My husband has been right along with me on many of these ventures....in fact, he was the one on hand when they caught the last bank robber over near Blos-

But he says he'll pass on going to the Middle East.

Only the United States Postal Service may deliver second-class material. USPS in turn takes our money and busy radio and viewing time from media that are in direct competition with

Working taxpayers may qualify to claim a credit on their federal tax returns based on child or dependent care

Depending on the adjusted gross income, the credit could be as much as \$720 for one qualifying person of \$1,440 for two or more. To qualify for the credit: 1. The taxpayer, an spouse if married, must work or be looking for work, and 2. The qualifying dependent must be your child under age 13, disabled dependent or disabled spouse. There are some exceptions for students and disabled spouses.

To claim the credit, file your return on Form 1040 or Form 1040A. Married taxpayers must file a joint return. Remember, you must list the social security numbers for dependents that have reached 2 years of age, and the name, address and social security number of your dependent care provider or be able to show that you tried to get the information.

Limitations, other important specifics and the calculation of the dependent care credit are in Publication 503, Child and Dependent Care Expenses. For a free copy of the IRS publication, call 1-800-829-3676.



Five years ago, before Murl and ters, horses that are known for their smooth gate and fox-like walking pattern. Like the fox, the horses place their hind hooves into the same grooves that their front hooves make, leaving only two hoof prings.

You can ride Foxtrotters for a long time. They don't wear out easily, and because of their smooth gait, you don't bounce around," Murl said. Before taking upriding, Murl didn't

know much about horses. She began riding only five years ago, after she and Johnny married. "I was from Arlington and moving out here and learning to ride a horse was quite a change for me," she said. "My kids are still in awe that I actually ride a horse, regardless of the weather. It's like I'm always saying "chalk one up for old Grandma" to them.

The Hawks would like to see more Foxtrotter interest develop in the area. "The horses are not real common in this area. Mostly quarter horses are


around here. It's hard to trail ride with quarter horses because Foxtrotters have a faster gate," she said The average week-long ride costs
