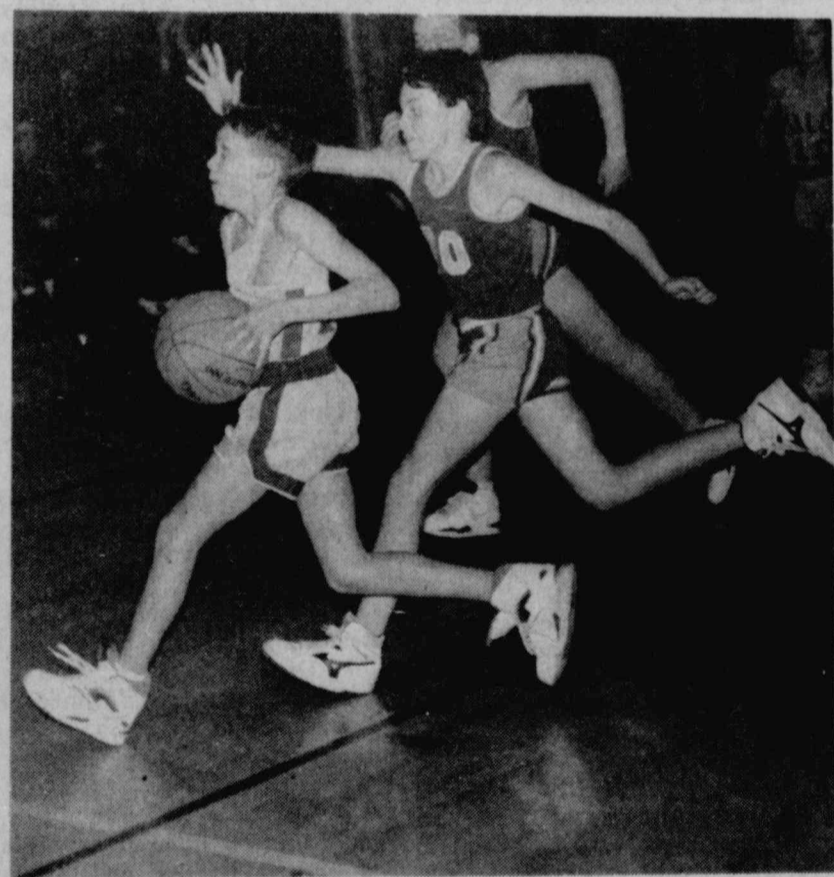
Exceptional Gain: Schools with at

least 30% or more students mastering all tests taken than mastered in the previous year.

In a letter from Monte Hasic, Chairman of the State Board of Education, directed to Freddy Wade, Superintendent, the letter stated "The 1989-90 school year heralds the final year of the TEAMS test. It also marks the year that more schools met the selection criteria than in any previous year. This year, 754 schools will be recognized for their outstanding performance on TEAMS.

"The State Board of Education, teachers, administration and students and the school in your district is recognized for this accomplishment. You, your staff, students, parents and community are to be commended for your effective leadership, quality instruction, dedicated efforts and support in achieving academic excellence.

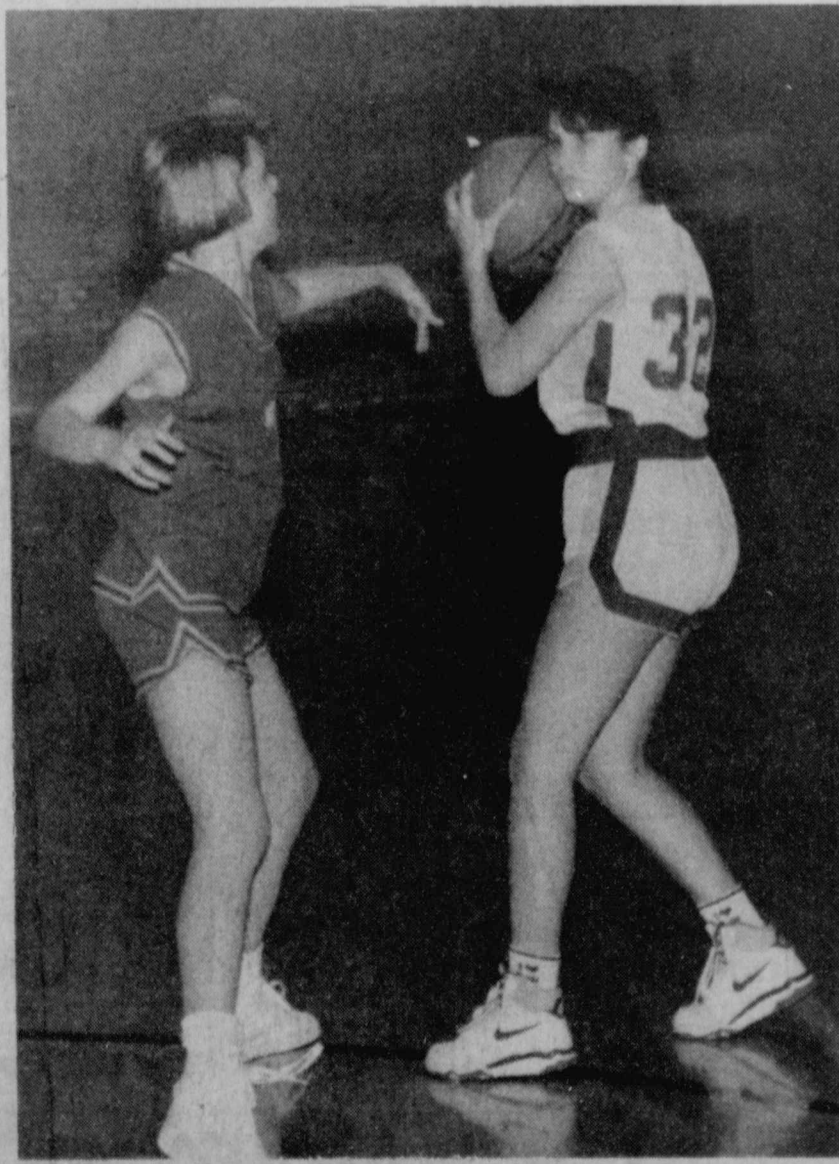

Girl Scout Cookie Sale Begins

If you want to order your Girl Scout cookies this year, it should be fairly easy to spot a Girl Scout. She'll be wearing a button that says "I Love Girl Scout Cookies," with a big red heart on it.

The annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale will begin January 11, with girls taking orders through January 15. You can expect delivery of your favorite cookies between February 22 and March 6.

Seven varieties will be offered at \$2.25 per box. Golden Yangles, a sugar-free snack cracker introduced last year, will be available again this year, as well as the old favorites: Caramel DeLites, Thin Mints, Peanut Butter Sandwiches, Shortbread, Lemon Pastry Cremes and Peanut Butter Patties.

Betsy Mills, coordinator of the cookie sale for Red River Valley Girl Scout Council, states that proceeds from the sale will help fund the many programs and activities of the Girl Scouts, including their new national service project, "Right to Read". A portion of the proceeds stays with the troop, she says, to help pay for their

projects and activities, while the council's portion pays for services to the troops, and helps maintain Camp Gambill and operate the council office.

Mrs. Mills stressed that the cookie sale is also an important part of the Girl Scout program, as it teaches girls some of the basic skills they need in life. Learning to make decisions, setting goals and making plans to reach those goals, accepting responsibility and managing money are all skills that can be learned through participation in the cookie sale, she said.

An incentive program offered by the council allows girls to earn awards based on the number of boxes they sell. They can also earn credit toward camp or program event fees, as well as Girl Scout sponsored national or international events.

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
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Rackliff On Dean's List At NTCC

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

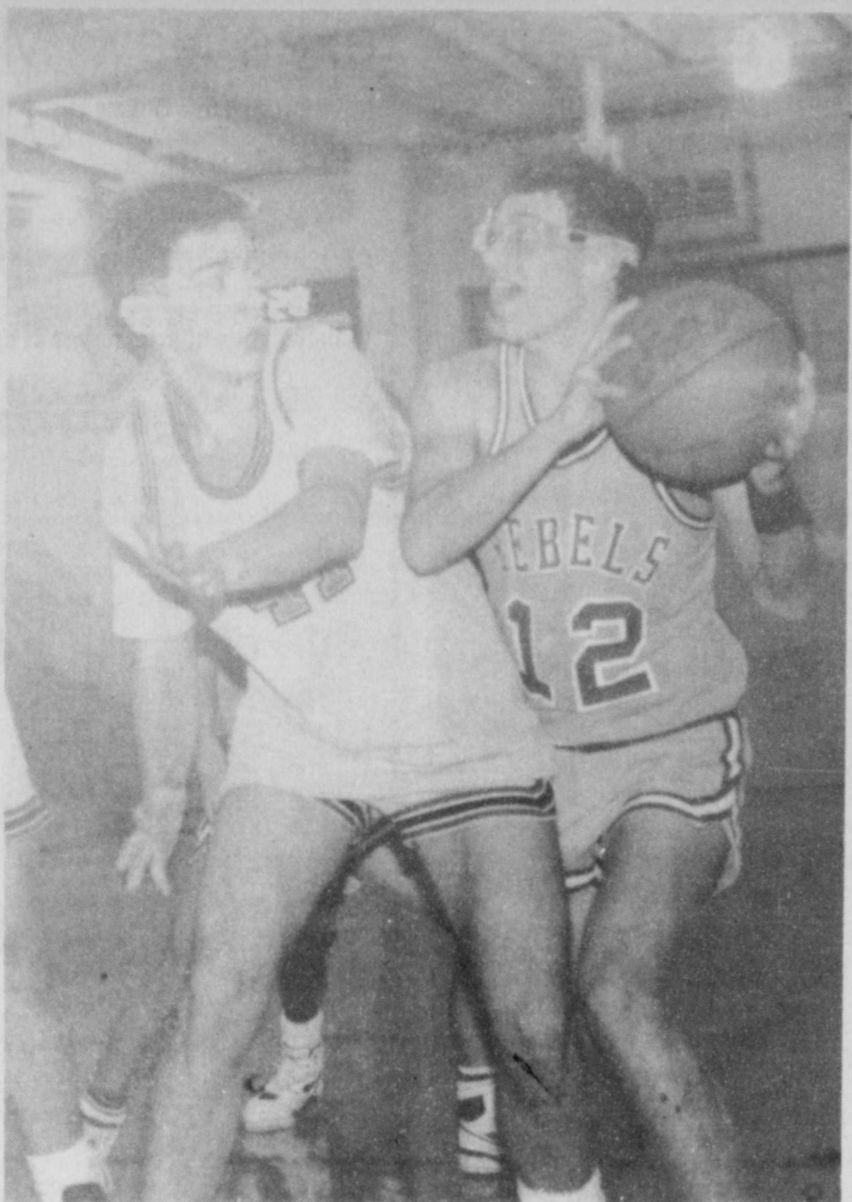

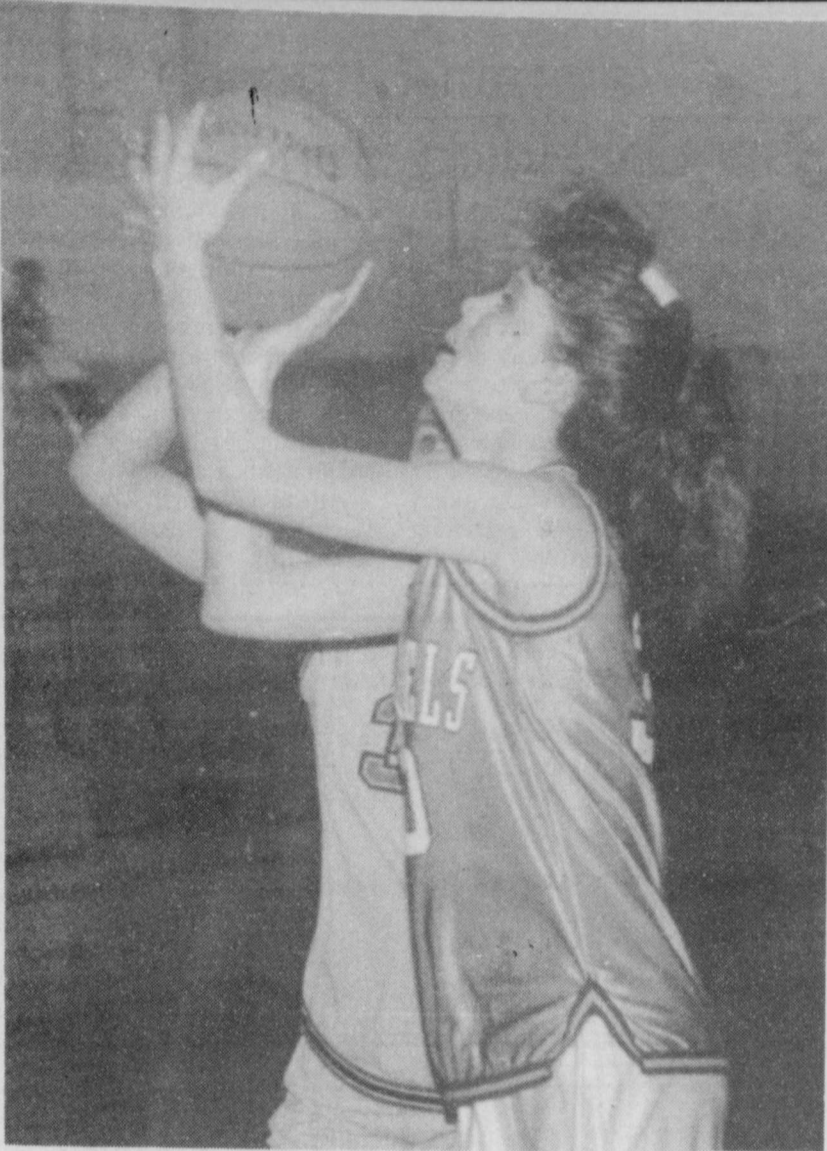

"The State Board of Education, teachers, administration and students and the school in your district is recognized for this accomplishment. You, your staff, students, parents and community are to be commended for

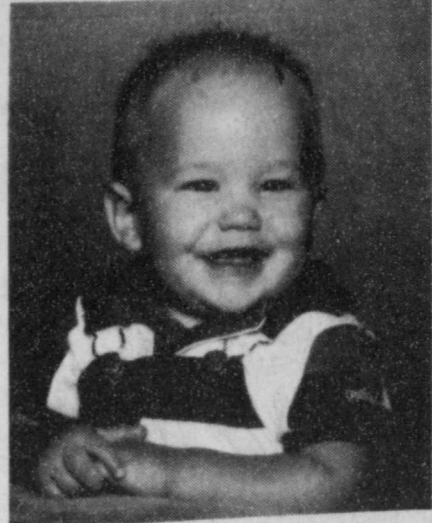

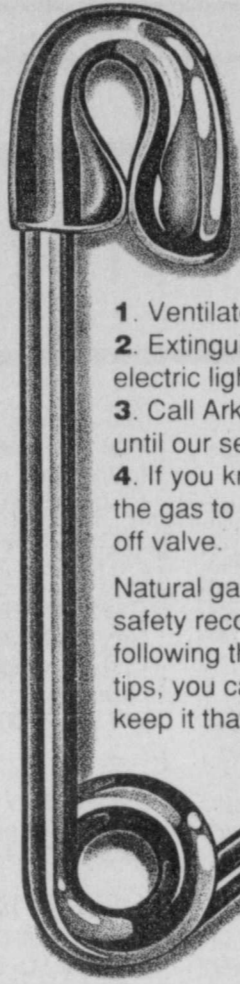

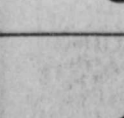
